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# "MARCUS WELBY" ANTI-GAY?

### **Gays Protest TV Show**

A forthcoming episode of the television series Marcus Welby, M.D. that deals with the sexual molestation of a 14-year old boy by one of his teachers has been rejected for broadcast by three ABC-TV stations, largely as a result of a coordinated national campaign by homosexual rights groups.

Four regular advertisers have also withdrawn for that episode. They are Bayer asperin, Listerine, Gallo wine

and Ralston Purina.

Bruce Voeller, Executive Director of the National Gay Task Force, said the concern of the homosexual rights organizations was chiefly that "the take-home message of the program was that the rape was a homosexual one," since both the teacher and the pupil are male.

He said it was feared that this would reinforce old myths about homosexuals and plays upon the apprehensions of parents, at a time when homosexual rights legislation is pending in the Congress and about 20

"We feel the program will definitely have a chilling effect on legislation which would protect gays from discrimination in employment and housing," Voeller said.

Although two of the largest affiliates, WPVI-TV in Philadelphia and WCVB in Boston, were among those rejecting the program, ABC-TV will carry the episode October 8, as scheduled, a network spokesman said.

The third station to cancel,

KATC in Lafayette, La. probably acted more from concern with the subject matter than with the alledged injustice to homosexuals, the spokesman added.

Voeller noted that homosexualrights organizations in a number of other large cities, with support from clergymen and psychiatrists, were still attempting to persuade their local ABC stations to keep the show off the

According to Voeller, some of the most reliable studies of sex offenses against children, including those published by the Kinsey Institute and the American Humane Society, have found that child molestation is almost exclusively heterosexual.

ABC executives maintained that the Marcus Welby episode does not deal with a homosexual teacher but with a pedophile, one who has erotic desires toward children. They noted that on several occasions in the program the point is made that the teacher is not homosexual.

The homosexual rights organizations contend, however, the disclaimers do not mitigate the clear homosexual implication in the situation of a male adult attacking a male

Note: Although the above named ABC affiliate stations have cancelled, the vast number of people in America will unfortunately see the show. Markets Minneapolis, Cleveland, Washington, Baltimore, New Orleans and Kansas City have for sure ruled that they will

In about one month there will be a statewide election. The people of California who bother to go out and vote will be electing a new governor for the next four (maybe eight) years. Based upon the excitement of the campaign, most people don't seem to care. To many of the would-be voters, it does not seem to matter which of the candidates gets the office. In the San Francisco area we have several local



elections which appear to be no contests. The sum is that many people are not going to spend time to vote. That's their choice and right. Yet, by so doing, the people of the state of California who do not bother to go out and vote may re-elect an Attorney General by the name of Younger. Therein lies the catch.

Younger wants to put you in jail for smoking grass. Younger wants to put you in jail for having sex with a consenting adult. Younger wants to put you in jail for reading dirty books. Younger probably wants to just put vou in jail. He comes from the same mold that former U.S. Attorney General John Mitchell came from. The only thing he lacks from being another Mitchell is that he has no Martha. Otherwise, he is no better than Mitchell and the rest of the Nixon gang. (Strange that Nixon had his Mitchell...Reagan has his Younger... and Alioto has his Ferdon. All are Executives who preach law 'n order and have Victorian's as their AG's... only thing is that so few of them practice anything but their own laws and their own orders.)

re-elected, we will still see the same philosophy coming out of the state capital that considers the so-called crimeless crimes as serious attempts to overthrow the government. The reelection of Evil Younger will be a reaffirmation of his views. The jails will remain full due to his election. Running against him is a man named William Norris. Where does Norris stand? At a meeting with several gavs a few months, Norris said that if he is called upon to bring to trial anvone accused of having sex with a consenting adult, he would not trial the case and thus he could force the state of California to hire outside lawyers. That means that the State would not have the power, the authority, or the strength of an Attorney General's Office in fighting the case. It would be undermining the law from within. It is a bold stand for an Attorney General to refuse to handle a case. It is the same as saving that he, the Attorney General, regards the law to be wrong.

Given the choice: Younger vs. Norris...I can not see how any gay person, how anyone who smokes grass, how anyone who gambles, etc. would not be determined to go out and vote for Norris. If there were no other A State or local races that interest you...the state-wide race for Attorney General has to, for if you are gay you have it in your own self interest to vote for a man who wants to toss out the sex laws as they now stand. If no other race interests you, you owe it to vourself to march to the voting booth...vote for Norris...and march out again.

Younger, like Mitchell, must not be allowed to have his say any longer.

### Time Well Spent.

It takes time to register to vote. It takes time to stand in line to vote. The total time may be only a few minutes or it may take an hour. Think of how much time each year thousands spend time in jail for having sex with consenting adults, for smoking grass or for obstructing sidewalks.

The last day to register to vote is Sunday, Oct. 6th. The last day to register to vote at City Hall is Friday. places, will be open on the 5th and Juory Trio & there will be deputy registrars there every day until then. 

mobility people, uplifted buildings of both business and residential purposes are finding a better place to be, and be built.


There goes another one of those Chron-Exam trucks thru a 4-way stop at a speed estimated (conservatively) to be thirty-five.)





## MEET TEAN SIMMONS by DOYALD MCIEAN

"I once got a little upset when somebody in an elevator said to me, 'Weren't you Jean Simmons?" And like an idiot I answered, "Yes, I was!"

At a press luncheon at Trader Vic's, there's no question that Jean Simmons "is" definitely the same Jean Simmons who played Ophelia at 18 opposite Laurence Olivier's Hamlet, came to America in Androcles and the Lion and remained toiling in the Hollywood vineyards for many years



as the radiantly beautiful star of Guys and Dolls, Elmer Gantry, The Robe, Home Before Dark and on and on. Asked how many films she has made, she pauses briefly, thinks and says, "I really have no idea. A lot. In those days, we made four or five a year." She manages to invest "those days" with a tone that implies she was a star of the silent screen, but such is not the case. Miss Simmons is now in her mid-Forties, is happily married to director Richard Brooks (after a first

marriage to actor Stewart Granger) and has two daughters, 18 and 13. She has the sort of beauty (thanks to incredible bone structure) that defies time...and she's a hoot to interview. With her low husky voice ("I thought it was a little ridiculous for a woman my age to still be talking way up here, so I worked to lower it"), Jean Simmons has a rollicking sense of humor that pervades the entire table. Her eyes flash angrily when one noted critic Hawaiian dish that is porpoise --"You're going to EAT Flipper!!?" -and reassured that it is not her favorite dolphin, we resume. Shortly thereafter, she suddenly looks around the table and says, "Okay, who stole the fortune cookies?!" The fortune cookies are hastily retrieved and again she settles back politely to answer questions. I ask her if she was ever confronted with an impossible co-star that she disliked. She looks wisely at me, and slowly replies, "Yesss...once ...it was very difficult." I'm on the edge of my seat waiting for the fatal name: Jean Simmons looks me in the eye and grins...a big grin that says, "That's all." Terribly frustrated, I try again. "Was there one film you'd like to burn the negative and forget? "Do I have to tell you the name? Miss Simmons says, "Yes!" I demand. "Well, it's so unfair, because nobody sets out to make a bad film. But I'd have to say 'Hilda Crane'. That almost put me in the cellar." And we both giggle.

Jean Simmons began her acting career at the tender age of 14 in England for J. Arthur Rank Studios. "I didn't really take acting seriously until I worked with David Lean in Great Expectations. I decided then I wanted to be an actress. I was 16." Prior to coming to the U.S., she appeared in 16 British films, including Hamlet with Olivier. "I had never done Shakespeare in my life and hated it in school, but when Laurence Olivier asks you, you do it. The other actors were marvelous to me; when Larry couldn't work with me, they would take me aside behind a piece of scenery and work with me...In England, I had a lot of protection, maybe too much." At the tender age of 18, "J. Arthur Rank sold me to Howard Hughes...he was very nice to me...and Hughes then sold the rest of me to Fox." She made her American debut in Androcles and the Lion --"which I don't think anybody saw" -and had her first big commercial



success in The Robe with Victor Mature and Cinemascope. "I got to put my fingers in cement for that...My husband feels that Cinemascope was only effective for the funeral of a snake." She continued her rise with Desiree and her singing debut as Sister Sarah in Guys and Dolls, both with Marlon Brando. "The first time was very difficult for me because I used to watch the way he worked instead of responding to him, but by Guys and Dolls I was alright. Brando at his worst...though there is no such thing for him really...is better than most actors at their best."

Upon leaving Fox, Miss Simmons became, and has remained so, independent of studio contracts. "I've made my own mistakes...Everything you do you must believe is going to be the best thing you've done." I ask if she's turned down any roles that might be newsworthy. She smiles broadly. "Well, there was one little film that won an Academy Award for the actress who took it when I turned it down, Three Faces of Eve, which Joanne Woodward won the Oscar for. But I would have been wrong for it and she was positively brilliant. Obviously she understood it better than I did." Jean Simmons has been twice nominated for the Academy Award, Hamlet and The Happy Ending, and lost. How does it feel to lose the Oscar? "Painful! We all say we don't care, but you do. It would be nice to win one."

"I have three favorite films, although everybody thinks I'm prejudiced because they're all with my

husband (director/writer Richard Brooks) -- Elmer Gantry, The Actress with Spencer Tracy...I was very close to Spencer Tracy...a very funny man too...and The Happy Ending...I don't think there is a Hollywood today, which I think is fine. Films should be international. My husband hasn't shot a film in a



is I have a husband who says. 'Go out and do it, kid!" I note that she hasn't gone the way of so many actresses, playing leads in horror films, and Jean Simmons exclaims, "No! Never! Well, I shouldn't say that; I may have to eat those words." (I doubt it seriously) Asked what she would like to do today, she calmly answers, "I'd like a crack at a really good bitch!" But didn't she play a good bitch in Mister Buddwing? "No, she was more of a drunken slob." (I am hysterical at this very classy lady calmly talking about

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playing bitches and drunken slobs, and those beautiful brown doe-eyes open wide to gaze at me...then she smiles. She understands)

While waiting for that bitch role to come along, Jean Simmons is currently touring as Desiree Armfeldt in A Little Night Music, now playing at the Geary Theatre under the auspices of the Civic Light Opera. Miss Simmons has previously only attempted the legit stage twice, once in Tolstov's Power of Darkness in England and in a play by Hugh Wheeler (author of Night Music) which never materialized. "I didn't have time to find out if I could even make it in the theatre...It's very exciting at this point in my career to do something fresh and new. My husband is proud of me because I had the guts to get on a plane and audition, which I haven't done in thirty years...I wasn't working and my husband, who's very wise and very smart, said 'Why don't you exercise?' I went to David Craig (a noted Hollywood coach) to work on lowering my voice, met Sally Kellerman there and she took me to George Griffin for singing lessons." Mr. Griffin tutored her and then wrote producer-director Harold Prince to recommend her for a Broadway Musical. Mr. Prince in turn asked her to audition for Stephen Sondheim, which she did, "and when they said to me, 'Would you like to do it?' I said 'Yes, please."

Night Music is a company show. You have to be up all the time and if anyone lets down, the whole company has to work that much harder. I'd like to talk a little about the other members of the cast. I don't believe the talent I'm surrounded by in this show." Margaret Hamilton ("I call her Mums") has left the show for two weeks to be replaced by the original

Armfeldt, Madame Hermione Gingold. "We'll all have to be very flexible because Hermione is very different from Maggie, but we're all very excited about her coming in." And of her own role of Desiree? "There can be so many different interpretations of Desiree, and all perfectly valid. I find her a free spirit, a very modern lady. She is generous with her love but not promiscuous. Send in the Clowns is a very beautiful, painful song, I have to fight against the emotion of it. I heard Cleo Laine sing it and loved it...To start off a musical career in the theatre with Stephen Sondheim and Hugh Wheeler is pretty fantastic. The audiences here in San Francisco, and I'm not saying this just because we're playing here, so far have been very understanding. Other places we've played, we've had the whole front row get up and walk out in the middle of the first act. Many people don't like it and that's understandable, but then there are people who come back three or four times...The only problem on tour is Hal Prince doesn't want us to get a tan so I can't play tennis as much as I would like. But, I also have my tatting and crocheting...In L.A. I was a slight basket case, because that's home for me." But how nice for Jean Simmons to return in triumph "home," to audiences and critics that had seen her for many years in a vast variety of film achievements now starting a whole

Jean Simmons is one of the most honest, guileless people vou'll ever meet. Aked if she'd like to do an old-fashioned razzmatzz musical comedy, she says, "Why not? That might be fun!" Or she'll duet at the Hollywood Bowl with Roddy McDowell in his Planet of the Apes costume singing, This Can't Be Love ("it was very Fred and Ginger!") and if you offer her a well-written axe murderess, just stand back and let her start singing. She's completely open, still possessing the same enthusiasm Olivier must have seen years back, and when I mention she seems very trusting, she replies, "I think you have to be...My career was like a fairyland for me...We all have our different ways of getting to where we want to

new career as a musical star.

I unabashedly adore Jean Simmons for this final line --"I've never considered myself a star. I'm just a working actress." The working actress is also a lovely lady.

### THE MEN IN MY LIFE PAUL-FRANCIS HARTMANN

### Lawrence & Other **Arabian Knights**

(part 2)

Rumaging through my father's library shortly after his death in 1961, I came upon a 1st edition of Lawrence's Seven Pillars of Wisdom. On the inside cover was written: "To my friend W Hartmann... Charles T.E. Lawrence, Akaba, 1926..." The inscription has puzzled me ever since because I can't imagine how it could be authentic. I have a feeling Dad wrote it himself.

My father, a World War I Captain of horse-drawn artillary, never quite my father standing at attention in front

outgrew his military escapades. He collected ordnance from the Great War. Around the flag pole in our front yard were arranged 6 giant 105 howitzer shells (they went to the scrap drive in 1942). In a side yard stood sentinel a mounted machine gun. In the attic were trunks of foreign rifles, bayonettes (some sleek and long, others savagely saw-edged) highpowered Mausers, German helmets. gas masks that smothered one with residue mustard. (A trip to this arsenal was the highlight of any neighbor boy's week.) As a Reserve Colonel he remained active in veteran affairs all his life. Battery F of the 105th Field Artillary held a yearly reunion -- until there were too few left to muster. To these veterans of Foreign Wars, the American Legion was a rag-tag band of slackers. After the war the ex-AEF'ers were most scrupulous in checking who actually had gone to France and who hadn't, what units fought where, who was entitled to wear what decorations. As Hemingway wrote, "In those days we did not trust anyone who had not been in the

I still keep with me snapshots of

of his tent, another on horse back reviewing his company. Aryan handsome and soft spoken, he was greatly admired by his comrades. His straight blond hair was parted in the center; his eyes were clear sky blue (envelope him in a flowing white cloak, and there'd be another Arabian knight). I've often wondered what moved my father to enter forgery in his copy of Seven Pillars, what identification was he seeking, what communion. What fantasy was at work?

In turn it's but a small step to wonder what triggered my own fascination for Lawrence of Arabia; for that matter -- my fascination with my father...?

I read on. Four pages further into Seven Pillars is Lawrence's dedication: to S.A. followed by a short poem.

> "I loved you, so I drew these tides of men into my hands To earn you freedom, the seven pillared worthy house that your eyes might be shining for me

> > When we came.

The remaining stanzas claim that Death has stolen Lawrence's lover, and the book was intended as a fitting monument, but it had failed (in Lawrence's eyes).

Whoever S.A. was, one thing seems certain: S.A. was not a woman. I wonder if my father wondered about that opening poetic memorial. The literati of the Western world have certainly wondered, and there are many theories as to S.A.'s identity. The poem is finely wrought, and Seven Pillars is considered a literary masterpiece; Lawrence's exploits politically, militarily were breathtakingly heroic. Could all of these things -- in fact his entire life -- have been a monument of his love for one young Arab (or one Arab symbolizing all Arabia)? The riddle remains -- we'll never know the answer, nor should we. For two reasons: there is Lawrence the proper Edwardian, and Lawrence the artist (My father would have understood the former role: I doubt he would have grasped the second.)

At times one wishes he might take a smear of Lawrence's work and subject it to microscopic scrutiny in hopes certain "facts" would emerge (similar to the hatchet job Freud did on Leonardo Da Vinci to demonstrate the genius' latent homosexuality). Would it make things simpler to say

"Lawrence of Arabia was GAY!" Or would it be forcing our poverty on pearls of greater value. Edwardian gentlemen accepted certain privacies as truly private. Neither sexual exposes nor sexual confessions were part of the then scene. And if one's suspicions were aroused, the decent response would be to look the other

Lawrence cautions, "My life is not summed up in what I have written (there are things not to be repeated in cold blood for very shame); but what I have written was in and of our lives." He knew and understood more than he wrote to spare his admirers, friends, and readers burdens unnecessarily spilled (for men like my father). Both men were supra-moral men, both severe and rigoriously demanding of themselves. Their sense of honor, of integrity; their sense of service and devotion belong to another age. The code of gentlemen/officers was held dear by these heirs to the grand tradition of chivalry.

On the second score Lawrence confides to his readers much about himself -- saying so much, saying so little -- revealing/cloaking. The artist in Lawrence was well aware of the power of ambiguity. When saying so little meaning so much more, when saying so much meaning so much less. Lawrence's prose is powerful; it bears, if not requires, several re-readings... wherein its meanings expand and its inferences spread. He is not reducible to psychological cliches, nor to summary statements. His words are opaque -- through a glass darkly -- they do not unravel in the blinding light of clarity. We would do well to recall that clarity is a commercial, industrial value, neither a creative nor an artistic one. It has been said that clear writing demonstrates the absense of thinking.

This is not to say the greater artist courts obscurity, flirts with complexity. Treasure is heavy, and extracting wealth calls for patient, painful digging. Weightless highs like Jonathan Livingston Seagull return feathery, transparent rewards -immediate and passing. Lawrence's language envelopes one like ozzing honey; blurred, gummy images that linger -- impossible to stabilize.

Lawrence remains one of our century's enigmas; may it continue to be so. For my father he was the consummate warrior -- a soldier's hero who on the final page of Seven Pillars stated his grand intention was "of

hustling into form, while I lived, the new Asia." For me he remains an incredibly beautiful knight, cantering across the desert, the brutal sun, the bobbing camel, the swelling music -- the romantic hero/poet who began his masterpiece with "I loved YOU."

"Love, the way-weary, groped to your body, our brief wage ours for the moment."

The uncipherable hieroglyphs of these "two men in my life" are much of their legacy to me. I like to think, like Lawrence, like my father, some things in our lives are not to be totally known. If treasure is to be treasure much of it must remain forever on the point of being discovered. Dredged up, spread out to light, the trove rusts to so much more rubbish. The banners of ancient causes rot to rags.


Similarly the conquests of all our Arabian nights lie best...more pure, more pregnant...buried beneath parched desert sands. To be unearthed, to be translated, eons hence, via some Rosetta stone of the imagination...

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Pearlie Mae's lookin' good, sporting a new close cropped shag hairdo and struttin' her stuff in a gold iridescent flowered caftan ("I borrowed this from a male friend in Southern California!"), and she's everything you expect her to be...and a little more. She's managed the neat trick of turning the elegant Venetian Room in -to her personal living room, just singing a few numbers and talking to a group of friends. She's on top of the situation from start to finish, directing the orchestra when need be, cueing the lightman, breaking off a number to warn a ringsider that photos are not allowed ("Darlin', I move so fast there hasn't been a camera made that can get it all!"), selling her books and campily laying out the headwaiters ("Darlin's, before you leave here, we'll get every penny you have!"). She talks about her heart attack in 1972 but never lets the commentary get too heavy, talking about the young doctors working over her to find her heartbeat ("and I know the difference between a fumble and a feel"), telling tales of her folks, visiting the "House" with Mr. Nixon ('when you've been there as often as I have, you just call it The House. But I haven't been there lately. I tried to, but they have this big revolving door at the front and every time I tried to go in, there were so many people coming out I just kept going round and round!") and spinning stories of her early days in saloons. She leans up against the piano to sing a number: "Just a minute! I wear my gorgeous clothes and they don't even dust!!" She then borrows a napkin from ringside and proceeds to dust the piano before continuing.

In between all this patter she manages to squeeze several good numbers, the voice still strong and resonant. Smile, Joy to the World, For Once in my Life, 2 numbers from Hello Dolly and the ever-popular Bill Bailey (complete with kicks and bumps) bring cheers from the packed room. She offers a varied selection with heavy emphasis on the oldies, the entire show structured at a leisurely pace that belies the underlying concentration of a showwoman who knows just how to hold her audience. Pearl Bailey is not of the "dynamo" school of performers; she just relaxes and entertains in a droll, offhand manner that guarantees her audience a good time.

Louis Bellson is with her, proving he is still one of the finest percussionists around today and opening the show with a bang, and the Fairmont orchestra backs her with high style. It's nice to spend some time with a lady who knows her business and is indeed an original. There's only one Pearlie Mae, and she's struttin' better than ever!

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### Kiss the Sky

A New Gay Play!

The Society For Individual Rights is now presenting thru Oct. 19th the premiere of a new gay play by Lane Bateman entitled Kiss the Sky. Mr. Bateman is currently a graduate student at Southern Illinois University working for his doctorate, and Kiss the Sky is his fourth play to be produced. Interestingly, his lead character in Kiss the Sky is a 30 year old college drama teacher (Mr. Bateman teaches theatre also) who makes his first entrance in drag returning from a party with three screaming gay friends, lives with a black lover who is a student at the college he teaches at, has written an outfront gay play that was produced at his college and who makes no bones whatsoever about the fact that he is gay and proud of it. He refuses to be forced to live a closet existence and demands his college Board accept him as he is. We get vague inklings that perhaps his job is in jeopardy, but it is never made clear just how precarious his position is. Mr. Bateman's theme of be-proud-ofwhat-you-are is most laudatory; unfortunately, he dissapates it completely in his third act. It seems that our teacher frankly admits he seduced a 16 year old student, who as the play opens has run away from his Midwestern home to join the teacher in California, unaware that his ex-lover is now involved with another student. Over a year has passed since Scott, the now 19 year old runaway, has seen Chris, the teacher, and Pat, the

current lover, does not take kindly to having his happy home invaded. Nor do Scott's parents, who track him down by phone, whereupon he blurts out he's staying with his male lover and hangs up. At the end of Act Two, the parents stalk through the door like avenging furies, ready to snatch Scott back home. So far, so good.

Then comes the troublesome Act Three. Scott's parents try in vain to communicate and discuss this sudden revelation with their son, who flatly refuses to even give them the consideration of a private talk. They are rudely insulted for their Middle Class morality by all of Chris' friends,

who kiss each other to shock the floundering parents even more, and if the parents seem intolerant, it is nothing compared to the blatant intolerance of the homosexuals. When Scott's mother threatens to go to the schoolboard to tell them about the teacher who seduces young students, the teacher retaliates by threatening to drag their son through a front page scandal and ruin his name; If-I-go-Itake-everyone-with-me. Upon this charming note of mutual blackmail (while Scott stands numbly by saying "I love him"), the parents retreat in disgusted helplessness, while teacher



Chris promises his unwanted ex-lover that he will support him, let him move in with him and Pat and take care of him if he promises never to have anything to do with his parents ever again, to which Scott agrees. After the departure of Mom and Dad, Chris admits "I lied to you" and tells Scott he will have to find somewhere else to go since Pat refuses to live menage a trois. As the play ends, Scott decides he will stay with gay friends until he can find a new lover. Then Scott, Chris and Pat climb into bed for one last night together before Scott has to brave his new world alone in the morning.

The dialogue is often sparkling and always lucidly interesting, Mr. Bateman capturing the humor and jargon of the gay lifestyle consistently, with the obligatory "bitch queen" fast repartee (Emory is now named Mitch) providing many solid laughs. His first act needs clarification of relationships and extensive editing (snapping up the pacing by directors Gary Bridwell and Dick Myhre would help immensely also), and if being "outfront" means taking a "if you don't like it, fuck off!" attitude, then his characters are definitely outfront. Hopefully a "work in progress," Mr. Bateman either

needs to rewrite the roles of the parents so they are completely unsympathetic and deserving of such a militent belligerant attitude, or allow his homosexuals the dignity of communication instead of sermonizing. His militant approach left me with a bitter taste, providing a great case for further straight intolerance, but it will be undeniably valid to some.

As is to be expected with a non-professionaly production, the play has been unevenly mounted, but surprisingly good overall. Randy Varney offers a gem of a performance as Scott, Gary Bridwell (who stepped in the last week when the role was vacated) plays the teacher Chris with low key sincerity, and Stan Bond throws away in a mumbling monotone the third side of the triangle, Pat. Jimmy Brent brings campy hilarity to the role of Mitch and Kathy Sullivan and Ross Kirby fight valiantly to prevent the parents from becoming giant cliches. The direction is ragged but spirited, and biggest asset of the production is the excellent set by Alan Greenspan.

You may or may not agree with Lane Bateman's point of view, but Kiss the Sky deserves to be seen as one

more link in the ever-growing chain of gay theatre that stimulates public awareness. The **Society For Individual Rights** should be commended for an auspicious beginning to their new program, presenting a forum for young playwrites, and for a paltry \$3.00 admission, *Kiss the Sky* merits gay attention.

To complete my annual Halloween schedule, I would appreciate hearing from bars who will have special events that night and any busses being planned.





It's present state, along with it's habitues, are a shame. Just a plain SHAME! Prices seem to be way up, and quality is almost non-existent. As our old French nana used to say, '... a lot of water has run under the bidet. . Or was that what she used to say. . ? And, frankly, it's been a couple of years since Mother has trod those mad blocks; what was encountered then was so pathetic that she has little urge to retrace her steps. If the GLF, GAA, GOO. SIR. and various 'guilds' and other 'do-us-good' groups, would like to effect some civic improvement, they could handily clean up a few blocks of the old Drag. Target for tonight: Wash a hustler!

We note that the Old Cow (it'll never be Crow, to thousands. . ) is still

going strong, though we wouldn't trust ourselves inside. (Pickpockets, and other groping-types, y'know. . . ) Thinking back, ... WAY back. .. we recall a mad incident — something overheard — in this place. Everyone on the 'street' knew 'Nell', a short of middle-aged queen, who cruised Market St. nightly. The 'War' was just over (?) and tricks were beginning to get paid 'for it'. The older you were. seemingly, the more you paid. It was beginning to be accepted, certainly never liked. Actually, Nell was quite well-off; had a very responsible job, and kept a very elegant apartment, on the Hill. However, on her nightly cruise, she'd dress like a ragpicker, always made it quite clear that '...she didn't have much money. .. Yes, my dears, a cheap bitch, and - like so many such — was constantly being rolled, beaten, blackmailed, and the like. Of course, everyone 'knew her'. and the Old Cow crowd was quiet as Nell told of her latest mis-adventure: '. . so I asked him if he wanted to make a couple of dollars, and he agreed. My dears, he was just gorgeous, and SO BIG!. . . (followed the usual bit describing size, shape and size. . .) 'so, we went up to my place, and I quickly

stripped, and was ready, laying on me tummy. He got his clothes off, came over to the bed, and PLUNGED that wonderful, big, (etc. . .) thing into my quivering quiff! And again! And, then he pulled it out. No! No come, no nothing! Just two strokes! After washing he got dressed, . .and me laying there speechless. . . he picked up my pants, took out the wallet, took out two dollar bills, . . . and there were at least ten in there. . . and remarked, as he went out the door: '. . .you wanted a couple of dollars worth. . and' that's what you got!. . ' An' he left...' As this all was so typical of the things that could happen to Nell, all present were vastly amused. It is possible that such antics would not amuse 'straights', but to all us faggots,

it was hilarious. Along in the block with the 'Cow' was, years ago, a sort of 'all-night' dairy lunchroom. It was often filld with unused (that night) hustlers, tricks, and queens. There were sometimes some gems to be found there; it seemed to be the first place that 'guys' hit, on arriving in San Francisco. One night. Mother picked up an absolutely ravishing blonde beast, there. He said his name was Paul, and he was in his early 20's. Claimed to have a motorbike parked somewhere; had been in town about an hour. This explained what such a dream-boy was doing, all along, in such a place. Mother rushed it off to a small hotel, where - as usual - she registered as 'N. Gwynn and Party'. In those days, Mother was a browning queen (and LOVED it!). With Paul, we quickly assumed position A; after a brief but satisfying bit of jigging up and down, in and out, we achieved our objective. Right where he was, Paul heaved a long sigh, and went to sleep. After awhile, and with no new fires rekindled. Mother decided to wait for morning for an encore. She pushed Paul off, on to his own side of the bed, and — also went to sleep. Some hours later. Mother awakened with a start. Wide-eved awake. Instinctively, she knew her 'friend' was still beside her, but something was wrong. Getting up to raise the shade, she was horrified to realize that Paul was dead. And he hadn't moved since being shoved off, some time earlier. Some 'stains' were still apparent; his eyes were open. . .Mother realized at what point he had expired; she broke all records for dressing; hastily, she partly 'dusted'

the room. She removed the 'stains',

and she closed the eyes. Pausing at the deserted hotel desk to rip out the last used page of the guest ledger, she flew! The following day she was on Yessler Way, in Seattle. Looking back, she realized, of course, that the man had simply had a heart attack or something. At least, 'he died in the saddle, doing his thing. . '. And, doing it to Mother. It really was days before she again 'assumed the angle', though she did do some facials; even in Seattle, a girl has got to live. But, a peculiar thing to remember; how would you feel. . . ? And this recalls another dead

boy. There was once a hotel — the Morse — on Market St: the building is now part of Weinstein's Store. It had six floors, with elevator, of course, but also an old-style circling staircase, with an open 'well' in the center that reached to the skylighted roof. The place was run by a 'Miss' Hayes, a shrewd old bag who specialized in gay-oriented hotels. Perhaps 65% of the guests at the Morse were gay — of some stripe or another. The halls were wide and warm; nights in San Francisco are often (most often) cold and damp. So, old sailors (some groups, too. . ) simply lay down in the halls to sleep a few hours. The 'paying guests' made frequent tours of inspection, and dragged in anything that looked tasty, you should pardon the expression. . .). There were some drunks, some fights, and so on. One night, and the house was very full, two sailors got to fighting in the hall on the fifth floor. (Later, at least 23 queens claimed the fight was over them; all lying bitches, of course, it was Mother they fought over! She says. . .) It all ended suddenly, and tragically, when one sailor picked up the other and dropped him into the stairwell. Five floors to a marble lobby. Well! Within 13 minutes there were at least 86 checkouts. Later, there was a police, and a Navy, investigation; somehow La Haves lost her license for the Morse: she later operated a small pad on Kearny, called the Metropole. A sort of 'hot bed' house. But, with the death of the poor kid at the Morse, and it's closing, another era ended for Market Street.

At some point in the mid-30's, Sonny was often 'between ships'; like many another, she took to the paves. He ('she') also found that he could best offer his 'face an' figger' in Navy blues. So, he had a tight (TIGHT) Navy uniform made, and did Post St. and

the 'op o' the Hill nightly And, it was a sort of 'racket'. He never asked for money; but he did memorize car license numbers like crazy. Next day a 'Girl' in the Dept. of Motor Vehicles gave out the address; the City Directory, Voter's Registration, and Dunn & Bradstreet (all handy at the Library) added to the dossier. The, he sent a bill 'for services'; the first went to the customer's office, the second to his home. There was a follow-up phone call if the bill was not paid; further calls - to wife and/or employer - were suggested. The fees were reasonable, and most - with a sense of humor. — paid. If not. Mother simply discarded the 'file' and forgot 'that one'. Yes, in a sense, it was a despicable program, though never doing any real harm. Before you think twice about it, it is impossible to manage today. In the mid-30's, '. things were bad, and a girl did what

she could. . .'. Mother was twice picked up by a dignified old party: he always wore a homburg hat, a good black coat, with a scarf about his throat. Both times we drove out around Fort Mason, for obvious purpose. The subsequent 'check' revealed that Mother had been 'twice blessed' by an Archbishop. He was in fact, Sonny's second such. Many years earlier, when churchmen were exiled from Mexico, Mother was the young (and very tender!) belle of the ball at a party (in Los Angeles) given by 'Miss' Novarro (. .may she be at Peace!. .) Mother was 'communicated' by her first Archbishop, there. She never really thought so well of the Church, after her second. Huh!

Queens, and tricks, in trouble often went to see 'Father Anthony' at a religious Brotherhood in downtown San Francisco. He, gently, laid on the hands: usually gave the troubled one a few dollars, and prodded them into going to Confession, and toward 'going home'. Many must remember 'Father Anthony'; it is to be hoped that there are as many prayers for this kindly

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# The Gournnet Shoppe By Lou Rand


In recent BAR, we mentioned 'a dish from the Orient,' so - let's do it! First, it is claimed that 'Oriental Cookery' is possibly the basis of many modern cuisines, over the world. And, another thing, many modern day 'gourmets' are passing up some fine things in over-looking the Orientals themselves. Many are, it is true, small people, (and many are not!), but all are confirmed sexists, from the age when it begins to 'rise.' As dedicated lovers, most Orientals are without peers; and the younger ones are often. on 2nd look, as handsome as can be. So, ladies, don't sell an 'Oriental affair' short; you'll miss something very, very satisfying.

Many popular dishes, from the Far East, are tasty, too; one of the most pleasing being a very standard Filipino number called Adobo. There are many variations on this theme: here is one, for 6 people...4 lbs. trimmed chicken parts: breast with wing-arm, thighs, legs. 1 lb. lean pork, cut in strips, 1 in. wide x 2 in. long. \*Put into caserole (or other sturdy vessel), with Salsa: 1 tsp. pepper; 3 cloves garlic, crushed and minced; 3 tomatoes, ripe, peeled and seeded, then chopped; 1/4 c. white wine vinegar; ½ c. Soy Sauce; ½ c. dry Sherry: 1/2 c. water: 1/4 c. clam broth; the grated rind (yellow) of ½ lemon; 1 tbs. grated fresh ginger-root. Let meats stand in this mixture for 1 or 2 hrs., stirring occasionally.

Cover caserole, let simmer slowly over low heat for  $2\frac{1}{2}$  hrs. Do **NOT** remove cover, but shake pan (or caserole) occasionally. There should be very little liquid sauce or gravy left with cooked meats, in properly cooked Adobo; meats will have absorbed this, and are certainly not dry.

This is usually served with plain boiled rice. Some cooks garnish this dish with toasted whole sesame seeds, strewn over the meats at serving...and there you have it!

And again, let us advise of the delights of many 'Oriental dishes.' (Can't wait for the next Japanese Navy Training ship to get into port....

My cooperation with the Department and Mission Station is "record." Many problems have here been presented and resolved; reasoned respect and understanding between sincere men, of varying convictions resulted, and it is my hope that tonight's problems will be attended to in a similar climate. Such was the impression garnered from a Meeting held one week ago in the Hall of Justice in which Supervising Captain Taylor, Captain Laherty, other Police Officers, and leaders of the gay community, myself included, participated. We then hoped that civic minded persons could meet in honest forum and seek resolution of these problems which now debilitate our District.

However, within twenty-four hours of that Meeting, a gay publication, The Bay Area Reporter, hit the streets carrying the inflamatory, venonmous rhetoric of a duplicitous person who, sat with us at the Wednesday Meeting, pledged concilliation and co-operation in order to prevent further re-occurances of the type seen during the Labour Day Weekend, yet, at the very same time knew his lies and anti-police utterances were "going to press."

Marks, chairman of the Senate Select Committee on the Maritime Industry, will present a Senate resolution hailing all the ports' importance to California's economy and culture. Port Commissioner Harry Bridges and Port Director Bernard A. Orsi will accept on behalf of the local port.

National Port Week was establishment by Presidentail proclamation earlier this year "in order to remind Americans of the importance of the port industry of the United States to our national life."


The inventory will include furniture, clothes, costumes, housewares, toys, miscellaneous items and a home baked goods sale.

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

Beauty Shop in Montclair was shot and killed by a young black burglar during a scuffle in which Edy attempted to retrieve her money scooped up from the bar by the young burglar.

The burglar, in his late 20's, enetered the Jubilee Bar on East 14th Street in Oakland, and at gun point approached Val Souza, owner of the bar and formerly of Leonarda's on Leland Ave., and more recently owner of '1001 Nights on San Francisco's Jones Street. He demaned that she turn over all of the money in the register. Startled by the sight of a gun pointed at her, she hesitated momentarily, prompting the burglar to say "I ain't jivving lady, give me all the money" pointing the pistol at her point blank

Val reached into the register and surrendered approximately \$350.00 which the gunman stuffed into his pocket and as he started out the door....enroute, he passed that place at the bar where Edy La Fleur sat with her change on the bar in fron of her. The Gunman scooped that up too, which prompted Edy to start out the door after him. Catching up with him in a struggle, it was at that time the gunman fatally shot Edy La Fleur.

Enraged at the shooting, the entire bar, full of customers - all women - took out after the fleeing gunman, who dropped his gun and all the money he had just gained at gunpoint.

The Gunman was arrested by Oakland police and he is now charged with murder and burglary.

Funeral arrangements are pending advice from Edy's family and next of kin.
