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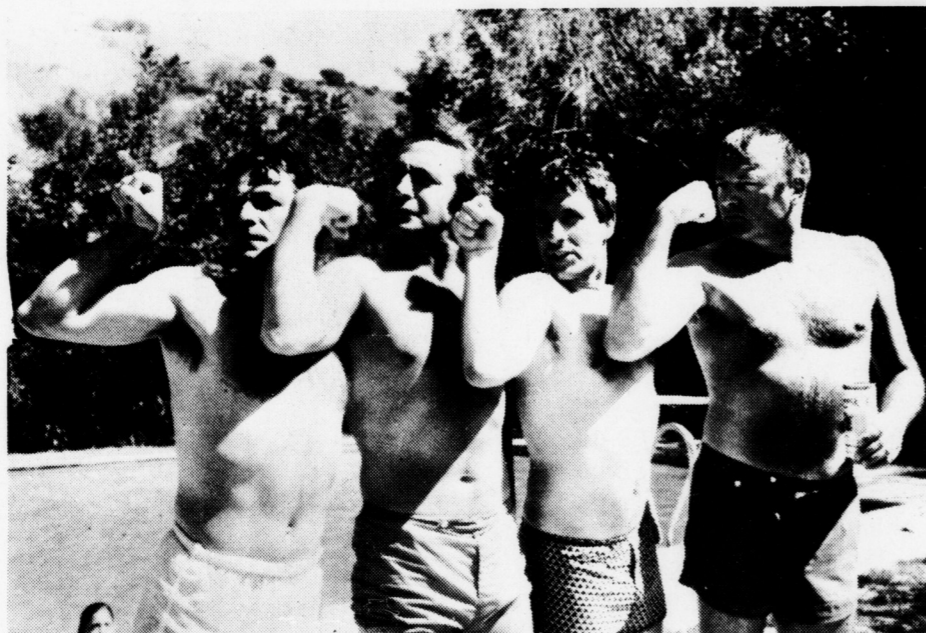

'HUSBANDS':

MAN'S LOVE FOR MAN IN THE STRAIGHT WORLD

Al Ruban and Sam Shaw Present Ben Gazzara, Peter Falk, John Cassavetes in HUSBANDS/Produced by Al Ruban/Associate Producer Sam Shaw/Written and Directed by John Cassavetes/From Columbia Pictures

Don't let John Cassavetes con you. He purports to be a maker of filmic entertainment, but he's a sly fox. For, you see, he's really a medical examiner: vivisectioning human relationships and recording his findings on celluloid. As you watch "Shadows" or "Faces" or "Husbands", you realize this. He's snuck up on you, hasn't he? For there you are, your inner machinations projected from wall to wall and you see them - exactly as they are - perhaps for the first time. If Mr. Cassavetes has his way, you'll analyze them and, hopefully, you'll see those crippling cancers you could never find. "My God," you'll say, "I could cut them out with quick, clean slices!" That's what you'll say - if Mr. Cassavetes has his way.



You see, John Cassavetes has no pretensions to corrective surgery. He has no answer; no overnight cures. And why should he? These are diseases only the patients themselves can cure. But someone has to open us up and expose the cancers to our eyes - it's the only hope. Other film makers have tried but, somehow, their cameras are always blurred. Mr. Cassavetes has the only X-ray machine in town that always takes razor-sharp pictures.

"Husbands" records man's love for man in the straight world. To reiterate, Mr. Cassavetes' beautiful film does not exaggerate or theatricalize this love. He has not made an entertainment, but an accurate recording of absolute relationships - the ones buried under the inhibitions. The trick is in who Mr. Cassavetes invites to his parties. In "...Virginia Wolff" or "Boys in the Band", the exposures are provided by the puncturing of the

skin by ice picks. Eventually, we can see a faint glimmer of truth through the holes. But Mr. Cassavetes always invites people who are happy to come naked. The instant we see them, we recognize them as people we know too intimately, but not well - ourselves. We're embarrassed at their (our) exposure and find ourselves in emotional pain at this sudden confrontation with ourselves. Some of us can't take it and leave the theater soon after the party has only begun. We revel in the sight of other people's blood, but the sight of our own makes us pale. "Another drink, bartender - and hurry!"

"Husbands", however, is not a particularly negative film, as "Faces" was. The love of Peter Falk, Ben Gazzara and Cassavetes for each other, while producing frightening after-shocks - especially on their wives - is a beautiful (because it



is a natural) thing.

The death of a beloved fourth member of this male assemblage is what strips the masks away. Suddenly,

if temporarily, man as natural focal point of the universe is apparent to them all. As Gazzara says to his two male cohorts:

"Aside from sex - and my wife is very good at it - I love you guys the best." The two kid him about being "a fag" and he joins the kidding, but they are doing just that - kidding. They accept man's love for man, as the natural order of things, without question - perhaps for the first time - and acknowledge its existence as the only enduring joy in their otherwise dreary lives. As one of the men notes (and pardon the paraphrasing, but I assure you the thought is exact): "It's only for the breasts and legs that we go home, isn't it? That's the only reason, isn't it?"

The relevance of "Husbands" to the homosexual world is the comforting realization that man's love for man is a universal and the only difference between the homosexual and his straight counterpart is the heterosexual's lack of this love's sexual extension.

On "Husband's" periphery are incisive looks into the games men and women play with each other - the horrors of which only the most masochistic of homosexuals would put up with - the tedious put-on of a woman in a bar, as the three men harass her into singing "from the heart" after innumerable tries. (Aside to Women's Lib: do you really think she'd put up with that from a woman for more than five seconds?)

Much of the film is slow and painstakingly detailed, with no theatrical "heightened-reality", but if you find "Husbands" boring, your life must be an endless stream of psychological outs. However, if you're really looking for truth, Cassavetes is worth all the acid in town.

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Its a big job trying to keep up with so many of the happenings South of Market. This flower tries to attend everything in the Bay Area. So I may touch on anything, anywhere and anytime. FULL MOON COMING

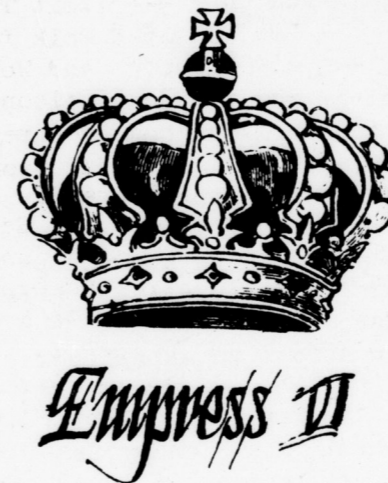
Dear Reader:

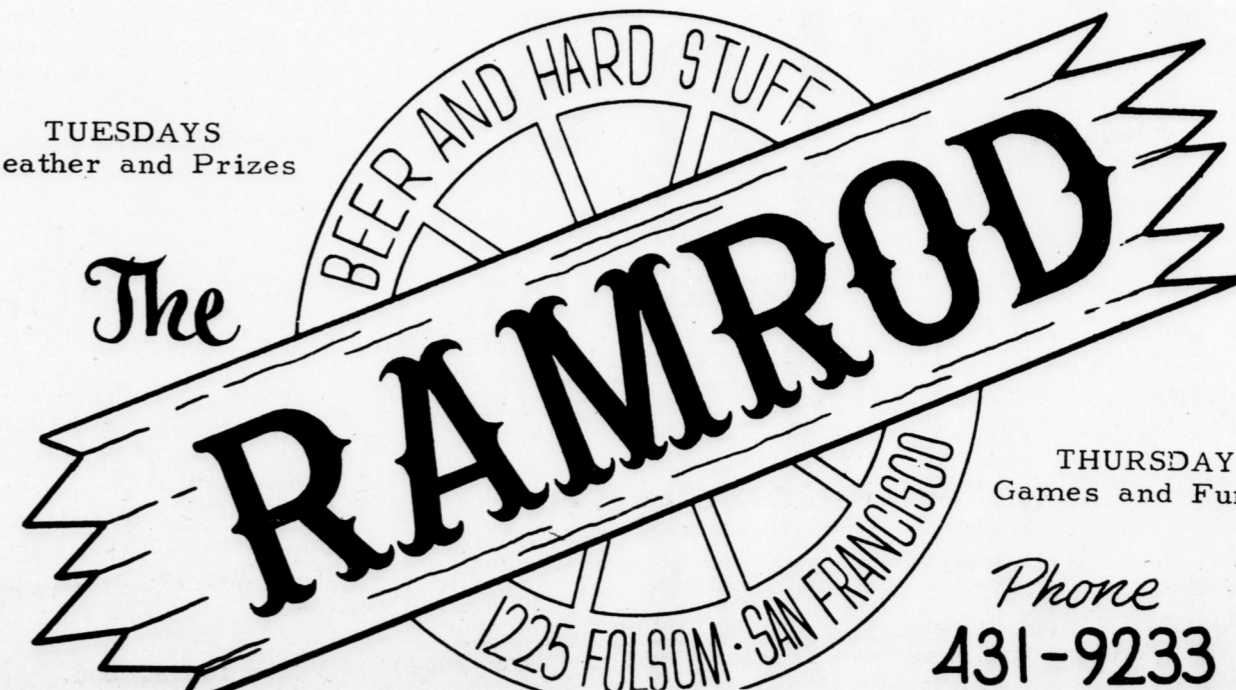

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Book Reviews

THE BEST OF BOOKS

Everyone ought to be informed about the new and best-selling books even if their status is a little bit dubious. Once in a while you are going to get one that is worth reading, one you will want to give as a gift, or one you will even keep to look at again someday. Some look well on the shelf or on the coffee table, attesting to the fact that you are either well-read or certainly buy the latest.

The current fiction best-sellers are a hodge-podge. Two are out-and-out computer novels, very of the moment, well researched in areas where but few people go, and glamorizing life as it is lived by the rarest birds. Another best-seller is a preachy mystery story. Two are historical novels, one dealing with the childhood of King Arthur, and the other with the times of Charles the Second of England. Another is the patched up leavings of a major, if somewhat gung-ho novelist. While yet another will take you inside the police state or the state of the police.

In non-fiction best-seller-dom we have one reactionary and sentimental analysis of what makes America tick, we have some possible memoirs of a Russian named Khrushchev, and we have some rather live-ly taped diaries of a former Mrs. Johnson which reveal her

as considerably brainier than a flighty bird. Then there is THE SENSUOUS WOMAN, already a paperback; THE SENSUOUS MAN may never make the best-seller list. Considerably more informed about sex is the EVERYTHING YOU'VE ALWAYS WANTED TO KNOW book; it has some words some of us have never yet used. Then there is FUTURE SHOCK which only the more serious may tackle. It is a very important and interesting book, but it takes some preparation to read. CIVILISATION by Kenneth Clark is easier but does not come across as lively as it did on television. It is supposed to tell us what makes us human beings so great.

Perhaps the two best-selling non-fiction books at this time are THE RISING SUN by John Toland about the Japanese Empire, and INSIDE THE THIRD REICH by Albert Speer, which is the memoirs of a real insider to the life and times of Adolph Hitler. Unfortunately, neither of these is light reading. To them you must bring some interest of your own and some ability to sit and allow yourself to become engrossed in the serious past.

Another such book is STILLWELL by Barbara Tuchman. As early as 1935, Barbara Tuchman was a foreign correspondent in China. And as early as that, the United States

of America was involved in Asia. Here we have the Army represented by Stilwell, the very crew-cut and crassly tactless military type that is not yet quite old-fashioned enough. He read his orders and he did his duty. Even if he saw Chiang with utter contempt and nicknamed him "Peanut". And Stilwell was equally disliked by Mme. Chiang who has been too much sentimentalized by the middle American mind. So Stilwell did not have an easy time of it. He was doing the best he could in an impossible situation. Then fashions changed to air power, and Chennault was the hero. But there is a great deal more to this book than the personalities involved. In the face of future East-West relationships, this book should be thoroughly read. Somebody, someday, is going to have to be informed

The book which nobody can put down might well wait until it reaches paperback status. This is THE THRONE OF SATURN by Allen Drury. It is a space novel, very open-ended. If it cannot happen on earth, and no one says it hasn't, it might all happen out in space. Drury certainly tells a good story. It is well researched, a hallmark of the computer novel. It has something for almost everybody, all the stage props, the type-cast characters, and all the entrance to a world which is certainly not everybody's everyday world, a bit incredible, but no less possible.

While we speak of paperbacks, everyone will want to know that THE LORD WON'T MIND is now available that way. Little more needs to be said about this sensually sensitive and realistic treatment of today's gay male world. This is a super-charged book, another which

you will not be able to put down.

The big new book of the moment is THE PASSIONS OF THE MIND which is a biographical novel based on the life of Sigmund Freud. Written by Irving Stone, it is as well done and as completely engrossing as his earlier THE AGONY AND THE ECSTASY about Michelangelo. Of course this is a book closer to our own times. The material is still plentiful and fresh. It is sure to do well as both a movie and a paperback.

And while we speak of movies, it may be news that Richard Burton and Elizabeth Taylor have bought THE ANTAGONISTS by Ernest K. Gann for their next movie. This is a novel about Masada and the Roman occupation of Jerusalem. The author became very interested in the archeological work being done there and went over and investigated the diggings and the finds. He has created a well-told story of those times, a natural Burton-Taylor opus. He will play the Roman General, and she will play the girl (of course). You can see it coming.

But let us get back to the mind momentarily. At least to a mind bender. This has got to be the only description for Laing's KNOTS, although Time Magazine lists it as a fiction best-seller. If you open it, it looks like poetry. If you read some of it, it reads like "This is Jack. See Jack Run." If you read enough of it, you can feel that you are in psycho-therapy. You pay your money, and you take your choice.

Then there is poetry, real poetry. It's very nice. If you sell books, the standard comment is that it (poetry)

does not sell. Indeed, you seldom see it on the best-seller lists. Yet people do buy it, read it, give it as gifts. And there are three current poetry books worthy of serious consideration. THERE ARE MEN TOO GENTLE TO LIVE AMONG WOLVES is a well done surprise by James Kavanaugh. It is always a surprise when someone turns poet after having written A MODERN PRIEST LOOKS AT HIS OUTDATED CHURCH. THE COLLECTED POEMS OF EDITH SITWELL is a must for every well stocked library. PASSIONS OF THE ANCIENT DAYS contains the new poems of Cavafy in a bi-lingual edition, in case you also read Greek and want to try your own hand at poetry translation.

Some books never become best-sellers or movies or even paperbacks, no matter how interesting or amusing they may be. Such a series of disasters may be the fate of THE BEAUTIFUL PEOPLE'S BEAUTY BOOK by Princess Luciana Pignatelli. This has got to be the fun book of the month. As the title implies, this book contains beauty hints from various and sundry of the beautiful people. Some of these beauty hints are surprising. They range from sheer superstition to lucky intuition. Some are entirely based on fad, and some have been medically proven. You can take walks every day, or you can cut down the liquor intake, or smoke less because smoking makes the skin sallow, or you can take more naps.

But beauty is no longer the simple luxuries of an extra facial or proper pedicure. For this is the story of how a nice freckle-faced girl grew into a raving beauty. She left no stone unturned, no service untried, no expert unconsulted. It is

the story of a tragedy. The nice girl's nose grew to full Roman splendour. So she had it bobbed. And then she married a real prince. She soon gave that up, and beauty treatments had to wait a while on sessions with her psychiatrist. Even though she is now married to Richard Avedon, she is still a princess. And she is able to take up where she left off in her pursuit for beauty.

She certainly is not one of those women who have waited until they really fell apart to do something about it. She has had a head start. Nose-bobbing was only the barest beginning. The proper use of cosmetics was only a minor hurdle. It is with sadness we find that, with each passing year, it takes five minutes more to make-up properly. Then there were cell implants and some silicone here and there. She says she is having a hard time remembering what is real and what has been done over. But the bone structure still shows. Some of that she still retains.

With all she has done and with all she may yet have to do, it is hard to find that she is still only in her mid-thirties. How she found time to write this slender volume or finds the time to have some fun is somewhat of a mystery. One can only wonder if it will be worth the while, what will come next (she hints at eyelash implants), how long it will all last, and how long she will keep it up. But that is like wondering what happens to the characters in a novel after the novel ends. It is not part of this story and not important. The fact is that in this book there is a lot to be learned by those who will learn it and a lot of fun for those who would be simply amused.

Having recieved an invitation to appear at the Royal Palace, we arrived promptly at 9:00 P.M. We were greeted by an apparition in 50 yards of

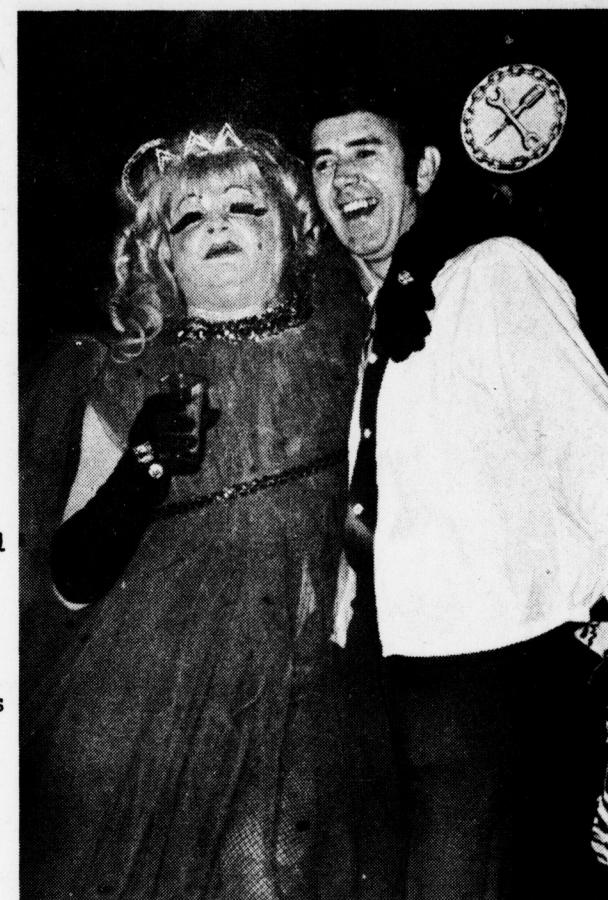
