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McGOVERN: THE GREAT GAY HOPE

THE GAY GHETTO VOTE:

McGOVERN 3 to 1

To determine how much influence the Gay movement and media had on the Gay vote, I surveyed 12 of the 14 precincts in the Upper Market Gay ghetto area. The precincts cover the area bounded by 14th Street, Sanchez, Collingwood and 19th. Unfortunately, the talleys from two precincts were lost, so they could not be included.

The talley shows McGovern leading Humphrey by a 3 to 1 margin (1,319 to 420). Shirley Chisholm did well with 172 votes. Nixon had very little support: 227 votes - less than 10% of the total votes cast.

Hallinan whipped Allen by a 50% margin (956 to 639), while McTernan easily swamped Vavirus (757 to 620).

"Rick" Stokes far outpolled any other Community College Board candidate, and lead the field in 10 of the 12 precincts. In some precincts, Stokes got more than twice the vote of any other canddate. Robert Scrofani, who was endorsed by B.A.R. and had favorable mention in the ADVOCATE and othe; Gay publications, ran a poor second in most of the heavily Gay precincts. The other candidates ran far behind.

Considering the sharp differences between the election returns form the Gay precincts and those of the city as a whole, it can be presumed that the Gay media had a substantial influence on the Gay voters. However, it must be remembered that the Upper Market area is inhabited mostly by younger, poorer Gays who live in rented apartments. The heavily Democratic liberal-to-radical voting pattern may not be typical of the Gay voters elsewhere in San Francisco.

The Gay cause suffered a disastrous defeat in the June 6 election. Allen and Vavuris, the two anti-homosexual Superior Court Judges, were re-elected by large margins. The pair have been extremely harsh in Gay cases, and sentenced 110 Gays to 15 years-to-life for sodomy and oral copulation during 1971. The re-election of the two queer-haters dooms any hope of reform at the Judicial level in San Francisco for at least six years.

Gay attorney "Rick" Stokes lost badly in his bid for election to the Community College Board. Anti-homosexual majorities were elected to both the College Board and the Board of Education.

There were a few glimmers of hope in the suburban areas. Pro-Gay Tony Grovenale won the Democratic nomination to the 27th Assembly District (South San Francisco) seat vacated by anti-Gay Leo J. Ryan. Pro-Gay Congressman Paul McClosky (San Mateo) won a slim victory over two arch-conservative anti-Gay

The five pro-Gay incumbent Assemblymen in the East Bay all won, as did pro-Gav Assemblyman William Bagley (San Rafael) and John Vasconcelos (San Jose). Eighty-year-old Congressman George Miller (Oakland), who doesn't even know what Gay means, was defeated after 36 years in Congress by Gay rights advocate Peter Stark. Up in Contra Costa County, queer-hater George Dye, who campaigned on a platform advocating castration of homosexuals, was defeated by a vote of 17,136 to 981. Presumably that's the last we'll ever hear of George

The overall political picture is one of little change which, for a movement

which wants change, is not encouraging. The only positive factor is the victory of Senator McGovern in the Democratic Primary.

With McGovern's victories in California, New Mexico, North Dakota and New Jersey, he seems assured of getting the Democratic nomination. The new political situation requires Gay Movement groups and publications to re-appraise and revise their strategy.

Gays can seek their rights from any of the three branches of government, and on either the state or federal level. In California, where the courts are filled

with Reagan appointed judges, and where Reagan will veto any legislative reform, the Gay cause is hopless until we have a new governor. Most of the federal court benches, including the Supreme Court, are occupied by queer-hating, very young Nixon appointees, who are appointed for life and cannot be removed. There's no hope of reform here for the next half-centruy.

The only real hope for freedom in the foreseeable future lies in electing a Gay rights advocate to the presidency. Much of the oppression of homosexuals results from executive orders and policies made by the President, and the President can abolish most types of discrimination against Gays with a sweep of the pen. He doesn't need the approval of Congress or the courts to do

Employment discrimination, immigration discrimination and the criminal and civil sanctions against homosexuals by the Federal Government and armed forces were created by an executive order written by Richard Nixon and signed by President Eisenhower during Nixon's term as vice-president.

This fall, Gays will have a choice between the man who is the main obstacle to Gay rights - indeed, the instigator of much of their oppression and a reformist who promises full equality immediately. There is no doubt that all segments of the Gay Movement will unite behind McGovern. Unfortunately, the same cannot be said of the Gay voters, many of whom are politically uninformed or disinterested. The Gay media has an immense job of political education to do before the November election.

If all of the twenty million voting-age Gays whould vote, and vote as a block, they could elect anyone they choose. The big problem is there are just too many Gays who are more interested in getting another trick than they are in voting. The Gay movement and media should concentrate their efforts on getting the non-voting Gay to the polls.

A second problem is the Gay Republicans. There are no organized Gay Republicans and there won't be. The Republican Party wouldn't permit the formation of a Gay Republican organization.

There is no reason why the Gay Movement should be strictly partisan. There are a few Republicans, such as Congressmen Mailliard (San Francisco) and McCloskey (San Mateo), who have taken positions in favor of Gay rights. There are a few Democrats, such as Assemblyman Foran (San Francisco) and Congressman Ryan (South San Francisco), who oppose Gay rights. However, the central committees, the Democratic councils and the power structure of the Democratic Party have committed themselves to Gay rights. The central committee, the organization which controls the Republican Party, (continued next page)

and most of its leaders are obsessed by the virulent anti-homosexualism of Nixon, Reagan and George Dye. Gays who vote for these bigots are equatable with the masochistic Jews who voted for Hitler as an act of self-destruction.

The phenomena of Gay Republicans may be due to the "princess syndrome." Many Gays, whose income is only slightly above the average \$770 per person monthly income in San Francisco, fantasize that they are members of the Establishment. In their delusions of grandeur, they identify with people in the million dollar-per-year bracket, and so vote Republican as a status symbol.

Some 2800 homosexuals get arrested for sex acts in San Francisco every year. More often than not they lose their jobs, their mortgaged homes or flats get foreclosed, their business licenses revoked and they go to the welfare line. The princesses, of course, think this only happens to bums, and never to grand ladies like themselves. They become disillusioned when they learn that justice is blind. The princess must be educated to the fact that he will never be secure in his job or possessions until the anti-homosexual criminal laws and employment discrimination are abolished. And that's not going to happen while Nixon, Reagan and their co-horts are in power.

BIG GAY CONFERENCE SET by Don Jackson

The National Coalition of Gay Organizations, a group representing almost all of the Gay movement in the conference at Bakersfield over the July 4 weekend.

The four-day conference will start June 31, and will feature a major workshop on the Gay prison situation. The prison panel will consist of ex-convict-poet Paul Mariah, Morris Kight of the Gay Community Services Center Prison Affairs Committee; ex-convict, ex-Atascadero inmate Dennis Richardson, Rev. Joe Gilbert of the METROPOLITAN COMMUNITY CHURCH, who is active in the Gay prison movement and hopes to be appointed to a prison chaplin's position, and B.A.R. reporter Don Jackson, who is considered an expert on Gay prison affairs.

Jamie Green, co-ordinator of the conference, announced that Gay organizations are filing a class action law suit asking that the courts order a halt to the use of electro-convulsive shock, aversion therapy, torture drugs, chemical castration and the errorless extinction of penile responses therapy in the California prison hospitals.

The Rev. Troy Perry, founder of the METROPOLITAN COMMUNITY CHURCH, will be the keynote speaker at the conference.

Another very important part of the conference is the July 1 session of the Gay Political Caucus. The Political Caucus, which is headed by Rev. James Sandmire of the San Francisco M.C.C., will plan the political strategy for the Gay movement and focus on the presidential election.

The BAKERSFIELD GAY LIBERATION FRONT, the host for the event, has also planned many lighter activities, like a bar-b-que, poetry readings and the like.



CHRISTOPHER STREET WEST SF ON JUNE 25TH





There could not be a more apt description of the San Francisco Gay Community concerning the flap over the death of J. Edgar Hoover — The Health & Family Life Education program of San Francisco public schools — The VECTOR "editorial" about the Parade — The Foster/Stokes political fiasco — S.I.R.'s budgetary incompetence under its present leadership — the insane view of police helicopters looking through walls to

catch homosexuals - et cetera and et cetera and et cetera.

"Prissy, put some water on to boil!"
"But, Miz Scarlet, I don' know nothin' bout..."

"Shut up, Prissy! Put some water into a heavy pot that has a long handle and put it on the fire to boil. I just heard about a new act at the COUNTRY CLUB done by Cliff, the chef, and I certainly can top that one."

If, as Don Jackson wrote in the last B.A.R., that J. Edgar Hoover was Gay,

than Mr. Hoover certainly was doubly guilty of many outrageous injustices to his Gay brothers and sisters. How could anyone be so unknowledgeable as to declare J. Edgar Hoover a Gay hero? VECTOR printed the following about the man:

"J. Edgar Hoover's public image served to conceal a warped and virulent personality that may find itself classified in history alongside Stalin, Hitler, Genghis Kahn and other hated tyrants...

"The director of our FBI was apparently homosexual but he wielded unlimited power in an effort to suppress anything that showed the smallest trace of any divergence in others... The picture that we had of him was a picture of travesty, the most successful Public Relations 'con job' every perpetrated on a host of people...

"One can now hope that principled men will dismantle the 'cult' which sustained Hoover's power and destroy the files he kept on millions of Americans."

The above quote is as far fetched as Don Jackson's writing:

"The story of the 44 years of mutual love and devotion between Edgar and Clyde may become a classic story of Gay love, and rank with the stories of David and Jonathan and Gertrude Stein and Alice B. Toklas."

Come on, fellas, John Edgar deserves burying because he is dead. Let's hope that no closet queen ever again has more power than our president and uses it against his own kind in such a questionable and destructive way. If, in the future, a homosexual ever gets to be an FBI director, let us hope he can be at least an honest, open, self accepting homosexual. Let us change our society so that such sad, unhappy, dishonest men as J.E.H. no longer need to be created by our society.

As this column goes to B.A.R., the front page of *The Chronicle* carries a story about:

"The State Board of Education voted unanimously here yesterday to investigate sex education in California's public schools to see if 'illegal' instruction and 'perversion' are being included in some clases....

[It] "has so far received compaints about homosexual speakers at Roosevelt

Junior High School in San Francisco."

This flap can lead to disaster to a constructive idea that I introduced many years ago through S.I.R.; that is of speaking to groups as a homosexual and making them aware of that 10% of our society who suffer daily trauma because of social and family ostrasizing. Mr. Guy Wright, has written two antagonistic, largely untrue, articles on the event at Roosevelt Jr. High School in an obvious attempt to stir up trouble and get readers for his unpopular and badly composed column.

After some preliminary investigation, which I intend to pursue and report in my next article in B.A.R. I have established some facts.

It appears that George got the sheets of toilet paper that he wrote on, from

the 99 Cent movie house, shuffled into a hodge podge.

George, if you must write your articles while cruising from your throne, please number the sheets.

(Did you say he was an Editor, Maude?)

And about that "Stokes" shoo-in as President of the Community College Board; we understand that the Burton Machine is going to make Jim Foster eat all Stokes campaign signs that are taken down and turned in at their headquarters, enough said.

Have you heard that the membership of S.I.R. has finally direct the Board to direct the Executives to make up a budget for S.I.R.? Months of leaderless overspending can lead back to Grove Street to stay: right, Bill?


I can only call this latest baloney from Don Jackson, a priceless bit of flawhooley.

THINKING OF YOU

I am a reader of B.A.R. and feel that there is too much drag and bitching. Therefore I have asked the editor about writing a column. It is my hope that readers of B.A.R. agree there is more to the homosexual than jewelry, furs and dresses

First of all a brief introduction.

I have been a past S.I.R. Board Member, am presently a member of S.I.R., the TAVERN GUILD, worked with C.R.H. and D.O.B. on some of their projects, and now own two gay oriented businesses in San Francisco, a bar/ restaurant, and a graphic design studio.

Being of sound mind and

body, most of the time it is slightly beyond my understanding as to what the "unity" people are screaming about. It seems to me that they suggest a unified "Tenderloin bitchery" within their group, apart from the mainstream of the Gay Community. I think that if one was to really analyze this past year's shows and other varied interest spectaculars he would see that all this unity nonsense has led only to some mighty fine brawls and back-biting which I might add has been done by even our most upstanding Gay citizenry.

Of more importance, rather than soap box rhetoric, we must go back to

good old fashioned work. And there is a hell of a lot of it which must be done.

Back in the dreary days of the early sixties in our fair city there were many, many Gay arrests, bar busts and virtually no way to talk in a rational approach to the Police. This all brought together a group of people who decided that it was time to begin a change in our society regarding homosexuality. It was felt that "a better social fabric" was needed for the ordinary homosexual, for at that time there really was no Gay Community per se. At the present time it appears that that fabric has been attacked by many moths and presently seems to look more like last year's Cockette's

During this beginning period of S.I.R. there were many dedicated intelligent persons working toward a better world in the established tradition of the establishment. At times things went a little slowly but eventually we began to see a slight amount of change and felt that our work was rewarded.

Interest was generated within S.I.R. and outside S.I.R. At that time we were felt to be a most important organization by being recognized by articles in the San Francisco Examiner, San Francisco Chronicle, medical journals, psychiatric journals and national magazines such as Look, Life, Time and Newsweek. It now seems that the organization has backslid into a rather non-volunteer, "professional homosexual" slump. It reminds me of the very thing we were trying to fight, in the old "Mattac. ine days" with our star "professional homosexual" Harold Call.

In the old days we had a "shakedown" by the establishment but now it has simply transferred to a "shakedown" by homosexuals to other homosexuals.

Every organization has its goal.

S.I.R.'s goals were for specific law change regarding homosexuality, a sound funding program, and an informational outlet for V.D. education, legal education as well as to serve the day to day needs of all homosexuals such as doctor referrals, job referrals, legal referrals and also to create a good social atmosphere where people could meet each other on a more personal basis. Once this goal of working with homosexuals becomes muddied or mixed with other interests, its power is weakened and its

membership will falter. A good example of this is the approval of the "Marijuana Resolution" passed by S.I.R. using a rationale that this is a victimless crime and S.I.R. is against law enforcement of all victimless crimes. This is plain poor judgement. It is too general and alienates many members. To those who are interested in the "Marijuana Initiative" it is their privilege to work in the organization that was set-up specifically for that purpose. For those that are interested in working with homosexual improvement, S.I.R.'s present attitude is

self defeating.

In the beginning days there was a time when new people in San Francisco and people off the street could come into a bright cheerful center, sit in the lounge and watch television, play cards or chess or just sit and rap. At that time we also began a library which was to become an important research library of homosexual literature. Now amid the broken lights, peeling paint, and slipshod storage, persons from off the street and new people get a really great first look at this organization. Now they pull up a folding chair and read an old magazine or a good book (if they brought one) by flashlight. It's no wonder that S.I.R. is lacking new ideas, more youth and excitement, and is turning into a moth ridden attic of old aunties.

If S.I.R. would have continued on its incepted aim, by this time it would have a building of its own, have definite financial worth, Vector would already be nationally recognized as an important homosexual publication and the center itself would not look like an unwelcoming cheap waterfront dive. A pleasant atmosphere can do much for building morale.

It seems as though the organization has receded back to those "Mattachine days" when Harold Call was ring-leader.

It seems there are certain groups in S.I.R. that are attempting to factionalize the organization through radicalized ideology. Through various personality clashes they seem to have forgotten what the organization is about.

proposal in four sections which was brought to the membership's attention at the last meeting regarding what certain committees should do. This he brought directly to the membership without forethought of attempting an understanding with the committee chairman.

He brought about a general chaos in the meeting and touched off an egoistic erruption of the political chairman, himself and even the president. This type of presentation should have been thrashed out in the committee structure. After all this is why committee functions were set up on the S.I.R. Board of Directors.

Nothing seems to be getting accomplished. Something is wrong when an organization as large as S.I.R. can run through over \$125,000 in one year and have nothing to show for it except \$71.00 and a few personalities that have been bickering with each other for over two years.

S.I.R. seems to have lost its positive approach, as well as many interested persons that really care for the organization. It has veered from overall goals and has turned inward, factionalizing much like the G.A.A. in New York which presently is almost non-existant. It has turned people off, especially when members yell at one another: "...and don't forget he's a Jew too!", "I resent being called an old fart and drag queen!", "Shut your god damn mouth and let me speak!" etc. etc. such as was heard at the last membership meeting.

Now really gentlemen, perhaps the organization should install a large sandbox instead of having a board of directors' table.

The organization as it stands now is certainly a shoddy mess almost on the verge of bankruptcy. It seems that most of the individuals in control have done a very bad job of it, both intellectually and financially.

I suggest that S.I.R.'s personalities end their feuds and get back to the original goals of the organization's again being an important force in legislative law changes and political policies that can be constructive rather than detremental to the Community as a whole.

The political factions and the social factions of S.I.R. must work together.

It is necessary for an organization to have a specific funding program such as help with shows like the fabulous "Hello, Dolly!".


It is necessary for both sides to work together in a positive way.

Let us bring back S.I.R. to a catalyst of understanding for good relations throughout our Community which at this time is of utmost importance.



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

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

TWO ON THE AISLE by Jay Noonan

THE LIGHT OPERA SEASON

me'di-o-cre, a. [L. mediocris, moderate, ordinary, from medius, middle.] of a middle quality; indifferent; ordinary; commonplace; neither good nor bad; second-rate.

When Edwin Lester previewed the San Francisco Light Opera Season this past February, he stressed bringing back youth into theatre. That's why he had chosen "Two Gentlemen of Verona" which is not scheduled until next

February. In the meantime, we must be

The Rothschilds

To bring youth back into theatre audiences, the first selection of the Season, "The Rothschilds," will probably drive them right back into the streets. Money and war may be topical in our conversation today, but to sit for 3 hours and listen to nothing that amounts to more than "Edge of Night" or "Marcus Welby" segments on the tube, there would probably be more humor in Karna Small's Weather Capsules.

The point to be considered with "The Rothschilds" is that it couldn't make it in New York with a built-in audience, never paid back its investment and closed in the red. How is it going to make money for Civic Light Opera? And if you think they were walking out of "Company" in droves, take a check at intermission at the Curran lately, Mr. Lester. Outside of some brilliant Michael Kidd staging and Hal Linden in the title role of Mayer Rothschild, the show is slow moving and dull. It used to be the mark of a winning musical, as you went up the aisle, you were either humming or whistling one of the songs from the show. The only tune I could muster up at "The Rothschilds" was "We're in the Money." It used to be the musical was dedicated to the tired business man; well, it still is: a tired business man can go to "The Rothschilds" and sleep and sleep and sleep and never worry about missing anything.

The Balance of the Season

Next Mr. Lester was going to give us "An American in Paris," starring Victor Borge. Well, it hardly got off the drawing board when it was shelved for various reasons. So now we can look forward to the "Sound of Music" (now, doesn't that whet your musical theatre appetite?). Well, I'm sure if it weren't that, we would have gotten the "Great Waltz" again. So, the lesser of two...

In the "Sound of Music," with Sally Ann Howes, some mild, sentimental music all adds up to 4 pounds of sugar in a half-pound bag.

But have no fear, for, in the Fall, the show with its cup overflowing with nostalgia, "No, No, Nanette," comes to town and probably will be the only bright spot this Season (and then, next year, in February, "Two Gentlemen of Verona").

So, Mr. Lester, what youth in what theatre? Why, Mr. Lester, must San Francisco depend on you and all the little ladies on the hill in L.A. to decide what San Francisco musical taste is? Must our musical taste always depend on the Geritol to Forest Lawn set? Where are the good musicals like "Follies"? "Purlie"? If it's revivals,

where are all the hit shows of the past? Must we forever see and listen to waltzes of Sigmund Romberg and Wright and Forest - musicals that are dreary? Oh, yes, I forgot the Meredith Wilson fiasco.

With such a vast number of people who are out of work in the industry. one might think you could muster up something a little better than "Sound of Music" - all the youth majority for that production who will be in theatre will be on stage. Remember your stand on "Hair"? How much did that cost Civic Light Opera in revenue for being so righteous, when, by today's standards, "Hair" and "Sound of 'Music' go hand-in-hand?

If youth is coming back into theatre

audiences, they are next door at the Geary Theatre to witness a sparkling A.C.T. production of "Sleuth," the Anthony Shaffer mystery thriller. This is first-rate theatre in any man's language and this production is brilliant. Ken Ruta and Peter Donat head a five-man cast that, from its opening line to its fantastic finale, is sheer brilliance and theatrical know-how. Mr. Shaffer has written a two-act play that will be hard to top anywhere (Agatha Christie and Alfred Hitchcock who?). To divulge a single fact of this play to anyone who hasn't seen it would be an unpardonable sin. It will be at the Geary through June 24th and I urge anyone who enjoys theatre - and especially mystery and suspense - to see "Sleuth." It is a gourmet feast. DON'T MISS IT!

A P.S. TO "DOLLY!"

A postscript and apology to the lighting crew of "Hello, Dolly!". In the program this reviewer received, there was no slip of changes. Therefore, when I went to the typewriter, all that was in front of me was the original program. So, to Al Jutzi and the people of EFFECTS UNLIMITED, my profound apologies for misdirecting my comments on your most effective lighting.

To the "Dolly!" cast, again (as I went back closing night), splendid show. With this production of "Dolly!", you have raised the standards of shows so that those to come will have to be in top form to compete with your standards of showmanship. You have set

LORI and LARGENT at LEONARDA'S


Recently Lori Shannon, with the CHUCK LARGENT REVUE, previewed what looked like the beginning of a good cabaret act to bring here into town and make it a socko act. It has all the elements of becoming a top-notch club act. As of now, Lori Shannon delivers some good sounds in this all-live show, but Miss Shannon must learn phrasing and breath control and how to end a song. Miss Shannon's costumes are, as always, tasteful and suit her style (except the blue mushroom that was used for a "Wonderful Town" medley with Faye). Miss Shannon has good stage presence and her chatter between shows was funny and not overlong. Her


selection of material is pleasing.

Somehow, when they first appear in their opening number and before they get into it, they seem, in their costumes of shimmering silver and black, to look like the Flying Wallendas. The meshing of Miss Shannon and the CHUCK LARGENT REVUE in "The Party's Over" was excellent; the meshing should happen more often.

There are good qualities of both and they should emerge into a fine piece of showmanship, and with the fine backing of Denis Moreen, should prove to be a good act for any nitery that's interested in an all-live show with quality.







A BEAUTIFUL NEW FEATURE LENGTH FILM FROM J. BRIAN

SEVEN TIMES SEVEN, A Vitruvian Production, written, produced, directed and edited by J. Brian; with Jason Walker, Doug Williams, Eric Martin, Aaron Bedford, Joe Markhum, Dale Carpenter and Tim Simon: a U.S. Biograph Release, in Eastmancolor: running time: 2 hours.

Under the pressure of frequent and varied police harassment - from the dissolution of his model modeling agency to the foreclosure of his motion picture theatre to the seizure of 400

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feet of his most prized film footage from his private studio - J. Brian has made a two-hour, synchronized-sound. full-color feature film, the first showing of which took place this past Wednesday.

normal) - in light of his near-financial disaster brought about by this staccato series of legal actions - he would take what remained of his monetary sources and put together - as quickly and commercially-minded as possible - a film calculated to re-fill his vacuous facets contribute to the beautiful "feel" coffers.

With his technical felicity and inherent taste, I'm sure he could. Yet, strangely enough, though he really feels SEVEN TIMES SEVEN is a desperate

risk of his remaining finances, he took incredible care in the making of SEVEN TIMES SEVEN - in its writing, its casting, its direction, its sound-recording, its photography, its editing, its scoring - incredible care and the resultant valuable time and restricted effort.

The resultant effort, which I witnessed in J. Brian's studio as he nervously watched the balance of his income run through the projector as quickly as a thief on the lam, is probably the most beautiful so-called "hard-core" Gay film ever made. The color control is brilliant; the natural locations in the mountains, forests, under the bright blue skies and soft. billowing clouds and on the beaches of California magnificently reproduced: the presence of the synchronized sound as exceptional as that of the major film studios; the compositions as carefully planned and executed as those of Lucino Visconti (I am especially thinking of Visconti's brilliant lighting One would think (indeed, assume as in "The Damned," which J. Brian has equaled, in his own way, in an interior sequence shot in a photographer's studio); the beautifully timed lap dissolves, fades, superimpositions and rapid-fire cuts of the editing giving the film a soothing fluidity - all these of SEVEN TIMES SEVEN.

> But those are just the techniques of film-making (J. Brian has always been a little-bit ahead of the other Gay film makers; always shown a great deal of

promise - but this time he has taken a gigantic leap forward and has left the others coughing in the dust). What about the film itself? First of all, with all the half-hearted

attempts at story telling in Gay films, SEVEN TIMES SEVEN is really the first film of that genre with a truly satisfying linear structure. And, ironically enough, it is not done through the process of a story in the sense of inter-related events and characters. SEVEN TIMES SEVEN is a series of seven unrelated episodes, but... and here's the difference... each episode motivates the next. And motivates it in the sense that the following episode could not exist without the first. And if that's not enough, the final episode motivates the first. This leaves the viewer in a complete state of catharsis a sort of subconscious "aah" at the end. (Margurite Cullman, the Broadway theatre's most successful backer [she never loses money], says that if, when she reads a script, she feels the catharsis - that illusive "aah" at the end - she backs the play; if not, she doesn't - as simply as that.) SEVEN TIMES SEVEN achieves its linear structure through having one boy lead you into the next scene with a new boy, and the new boy lead you into the following scene with a newer boy, and so forth. And each boy is beautifully attractive - though there are seven distinctly different types, from a black to a head to a sailor - but - which is most important and where J. Brian's inherent taste has always entered the picture - each boy has an illusive quality which makes him charming, instantly likable, and thoroughly enjoyable to be in his company - even in the third person. There is also a certain sincerity of purpose, a feeling of genuine affection for his partner and a total obliviousness to the process of film-making which alleviates prurient interest and makes the entire process of homosexual love-making - no matter how uninhibited - seem absolutely beautiful to the far-reaches of one's ideal mind.

All of the seven young men are not ideal actors, but all are quite natural and as convincing - at worst - as some you have met in "real" life. Four of the young men are really fine, delightful and handle J. Brian's often devilishly subtle script-humor so that it is at once hilarious and a joy to listen to. For example. Aaron Bedford as the photographer, when replying to Joe Markhum's query as to the location of his studio, tells him, "850 Bryant" (the Hall of Justice). Eric Martin as the handyman is delightfully coy as he tries to fix Doug Williams sink, trying not to notice that Doug's hand is on his ass (but careful enough so Doug won't remove it). Best of all is Tim Simon as the sailor. His performance is really quite extraordinary: the expressions of psychological complexities riding across his face like stampeding cattle: the wanting to have male sexual contact, the fear of Dale Carpenter's incipient approach, the guilt after the approach is made and the act is begun, the hate he reaches simultaneously with his climax. This brings me, however, to the only qualm I had at the screening of SEVEN TIMES SEVEN. The sailor's voice-over "stream of consciousness" from one feeling to another was rather violently abrupt. And when he verbalizes the previous incident to a new-found stranger on the beach, the sudden outburst of his subconscious mind is rather a shock to the logical mind. But J. Brian assures me this minor – though terribly important to the over-all flow of the film - flaw will be corrected.

The ultimate result, then, of J. Brian's hard work and financially-depleting film project, SEVEN TIMES SEVEN, is a two-hour film of such beauty and enjoyment as to seem like twenty minutes, and a film that is so nearly flawless as to be almost a Gay masterpiece.

With the proper corrections, the film will run a long time in a lot of places. When it opens, don't miss it!

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




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Show News



ON TOUR IN LOS ANGELES

Last week the Snoop made his first pilgrimage to L.A. to see what the showbars there were offering in the way of entertainment. The shows in L.A. are geared very differently than San Francisco shows, aiming more to a straight tourist-type crowd than a gay bar crowd. And yet, in most of the clubs I visited, the audiences were predominantly Gay. The shows there are far more lavish (bless the bead and feather shops close at hand and fooey to Lew Serbin's for having the only game in town here!), have much more dancing and less pantomime than we have in our "drag" shows. However, the big trip in L.A. seems to be, drag-wise, to be as stone "real" as possible, and while the shows are slick and professional, they aren't "fun" or campy. Again, they do not play for Gay audiences, but there's lots of talent currently working in L.A.

Starting at the REDWOOD ROOM, the show there is fast and smooth starring Brandy Lee and Butch Ellis. Brandy is a lovely entertainer who sings in a very feminine voice, has complete assurance onstage, does the choreography for the show, and is definitely a "well-rounded" entertainer (clock the figure!). She really belongs in a small, intimate cocktail lounge with a combo backing her working full live. Butch Ellis is of the old school of drag, strictly for fun, and he emcees the show, does the patter and sings in a surprisingly strong pleasant voice. The coupling of these two entertainers together is truly a study. Also in the cast is a gorgeous stripper named Tammi that nobody will ever convince me is actually a boy, Sheila Gibson, an energetic hoofer who does a wicked buck-and-wing, Chico, the male lead, and Thumbalina, who provides the comedy pantomime for the show. Actually, the REDWOOD ROOM has certainly the best show I saw in L.A., thoroughly enjoyable and professional.

At the OUEEN MARY, the star of the show is an exquisite vision named Angel. Here again, this is a boy? Wow! The male lead of the show is Eddie, and this is definitely all boy! Bring along a spare set of dry pants. When Angel and Eddie team up for doubles, it's enough to send you running to a surgeon. There is a pert charmer in the show named Kara, a real girl, who really bolsters the entire show immeasureably. She brings vitality to the stage like water to a dying man. And there are four more in the cast. As for the show itself, it can most kindly be described as uneven. Despite

some beautiful effects (Angel's Bassey medley with movies of herself to one side of her, two complete stages constantly in use, a double using movies dissolving into live and back again), some heavy dancing, excellent wardrobe, and one hilarious Carol Burnett sketch, there's no excitement to the show. The male mime monologues are a bore, the "Irma la Douce" number was appalling, and the medley from "The Boyfriend" starts off just great and then peters out. The most exciting number in the show is a dance trio, western-style, the three boys do togethr. It's all beautifully slick and smooth, but there's nothing clever or inventive (except in some individual solos) that makes it memorable. And it's a shame, because the setup is fantastic, the stage has some fine talent on it, and the potential is unlimited.

Now, to compare the show at the C'EST LA VIE to the aforementioned would be unfair. This is not a production show, nor is it really a showroom. There is a dance floor and the performers enter thru the kitchen doors at the back. Working under these conditions, they present a pleasant pantomime revue with the one-spot-after-another format. Headlining the show are Rikki and Ronnie Summers, two brothers who are totally different in style. Rikki does the comedy mime and m.c.'s graciously, Ronnie sings in his own strong male voice (whoever made his tapes should get an award!) and also does very good mime. The show is fast and "up," with Dodi doing the hard-rock and soul numbers and Roski being Miss Perpetual Motion (it's easy to see how she keeps her figure.) The high spot of the show is Ronnie's singing voice, doing a medley of "My Way" and "This Is My Life." He's a very "together" entertainer who knows exactly what he's doing. It's an informal, relaxed atmosphere at the

C'EST LA VIE, and the show provides a pleasant evening of diversion.

Also appearing in L.A. are several top names familiar to San Francisco audiences - Charles Pierce, Maurice and LaMont, and Hadda Brooks. Time did not permit to see all the shows currently playing so I chose those whose work I had not seen before. No slight intended to anyone. I must also add that I met many of the entertainers mentioned, and many others who were in the audience, and all that jazz about L.A. queens are "uptight" and "plastic" is a pile of! The entertainers, at least the ones I met, were very relaxed fun people who made my brief sojourn a pleasure. Makes ya kinda wonder what kind of reputation we must have in L.A., hummm?

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TO TIP OR NOT TO TIP by Mona E. Baggs

"To tip or not to tip?" that is not the question! Unless a waiter has been truly rude or grossly incompetent, a tip (gratuity, if you will) is in order. It should not be considered as an award (although some battle ribbons are won with less trouble) but as a legitimate part of your dinner expense. (In fact, in Europe you may find a 'service charge' of 15%, 20% or more automatically added to your bill). Although we shall go into the duties of waiters and other restaurant personnel in our next column, perhaps a general outline of what a waiter goes through trying to

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help make your dinner an enjoyable experience will explain why - although it is not always obvious - a waiter more than earns his tip.

Each customer has his own idea of the Ideal Waiter and, on some Aristotelian plane, there may indeed be one (serving Ideal Customers, no doubt!) In order to even begin to satisfy everyone, the "Ideal Waiter" would have to have the TACT of a politician (preferably an incumbent), the WIT of a nightclub comedian (Don Rickles?), the CHARM of a matinee idol (does anyone still go to matinees?), the SPEED of a track star, the STAMINA of a professional boxer, the BALANCE of a juggler, the MEMORY of a computer, the PATIENCE of a saint (pick your favorite) and advanced powers of ESP all at the salary of a good babysitter (and he's often required to be that,

Waiters are underpaid because the restaurant operates on a low profit margin. Theoretically, the better a waiter is, the more satisfied customers he will have; the happier they are, the more they will tip and the more often they will return. Thus, the waiter makes money, the restaurant makes money and the customer is happy. That's the theory - most of the time it works, sometimes it doesn't.

Invisible, but always available, the waiter is expected to insure that all of his customers (despite their widely disparate tastes, moods and manners) enjoy their meals. During the course of an evening the waiter may be scalded, poked, insulted, bumped, burned, jabbed, grabbed, interrogated, patronized, bullied, spilled on, stepped on and still be expected to smile through it all. And the damnedest thing is that a good waiter will (and does...

The question then is not "To tip or not to tip?", but how much to tip (...and by that tip to say we end the heartaches and the thousand natural shocks that... oops, sorry!) How much should you tip your waiter?

Let's start with the most controversial aspect - so-called "over-tipping." Now, let's end with the simple statement that there is no such thing! (I suspect that the stories of waiters who disdain those gauche enough to "over-tip" are invented and sustained by cheap people.)

Perhaps the most generous tip that has ever come to my attention was left by the late James Gordon Bennet, publisher of the New York Herald. While in Monte Carlo Mr. Bennet went to a small cafe in the hills for lunch. Finding the table he fancied occupied, he sought out the owner and bought the restaurant on the spot (for about \$40,000). When he had finished with the meal, he gave the restaurant to the waiter who served him. The waiter's name, by the way, was Ciro and he used his windfall to open the world-famous Ciro's of Monte Carlo. Ciro may have thought a lot of things, but I seriously doubt he thought Mr. Bennet was crude for "over-tipping."

The mythical practice of "over-tipping" is not to be confused with the much more common and demeaning practice of "extortion tipping." Often a customer who is drunk, rude, boorish, demanding or otherwise obnoxious feels that a fat tip will take care of everything. I won't deny that there are some waiters (greedy, poverty-stricken or just plain sycophantic) whose self-respect can be bought for a large enough tip (we're not all perfect) but to do so is nothing less than ethical prostitution on the waiter's part. As far as the customer who indulges in this practice is concerned, he is dealing in a form of blackmail -"extortion tipping." The waiter is not disdainful, then, of the large tip, but of the attitude with which it is offered.

Then there are those who, either through ignorance or penury, consistently "under-tip" (this is definitely not a mythical practice). By doing so they degrade the service and (I would like to think) unknowingly insult the waiter. I have many times received effusive thanks and elaborate compliments on the meal and the service only to have this approbation

sadly belied by the gratuity; it's hard to believe you're the world's greatest waiter - that you served the \$10.00 steak with flair and the wine with savoir faire when there is a quarter staring at you from the tip tray!

In an inexpensive to moderately priced restaurant (where the total bill is less than \$5.00 per person) a 'per person' rather than a "percentage" tip is more equitable. You should be prepared to leave a minimum of 50 cents per person for service; if you enjoyed the service, this could range up to \$1.00 per person (which would be considered a generous tip). In a more expensive restaurant (where the total bill, including drinks and wine, comes to more than \$5.00 per person) a "percentage" tip is the better alternative: 10% is a parsimonious but acceptable gratuity, 15% is the 'standard rate' and 20% indicates that you enjoyed the meal and the service. (If you would like to enjoy the waiter, however, the rates can become rather

In any case where you honestly feel that the service does not deserve a tip, please have the courtesy to explain to the waiter or the host what was wrong. It is frustrating to face an empty tip tray and not know where you went wrong; if the waiter was rude or incompetent, the management would like to know.

Most waiters enjoy their work; some are in it strictly for the money and make this fact rather plain. When a service - any service - is obviously performed with an open palm and a mercenary gleam in the eye, then a gracious smile and a "thank you" are all that are required. When, however, the service is spontaneous and friendly the nicest expression of appreciation and the sincerest form of flattery is a tip.
