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

Divide and Conquer

FRANCOIS. BARBAGELATA AND KOPP: WHAT ARE YOU UP TO **NOW....?**

We, of the Gay community, are outraged by the actions of three supervisors who, in a last ditch effort to block the establishment of the new Commission on the Status of Women. are attempting to use us as their political football. In introducing an ordinance to set up a Commission on the Status of Homosexuals, Supervisor Terry Francois acted independently. He did not even consult members of the Gay Community. He, along with Supervisors John Barbagelata and Quentin Kopp, are trying to make a mockery of serious efforts by women and Gays to gain representation in city government. It is the old "divide and conquer" technique which has been used time and again to discredit minority groups and to defeat legislation which would help to resolve some of our problems. We will not allow these supervisors -- or any other politicians -- to pit the Gays against the women. We have many common concerns, and we fully support the proposed Commission on the Status of Women.

The Bay Area Women's Coalition, which is comprised of nearly 60 diverse women's groups, includes representatives from the Gay community. Members of the Lesbian Mothers Union, Daughters of Bilitis and the Alice B. Toklas Democratic Club have worked with union women, racial and ethnic minority women, feminists and other women's groups at every stage of development of the legislation to establish the Commission on the Status of Women. At the hearing before the Urban and Consumer Affairs Committee of the Board of Supervisors many gay groups, including the Metropolitan Community Church and the Society For Individual Rights, testified in behalf of the Commission on the Status of Women.

The Gay community is well represented and is confident that the new Commission on the Status of Women will be a working commission for equality in our society and for equity

in our city government. As a class, women cut across all segments of the community. Women's rights are inclusive of minority rights and Gay rights. We therefore affirm our solidarity with those women's and minority groups in San Francisco which are working for equal rights for all people.

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

New Gay Bill Introduced by Foran

A major piece of civil rights legislation was introduced on Feb. 3, 1975, by Assemblyman John F. Foran (Dem. -S.F.). AB-633 would provide that it is unlawful employment practice for an employer, labor organization, or any person to discriminate in employment because of sexual orientation.

"Civil rights should include all people," Foran said, "and my bill provides for a large segment of our population which has never been included."

Assemblyman Foran in introducing his bill called upon the gay leadership throughout the State to aid him in the successful passage of this bill. "Chances for passage would be slight without anything less than a broad and intensive effort on the part of the gay community and others interested in civil rights being extended to all."

At this meeting, the association adopted by-laws and set up six committees. Leadership is by rotation of Chairpeople, rather than elected officers.

BAGL has attracted many young

gays as well as women, who, for whatever reasons, have not been attracted to the already established organizations. It is currently searching for a regular location to hold its meetings. The first two meetings were held in churches. The next scheduled meeting is for the 10th and at this time, a site has not been found. Anyone interested in attending, B.A.R. will know the location by the time this issue is distributed, If you call B.A.R. (861-5019), they will be able to tell you where the meeting is to be held.

The committees already established are: Media, Legal, Educational, Culture, Police, Labor, Headquarters and Social. Membership to BAGL is open to anyone who attends the general meetings. Anyone may also attend the committee meetings.

New Group To Organize Gay Workers

A new gay organization has been born after several weeks of planning and two weeks of open meetings. The first meeting was held at Trinity Methodist Church, on January 22nd, with 173 people in attendance. The next meeting was on January 29th at the 1st Unitarian Church, with 134 people present. That makes over 300 young gay people in just two meetings.

The core of the new group is headed by Howard Wallace, a former

candidate for the Board of Supervisors on the SWP (Socialist Workers Party) slate. The SWP is a Marxist-Trotsky international communist group which publishes the Militant newspaper.

Other noted activists involved are Jane Sica, David Goldman and Bob Vizzard. And while the core group seems of socialist persuasion, the overall body does not reflect that. The age grouping is very young, with most all under twenty-five, coming from mostly the Castro, Haight and Mission areas of the City.

Several women are actively involved in the new group, which is most unusual. And this was most clear at the Unitarian Church meeting, when they spent an hour or so discussing the SWP current "cause," the Joanne Little case. Ms. Little said that a guard raped her while she was in jail in North Carolina and she killed him. The state says otherwise, that she killed the guard in an escape attempt. The new group seems to be bent on spending time and money on behalf of the North Carolina case according to the talk at the last meeting.

The group also gave itself a name,




educate against sexism and racism in the gay community.

The new group, **BAGL**, which has no mailing address at this time, but does have a phone number, **431-1522**, which is the phone of Howard Wallace, who was selected to head the Labor Committee of BAGL.

Wallace told those assembled at the last meeting that BAGL must "begin organizing the gay workers in the gay bars and gay restaurants, as they are being exploited." Wallace called for the organizing to begin as soon as his Committe is completed. Wallace claims that all of the gay bars and gay restaurants underpay the gay workers and they must be forced to pay union wages. He suggested pickets and other tactics to help organize the gay bar and restaurant workers. He also said that they would establish their own union, not affiliated with the existing unions, in order to bring this about. When







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questioned as to the pay scale which exists in the bars and restaurants, Wallace said that all he knew...was that the workers were underpaid. He did not say which places underpaid or how many workers he had interviewed.

On the subject of existing gay groups, BAGL denounced them all as "ineffective," and said that BAGL was the "only gay liberation group in the bay

Comments on this were sought from the Society of Individual Rights, Helping Hands Čenter, West Coast Gay Liberation Front, Tavern Guild, and MCC, and each withheld comment until a later time, concerning the new group.

At the Unitarian meeting, several East Bay Gay-Pacific Center dignitaries were given a warm welcome, as were members of the Stanford Gay Peoples Union. The existing San Francisco groups were ignored by the new group purposely.

One final note on BAGL is...in their statement of purposes, they say that "we will not endorse any candidate for public office or any political party."

Most observers present at both meetings, who have good credentials in the gay liberation movement throughout the state, give the new group about sixty days or more of large meetings, and then "death" through personality conflicts and struggles over Marxist-Trotsky ideology...after six months.

Can Gays Get it Together in S.F.?

San Francisco has perhaps the greatest proportion of gay people of any city in the nation. We are spread throughout the city in the tens of thousands and especially concentrated in the Castro Valley, the Haight, Polk Street, Tenderloin and North Beach areas. Yet, how much voice or power do we have in shaping the future of this

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city and our own lives? How much have we used our increased numbers and capacity for greater openness to break down anti-gay prejudice, stigma and social/political isolation?

We have a mayor who feels free to indulge in crude anti-gay humor; a Board of Supervisors who pay little more than lip-service to the gays who help elect them; a daily commercial media which presents gays as pathetic caricatures of human beings and, with a few worthy exceptions, a clergy and professional establishment which pretends we don't exist. The entire control of this city is dominated by some of the world's largest corporations which maintain an overall policy of "benign neglect" toward the social, economic and political lives of gay people.

Standing out glaringly in the midst of all this, has been a stream of police harassments, culminating in sweeping Labor Day arrests in the Castro street area. Many people leaving gay bars across the city have faced similar intimidation.

How much longer will we allow our powerlessness to continue? When will we cease to be the object of such contempt and indifference? Only when we unite against every injustice imposed on gay women and men; when we create a force to be reckoned with on all issues affecting out lives as gay people.

We believe the process toward this end has already begun. The recent dismissal of false charges against the Castro 13 was, for the most part, the result of a mass response from the gay community. Likewise, the subsequent million-dollar police misconduct suit filed by eleven of those arrested helps to place us on the offensive. We feel the time has come to build and broaden that offensive. How can this best be done?

The executive board of the Police-Community Relations Units, a civilian agency of the San Francisco Police Department, aims at promoting "under-

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standing" between the police and the community. What kind of understanding? We understand the police all too well - BY THEIR DEEDS! From the racist Zebra dragnet, to the Chinatown payoffs, to the failure to investigate widespread reports of brutality against Chicanos and Latinos in the Mission to police infiltration of progressive organizations to the "cleanup" of pornography and prostitution in the Tenderloin, to the crackdown on gays and shakedown of gay businesses -BEHAVIOR, NOT WORDS, TELLS THE STORY!

Recently, gays in the Castro area won a moral victory when they defied the wishes of the old leadership of the Eureka Valley Police Community Relations Unit by proceeding with elections. Many people, however, left the meeting with a feeling of frustration after it became apparent that all major decisions, including the election itself. must be approved by the Executive Board over which the community has no control. The need is clear for gays to organize around police and other problems on a city-wide basis, free from police participation and interference. Let police deal with their affairs, we can deal with ours!

We will consider uniting with other minorities in a city-wide campaign to deal with the police. One possibility might be to organize for an elected police review board empowered to hold public hearings and issue subpoenas upon filing of citizen complaints.

We will also discuss the potential for a broad-based gay activist organization which could bring us together, whatever our differences, to confront every inequality faced by gays in San Francisco. One which could develop a strategy for direct public action; an independent force with social and political clout that could not be ignored! Fresh ideas are welcome. 
New Clinic

Pacifc Medical Center is pleased to announce the establishment of a new clinic designed to serve the psychological needs of the homosexual community in the San Francisco area.

The clinic, which is open to patients as of January 15, 1975 is the outgrowth of a project started by members of the homosexual community of San Francisco to establish a psychological service addressed to the specific problems of the homosexual in today's society. To raise funds for this purpose, a number of dedicated persons in the homosexual community formed an organization known as "Operation Concern." All initial funds for this new clinic have been raised and donated to Pacific Medical Center by Operation Concern.

Mr. James Stoll, former Homosexual Counselor at the Family Service agency of San Francisco, has been appointed staff counsellor for this project which is the outgrowth of the Family Service Agency gay counseling

Prior to his position with the Family Service Agency, Mr. Stoll worked for four years at San Francisco General Hospital on the Depressive States and Suicide Prevention Project, funded by the National Institute of Mental Helath through the Langley Porter Neuro-Psychiatric Institute of the University of California, San Francisco. He has served as therapist with groups, including a current one for depressed and/or suicidal male homosexuals. Additionally, Mr. Stoll has extensive experience in marital and family counseling and teaches a course in Crisis Intervention for students of the Graduate Theological Union in Berkeley. Barrier Broken?

Au Contraire... PCR Needed

Some people argue that there should be no need for an organization such as the Police Community Relations. They say that the fact that it exists means that something is amiss. They say that there should be no need for a group to improve relations between the police and the community. They are right. But if they were to continue their logic one step, they would also have to say that there should be no need for police. That the very fact that there is a police force means that something is amiss. They are right.

But things are not as they should be. People do steal, rob, mug, kill, rape, etc., etc. Thus there is a need for the police. And because of some police, there is a need for improving attitudes between the police and the community. And, because the people do have trouble in keeping serious crime in check, there is a need for greater cooperation between the police and the community. Because of the nature of man, we need police. Because of the nature of man, we also have come to need Police Community Relations...but a meaningful PCR and not tokenism. Things must change. Man must stop his robbing, his killing. The police must stop their misuse of power: i.e., their attack on last week's anti-Viet Nam demonstrators and press, the Castro Sweep, their harassment of gays. It adds up that on both sides, there is a percentage of people who abuse the rights of others. The question is what can be done to help change the thinking of this percentage of people?

There always will be some who will not play the rules. There always will be some who will take advantage of others. There always will be some who, for many reasons, will create an unsafe atmosphere. There are deep rooted reasons for this...lack of education, lack of job opportunities, frustrations, etc. These are paramount problems that will only be solved when our elected leaders get the guts to attack the problems instead of the crises. No PCR unit can hope to solve these deep rooted


problems, What a PCR unit can solve is the attitudes on the surface and the attitudes that exist for lack of understanding: on both sides. The PCR can bring the various communities together and work on improving attitudes. It is no easy task. There will be no fast solution. The Eureka Valley PCR is correct in trying to solve some of the local problems before trying to solve the citywide problems. (If you can not improve your own area, how can you have the ability to solve things on a larger scale?) A great opportunity to improve relations has been formed... the local seminar. It will offer the police the chance to explain, in detail, the problems that they face: and they do have problems. If the gay community is able to get a fuller understanding of the police, maybe some of the confrontations will lessen. The burden will then be transferred to the police to understand

the life style and the frustrations of the gay community. If that happens, we might see less and less police harassment and less and less instances of police beating up gays.

The end result is what we are after. We wish to live and work in harmony. In order to do that, many of us will have to improve our attitudes towards the police. Few among us, including myself, have never yelled "pig." That must change. Instead of making faces at the police, we must start to smile and be friendly. We must welcome them. That may sound strange coming from this pen, but I look to the end result. If the gay community welcomes the police and makes friends with them, we can then expect the police to respect us and our rights. It has to be a two-way meeting and I have no hesitation to take the first step. I will take that step, but, I in turn want to see the police take the next step!

Last Saturday night in front of the Regency theatre there were about 500 people waiting to get into the movie. The sidewalks were blocked. Even though you could not pass, there were

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no arrests for "obstructing the sidewalks." Last week at the Hilton, there was a Photo Show. In all the ads there was mention of a holographic exhibit. The center of that exhibit was a hologram of two naked women kissing and licking each other's breasts. Even though there were no warnings and even though children were watching, there were no arrests for "obscenities." The "double" standards against the gay community must stop. Gays must not be arrested on made-up charges. Gays must not be arrested for doing the same things straights are doing. Gays must not be beat up by the police... (we have on file, incidents of that happening.)

Once these two steps are taken, then the next step can be taken. That is where the entire community, gay and straight, can help the police. Last year in this city, over 40,000 serious crimes were reported. Over 100 per day! Add to that the number of serious crimes not reported. Something has to be done to lower that rate rapidly. While police are busting gays for obstructing the sidewalks and while gays are yelling "pig," people are being mugged, robbed and murdered. All that negative police energy, not to mention the tax payer's money, being spent in harassment of

the gays must be turned into a positive force against serious crime. Instead of looking for a gay to beat up, the police should be looking for criminals. The gay community can be of help. The upcoming Eureka Valley PCR seminar can open the door for the gays who have been victims of the police and for those police who hate us. But it is a step that must be taken. The end result will be not only an ending of harassment, but also a lowering of serious crime...all benefit.

With the end result in mind, I ask the gay community to continue to take a very active role in all local PCR units. To attend the Eureka Valley PCR seminar with a positive approach rather than any disruptive approach. The problems will not be solved overnight. Hatred has taken years to build. It will take time to overcome. But if the gay community takes that first step and makes it positive, friendly and warm, then maybe those police who have abused their authority will take the next step. We have questions about some of the police leadership. We may even have hate. We have to bury that, not only for our own sake, but for those gays who will follow us in the years to come. We have the opportunity to show not only this city, but the nation how to bridge the communities. It would be a shame if we don't make the most of it.

The next Eureka Valley PCR meeting will be on Wednesday, February 12th, at 8 pm at the Recreation Hall on Collingwood, near 18th street.

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

Editorial

But to hurl them out the way he does, smacks of typical Fascist tactics to smear anyone who does not agree with the personal thoughts of W.E.B.

We also grant the Rev. Broshears is highly controversial and quite volatile. However, we believe to give credit where it is due, and in this, the Reverend has done much to alleviate the poverty and distress of many of the Tenderloin elderly, transsexuals and poorer classes of gay people. We still believe in the basic rights of people to think what they wish and to try to do what they believe to be the right way, even if we don't completely agree with them. This is not yet a totalitarian state.


We also think that editorials of the nature of W.E.B. do more harm to this community than any attack from outside can do. While it is the perogative of editors to write on any subject they wish, we urge Mr. Beardemphl to calm down, try to work with others, and not try to divide a community that is trying to desperately to get its act together.

We also admire the fact that Mr. Beardemphl will sign his own name to the article, and ask his other writers who hurl bricks from their columns under pseudonyms, i.e. Marina (a **Straight Woman**) and Ramon Naruda (possibly another name for W.E.B.?) to use their own names and not speak for gay people when no one knows who they are.

And while we are asking questions, maybe W.E.B. can answer one for us. Where is the long-overdue promised Financial Report of this 1974 Freedom Day Parade, Dance Button Sale and Sentinel Published Programs? We recall that a sum of money was raised at an auction for live music; we recall no live band music. C'mon Bill, cough up and give us your report...it is long overdue.





Taming of The Shrew

STILL AN AUDIENCE FAVORITE

When A.C.T. wisely decided to keep Taming of the Shrew in its repertoire a second season, director William Ball was left with one large problem -- the sexy Petruchio of last season, Marc Singer, who shot to stardom in the role, had vacated the company to seek fame and fortune in the lucrative vineyards of the boob tube. Who to replace Singer? Ball entrusted the golden opportunity to musical comedy performer Anthony S. Teague ...and then the trouble began.

Anthony Teague has proven repeatedly he can be dazzling in the right vehicle; Shrew is not the right vehicle.

from his tongue with all the understanding of Huntz Hall delivering the Gettysburg Address. Gone is the nuance, shading and compassion that made Petruchio more than a blustering macho chauvenist and we are left with stereotype 2A in the actor's manual. It is not really Teague's fault; he gives the role great style, flair and virility. He also brings a dancer's technique to the part, to the extent that often he seemed on the verge of bursting into a fast eight bars of Where is the Life that Late I Led with appropriate softshoe encore. But his is a monotonous iinterpretation with no breadth or build that becomes increasingly uninteresting as the evening progresses, a solo performance in an ensemble company. To compare Singer and Teague is unfair, particularly when Teague has been forced into a recreative situation not of his own making. Suffice to say, he gives it a valiant effort...and falls short.

Fredi Olster has steadily improved upon Kate the shrew, and now the focus and sympathy of the play shifts to Kate. Miss Olster gives us a spoiled,

willful and yet insecure woman who manages to be both irritatingly headstrong and appealingly vulnerable. It's a lovely sure performance that runs a wide gamut of broad comedy to subtle

James R. Winker and Raye Birk have polished the lovesick suitors to the slickest act in vaudeville, a rapid-fire comedy team who continually demand constant attention for fear of missing one little bit. Their flirtatious foil Bianca is played by Sandra Shotwell, who gets in some deft licks of her own with effortless ease -- a girlish giggle, a toss of the curls says volumes in Miss Shotwell's capable hands. William Patterson, Stephan Schnetzer and Deborah May offer the sturdy support that exemplifies the best of the A.C.T. ensemble training program -- given a lead or a bit, they make the most of every role.

William Ball's direction keeps this Shrew an exhilarating cannonball of commedia dell'arte knockabout slapstick and good fun. While some parts may be weaker, the overall production is still strong!

Street Scene

THE 1929 PULITZER PRIZE WINNING PLAY

A.C.T. director Edward Hastings, who last season gave us the 1926 Broadway, has resurrected yet another classic of the late 20's, Elmer Rice's Street Scene, a valid look at the teeming ghetto life when New York was the melting pot of the nation, when "kikes" and "spics" lived side by side but no "niggers" allowed. In its time, Street Scene made an important statement about prejudice, intolerance and the interrelationships of persons, not labels. The theme is still equally valid today, but to say I found Street Scene much more than an antiquated bore would be a lie. The play is a mood piece, but under Hastings direction, the mood is lethargic and seldom exciting. Much of the dialogue today is unintentionally funny, little more than bad soap opera, yet one must remember that this play won the 1929 Pulitzer Prize...and to its credit, there are moments and scenes throughout that remain vividly dramatic.

The main reason to see this production is to discover a trio of beautiful performances by three resident actresses who shine throughout --Barbara Dirickson as the young Irish girl Rose Maurrant, Elizabeth Huddle as her mother who seeks understanding from a black lover, and Ruth Kobart as the bigoted trouble-making neighbor who casts stones from her glass house. Miss Dirickson maintains riveting interest and builds the tension of the dissatisfied ingenue with a conviction that surmounts all script and directional problems. Miss Huddle is equally compelling as she reveals the struggles to be a good wife and mother and yet have an identity of her own, and Miss Kobart garners most of the scattered laughs in the sort of role Thelma Ritter honed to perfection. With these three outstanding actresses, and several excellent supporting roles (Charles Hallahan, Hope Alexander-Willis and Rick Hamilton to name just a few), Street Scene offers a muriad assortment of acting levels. Michael Hume is stiff and awkward as Rose's potential boyfriend Samuel, who comprises one-half of the Romeo & Juliet love theme. And there are many minor parts that are just embarassing.

Any A.C.T. production always offers something of merit. The acting company continually rises to each

occasion, often surpassing its material. But I begin to question why Edward Hastings has a pre-occupation with beating dead horses? Reverent revivals are no substitute for imaginative creativity.

Street Scene is a classic milestone in American drama and for those who enjoy the attraction of museum pieces, it should be seen...especially if you missed it the first time around!







Alice Doesn't Live Here Anymore

Once in a very great while comes along a film that is so perfectly made a critic throws pad and pencil to the wind and tends to find himself frothing with glee and writing things like "One of the year's best" and "Not to be missed!". Well, the year is still young, but Alice Doesn't Live Here Anymore definitely sets a high standard for '75 film fare.

Martin Scorsese, who gave us the brilliant Mean Streets last year, has returned with a jewel of a film about a 35 year old housewife married to a dullard with an 11 year old son who suddenly finds herself a widow with a child to raise and support. Sounds grim, right? Something Claudette Colbert or Susan Hayward might have made a good weepie woman's picture. But Scorsese and cast have made one of the funniest, yet moving contemporary stories that probes the plight of the widowed mother you'll ever see. Living in stodgy Socoro, New Mexico, after a particularly bad day, Alice sticks her head out the front door and yells "Socoro sucks!" She treats her son as an equal, a pal, and their relationship is one of the prime joys of the film.

Upon widowhood, Alice embarks upon a career as a not very good singer in cheap cocktail bars, where she meets a 27 year old charmer who turns out to be married and psychotic. Hard times become harder, and she ends up slinging hash in Tucson, Arizona, and meeting a gentle farmer who wants to marry her.

But he deserves a big "E" for effort, as does Lola from Seattle, Jamie St. James, and Dorris' cheer-leaders, who introduced her by way of singing a capella and off-key.

Whereas there must have been at least five to eight community females in the audience, none was present at \$7.50 a crack, to receive their awards, for Women's Bowling, Women's Basketball and Women's Softball. Charlotte, of the Mint, was off and away in Rio for Carnival, so Tommy Turner accepted the "Outstanding Halloween Nite in a Bar Award," for her. Nancy Bleiweiss was the only female award winner present, and she received a heart warming applause for her excellent production of Beach Blanket Babylon.

The procession of presenters, the long-winded announcers and the entertainment made the evening a trinity of tiresome, boring and dragging during the three hours it all consumed. But actually, the producers didn't promise us a Rose Garden! It was a family give-away show and that's what we got for our admission. Those who didn't want to spend that much, stayed away and they did in healthy proportions. At least a third of the audience left during the intermission, and went to Jackson's or some other nearby bar for a needed drink.


Many volunteers, not members of S.I.R., pitched in to do the necessary work so important for the success of an event of this magnitude.

A Unique Caribbean Cruise

The week prior to Christmas, history was made, 377 people converged on Fort Lauderdale, Florida from all parts of the United States to participate in the very first All Gay Chartered Cruise to the Caribbean. The idea, planning and executing of the trip was a coup for the Islanders Club of New York under the direction of its vibrant and handsome President, Bleu Fletridge.

At the request of the steamship company, the Islanders agreed to avoid press or open notoriety announcing their cruise plans. However, judging from the passanger list, the word was widespread. When I first learned of the trip from a friend in New York (Thanks Monte), back in July, I admit I had my reservations. It was a huge undertaking that could spell disaster for its organizers if not properly handled. I must say, all my misgivings were dismissed once our

ship sailed from port. It was decided after negotiations, that the Paquet Lines' ship, Renaissance, would be used for the historic voyage. The Renaissance is a sleek, one-class ship, specifically designed and built in an A-1 French shipyard, for the growing worldwide cruise market. She is a 12,000 ton, 8 deck ship with ample public space, her dining room and Grand Salon can accommodate her entire passenger compliment (460) at one time. Other areas of interest are the Cafe de Paris-bar/restaurant, located on the Grill deck, the Lido bar on the upper pool deck and the intimate tavern Bar on the first deck. The ship also features a duty-free shop area, barber and beauty shops, gym and sauna facilities, movie theatre, plus two swimming pools. Her passenger accommodations are adequately laid out staterooms for

private baths.

The Renaissance is a French flag vessel, which means a French crew and cuisine. Special accolades whould be given to the captain, his officers and crew for their hospitality and excellent service during the 7 days at sea. I'm

sure they had no idea what to expect from us as passengers, but rumor has it, they would be more than delighted for us to return.

Taking into consideration the ship was on charter, certain concessions obviously had to be made to offset the reduced fares and the natural area for the cutback was, disappointingly, food. The food as a whole was pleasingly presented and palatable, however, not entirely up to my expectations. For the most part, the meals, specifically dinner, consisted of a single menu with only minor variations available on certain evenings. Breakfast and lunch, on the other hand, were open menus with a wide variety of choices and generally good food. One of the more spectacular meals was the last night's dinner, which I have a feeling was more in line with their usual cusine. The menu featured pate as an appetizer, then consume, followed by rock lobster flambe; the main course, Duck Orange, apple fritters and marinated peach halves and a house salad. Dessert was Baked Alaska, a traditional last night treat. Complimentary red, white and rose wines were served with all meals and on special occasions, private stock wines and champagnes were likewise

The Islanders' staff planned many varied shipboard activities that specialized in a theme for each day. We celebrated New Year's Eve, Bastille Day, Halloween and Christmas, to name a few. There were also traditional attractions, such as bridge, movies for smaller groups, and contests like the Halloween Costume Parade and the Mr. Renaissance Contest for the

masses. One of the daily highlights I enjoyed most, was the afternoon Tea Dance on the Grill Deck, held each day at 4:00. While the ship served coffee, tea and delectable pastries in the Cafe de Paris, the discoteque system was set up poolside for the cha-cha groups to limber up for the evening's festivities. It was, for me, the most relaxing time of the day and gave me an opportunity to meet many new people and make arrangements for the evening's activities.

Evening was the high point of each day, which generally found me in the Grand Salon for cocktails, followed by dinner, then a return to the Grand Salon for a show and ending with either dancing, a stroll around deck or feasting on the midnight buffet. For the night owls, fresh onion soup or a hot dog and nightcap were in order in the Tavern Bar.

Being an entertainment critic, I can't help but comment on the shipboard talent. The performers' showcase was headlined by Michael Greer, who literally worked his tits off, four out of the seven nights, never once repeating material. I really don't know how he did it, especially since the Mona Lisa was absent from his act. Bravo Michael. Next were the male Pointer Sisters, Gotham, the high stepping, nostalgia singing trio, who are dazzling entertainers. They are so exciting they defy any better description. The lesser side featured Frank Underwood, a pianist and music man of Lovely Ladies and Kind Gentlemen fame, and singers John Paul Hudson and David Summers, the later being an attractive, but not particularly talented, former star

Getting back to the cruise itinerary, the Islanders wated to avoid the well-traveled Caribbean traffic routes for obvious reasons, and elected to visit the more primitive climates of the Yucatan Peninsula and Guatemala. Stops were made at the quiet port of Carmen del Playa (Yucatan) for sightseeing to the Mayan ruins at Tulum and Chichen Itzu. The next stop was the island resort of Cozumel, 12 miles off the Yucatan Peninsula coast. Our final destination was San Tomas in Guatemala where side tours were once again offered.

The Islanders are to be praised for a fantastically well organized trip that I will long remember. And it was a FIRST! Kudos to you all. They managed to assemble a group of passengers, although cliquish at first, which is understandable, who were in a short period of time more than relaxed and by the end of the cruise, a warm camaraderie prevailed with everyone. I can't remember when I've been a part of a more handsome collection of men who were as genuinely friendly and well mannered, while having the time of their lives.

My only complaints during the eventful week were not the faults of our hosts. The weather was totally unpredictable and we had everything from hot tropical to stormy, rainy weather. The worst was the sixth day, Thursday, with high seas and further complicated by a malfunctioning ship's stabilizer,

plus bad water taken on in Guatemala, caused many to take to their beds for most the day.

My next mistake was strictly voluntary. I made the fatal error of staying at the Marlin Beach Hotel for three days, after the conclusion of our cruise. The hotel is situated across the street from the famous Fort Lauderdale gay beach area. The beach boardwalk is a haven for panhandling beach bums and the hotel's bar/discoteque and restaurant, a mecca for hustlers. The rooms are clean, but unexcitingly

decorated. I found the room rates, bar and restaurant prices much too high for the quality offered, (a drink at the crack of noon is \$1.50). Thanks to shipboard acquaintances, including two Floridians, little time as possible was spent at the hotel. Miami, I later discovered, is far more to my liking and will be a must for my next visit. Fort Lauderdale is definitely not on my preferred list of places to revisit or recommned to friends who plan to stop in Florida.

All in all, it really was a week that was....the best news of all, is that the Islanders Club, I have been informed by Mr, Fletridge, is positively planning a return engagement for 1975. Unfortunately, it's much too early to divulge any plans, but take my word for it, the next adventure will be bigger and better than the first. I hope to entire more people from the West Coast next time around to join in on the only way to travel....take a cruise and leave the driving to them.

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

Most people only know of her after her stardom either with the group or by herself, but I knew her before she was a star...yes, I knew Mama Cass in the early Sixties in Baltimore City. Baltimore, Maryland, a city of about a million people, has turned out some pretty big stars: Ronnie Dove (who recorded Keep It A Secret), Billie Holiday (the fabulous blues singer) and Mama Cass.

It's funny that she said, according to reports, that she did not want to be called Mama Cass, but simply Cass Eliott. Funny, because she was always "mama." The first time I met her was on Howard Street (one of the main streets in downtown Baltimore). She was walking with her lover or husband (I don't know which, because she never really said). I remember thinking, "My God, how fat," but after talking to her I soon forget her fatness, because she seemed to be so interesting and that is what one got into. She could talk up a storm, wow!

She lived off Howard Street, in an alley apartment. The guy she lived with was extremely handsome. Both were rather poor, money-wise. Still, they seemed happy. I never thought, to be honest, that she would ever make it as a singer. Sure, I knew she was going to enter the field and once in a while, if you were walking by one of the hep, underground coffee houses in Baltimore, you could hear her singing, not for money, but for her friends.

I remember when her daughter was born. Cass was so very happy. You could see it in her eyes, her smile and she, as a being, seemed to glow with joy. One of the things she loved was to take the baby for a walk in her roller-carriage down Howard Street and to stop in to Reads' Drug Store (on the corner of Howard and Franklin Streets) to show off the baby. What troubles me most is that the guy who was her lover or husband was the father, but he does not look like the guy who the papers say was the father (however, I did not see Cass for six years or more afterwards, so maybe the guy did change in his looks and maybe they are one and the same).

Mama Cass really was liberated. As a woman and as a person. She believed everybody should be free and as for gay people, she loved them. Recently I heard just the opposite, but I can only remember how warm she was to the guys and how she welcomed them into her life, in Baltimore, as friends. She was always ready to be a Mama and listen to problems or cheer up a guy (or girl) and she was the first to make a gay couple feel proud of their love.

Afterwards, Mama Cass rarely came back home. I moved away and came to New York City. As her career zoomed, I heard bad things about her, but I think that it is important to remember the good things about people and so it is with Mama Cass. God bless her in Rock and Roll Heaven. May she dream a little dream for each of us on Earth.

Look Good Feel Good


HOW NEUROLOGY & PSYCHO-LOGY CAN INCREASE YOUR OUTPUT

The constant cumulative rise of health/bodybuilding research is progressively making your work(out) more complex. Meeting this challenge requires increasing your output. Which is to say, common sense dictates that efficient allocation (or management) of time will invariably increase your output. By the same token, the degree of failure (in meeting the latter requirement) becomes more and more apparent via the mounting time pressures.

In essence, refining techniques of self-management will result in over-coming time pressures and increasing output. Yet, to do so effectively, one must have the capacity for recognizing and dealing with even the smaller elements of his own experience. In a nut shell, all of our experience is the direct outgrowth of various activities of nerve cells (called neurons).

Prior to engaging in a constructive discussion on neurology, allow me to point out that it is truly not the value but the worth of a thing that is important, as in the case of an inexpensive but strategically placed button. Yet, with the vast number of circles of critics....well, the way some people find fault you'd think there was a reward. Consequently, again proving that the trouble with Man is twofold...he cannot learn truths which are too complicated, and he forgets truths which are too simple.

In neurology one may readily compare nerve cells with radio tubes in electronic computers. Yet, the differences in property include: the neurons can repair themselves; grow larger; and, even hold a constant temperature. They are found in our spinal cord, our nerve fibres, and our brain. More astonishing is the fact that the cortex (the most complex part of our brain) contains about fifteen billion neurons. In addition, our experiences



are born within this mass of interconnected cells. Oddly enough, millions of neurons can simultaneously carry impulses into our brain -- and still, the human central computer manages to sort out these incoming signals and organize them into a series of separate impressions and pictures.

Consequently, the speed and accuracy with which you are able to dominate/control your attention span will determine the success or failure of your output and productivity. For example, you can shift very quickly from looking to smelling, to listening and then back to looking again, yet each shift is made at the sacrifice of the previous impression. Similarly, the brain is capable of tens of thousands of daily impressions -- and these pictures may be interpreted as the "smaller elements" of experience.

Since we have already touched upon the initial phase of the general method of increasing your output (which is to say, "increasing your alertness"), let us now focus on increasing your knowledge and range of experience. An appropriate analogy that will dramatize the purpose of the second phase reveals an individual (blindfolded) being led into an open field. With timed precision and dexterity we remove his blindfold and replace it with a remote-controlled pair of goggles, without allowing him to see anything during this transition. Then, we observe his actions as we control his

First of all, we note that as there is



just a regular scattering of shifting lines like this:

the subject is reluctant to move from his original position. However, as we manage to adjust the controls in order to provide a clearer picture,



we note that our subject will more than likely proceed to move along very cautiously (since he can barely make out the level surface for several yards at a time). Similarly, as the vision clears completely, our subject can now act with confidence. This is merely to say that the impressions in your mind control your actions. If you are able to feed your brain knowledge, clear, concise pictures/impressions/signals then you can rest assured that your control over your actions has increased; thus, at the same time, "increasing your knowledge and range of experience."

Finally, in increasing your alterness and knowledge you are in a better position to increase your available energy; hence, completing your concentrated attack on the three-pronged method for raising the level of your output. Thus, the more a man trains sensibly, the better adapted he becomes to sensible training, and bodybuilding is nothing if it is not the methodical creation of the habit of training. By the same step, people who want by the yard but try by the inch, should be kicked by the foot

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
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
