54 Gay Leaders At Fresno Conference

This beautiful quiet town of some 200,000 persons found itself with two major meetings the weekend of Aug. 14th - 16th. Both the United Farm Workers and the Gay Liberationists leaders from around the state converged on this city of sleepy beauty.

Fresno, used to marching, shouting by the Farm Workers, was ready for Chavez and his members, but they were not ready when on the local TV stations at suppertime Friday, militant minister Ray Broshears of San Francisco, came on telling the people of Fresno that he was there and that dozens more of the Gay Liberation leaders were descending upon Fresno. And this was to change the laws allowing equal employment

The Fresno media took it in good stride, and gave excellent coverage to the first press conference called by Broshears, and the "Fresno Bee" gave it a first class page two write-up.

On Friday evening, as the conference attendees began arriving for the session, the temperature was a cool 104 degrees. This Gay Liberation conference was the largest ever held in California, topping the 1972 Bakersfield

Morris Kight of Los Angeles and the Rev. Broshears, were the moderators and coordinators of the conference, and both appeared in top shape all through the event. Both Kight and Broshears, according to a noted gay historian who was present, "appeared to be in a contest of one-upmanship, which resulted in a top notch conference with some dramatic exchanges of positive action taking place in the early part of the

The attendees severely chastized George Raya, who they claimed is not representing any of them at the conference, with the exception of Doug DeYoung, who arrived as they conference was nearly over and after some of the major leaders had departed due to other committments early.

The conference attendees ureged the people to call for a financial accounting of Raya, and urged until he did so, that no one give him any further

Representatives from San Diego and the Valley were infuriated with Raya, and promised to withhold any further funding for Raya and the group known as the Concerned Voters of California, of which David Goodstein of the Advocate founded along with DeYoung and Rev. James Sandmire.

Raya and Duke Smith of San Francisco had made numerous telephone calls to San Franciscans telling them that "no one of importance was going to be at the Conference and to boycott it." The attendees at the conference took great exception at another Jim Foster-type put down like the "generals and privates" trip that they laid on Gay Liberationists heads in the Advocate earlier this year. It was

learned that the money collected by Goodtsein's group to do lobbying, against the referendum which never happened, had collected \$6,000 and that they were going to pay back only 30% on the dollar, for they stated that the frim of Winner-Wagner had to be paid for flying around the state to figure out what was going on. This was denounced by the conference as a rip-off of the gay people of California.

Concerning AB 633, the Foran Bill for Equal Employment Rights, the conference did the total job it was set up for by Broshears. It got southern and northern California gay people in a meaningful face to face contact with one another setting up invaluable lines of [Continued Next Page]





communication, and they discussed the various approaches to take in assuring pasage of AB 633 which has but two weeks until it is voted upon.

Morris Kight stated that with this conference, once and for all, fears and superstitions built by "other persons not at the conferenced" were done away with and that a new day had begun and that we will conquer all obstacles to quality for homosexuals in California, for at last we have a "grassroots leadership" that does not require millions of dollars, and that will lobby effectively for legislation which will bring freedom for gay people in California.

Everyone is urged to write letters right away to the various legislators urging them to lobby for and to vote for ASSEMBLY BILL 633 which will be voted upon the first week in September. The conference attendees urged that form letters not be used, as they have been ignored by legislators in the past and shall continue to be ignored. Personal letters, and also telephone calls to such Bay Area anti-AB 633 legislators as Assemblyman Daniel Boatwright of Concord-Walnut Creek-Danville-Martinez, and also Assemblyman John Miller of Berkeley who is not too hot for AB 633.

Extreme pressure must be exerted upon legislators from San Jose, and Santa Cruz, as they all are opposed to AB 633. When you finish reading this, write letters, and please sign them in full, giving name, address and phone number. The same goes for telegrams, please put your phone number on it as well, for some members of the Assembly call and find out if the letter, card or telegram is for real.

You are urged to flood with phonecalls, the offices of all the legislators, the friendly as well as the opposed. This bill, AB 633, can be passed when voted upon in three weeks, if you only work for it, each and every single gay person and friends of gay people. Your urgent action is needed now, for tomorrow could be too late. If we don't get AB 633 through this session of the Assembly, we may never get it through. And if it does pass this session, it will be alive for the Senate to handle, when it re-convenes in January, 1976. Please, do more than your part today to make up for the closet queens who won't lift a damn finger but are hampered by the same laws as we are.

That was the general text of the conference, a working conference which saw the greatest show of unity

and solidarity in the history of the gay liberation movement in California.

Special thanks must be given to the Fresno Gay Community Center workers and the pastor of Fresno Fellowship of the New Covenant, the Rev. Joe Brown. Also, to Assemblymember John Foran, and to Mike Caringi who helped to finance a good portion of the conference.

And a not of damnation to George Raya, Duke Smith and the Alice B. Toklas Democratic Club for trying to sabotage the conference.

A cooperative effort is being made to curb the large number of assaults, on streets and other public places, against gay people. I'd like to talk with individuals who have been assaulted or harassed during the last four or five months in or around San Francisco. If you can describe your assailants I can construct a composite drawing from vour description. Some composite drawings of recent assailants are already completed and more are being prepared. Anyone who has been attacked may see if his assailants resemble those who have attacked others. The same people may be responsible for a number of attacks and they may have a common source. WE also need to know how, where, when and why these attacks have occurred so that others may know the types of situations for which to look and avoid.

If you have a case, connected with an assault that you intend to dismiss, pending before the court, you should seek legal advice before hand. Although general information - time of day or night, place, description of assailants, etc. will be made available to the gay community at large; specific information, such as your name, etc., will not be disclosed. Milk Forum By Harvey Milk

Assemblyman John Foran's Gay civil rights legislation - AB 633 - will be brought to the floor of the state assembly within the next week or two. At this time there is some doubt whether there are enough votes to get the bill passed. If it does not get through it may be two years before the next try. There is something that everyone of us can do to help gain enough votes this year.

We do not have to spend time "lobbying" the San Francisco assemblyman. We do have to spend a lot of energy and time "lobbying" the assemblymen from all other parts of the state. John Foran has told people that the best way to lobby is to make a personal visit to the home district office of the assemblymen. That counts more than anyother thing you can do. Thus, all in the Bay Area should call - time does not allow for letters - everyone you know - friends, relatives, lovers, tricks, business associates - who live out of the Bay Area and ask them to mount the campaign. Ask them to go themselves and to tell all their friends - gay and non-gay - to go to the local district offices of their assemblymen. Pay that visit. Even if the assemblyman is not in, make sure your visit and request is noted and passed on. If there is no way to make the personal visit then a personal letter on your own letterhead or a telegram is the next best way. (In either case, you must have a return address and phone number or the

The local district offices must be jammed with local voters wanting to see their assemblyman. They want to talk to him about passage of AB 633. The message is simple and clear. If the assemblyman votes for the bill you will round up votes for him when his term is up for re-election.

It need not be said that if the assemblyman votes no, then you will round up no votes for his re-election.

There are many arguments for passage. If your assemblyman needs some "professional" opinions, ask him to talk to John Foran about the bill. The failure of the referendum drive against Willie Brown's bill should let them know the weakness of those who protest against AB 633. We have to show the strength behind the "yes" on 633 drive. It is vital that every assembly man's office is swamped with local voters visiting their elected leader. It is vital that each assemblyman gets hundreds of letters.

The costs of calling up all the people you know outside of the city, is a low price to pay for gay civil rights. Once this bill is passed, other needed legislation will be easier to obtain. Every person who has a telephone tree must put it to use this week. Next week may be too late.

Fatal to Rats, Monkeys and Dogs

News Item: A research team from Stanford University today announced the discontinuance of their Hayes Valley project, an experiment which would have determined the absolute limits under which human life may survive.

The cancellation of the research program came about as a result of dissention among the group of scientists involved in the project, according to a Stanford spokesperson.

The disagreement over the Hayes VAlley project began when a faction of researchers proposed the addition of 10,000 new units of government housing to the already overcrowded area. The other scientists balked at the idea, some calling the proposal inhumane to the current dinizens of Hayes Valley, and others citing the United States Consitution and its amendment which prohibits "cruel and unusual punishment." Result of the project to date, these researchers argued, have proven conclusively that, under wretched living conditions, with little income, inadequate health facilities and a nearastronomical crime rate coupled with almost nonexistant police protection, the residents of Hayes Valley are already living successfully under levels proven fatal to rats, monkeys and dogs in similar experiments.

Those in favor of the addition, however, called attention tol the apparent contentment of the people living in Hayes Valley, a result, they said, of carefuly plantings of liquor stores, street prostitutes, and other stimuli, plus the introduction of racial minorities into the area for the purpose of releasing pent-up angers.


"In fact," said one Stanford researcher who wished to remain nameless, "given enough liquor and hate objects, we could quite conceivably add twice as many units as have been proposed, with almost no noticeable difference."


Later, the researchers began to draw up plans which would call for the addition of liquor stores to the five remaining corners in Hayes Valley that didn't already have one, and advertisements in popular Gay publications such as the San Francisco Sentinel, in an attempt to add Gays to the traditional Blacks and Orientals for use as hate-objects.

The addition of Gays to Hayes Valley would be a great asset, the researchers contended. One researcher commented: "It's quite simple, actually. Whites hate the Blacks and Orientals, who in turn hate the whites. But they would **all** hate the Gays, which would lend a whole new dimension to the project!"


Unfortunately, the effort didn't work out, the scientists fell into argument again and, due to the incompatibility among those who were involved, the hayes Valley project was ordered shelved by the Stanford Board of Trustees.

Now that the project has been discontinued, however, the question now remains to be answered as to exactly what is going to be done with Hayes Valley, since it has served its usefulness. Suggestions have run rampant, but one suggestion, made by a freshman scientist who wants to make the former research project a part of San Francisco's Fillmore District ("Nobody'll notice it there," he contends) is reported to be under serious consideration.

Stage: The Wizard of Oz


Once upon a time, in the mythical land of Frisco, The Court of Empress Doris was sitting around one sunny day when a bright eager voice said, "Why don't we put on a production of 'The Wizard of Oz' and donate all the money we make to Operation Concern?" "Impossible!" cried the angry pessimists who make a career out of decrying the ambitions of others. "Judy's performance is history. Bert Lahr's ghost will frown down upon you! Oz is a film classic! How can you compete with a classic??!!!"

Undaunted, Imperial Productions, as they decided to call themselves. decided not only to do it, but to put it on in the cavernous Kabuki Theatre. previously the home of such short-lived quickies as Heartbreak of Psoriasis,



Salute to the 30's and John Raitt's memorable production of Kiss Me Kate. The Kabuki has a sound system guaranteed to make lip-readers of any audience, no matter how attentive, and a stage that rivals Radio City for sheer scope.

Fearlessly chortling in the face of adversity, director Chuck Zinn issued his edict -- "I shall not compete with the memory of the film, I shall recreate it!" He sent telegrams to producers Charlotte Coleman and Mike Gerry --"Send Money!" (they obviously did) He held auditions -- "I shall make



munchkins of you all!" He found a fifteen year old girl from Alameda --"Listen, kid, stick with me and I'll make you a star!" And he wisely entrusted the sets and costumes to eight creative individuals.

Many weeks passed; Oz buttons flowed over Frisco like rainwater. Opening night arrived -- August 15, 1975. The eight-piece orchestra under Chris Wayne's smooth direction sailed into the opening bars of Over the Rainbow and the crowd went wild. The Harold Arlen/E.Y. Harburg score still packs a wallop. The curtain rose upin Autn Em on the porch of the Kansas farmhouse, looking just like the opening scene of Oklahoma. Enter young Suzi Smith as Dorothy (but minus Toto, the one grevious loss in this production). As Miss Smith settles herself upon the porce steps and sings Over the Rainbow, it become apparent the Garland image is indelible as Suzi's Dorothy sings in a thin, weak voice with no lyrical interpretation. It's sweet. . .but that's all. (But of course, she didn't have all those M.G.M. years of training behind her either). She's not helped by Charlotte Wood's lackluster Aunt Em, but shortly George Lowy in white tights and chiffon cyclone whirls in and we're off to Oz.

Munchkinland - - with a truly incredibly set by George Boche and brilliantly colorful costumes by Tom Brown and the most adorable group of Munchkins you've ever see. The entire scene works like a dream, marred only by Rose Kocnur throwing away the role of Glinda, the Good Witch. And the young Miss Smith reveals herself to be a quite credible actress who makes the corny-but-fun book by L. Frank Baum sound fresh, and who can resist a little burst of applause when Dorothy is told by the Munchkins to follow the vellow brick road. We're cheering for a part of

our childhoods. Into the Forest, where Dorothy meets her three famous cohorts -- The Scarecrow, engagingly played by Don Thompson; The Tinman, the most beautifully subtle acting performance of the show by David Simien LaCoeur (Jack Haley would have been proud); and The Cowardly Lion, broadly but hilariously overplayed by Mike Lewis (if more Paul Lynde than Bert Lahr).

Many months have passed since the inception of Oz. It now remains only for one added performance on Saturday, Aug. 23rd to attest to its financial success, but along the yellow brick road, we have seen several new talents discovered, a fristrate production of a 1939 film classic transferred to the stage, we have even solved most of the audibility problems of the Kabuki (something I had long given up as hopeless), and we have seen the finest "amateur" technical production (whatever that term means) to yet grace our local stages.

- At the Mitchell Bros. O'Farrell Theatre, there is a new film entitled Sip The Wine. It is a straight X-rated film that is interesting for several reasons. It was locally made by Liberty Street Productions, using several members of the A.C.T. acting company in the lead roles, and it attempts fairly successfully

Bob Burns cackles malevolently and makes the most out of every moment as The Wicked Witch of the West (the lone drag portrayal and the one most valid), his melting scene a gem of a finale, gene Hart shines as Lord Growlie in the Emerald City, and Jack Natkin is perfection as the Wizard

But for all of the fine performances and creative memory of director Zinn, Oz remains a triumph of technical achievement. The mammouth sets by Bob Paulsen, Gene Boche, Les Balmain and Bob Leshem are of the highest professional calibre -- to single any one out would be unfair -- and the costumes by M.J. Talbot (what can you do with Kansas overalls?), Tom Brown, Ed Walsh and Herman Nieve make Dorothy's rainbow come vividly to life. George Lowy has contributed some effective choreography, and the entire cast should give a long, low bow to the ingenious makeup staff. Oz is a visual




to bridge the gap between legit and porno filmmaking. Its biggest deterrent to success is a cliche-ridden script about the trials and tribulations of a porno film director and his professional problems trying to make a good porno flick and his personal romance with a young virgin sweetheart versus the experienced older woman.

The film is at its best when it takes a laughing look at the boredom of sex and flesh day in, day out, and at its most embarrassing when it tries to be moving and sincere. Romping along the beach nude hand in hand may be very lyrical, but it's not particularly exciting. Director

Dan Caldwell is to be commended for trying to film a legit love story that doesn't turn coy at the crucial moments and suddenly cut to waves breaking upon rocks. The scenes of the move-within-the-movie -- the bored tough blonde chewing away on the bored porno stud -- are genuinely funny, if disappointing to porny patrons who brought their raincoats in vain.

JAmes Whelan and Colin Phillips are attractive leading men who can act well as show handsome flesh; Anni Long contributes a dimensional interesting portrayal as the woman who loves





well but not wisely, and Erica Hart exhibits a strong potential for leading lady status.

It's too good to be called a porno film, but not good enough to stand on its own as a legit love story. But its ambitious first attempt to creat a new genre, utilizing acting and plotline as well as bodies, and I await with interest to see their next film. It is well made by good craftsmen, and if it must be scored as a failure first time out, it also merits praise for daring to be different.

was supposed to be. Really couldn't figure out some of the roles.



If you've got the clap, you'll know

Syphillis and gonorrhea are the only two diseases which can be passed on by sexual contact.

1. False. The blood test for syphilis does not become positive until the disease is active in the body. This sometimes takes as long as three months after infection. Make sure! Get a blood test every three months.

2. True. If your lover/trick of w eek ago, or even a few months ago, tells you to get a blood test because he has syphilis, your test could be negative and you could still have it. The incubation period for syphilis is from 10 to 90 days. Immediate preventive treatment will



eliminate the risk of developing symptoms and passing it on.

3. False. Most cases of rectal and throat gonorrhea have no symptoms. The City Clinic reports that it is seeing more and more men with no signs (discharge, burning on urination) of penile gonorrhea either. Through sexual contact, you could be giving the clap to other people without knowing it. You can help stop the spread of gonorrhea by asking the doctor to take cultures of your throat, rectum and penis when getting a regular VD check-up.

4. False. Herpes, warts, scabies, and hepatitis can be transmitted through sexual contact. Bacterial diarrheas, like shigella and amebic dysentery can bespread by oral-anal sex.

Law In Action

DOCTOR'S DUTY TO WARN

"Doctor, I have this terrible urge to kill my boss." When the doctor hears this he must use his careful judgement to decide if his patient is dangerous. If the doctor things that his patient might kill, he must warn the intended victim at once!

This rule does not breach the privilege of confidentiality. Sure the law encourages confidentiality between the patient and therapist. But the law yields when it is necessary to prevent a violent attack.

A client should tell all to his lawyer so that he can get the best advice. Yet a client may not seek legal help to commit a crime or fraud. So if the client tells of a planned crime or fraud and seeks advice, he cannot use this privilege. The lawyer may be ordered to testity about the client's intended criminal acts.

Similarly, talk between husband and wife is privileged. Yet that privilege is lost if one spouse sues the other for property. Or if there is a crime by one spouse against the other or against a child. For example, where the husband is accused of grand theft, the wife may be ordered to reveal their banking transactions. Or if a father commits crimes against his children, the wife may testify.

As a rule, a person is not liable for someone else's criminal acts. In one case the trucker left the key in his truck parked in "skid row." A thief stole the truck, drove it negligently, and ran into the plaintiff. The trucker was liable to the plaintiff for the accident caused by the thief.






