

S.I.R. ZIPS IN ON FEDS

Every Bay Area TV station was there, Newsweek magazine had its cameras ready and while local newspaper and national news services were discussing the event to come. They had gathered to cover a non-violent "Work-In" organized by THE SOCIETY FOR INDIVIDUAL RIGHTS to protest the U.S. government policy of excluding known homosexuals from federal employment. The government says that homosexuals can pay taxes but not serve. The issue is not whether homosexuals should accept federal positions but that admitted homosexuals can not do so because of federal regulations.

D-DAY AT 10 A.M.

The front of the Federal Building, 450 Golden Gate, had been roped off by Security Guards although the police had been told that S.I.R. did not intend to invade the building. The demonstrators did not have to invade the building...from 9 a.m. they had been gradually one-by-one entering the building, awaiting the 10 a.m. "D-Day" starting time. At that time a large booth was placed in service in front of the Federal Building, with placards which read GAYS DEMAND EQUAL RIGHTS and HOMOSEXUALS DENIED FEDERAL EMPLOYMENT. Inside the

building homosexuals revealed their signs (pinned to their coats) which read "I AM A HOMOSEXUAL WORKING FOR THE FEDERAL GOVERN-MENT". Some began sweeping the floors with brooms brought into the building and other "manned" the automatic elevators..."Floor, please. Thank you, Sir." Others handed out literature at the Civil Service and Federal "Job" Centers and in the Internal Revenue Offices. The leaflets stated "Hello! My name is (name of demonstrator). I am here today as an openly identified homosexual to work for the Federal Government. My intention is not to offend or embarass you or anyone else but rather to make a dramatic protest of an unjust government policy. There are hundreds of homosexuals working in this building. They are no different than any other government employee except that they would immediately lose their jobs if the nature of their private sex lives were known to the Civil Service Commission."

Outside, several gay people (and many curious on-lookers) gathered. Large posters were held high as the protestors marched in a circle to draw attention to the plight of the homosexual who is denied federal employment. In

one corner of the plaza a "Homosexual Unemployment" stand welcomed those inside demonstrators who gradually left the building after the one hour march and work-in. They manned the brooms out front and swept the front of the building clean as "homosexuals working for the federal government."

As the cameras turned and newsmen interviewed S.I.R.'s president, Bill Plath, an incident occurred in one of the elevators inside. Those watching TV channels 2 and 5 saw the action later that night. Larry Littlejohn, former S.I.R. President, and Leo Laurence, S.I.R. gay activist, confronted the head of the Federal Security Guard in an elevator. As Larry and Leo attempted to go up in the elevator with a TV cameraman, Supervisor A. Smith stopped the elevator and began a conversation. Littlejohn said that he would leave the building when "homosexuals are treated fairly by the federal government" and then he attempted to leave the elevator after the officer blocked the exit. A scuffle resulted and the elevator took off suddenly from the first floor.

It was discovered later that Littlejohn and Laurence had both been arrested, finger-printed and jailed on the 16th floor on a general charge of being a nuisance in the building. After a conference between building officials, the two were then taken into an elevator which went to the basement. Littlejohn later stated that he had a "Hollywood"





Movie" flash in his mind that the basement trip might have meant a beating...but instead both men were quietly released.

The demonstration was arranged by the Board of Directors of S.I.R. and planned and carried to completion by Office Manager George Coffman and Littlejohn. Treasurer Bob Cramer arranged the posters and signs and the Reverends Michael Itkin, Ray Broshears and Bob Richards participated. The participants ranged in age from Charlie Davis and Gene Himelstern, both 67, to Lyle Gerard and Jerry Salazar, both in their early 20's. Also participating was S.I.R. Board member, Dick Gayer, who himself is now facing a legal hassle to keep his federal security clearance. Al Alvarez, who fought and won a decision involving his arrest at a San Francisco Examiner gay demonstration last year, could be seen directing people to elevators inside the building as the demonstration concluded...In the next 24 hours every TV station and major newspaper in the Bay Area carried films and photo stories of how the homosexuals had demanded to be treated as equals in the eyes of their government.. Well over one million saw this protest on TV or read about it.

Only a few days earlier, Mayor Joseph Alioto was quoted in a front page S.F. Chronicle story as favoring consensual sex legislation and the S.F. Mental Health Association had issued a

statement saying that homosexuals are not sick mentally. Board President Dianne Feinstein had earlier come out strongly for homosexual rights at a meeting at S.I.R. Center attended by several hundred.


All of this was not by accident. Careful contacts and the long range educating of public officials is now bringing the homosexual in San Francisco closer to first class citizenship. It is still true...United we stand, divided they will pick us up one by one.

The Human Rights Commission of San Francisco held a hearing last year on homosexual employment rights. The hearing, requested by S.I.R., resulted in the commission recommending to the Board of Supervisors that a "sexual orientation" clause be adopted by the city. This would mean that the city would have an open policy of hiring homosexuals. S.I.R.'s political chairman, Jim Foster, is now personally lobbying each supervisor to see if this can become a reality..

AB 437

KOKPIT BECOMES REGISTRATION HEADQUARTERS

Realizing the importance of making it convenient for everyone to register so that they may be eligible to vote in November, the KOKPIT at 301 Turk Street, will have a deputy registrar on duty in the bar on Sunday, June 20th from 4:00 until 8:00 P.M.

Young poeple between the ages of 18 and 21 will be eligible to vote for the first time this year in California, however they will not be permitted to enter the bar in order to register due to antiquated rules set forth by the A.B.C., which does not permit anyone under THEIR legal age of 21 to enter a public licensed place.

Since the California State Legislature has passed a law recognizing 18-year-olds as legal to vote and elect a governor, a mayor or senator and even a president, still they may not come into an A.B.C. licensed premise, to register or even buy a glass of beer.

It's the old story of one Government body in conflict with another Government agency. How long will the general public stand for such foolishness. Teenagers may enlist in the military service and fight a war, declared or not, and may now even vote for political offices, but still may not put foot in an A.B.C. licensed premise or buy a glass of beer.

TAVERN GUILD

The rumors have been flying fast and furious about the massive arrests at the last picnic. Not true. What is true, however is the following facts. Seven persons were arrested on trespassing and assorted other morals charges. It seems that several of the picnickers inadvertantly wandered on property other than that leased by the Guild. The owners of this property complained and the Guild started issuing warnings all day long to warn the many guests of an uptight neighbor situation. It was at the end of the day when many persons were leaving or had already departed when the arrests occured. It is still not clear as to whether or not the seven were trespassing or not, as the area in question was poorly marked, and boundaries not defined at all. While the Tavern Guild is neither legally nor morally responsible or bound to help the seven persons, a special meeting was called in order to define a course of action to be taken by the Guild.

After lengthy debate the membership present of the Guild voted to financially defray the legal expenses of the "Sonoma Seven" simply on the grounds that here were seven members of our community in desperate need for help. This action in no way is meant to imply that the Tavern Guild is condoning overt sexual acts in public. On the contrary, it is on a massive attempt to stop public sexual display amongst its members and the community as a whole. While public sex might be daring or whatever other reasons people find for indulging in it, it remains in poor taste and should be stopped. It is very difficult to try and maintain decent liaison with public officials and condone this type of action. One thing did come out of the special meetings of the Tavern Guild, and that is that the community does need property of its own for our own functions, far away from the prying and snooping eyes of uptight neighbors and other assorted voyeurs. We also must point out that these seven people are facing upwards of 25 years apiece on these charges, should they be found guilty, let this be a lesson to all and keep your peckers in your

GAY PRIEST REINSTATED AND CONGRATULATED BY BISHOP

Father Robert J. Richards, the priest-director of the Community of St. John the Beloved, a Catholic ministry within the Homophile community; was reinstated as a member of the Catholic Priests Association of the Archdiocese of San Francisco. At the May 26th meeting of the priests association, Father Richards was informed that he had been accepted back into the association that that a document would be sent to him at the Community of St. John the Beloved, officially confirming his acceptance.

Father Richards is an admitted homosexual and began a full time ministry with Gay Catholics over six months ago in the San Francisco area. He is quick to point out that the priests association's action will in no way change his 'status' with the Archbishop of San Francisco. Father Richards is not permitted to function 'officially' by the Archbishop. It was shortly after Father Richards received a letter from the Archbishop, informing him he was forbidden to function that the priests association had dropped him from their mailing list as a member. With his reinstatement, Father Richards expressed that the attitude of the Catholic Church regarding homosexuals is indeed changing.

Along with Father Richards' acceptance into the association, he also received congratulations for his ministry within the Gay community, from a Roman Catholic Bishop. Bishop Antulio Parrilla-Bonilla, S.J., wrote Father Richards, stating "I congratulate you and give you assurance of my prayers for the success of your apostolate... among the homophile community members of San Francisco." Bishop Parrilla-Bonilla is a Roman Catholic Bishop in good standing and is offically residing in Puerto Rico. He is noted for his Christian poverty and his work for peace in the world.

Assisting Father Richards with the various services offered by the Community of St. John, is Edward Mutter. Having been a member of the community for over 5 months, Edward views this ministry as a real step towards gays gaining their rightful place in the church.

San Francisco's Big 3!

THE POLITICAL FOLLIES

On June 4, the San Francisco Committee On Crime issued a report on non victim crime after three years of study. This "blue ribbon" committee of distinguished clergymen, lawyers, physicians, and community leaders, even included law enforcement authorities. One such committee member was former San Francisco Police Lieutenant William Osterloh, a cop for thirty years who was head of the Police Community Relations Department when he retired. His comments on the report included, "...It's creative and dynamic and very realistic, ... I see no reason why the report's recommendations cannot be completely accepted."

From this, it would appear that our Mayor, who advocated the formation of the Committee and who appointed the Committee members; our Supervisors, who approved of the committee and it funding; and the Police Chief, who publicly ascribed to the need for such a committee study; would be overjoyed at this report. We all know such was not the case. Instead of political joy, San Franciscans were treated to a political song and dance act straight out of an 1880 drama. While nostalgia is the order of the day in "show biz", I doubt that anyone would advocate a nostalgic return to the political ecstacies of William Jennings Byran.

FIRST COMES THE VILLAN

On June 4, we saw an angry Police Chief Al Nelder shouting on our TV screens that he was "flabbergasted" at the Committee Report. Among Nelder's all too loud and all too understandable statements were those regarding the recommendations for repealing all criminal penalties for homosexual acts in private by consenting adults. The Chief said that he shared the position of the California Peace Officers Association that the laws against homosexual conduct should be kept on the books, "otherwise it would make it more difficult to prosecute associated crimes such as male prostitution."

If our Police Chief were to use the same fuzzy clairvoyance and publicly declare that laws against all heterosexual conduct should be put on the books so that it would be easier to prosecute associated crimes such as female prostitution, he would be replaced as Chief before a new day had dawned. It seems to me that all homosexual organizations of San Francisco should go on record as demanding our Mayor to replace Nelder as Chief of Police for his position on homosexual law change.

ENTER ONE HEROINE

What was Dianne Feinstein, political goddess and President of the Board of Supervisors saying on the Crime Committee Report? On everything but the pornography section she registered a big beautiful smile; zero. On the pornography recommendations she expressed disappointment. "Before I looked into the situation, I would have agreed in theory with the Committee's conclusions." Mrs. Feinstein remarked on June 4.

What a change from her remarks at S.I.R. on May 18, just two short weeks before when she said on the same subject, "Obviously, I have NOT made an in-depth study; too little time to do it."

The Committee on Crime studied these situations for three years before making their report. Mrs. Feinstein is saying just what about her capacity in relation to the "blue ribbon" committee's capacity to research, study and reach a correct conclusion?

OUR HERO

At a certain point in all dramas of the late 1800's, the hero entered the scene to help morality triumph. The hero was always tall, broad-shouldered, handsome with blonde wavy hair.

Next to step center stage on the Crime Committee Report was San Francisco's hero, who is hardly type caste, our distinguished Mayor Joseph L.A.. Good 'ole Joe tried desperately to play out the hero's role. He had originated the Crime Committee idea and selected the persons on the Committee and even told the Committee what to look into in San Francisco's system of criminal justice. What Joe forgot was to tell the Committee what conclusions to reach. This, our Mayor tried to correct after the report was presented.

When the report estimated 90,000 homosexuals in San Francisco who could vote and subsequently recommended legal changes on homosexuality paralleling British law, Mayor Alioto went along with that. But on all other Committee recommendations the Mayor said, in effect, that the Committee had wasted three years of study and thousands of taxpayer's dollars. We wonder what Mr. J.L. Alioto's reaction to prostitution would have been had the Crime Committee estimated 90,000 prostitutes who were potential voters.

THE MORAL

This brings us to a depressing analysis of political stances; it is what we must call political administrative excesses.

If a business man were to spend the time of a distinguished group of persons, and thousands of his dollars to look into a problem of his business, would he throw out the report made on his problems before a thorough study of what the Report entails? We can only

criticize the Mayor for wasting our money and the time of these committee members. If Mayor Alioto had no intention of putting into practice the recommendations of the Committee, why did he form the Committee?

The Report states that it cost \$175.00 to arrest one prostitute one time. While I hear all the flap about welfare excesses, I also know that it costs less to house, feed and clothe an average welfare family for a month in the U.S. than it costs to arrest one prostitute one time in San Francisco. I also know that where prostitution is legalized and regulated, as in Amsterdam, the moral tone of the community is better, not worse as Alioto says.

Here seems to be another example where citizens of San Francisco particularly the younger persons, are far more mature and realistic than our elected officials.

Just how are these strange budget priorities determined? More next issue on "The Political Follies".

Why is it that all the local gay organizations run around so blindly when the real enemy is the District Attorney.


Why is it that this paper gets slapped because of the drag pictures when they are the only ones that will permit their pictures to be used.







Having been to this particular restaurant many times before they changed to a "gay" policy, I was looking forward to my first meal there under the new management. Except for a change of name, the "Q.T." once called The "Smokehouse" has pretty much the same feeling. The bar is small and very pleasant and the bartender who's name I did not catch was as attentive as he was. attractive. We had a few drinks and even though it was quite early, decided to have dinner. We were greeted by a very "maudlin" maitre 'd. This guy could be an understudy for "Dracula". A Maitre 'D in addition to many difficult tasks should greet people and make them feel welcome, that is the one thing this young man doesn't do. Anyway on to the soup, which again (it seems to follow me) was Creme of Mushroom. Fol-

lowed by a nice cold crisp salad with the standard vegetables, and just enough dressing. I had the special which was "Pork Chops" and my friend had "Spare Ribs". The chops were barbequed and very good. I had a couple of the Spare Ribs-they were excellent. The baked potato, standard, and the vegetables were lousy. The dining room at the Q.T. is very pleasant. However I did notice that they could not have squeezed another table or chair in to such a small area which I assume must be very uncomfortable when they are busy. The waiter gets a gold star. He was nice and did his job very well.


THE TRIDENT 558 Bridgeway—Sausalito

Lunch at THE TRIDENT was a mind blower. Just a year or so ago this restaurant was so "establishment" it could have been used as a model. A very well dressed Maitre 'D and all of the

waiters and bus boys in their "monkey suits," and gleaming white linens everywhere. Well enough of what was. This place is so together that just going there is a trip in itself. The marvelous hippie type help are doing their thing and doing it well. The menu leans toward pure or health type foods. Everything is for sale, ashtrays, candles, etc. They have a health bar which is great. I had an "Avocado Omelet" with salt free butter, unleavened bread, a wheat rice. Just fantastic. If you are not sure where to go for lunch and it is during the week, take the ferry over and have lunch, it is exceptional.

JACKSON'S Bay and Powell

Of all the restaurants I might review, this could be the most difficult only because I have some heavy memories of this place. Well we had dinner on a week-end night which is unusual for me as I am usually working. First off we were going to a show and requested that they seat us as close as possible to our phone reservation and indeed they did. The Maitre 'D seemed very busy and between covering for a busboy who did not show up, answering the phone, serving drinks, seating people, that is an under statement. Our waiter, who is a dear friend deserves an award for perseverance. "Nita" as he is known in the trade has been at JACKSON'S for a long



time. We can only assume that he must have started at a very young age, considering what he admits to now. Our soup was an excellent Navy Bean followed by a salad absolutely drenched in dressing-the lettuce was watery alsoone of the entrees' was "Calf's Liver" and one was "Prime Rib" and a couple of Pork Chop Specials. All in all the "entree" plates were very pleasant to look at. They use a vegetable dish which I prefer and in this case we had a nice summer squash and a re-stuffed baked potato. The restaurant was very busy as was the bar. For a house wine they serve Almaden. For one of San Francisco's oldest restaurants, JACKSON'S is still a front runner. The thing that I admire about this establishment is the fact that all the gay restaurants in the city combined have not been through the "trauma" that this place has been through. And all places experience a little "trauma" when it is sold or new management takes over. George Banda and Dori, from the CLUB DORI, along with Bob Ross, the chef, and their very amiable crew are keeping this fine club alive. I almost forgot to mention that they have a large banquet room upstairs, in which they show movies and they are presently having a private art show. They have had a "Flea Market", and you can rent it for a private function.




THE BEAD READER

On a past sunny Sunday afternoon I journeyed to the Covered Wagon for a couple hours of entertainment, as the road show company of "The Hayloft Folly '71" was trucked up from Los Angeles for a Bay City view. Mr. Rule cleverly turned the yard and pool into a combination Radio City Music Hall and Hollywood Bowl, which made for ideal viewing to the large stage which was erected for the occasion. But the show that followed all this conversion was not at all clever-and was on the whole deadly dull. Trying to remember that some members of the cast had to be added here and rehearsal time was short, I still find myself asking the same question on shows of this type. Why doesn't the chorus of production numbers open their mouths when they are supporting the principal of the song? The important thing here is creating an illusion and if all do not participate then the number or song is lost. Pretty costumes and pretty faces do not make a show-in shows of this nature lip sinc. has to be near perfect. If it is not the illusion is broken and it's just another drag show. This, I'm afraid happened too frequently with "Folly '71".

The opening from "Two's Company" with David Knight was delightful. Mr. Knight knows his way around the stage, has good timing and was one of the few shining moments of this show. I'm sure in his own surroundings he feels safe and secure and is much better than the good performance he gave. The Fanny Brice number listed as "Chansonette", I'm sure is a block buster in a club and I'm also sure Miss

Brice smiles down upon him nightly. To the dancing spot we turn to Ralph Reik -blonde and vivacious, who went through the Doris Day "shaking the blues away" routine. Where were the chorus boys when you need them? If any song ever needed them this one cries out for them. But alas, Mr. Reik did a good turn and if he had someone to support him it could have been great. In the sketch entitled "Audition at The Met" Buddy Ball did a fine job of lip sinc., but the strip wasn't necessary and took away from all that went before. Bob Pollack as the accompanist was excellent. By the way, if the paint can is on a hinge it should be put upright again after it's knocked over. The "Follies Hayloft" were fun numbers, but again the chorus could not open their mouths. Jim Perri was very pretty. So was his costume. And in the "Take Back Your Mink" all went well 'till they put the extra tag ending and spoiled the whole number, plus the splicing of the tape was bad, or the operator was.

was "Bravo Busby" but this was due to Mark Swinehart who was superb and Buddy Ball as the captain who was much fun. This obviously was their favorite spot and the chorus was adequate, except for the Rockette routine when all were looking at each other instead of the audience: all except Pete Dickey who performed all his supporting tasks with noticeable efficiency. This was not the performers fault, but was due to staging. "Hayloft Folly '71" was staged, created and directed by Ken Kane who I'm afraid is not a dancer, as his staging was at best, sloppy and stilted. For the two sketches "The Motel" was originally a 40 second blackout at most and its length now is dreary and not funny. The "Opera Sketch" had many more possibilities but very few ere evident. His selection of material is dated-what's worse than seeing a queen doing a Bette Davis impression? No offense Mr. Knight, Mr. Kane was very lucky in using your talent. But this is '71 not '51 and there are current shows and material to draw on. As I said earlier it's not enough to have pretty costumes and faces-direction is essential and I'm afraid "Folly '71" missed a lot of it.

It took eight minutes to uncover the pool, and the water was a delight.
