MURDER OR ACCIDENT

WAS NOT IN VAIN

On Friday, August 11th, the Coroner, Boyd Stephens, ruled that "I cannot absolutely rule out the possibility of foul play in the death of David Hart Winters, but the evidence that it was an accident is much stronger, and as such, the death of seventeen year old David Hart Winters is hereby ruled an accident."

Approximately forty persons attended the Coroner's Hearing, several having been supeonead, such as Perry George, a friend of the deceased, and Reverend Ray Broshears, who lodged an official protest that the death of David Hart Winters was not an accident, and that a full investigation be held. His death on the 22nd of July, was a most unusual one, that being according to the SFPD's Inspector Patrick O'Shea, David was supposed to be so drunk that he couldn't stand, point.18, and that he made it all the way from 9th and Market to the Sunset Streetcar Tunnel, and then to wander in pitch blackness through the tunnel, and to lie down perfectly parallel to the rail tracks, and not be hit by the front of the streetcar, but be hit by the underside. That, was quite a chore for anyone to do, sober, let alone being, as was charged, point.18, which is beyond too drunk to drive. Carl Harkness, Muni Railroad driver who found the body that Saturday morning, stated that there was no way that anyone as drunk as the SFPD claims, to have fallen down in such a perfect position, as to not have caused the "cowcatcher" on the front of the streetcars to have came down and stop the streetcar. Harkness has been a Muni trolley operator for the past five years. Muniman, Smith, who has operated streetcars for 28 years, stated that he did not know that he had hit

anyone, and stated that was most unusal, in light of the findings of the Coroner. It was true, that those who stated that it was homocide, could not offer concrete proof that a murder had been committed, that it was true on the otherside, that the SFPD's case was full of holes. The Coroner questioned all in a most leading way, according to those who testified, and the Coroner was furious that the news media was present, (several radio stations and the newspapers and KRON-TV), all of whom gave sympathetic coverage to the event. Most were in agreement that the case certainly was not clearcut as had been claimed by the ADVOCATE reporter Gerald Hasen, who spoke out against Broshears having interferred in the case which according to Hansen, "was none of Broshears' damn business". Broshears pointed out that

just two years ago, several blocks away, that a school teacher was slain by a group of young punks, who then placed his body on the J-Church streetcar tracks in a parallel position, killing the teacher upon contact, and stopping the car, for the tracks were at street level and that in the "Right of way" in the Tunnel, the tracks are elevated several inches off of the ground, unlike the Streetcar tracks on Church street. That death, as yet unsovled, coupled with the recent vampings of Gays by the these young punks, and the sterling-quality personality and character of David Hart Winters, was more than ample reaosn for a thorough investigation to be done. To the complaint by the Coroner of news media being present, called by Broshears, Broshears replied that, "if that had been the 17 year old son of some wealthy San Franciscan, there would have been dozens of newsmen present, but meaning as the death was what the SFPD and the Coroner described as "routine", of course they

didn't want any publicity. I can promise you from this day forth, that the

Coroner's Office will never be the same, for I don't care for these one-man no-jury setups in cases such as these, and that had there been a jury, the verdict would have been far different."

Earlier, Rev. Broshears had complained that the civil and constitutional rights of Dominick McBride an elderly business associate of Winters, had been violated in that he along with the others questioned, were not "Mirandized" by the SFPD, and that tape recordings were made without the permission of those being questioned. The SFPD officials did not enter into evidence any of the statements that had been given them as a result of Broshears' charge. McBride refused to answer any questions on the advice of his attorney who spoke for him at the Hearing. On this point, it was generally agreed that the SFPD had been made to "walk the chalk line and go by the rule book".

Supervisor Ronald Pelosi, in a letter to the GAA stated that he would personally look into the matter of poor lighting of the Sunset Tunnel area in DuBoce Park and would make such requests for increased lighting as has been requested by Rev. Broshears. Pelosi expressed considerable concern in the matter of citizen safety in that area, and would send a letter to Chief Scott on the matter.

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
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
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Editor:

Dear Rob.

For several months now a group of us have been attacked repeatedly by your columnists Bill Beardemphl and Chuck Thayer. The lies uttered really need to be answered lest readers of your newspaper be misled by them. Therefore, I hope you will publish this letter.

I know that you try to publish an honest journal, but it would have been more responsible for you, as editor, to verify allegations before publishing them. We would appreciate your doing so in future. We have not consulted the law books to decide whether we have been libelled; however, none of us enjoy having our reputations defamed.

Firstly, with reference to the Stokes campaign and its finances. The campaign raised \$9,142.38 and spent \$9,180.50. Of that amount, a considerable part came out of Rick's own savings as can be seen from the enclosed statement which was filed with the State. (You may publish the statement, if you wish.) No contributions were "Pocketted."

After three months of arduous campaigning, usually involing 20+ hours a day, Rick and Dave took a well deserved three week vacation. They paid for that, too, out of their own pockets.

The campaign was a success in many respects: (1) We ran a city-wide campaign with an unknown candiate. (2) He came in ninth in a field of thirty-four. (3) It was generally acknowledged that ours was the most professional campaign in the contest for Community College Board. (4) Rick received 45,000 votes - no mean feat for an unknown candiate. (5) Perhaps most importantly, we operated as a cooperative and integrated team. (Naturall, we wonder how much better Rick would have done had our brothers and sisters in the Gay Movement complained less and pitched-in more. We hope more will become involved in his next campagin.)

The second area where your columnists have attacked us is over the policies of the S.I.R. Board. They have the unmitigated gall to castigate us for dividing the gay community in San Francisco, and for being too "radical." Unity is a beautiful idea; everyone is in favor of it. Diverse opinions make it impossible to achieve. In our opinion, unity is less important than acheiving civil rights for gay people. Unity arises out of our achievements, and even our failures together; rather than out of the abstract itself.

By June of this year, many of us at S.I.R. realized that the organization's progress was being stalemated by a small group of nay-sayers. We decided to press on whether they liked it or not. The overwhelming defeat of Messrs. Thayer and Broshears' candidacies at the last membership meeting, despite the active support of the nay-sayers, indicates that the positive thinking S.I.R. members realize which of their leaders accomplish things for Gay Rights.

S.I.R. still has a long way to go. But in slightly over two months, we have moved significantly forward despite the oppostion of the nay-sayers, and despite a disasterous fire in our center. We have an operating budget

and have identified the sources of our financial problems. Because the Board no longer has to pass on every trival financial matter at its meetings, we can get on with the job of policy-making. We must find new and stable sources of income; we need to rejuvenate some old ones. We will achieve this because we are moving forward again.

This past week, S.I.R. cooperated with G.A.A., New York, and with the Gay Law Students Association in presenting resolutions to the American Bar Association convention in San Francisco, S.I.R.'s Legal Chairman and Committee had no desire to participate in that effort, and did not.

S.I.R. has four law students doing research for it in the area of Gay Rights. S.I.R.'s Legal Chairman and Committee had no use for their services, so they were assigned to my Political Committee. In two months, they have done a great deal of work and opened new horizons in our efforts to promote Gay Rights. In this regard we operate under the premise that a well-orchestrated attack on oppresive laws combines efforts in the legislature and the

In a few weeks, we wope to have a brochure of legal motions and arguments that will make it easier, and cheaper, for lawyers to better defend our arrested brothers. Soon, we also hope to begin the most professional attack possible on the constituionality of existing laws. Through the Whitman-Radclyffe Foundation, we are trying to fund this project with donations that are tax deductible. We estimate that it will cost about \$15,000.

According to figures we have seen, from January through June, 1972, 97% of arrested gay people in San Francisco pleaded guilty to oppresive laws, and paid their lawyers for that advice. A lot of them were represented by memebers of S.I.R.'s Legal Committee. We hope, in future, substantially more Gay Persons will fight for their rights. We hope to encourage more fighting lawyers, straight as well as Gay, to handle their cases.

Despite oppostion from the S.I.R. Legal Chairman, we have begun a dialog with the elected District Attornies of the Bay Area. We start with the premise that they are just as interested in improving the quality of law enforcement as we are. Maybe together we can make life under existing laws better for our brothers and sisters, and maybe we can get them to cooperate toward changing the laws. If these officials prove to be completely hostile to reason, then we can, and will, communicate that fact to the citizens who elect them.

We have been accused of "ripping-off" the Gay Community, Except for the fact that this accusation might interfere with our support from the community, it is too ludicrous for words. We give unstintingly of our time and money. People who feel guilty about their own conduct, and who lack self-esteem, often project their hang-ups on to those who they decide are their enemies. This appears to be the problem of your columnists and their

S.I.R. and the community have much to do. We must find ways to encourage more of our brothers and sisters to join us. We must make involvement in the Movement more enjoyable. We especially need professionals to help us in their field of expertise. At the moment we need additional lawyers with expertise and contacts in taxes, real estate, and corporations: we need accountants, experts in public administration, job counsellors, advertising people, space salesmen, and decorators, as well as many many positive thinking members of the community to help us with the day-to-day affairs of the Society.

Finally, I am proud to support George McGovern for President, His stand on Gay Rights may not be perfect. But we have reason to believe he will life the oppression where he can - by executive order in the area of federal employment and immigration, for instance. His opponent was instrumental in beginning the oppression; we have no reason to believe he has changed his position.

The Gay Movement in San Francisco and California is moving ahead. Those of us who are working rather than carping find our efforts in the Movement to be most exciting. enjoyable, even liberating. We will not be deterred or put down.

TO SHED OR NOT TO SHED THAT IS THE QUESTION.

In San Francisco there are so many legitimate businesses and bars to go to that it is not necessary to put yourself into jeopardy with the police unless one desire to be outside the law. If I may be more specific... Many persons including

the SHED'S membership know about the problems that they are presently having with the SFPD. The SHED is branding the problems as "police harassment". It seems to me that the police have no choice when neighbors complain because of somebody pissing on their house or playing garbage can lids like cymbols at 4 AM, or fighting in the streets, etc. It seems to me that any operating legitimate business does not have to worry about police harrassment in San Francisco, because the opening legal foundation is unshakable.

The SHED is having difficulty because of their residential location and questionable licensing for after hours dancing. I surmise that the present difficulty with the police is not necessarily harrasment since they have been given repeated warnings which simply have not been heeded. They now

have a temporary restraining order permitting their customers to dance after hours. They seem to think that this restraining order is final. According to the San Francisco Chronicle, Aug. 18th, they were issued a temporary restraining order which will be either made permanent or revoked on Thursday, August 24th.

It appears to me that the SHED is a black sheep in the family of legitimate Gay businesses. The situation with the police is an extremely critical one. How can one business continue to put other Gay businesses in that district in jeopardy? It seems they are not thinking of "their brothers" and "business compatriots".

I have some questions to ask the management of the SHED.

What considerations were taken for the many residents of the neighborhood when the business is structured to annoy them at all hours of the night and morning. Why didn't the SHED locate in a business area like other more responsible Gay businesses so as NOT to disturb sleeping persons and cause damage to neighboring houses?

How is it that other "after hours" places in San Francisco have operated for years with all night dancing in compliance with the laws? How is it that there are over a hundred Gay businesses operating in cooperation with the San Francisco Police Department that customers do NOT have to be afraid of arrest when they walk in the premises?

I quote from your mailing... "we would not sit by and see your constitutional rights be unlawfully abused..."

Just what Constitutional rights of mine were being abused? I do NOT find where the San Francisco Police unlawfully abused anyone's Constitutional rights in connection with your case.

On Friday August 18, The San Francisco Chronicle states that, "Far West Associates Inc. president William D. Harrington said police pressure against the club began July 10 and claimed he has lost \$70,000.00 in income since then."

Just who are the *real* owners of Far West Associates Inc.?

How can you lose that much money or are you a business set up to lose money for some undercover reason?





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

As a matter of fact we did not help our cause any (not that we could have) when we openly supported Dianne Feinstein. What we must realize that for any straight organization, group, social, political, religious, or merchants to listen to us, they must need us before they will come around to our case. To finish with "Dear Joe" remember when he runs for governor and if he wins you can kiss "Willie Brown's" AB47 Bill goodbye for a long time to come. You might wonder why this bill is mentioned so often and why it seems or is so important - it is another step towards freedom that all men are entitled to, but homosexuals are denied.

CREEDON NAMED TO HEAD MISSION SFPD STATION Gayvoice News Service(GNS) August 14, 1972

Spokesmen thorughout the Gay society in San Francisco were shocked and dismayed to learn that the San Francisco Police Department had placed Captain Dermot Creedon permanently in the Mission Station. The Mission Station jurisdiction includes the area of Upper Market, Castro Village, Valencia Valley and the Duboce Park areas as well as the traditional Mission District.

The office of the Chief of Police made this known through a departmental order on Wednesday August 9th.

Various leaders of the Gay world here have met with Captain Creedon and found him to be most unacceptable to them, as Creedon expresses a strong anti-Gay sentiment. Reaction has been to call for a petition to the presented to the Human Rights Commission and as well to the Board of Supervisors demanding a resolution calling for the

removal of Creedon from the Mission Station.

Creedon joined the SFPD in April of 1946, and was the personal choice of Chief Scott to replace the late Captain Philip Kiely, even though there was strong internal-SFPD opposition to that appointment, for as many police officers have stated, "There is no need in going in creating trouble when we already have more than we can handle now, and with Creedon, wow!" ADVOCATE reporter Sasha Gregory, and GAA spokesman met with Creedon recently and he was coldly cordial to them during the interview, and both of their reactions were that "Creedon spells trouble for Gays, with a captial

Creedon refused comment on the recent death of David Hart Winters, and as well as denied charges that any of his men "bother" any of the Gay bars on Valencia and that if such charges were being made by the owners, that they were lies.



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
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
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

GAY PEOPLES UNION FORMS IN PALO ALTO



TWO ON THE AISLE by Jay Noonan

LIGHT UP THE SKY

The second return of the CITY PLAYERS (a theatrical experience) is a step in the right direction for their acting company. Into the confines of the little theater at California Hall, Moss Hart's show business comedy LIGHT UP THE SKY gives us a hilarious view of what goes on before and after the curtain comes down on an out-of-town tryout in Boston.

When Mr. Hart's comedy graced the 1948 Broadway season, it brought forth many accolades from both critics and audience alike. In writing LIGHT UP THE SKY, Moss once said it was probably easier than any other play I have done previously. He also said it might appear to be autobiographical at times but not all the time and well it does, as the author of the play within a play probably was the young Moss Hart. who was quite shy with his first play "Once in A Lifetime," co-authored by George S. Kaufman, who he was in awe of. So, in writing LIGHT UP THE SKY, the dialogue must have flowed like water over a dam after fifteen years association with his fellow cohorts, and it flowered and came to life brilliantly at times Friday night, August 18, 1972.

We enter the lives of six people of the theatre in Irene Livingston's plush

suite in the Ritz Carleton Hotel in Boston at what they call "magic time". The time, an hour or two before the curtain goes up on their first out-of-town performance en route to bringing the show into New York for its opening.

Enter Carleton Fitzgerald (Ken Dickmann), the director of our little play, an eccentric who cries at the thought of anything and who floats, never walks, through the room on his first entrance with a black cape. In turn, Mr. Dickmann swirled in like Dracula and when he entered in his robe in Act Three clutching his throat, I flashed on a scene from "The Fearless Vampire Killers". It was a performance that was played to broadly in the first five minutes of dialogue and movement, but

settled down in the following acts into a first-rate reading.

The producer's wife Frances Black (Vern Becker) gives a special kind of delivery to every line. Her eyes are everywhere and they don't miss a thing. She is devoted to her producer-husband, although she herself is a star on ice skates. Her other occupation, however. on this night is two-fold. She is also half an angel, \$150,000 invested in the show her husband is producing. Her ensuing gin-playing and tet-a-tete with Nancy are hilarious, and if Mr. Becker is hilarious, Nancy, as Stella Livingston, the star's mother, is outrageous. Her stage presence and timing are a joy to behold. Her Joan Davis voice also adds dimension to her role. My only qualm is that she is the mother of the star and doesn't look it. Her hair should be greyer and in a Spring Byington upsweep, as she always had pencils sticking out of her hair to keep her gin score, and glasses that she constantly couldn't find because they were either in her hair or dangling down on her chest. Also, in Act III, when coming out of her bedroom into the dark living room, she should stumble over furniture as well as when she goes to the bar. But her performance was flawless. Bless you,

Peter Sloan, the playwright, played by Stan Berniol, was just shy and unassuming enough to carry it off beautifully. I hope SKY will do the same for you, Mr. Berniol, as it did for Barry Nelson, who originated the part. Also, there is a strong resemblance between you.

As Olga Turner, the established playwright and good friend to all, Roxie Hart speaks her lines well but seems wooden in her movements. We know

Irene Livingston, the star of our play-within-a-play, is performed with much gusto by Lori Shannon. Miss Shannon always looks at ease on the stage and she gave a good interpretation of an established star. I'm sure Moss Hart's Irene was fashioned from many a star of today, and Miss Shannon was dressed like a star and moved easily from bedroom to living room in fashionable elegance. But the Bette Davis routine was not needed. You were doing all right as yourself and anyway. imitations of La Davis came into being to the public after "All About Eve", not in 1946.

As the producer, Sidney Black, Chuck Waltz was forceful and lyrical as manager of his wife's career and producer of this play. Earl Parson's Shriner, with money to burn, was delightful. His stage-struck actions were a gem.







RED BAITING

The Most Exceptionally Rev. Itkin is not telling the truth when he says GAY SUNSHINE has been taken over by the International Socialists or Trotskyists.

I have been involved with SUNSHINE since its second issue, longer than any other person. I know almost all of of the people involved in the paper. There are, to be sure, one or two Trotskyists connected with the paper, but the writers and staff represent a corss cut of the Gay

Community. Several writers, including myself, are free-enterprise Libertarians, one is a conservative, corporate capitalism Republican, three or four are anarchists. One is even an S&M leather man who writes serious articles integrating sadism and massochism into Gav Lib doctrine.

Itkin is not the only red baiter to write in the B.A.R. Beardemphl has done his share. In the last issue Beardemphl says that "revolutionary extremists" are speaking for all homosexuals in San Francisco, "You

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dear readers, were represented before the Human Rights Commission by a paid employee of S.I.R. and the TAVERN GUILD who threatened to burn down buildings if he was not immediately heeded."

In truth, the Gay Community was represented by seven spokesmen at the HRC hearing. The spokesmen represented a broad political spectrum - Jim Foster, Peter Sorgen, Larry Littlejohn, B.J. Beckwith, Ray Broshears, Don Jackson and Dick Gayer. The hearing was to discuss strategy to end employment discrimination against male homosexuals. It was most productive. Already it has resulted in homsoexuals being included in the affirmative action hiring programs.

Red baiting has become a popular sport in recent issues of B.A.R. The would-be imitators of the fortunately late Sen. Joseph McCarthy would have us believe that the communist conspiracy has infiltrated the Gay movement and media and is about to (continued on next page)

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The truth is of some 200 Gay organizations in the United States, only two - the International Socialist Gay Caucus and the Red Butterfly Cell - are controlled by old leftists.

Most Gay organizations are Libertarian and believe in the democratic process and letting everyone have their say; consequently, the leftists have been permitted to have their say, but Libertarians are the vast majority in the Gay movement. With their firm belief in individual rights, Libertarians are distrustful of organized groups and alien political philosophies. Readers may rest assured that Libertarians are in firm control of the Gay movement. The chances of the Gay Movement being taken over by communists is nil. It's just a "Red Herring".

Now, back to Itkin's letter. Itkin would have us believe that Winston Leyland is at one and the same time a monarchist, an anarchist and an International Socialist. Itkin doesn't explain how one person could hold three such totally incompatable political philosophies.

Itkin criticized the pornography ads, but does not explain how else SUNSHINE can survive. One of the facts of life of the newspaper business is advertising is an economic necessity. The history of many short lived Gay publications that attempted to publish without advertising speaks for itself no advertising, no paper. The advertisers don't interfere with the editorial content of the paper. Itkin should be grateful to the advertisers for providing the funds that pay the printing bill.

Since its first issue two years ago, SUNSHINE has been the avant guard of the Gay media. It published anti-establishment news concerning the persecution of Gays in the military, prisons and mental institutions long before such stories became fashionable.

But SUNSHINE'S most important function has been in providing an ideological forum for Gay Liberation. It is the only publication in America that has dealt extensively with the social, philosophical and ideological issue of Gay Liberation.

Far from being Trotskyist oriented, most of the material in SUNSHINE has no political bias at all. It is filled with poetry, book reviews, film reviews, and is, in fact, the most literate Gay publication around.

Although SUNSHINE is published in San Francisco, it is not a local publication - the vast majority of its circulation is outside California. It is sold throughout the United States and Western Europe.

SUNSHINE's articles have been widely repreinted in the underground press and in hard and soft cover books.

It is quoted and reprinted far more often than VECTOR, far more often than the ADVOCATE. More than any other publication, it is the Gay Movement's window to the world.

Ralph Schaffer, 45, one of the co-founders of the GAY LIBERATION FRONT and prominant journalist was found dead from bullet wounds August 29

Schaffer's body was found lying in a pool of blood by Morris Kight and GAY COMMUNITY SERVICES CENTER Director Don Kilhefner at the Gaywill Funky Shoppe in Hollywood. Schaffer was the non-paid manager of the shop, which is operated by the GAY COMMUNITY SERVICES CENTER to raise money for Gay charitable purposes.

Morris Kight said he became alarmed when repeated phone calls to the Gaywill during business hours Monday failed to get answered. Kight called Kilhefner, and the two went to the shop, where they found Schaffer's body.

No clues as to the motive or identity of the murderer or murderers has been found. Schaffer was last seen alive Saturday, August 26, and died sometime between then and the time he was found dead Monday afternoon.
