GAY HELP FOR SCHOOLS?

School Boss Begs Gay Help

Desperate in the thought that Proposition N might meet defeat at the polls, Milton F. Reiterman, Associate Superintendent of San Francisco's Unified School District, called in leaders from the local gay community and flatly admitted that the "gay political bloc" was the vote he was seeking if Proposition N is to be a reality.

Proposition N is that nearly Eight Million dollar food complex that is offered to district voters as a modernized facility from which thousands of breakfasts, luncheons, etc., will be prepared for distribution to the various schools to be sold at half-price, reduced price or given away to students, depending upon their financial need and/or welfare status.

While there is no opposing argument in the Voter's Pamphlet, the title of the Proposition reads "Prepare plans and specifications and lease a building as a Centralized Nutrition Complex for Food Processing and Student Training"...."on Double Rock site loacted on assessed Lot 27 Block 4909 (presently owned by the School District in the Bayview) City and County of San Francisco" and "For such purposes, shall the maximum TAX RATE OF THE DISTRICT BE INCREASED BY NOT TO EXCEED 5 CENTS to be in effect from 1975 through 1995." This means an increase of Five Cents per Hundred **Dollars of Assessed Property Value for**



VOTE NOV. 5 everyone living within the school district. On top of the already high cost of a badly administered district it will be a bigger bite on the Gay Tax payer who ordinarily is childless and does not avail itself of the district's facilities.

Important is the fact that at long last San Francisco's School bosses recognize the collective power of the local gay vote bloc. While school boards have traditionally gone out of their way to discredit gay teachers and para-professionals, Fr. Thomas A. Reed, who was appointed to the Board of Education by Mayor Alioto, after he failed to win election during a previous election, and Milton Reiterman promised that they would spearhead a project which would hopefully lead to a dialog between the Gay Community and the School Board.

"I need to be taught" said the school board appointee, Fr. Thomas A. Reed, S.J., "I believe your community can afford us the opportunity to get to know your needs better." He seemed responsive and willing to bring our voice to the total school board.

Ms Joyce Ream, Treasurer of the



Committee to Promote Proposition N and vice-president of the District's PTA is a bright, intelligent woman with emphasis on her feminine status. It would appear that she is active in such feminist organizations as N.O.W. She volunteered that "several" of the best teachers in the district are known to her as being "gay." She disclosed that no donations were made to her committee by any single source in excess of five-hundred dollars, and that no donations were solicited from any food vendor. Ms. Ream is dedicated to seeing that N is approved by the voters, regardless of the burden it might become to childless tax payers.

Attending the meeting with Mr. Reiterman were Ms: Phyllis Lyon and Del Martin, representing Lesbian Mothers, Gay Women's Coalition, and Council on Religion and the Homosexual: Wayne C. Redus, Human Rights Commission. (who affirmed that he was not gay), Don Meisen, of Pride, a representative of S.F. Tavern Guild, and S.I.R., as well as from the Advocate, Kalendar and B.A.R.

Whereas wine and cheese were served in Mr. Reiterman's office, it did little to soften up the attitudes of the guests who asked biting questions of Fr. Reed and School Boss Reiterman.

The Bay Area Reporter does not endorse Proposition N, however it does recommend that you exercise your franchise to vote and to cast your negative or affirmative vote as your conscience dictates. If you are on welfare and have children, it would probably be to your advantage to endorse N and thus insure your children a fine hot breakfast and lunch each school day. If you are childless and are a property tax payer, vote No and save yourself Five cents on each hundred dollars of assessed value on

your tax bill.

Regardless of your vote, you should be happy and pleased with the breakthrough achieved by this meeting with the Unified School District and Gay Community leaders.

The local Chapter of this national organization for gay Catholics will meet at 3 p.m. Sunday, Nov. 3, in St. Ann's Hall, St. Peter's Church, on 24th St. between Alabama and Florida Sts. The business session and program will be followed by a Mass said by Father David, one of the founders of Bay Area Dignity.

National Dignity, Inc. now boasts a membership of well over 2,000 in its 25 chapters across the U.S. Its membership is comprised mainly of gay Catholic women and men, but also includes other concerned persons, religious and laity, gay or straight, who may wish to participate.

Dignity's purpose is to work at developing personal and public understanding of the homosexual, and to build for gay women and men their rightful place in the Church. One of Dignity's major concerns is the updating of a modern sexual theology for the Church, currently working with the National Gay Ministry Task Force.

The San Francisco Bay Area Chapter of Dignity (with members from Anchorage, Alaska to Enid, Okla.) has the support of local priests. There is a Mass at each monthly General Meeting, frequent Home Masses and Open Houses, and a mid-month Rap Session. Non-Members are welcome at most Dignity activities.

The National Organization, Dignity, Inc., is spreading the good news that Gay Catholics can and do co-exist in the Roman Church -- with pride and Dignity!



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

In the last issue, I gave my reasoning behind my selections for the upcoming election. At this time, I would like to comment on two of the City Propositions which I think should be voted down (C and L).

Interestingly, there is no mention in any of the press about Prop. C. No mention about censorship. No mention that the powers behind the Supes are once again about to pull a fast one

on a lot of people in our city. Based upon complete lack of any discussion on this prop., its passage is probably assured...that is exactly what the downtown interests, the major media and the supes. want.

What is Prop. C all about? Well, it will be much easier to go through the Voters Handbook in the future, on all city propositions. That sounds good. How does it make it easier? Well, the supes. will be given...let me quote: "The Board of Sueprvisors shall, by ordinance, provide for the format of said pamphlet and for the submission, review, selection, printing, and inclusion of arguments in favor of or in opposition to any measure contained in said pamphlet." Reread that and think about it!


Once the Board of Supes, vote to bring to the voters a proposition, then they, the supes. themselves, will then have the right, by law, to pick the arguments against their propositions! They will have the sole right to pick whichever argument against a proposition that they want passed! And, if they do not want a proposition to go on the ballot, and the people, by petitions get enough signatures to put it on (like last year's election of supervisors by district), then they, the supes, who did not want it on the ballot, get to pick the argument in favor of something they do not want passed.

They are going to get away with it, unless enough voters take the time to read it, and think about what it really is saying. Censorship, all in the name of making it easier to read the voter handbook....the "scrap the Bill of Rights" drive continues even here on a local level.

.....Then there is Proposition L. This is being sponsored by most of the supes. in the name of fiscal responsibility. Anyone who has followed the actions of the Board knows that the two staunchest moneywatchers who sit on the Board, are Barbagelata and Kopp. They have been against almost every excess of spending. They have fought against giving away money for everything, time and time again. Interesting that these two, with their well established records of being fiscally responsible, are strongly against L. Maybe L is not really so fiscally responsible after all.

Dig a little deeper...oh, yes...it goes after the street sweepers and their excessive pay scales...but, is that what it is really after?

I always wonder about legislators who are interested in cutting governmental spending by cutting salaries first. I think that if you are going to cut a budget...if you are going to really be for fiscal responsibility, you cut the fat and the excessive programs...no such cut by the supervisors in these areas...the pet programs of the downtown interests continue...the fat in the budget is not even mentioned... the tax rate goes up and up and they decide to make an issue of the salaries of the overpaid street sweepers. MEET SHIRLEY MacLAINE by DONALD MCLEAN

The Show

Well, it was everything we expected and more. Shirley MacLaine sailed into Circle Star for four short nights with a full-scale, beautifully conceived and executed show that was far more than a Las Vegas revue. From her opening, Remember Me, tracing her career from the early days





to the present, the show is actually a musical biography of highlights of the musical MacLaine career, with all the expected favorites -- Steam Heat from ger Broadway break Pajama game, Sweet Charity, a poignant Irma La Douce, and a stunning sililoquy as Ginny Morehead in Some Came Running. Almost every other number of the hour-and-forty-minutes she does is a production, with 9 shining "gypsies" who match their leading lady for talent and enthusiasm, with a hysterical "Change Partners" routine with the boys and MIssissippi Mud (with the originator of that number, Bing Crosby, in the audience) and Life is a Song Worth Singing with full cast, and lively, original choreography by Alan Johnson. It's a masterful production with the radiant Miss MacLaine giving her audience exactly what they want plus a little more. She's a musical actress in total control with a show (it's unfair to call it an act) that does great credit to all concerned. If They Could See Me Now is the title -if they don't, they've missed a rare evening of show business savvy. And Miss MacLaine and company debuted a new 13 minute production number here to Be A Performer that works nicely, but might benefit if placed earlier in the lineup. Also on the bill was impressionist Fred Travalena, who had to open cold, without even an overture to muster the audience, and did several good vocal impressions but

overstayed his welcome with a routine that should be cut in half. You could feel the audience restlessness during Mr. Travalena; it was Shirley they came to see and it was Shirley they got...with all the stops out!

The Woman

"They want to see me sing and dance and be cute and adorable, all the things that are the antithesis of my actual personality. My show is a musicalized version of me, saying, in other words, I'm back! A lot of people didn't remember I could sing and dance. Even I forgot!...I want to perform and have a good time and kick my legs and show the audience a good time. And they love me because I don't talk about politics onstage. They paid their money to see me perform. They're a captive audience and it would be wrong of me to impose politics into my act. 75% of the people who give me a standing ovation are Republicans who are just so damned glad I didn't mention politics! I'm not a politician, I'm an artist."

Looking cute and adorable. Shirley MacLaine is most definitely back with a vengeance, sporting the old look but with a new energy and outlook that belies her early film image ("Wasn't that sickening? Miss Dolly Doormat!"). She's also sporting a bad case of bronchitis as we talk -- "I

went coughing out of L.A. and spewing into San Francisco. One of the gypsies in my show keeps circling around my cough medicine cause he knows what's in it." Arriving a week early to plug her appearance at Circle Star, our local smog does her in to the point that she is forced to cancel her appearance at the Film Festival and fly back to L.A. to rest up. But ill or not, she's a game gal who tells it like it is...and Shirley MacLaine has a lot to tell

Most people by now have heard the story of how she was hoofing in the chorus of Pajama Game, then 3 nights after opening she had to go on for Carol Haney and was discovered by Hal Wallis, who immediately signed her for Hollywood. And most people have probably forgotten that she was nominated 3 times for an Oscar, for her work in Some Came Running(her favorite film), Irma La Douce and The Apartment. But we all remember her as an excellent light comedienne in Can Can, Sweet Charity, Two for the Seesaw, etc. And almost no one remembers her last film, The Possesion of Joel Delaney -- "It was a disaster. You know what was wrong with it? It was too real. It slept and slept and slept, it was such a sleeper." In films, she always has had that unique appeal of the lived-in innocent, while in actuality, she's "too ballsey" as she expresses it to allow such an

On her film career -- "I never took it seriously, that was the trouble. There were all those hooker parts. I must have played 14 or 15 of those. I have nothing against hookers except I think they should get paid more and be legalized. Half our Presidents are doing what those girls do and getting paid big money for it, while the girls just get arrested." Prior to filming Irma La Douce, she lived in a French brothel as one of the girls with their full encouragement, because they wanted to see a hooker honestly depicted onscreen for once. Asked her least favorite film, she replies "About 15 just flashed in my mind. I can't begin to tell you. I do remember I would ask for a lot of money if I didn't like the script."

It's no secret that the role of the actress/mother in *The Exorcist* was written by William Blatty about Miss MacLaine. "I won't see *The Exorcist*. It's my protest to Bill Blatty, cause he patterned it after me. And I don't want to have to express an opinion on it."


In 1970, she had published her




first book (the second due to be released later this year), Don't Fall Off the Mountains, telling of her search for her own identity while travelling around the world. I'd make a film, then travel, then make another film. I began to think I was making films just

to pay for the plane ticket." There followed a brief disasterous T.V. series, and in 1971 she campaigned vigorously for 18 months for Senator George McGovern for the presidency.

There was a period when I thought I would never work again. I wanted to run for Congress, but my desire is so swift and demanding and so radical, it wouldn't get me one vote...If George had become President, I would have liked to become involved with women and over-population or be some kind of travel ambassador. I'm too outrageously honest and that's not the makeup of a politician. I'd work my ass off for what I believe it right. I'm still involved, but there's no point in being involved right now because it's cleaning up itself. I think what happens now depends on every one of us. We saw what happened when we didn't take notice. During the campaign, I was out trying to convince people of things, not listening to them. Now I want to listen...People know when they're getting ripped off by a politician or a performer. They like me cause I work hard and they can see the sweat pouring off me. If you care, you sweat. And I care. It's all inter-related. God knows, our best actors are politicians!

They're numbskulls and they're corrupt and they're dishonest!! Nobody believes the politician, everyone believes the artist, so the artist's value is intrinsically higher."

On Women's Lib -- "I haven't met one man who was opposed to Women's Lib. Ive met a lot of women who are. I wonder what you're like in bed as much as you wonder what I'm

like. It's equally intriguing. Why do !! you think Playgirl is so popular. Not only do men read it to compare, but women have something to look at, after all those years being exploited by Playboy and magazines like that. I just wish they had the guts to show some small ones, instead of all those big ones...We are really still operating in a man's world, particularly the artist. None of us can find the parts that exemplify what we're feeling today. Crawford and Davis always fell into the arms of some man by the third act. They never walked off into the sunset alone, which is what a lot of us want to do now. When you see a picture with Robert Redford or Paul Newman, you Robert Redford or Paul Newman, you never ask who they slept with last night. With a woman, they want to know. It's all still related to men ."

On her brother Warren Beatty, with whom she reportedly feuded for years -- "He's too selective. He's too good not to work all the time." She speaks glowingly about him, so much for the rumor myth, and when it is mentioned he gets more than his share of news coverage, Shirley MacLaine howls, "He gets more than his share of a lot of things!!"

When it's mentioned how unfair the law is, allowing women to dance

with women but men are not allowed to dance with men, she quips, "That's because they can't decide who'll lead." She's pro-gay, pro-hooker, probody who's being discriminated against. With one daughter of her own from her marriage to Steve Parker, she also supports 118 orphans in India and Japan, and maintains residences all over the world. Shirley MacLaine is about the most liberated lady you'll ever meet! I ask if it's really possible to have two mistresses and she exclaims, "The more mistresses, the more lovers, the more of everything the better. I know I confuse people. Does she want to act or go into politics and when my book comes out in February, that'll confuse them even more. I should have been a photo journalist who performs."

In April of 1974, Shirley MacLaine headed the first American women's deligation to visit the People's Republic of China, where she shot 45 hours of film that has been edited down to an hour-and-a-half special entitled The Other Half of the Sky which will be seen next Spring on television. "I took it to the Cannes Festival and they came out in tears. It's too moving...What was astonishing was the respect of the artist by the Communists. That's why they repress it. In this country, there is so little respect." And next on her agenda is to star in a film based upon the life of Amelia Earhart for her own production company, where she can maintain artistic control and make





sure Amelia is her personal statement.

A lady of tremendous appetities, with an electric energy and magnetizing warmth that draws respect from anyone who is fortunate enough to come in contact with her, whether you agree with her or not, she is equally honest about herself. "I'm an idealist...I'm not funny, I'm perverted. I laugh at funerals. I think porno films are hysterical...I've tried to give up performing, God knows I've tried. I've walked off into all sorts of sunsets until I walked back....I'm now into physical yoga. I only sleep 3 or 4 hours and feel completely refreshed. I'm thinking of having my telephone turned off and just getting an answering service that I'd phone into once a week. If any of us got sick and went away for 3 or 4 weeks and then came back, it wouldn't matter a helluva lot what we missed...I think everybody has their fair share of good luck and everybody has their share of the Bluebird of Happiness crapping on their birthday cake. I believe the ones who make it are the ones who are prepared when the breaks come!"







A Very **Natural Thing**

A Very Natural Thing has finally arrived in San Francisco. This long awaited film has been hearlded as a major breakthru in films for the general movie going public (as opposed to the heretofore strongly stated

This is a film that every gay person should see, especially those struggling within themselves for answers to their way of life. This film may not supply those answers, but if nothing else it lets you know that you're not alone.

The plotline is amazingly simple and if this would have been told with a heterosexual couple, the film would reek too much love stories we've seen a million times. But it is about two men, actually three, who learn and love and try to hold their worlds together not only within the framework of a heterosexual society but also within their own gay circle.

Written, produced and directed by Christopher Larkin, the film gets a little too artsy-craftsy in some scenes too "picturesque". But all that aside, the main fact is that it works and you leave the theatre that much more proud of being gay.

The R rated sex scenes are very provocative and actually I found them much more sensual than most of the porno films I must review. There's enough there to interest but not bore.

I won't go into detail on the plot because hopefully all readers of this column will go to see the film now at the Alhambra - show those straight theatre owners what gay power can mean at the box office so Mr. Larkin and others can make films that can run in class houses!

The acting in the film is generally above average and I'm sure that all Mr. Larkin's actors must have had some film or stage work behind them. Robert Joel plays the leading character with just the right blend of "romantic" and "realist" to make you sympathetic to his role. Curt Gareth and Bo White as his two loves are both excellent with Gareth having more film time to show us a type that many will recognize and know from personal experience.



people who eventually gather that night at the club for a costume ball. But the focal point of that affair is a drag queen named Hosanna. Hosanna







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

A FIZZLE OF A FOURTH!

After three topnotch productions this year by the Civic Light Opera, it was almost too much to hope that their luck would hold out for the entire a perfect Broadway musical, loaded season. Their fourth and final show of the '74 season is Sugar, the musical adaption of Some Like It Hot. If you

1931. And certainly there are some funny moments in Sugar -- a hilarious scene between Larry Kert and Robert Morse as they try to undress out of their female attire in cramped bunk beds, a zingy number entitled The Beauty that Drives Men Mad when they make their first appearance in drag, and one gem of a scene in the second act between Morse and Gale Gordon that is wonderful parody of the eternal love duet. And that about covers the better moments. Jule Styne and Bob Merrill have

written 4 new numbers for this production since it appeared on Broadway, which add approximately 15 minutes of added tedium to what has got to be one of the worst musical scores ever written for the theatre. After hearing Sugar, I went out humming Oklahoma. The book by Peter Stone is a direct lift of the original Wilder script, even to the final punchline when Morse confesses to an enamored Gordon that he cannot marry him because he's really a guy and Gordon replies, "Well, nobody's perfect!" Cyril Ritchard has listlessly directed and Denny Martin Flinn has staged from Gower Champion's original choreography some fairly cliche dance numbers. The costumes by Alvin Colt are exceptional and sets by Robin Wagner attractive.

The main problem of the show is energy. For a plot that should move like a bat out of Hell, the pacing staggers along, relying upon individual scenes and performers to furnish momentum, and the cast looks bored. Really, the cast look like they wish they were anywhere but onstage at the Curran (one chorus boy snapped his fingers through the curtain calls like he thought the curtain would never ring down and performers whom we have seen previously in excellent portrayals go through their paces with minimal efficiency and no spark whatsoever. Only Morse and Kert manage to pump life into the show, with Kert, who possesses one of the finest voices around today, vocally wasted. Robert Morse continues to play the only way he knows how -front and center and balcony. He's a master of timing, and ardent Morse fans will adore him. I find his con tinual schtick distracting, but with this book, perhaps he's wise. Morse will undoubtedly be the one you remember as you leave the theatre, mainly because he relates to no one onstage and plays the entire show as if it was a

huge joke between him and the audience. But he's brilliant at what he does. And Larry Kert is as good a leading lady as he is a leading man.

Leland Palmer, in the title role, is an excellent dancer with a weak voice who looks as if she was starring in the road company of Sweet Charity. The Gwen Verdon comparison is inevitable and she does everything to help it. She shines briefly in a big dance number in the second act, but her Sugar Kane is not innocent but dumb, with a hard edge that is unappealing. Gale Gordon is competent, Virginia Martin (her one big song cut to shreds) manages a few nice moments as Sweet Sue, and Steve Condos taps up a storm to fill time for costume changes (and that's just what it looks like!).

The show is badly structured, badly directed and unevenly performed. Sugar was not a success on Broadway, and while I admire Edwin Lester and the C.L.O. for giving local audiences a chance to see a show that has a built-in appeal, I'm afraid Sugar was rightfully destined to remain a dust-collector in the Tams-Witmark archives.

Sensational Opening!

The American Conservatory Theatre has opened its 1974-75 season with two outstandingly directed productions, the first is William Shakspeare's Richard III, directed by William Ball, ACT's general director. Fashioned much the same as Ball's superb triumph of last season, Taming of the Shrew, Richard III has been given that special William Ball stylized look. The set by Robert Blackman is stark black and is adorned only by a huge ornate crown suspended center stage. Likewise, the costumes by Robert Fletcher add fufther dimension to the macabre illusion, Richard and his followers in black and Richmond's (later to be Henry VII) coterie in white, thus establishing good from evil. Ball has proven once again that he is a master craftsman of directional techniques, special effects and is above all a creative genius.

Richard III is set during the War of the Roses which for 30 years saw England in a Civil War. Possession of the English throne was at stake with the houses of York and Lancaster vying for control. England was torn apart and desperately needed a strong

performance is the classic example of superb control of his characterization, plus his outstanding mastery of the Shakespearean artistry that should not be missed.

Also featured in the excellent company are Elizabeth Cole as Elizabeth, Queen to Edward IV, Hope Alexander-Willis as Lady Anne and a new exciting performer, Randall Smith as Henry, Earl of Richmond. Mr. Smith is a Mark Singer look-a-like that I'm sure will be featured in later ACT productions.

Richard III is Shakespeare at its best, a must to see!

The second production Pillars of the Community, to my knowledge has never been presented here. Written in 1877, it received critical acclaim that established Henrik Ibsen as a major playwright. He later followed with his more familiar works such as A Doll's House and An Enemy of the People.

The play is set in a Norwegian seaport where the town's leading citizen, Karsten Bernich (Earl Boen) is a wealthy shipyard owner. Although Karsten is the most powerful man of the community, scandal is about to beset not only him but the entire town. He has married a woman whom he does not love, deceived his fellow townspeople, lied to his family, committed fraud against his company and let others take the blame for his errors. As the truth begins to unfold with the arrival of his brother-in-law, Johan (Charles Lanyer), the man blamed for fraud and Lona Hessel (Elizabeth Huddle), Karsten is faced with the inevitable problem of exposure. He plots to send Johan home



leader. England got its leader in Richard only to find itself living in a reign of terror again. Richard's only concern was to be king at any cost. King Richard was a diabolical leader who murdered anyone who might stand in his way. King Richard was defeated on the battlefield in 1485 by Henry, Earl of Richmond, who later ascended the throne as Henry VII, and so ended the Civil strife that had left England shattered. Peace for the moment returned.

Richard III was a ruthless tyrant with a grotesque physical appearance. As Richard, Randall Duk Kim, turns in a magnificent performance. The role makes great demands on the actor, not only from a physical standpoint but also being totally unsympathetic character. Mr. Kim's

to America aboard a rotten, improperly repaired ship that will surely sink. At the last minute a turn of fate assembles all concerned at the Bernich house and Karsten makes his emotional confession.

The drama as written is a long, heavy in dialogue soap opera affair that has little to offer its audience. The characters are so intertwined that I felt I needed a score card just to keep track of who was who and who did what to whom. As far as the play's social value, I also found none. Pillars in any community can be erected, but they can likewise be destroyed by their own indiscretions. The only obvious point to be recognized is what Ibsen wrote almost 100 years ago is still a common activity today.

Even with the play's inherent flaws, Allen Fletcher has managed to guide his cast through a boring script and mount a visually handsome production. His direction has polish and coupled with the exquisite set by Ralph Funicello and the stylish costumes by Robert Morgan, Pillars of the Community has a certain appeal that is difficult to describe.

The cast is large and expertly handles their individual roles with professional ease. Earl Boen as Karsten Bernich is excellent as the town's corrupt leader. Also, Elizabeth Huddle, as the pre-Women's Lib, Lona Hessel, is superb.

Pillars of the Community will probably never set ACT audiences afire but credit must be given where credit is due. Pillars is a good solid production, weak in content, but strong in effort.


Morey Richards and Company, and the 'and Company' should be literally and physically deleted by Mr. Richards from his act. First there is a warmup by Genie Dee, a fabulous drag, but not a comedian. Next is the Giding Light, an untalented group of thee, two gals (I think one might be a drag) and one guy, who seem uncertain of their material and who are vocally inconsistant. Overlooking the inadequacies of his supporting company, Morey Richards is himself a good entertainer who needs guidance in the right direction.

Vocally, Mr. Richards, has an excellent voice and good range. He performs a variety of music, all of which is currently on jukeboxes and played at discotheques. His renditions, or reproductions of sounds, are especially good with I Never Knew Love Before, Oh Babe and And I Love You So. Unfortunately, Morey Richards performs in drag which is definitely not an asset. He appeared to be uncomfortable and awkward in his much too long fishnet and rhinestone dress, constantly tripping over his own feet. As a man I can't believe he could hurt his performance by working as himself, it may even enhance it.

Morey Richards and Company are backed by an unnamed trio (good musicians) and will remain in the theatre room at Cabaret for a limited engagement.




great after centuries.




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


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


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Push To End Victimless Crime Laws

Before a crowd of some 650 people on Monday night, Senator Milton Marks called for an end to all so-called crimeless crime laws. It was a gathering organized by Dick Hongisto and his San Francisco Sheriff's Department held at Glide Memorial Church. Speaker after speaker called for a "consciousness" about the conditions that exist in the jails and for an end of incarcerating people for crimes in which there are no victims.

John Maher, founder of Delancey Street, in a ringing denunciation of the political leaders from all levels of government, and the corruption that takes place, vehemently attacked the policy of "hiring grown-up men to chase homosexuals on Polk Street." He called for the people of the city to organize themselves into block by block groups and unite to remove from office all unresponsive elected officials.

Sheriff Dick Hongisto called upon the people to elect as mayor next year, a man who will fight to end the present conditions at the city's jails. He pointed out that at present, the apes in the city's Zoo get more money per day for food then those humans who are in jail. He also called for a mayor who would visit the jails in person (It was noted that the present mayor has never visited the city jails during his term in office.)

The emotional highlight of the evening was when Bob Wells was called upon to speak. A roaring standing ovation was given to this man who has spent most of his adult life in jail. Wells cautioned all to be wary of anyone who is for great "prison reform" as, in his experience, many are for it for what they can get out of it themselves. He was afraid that the



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rip-offs which take place leave little for those in jail. He called for a change in the entire system.

The program contained a powerful slide presentation of conditions in jail and films made by the University of San Francisco's Department of Media. Volunteers were called for in order to help in all ways to change the present treatment. Information on how you can help can be obtained from Joan Mills at 558-2411.

Personal Comment: while it was pointed out that each person in jail is fed on \$1.40 per day and that the total annual budget for the jail is at the \$4 million dollar level, our Supervisors are excited about spending \$10 million to tear down an existing freeway because it is ugly. And they wonder so much as to why the crime rates are high...so much that they held a hearing about the crime problem.
