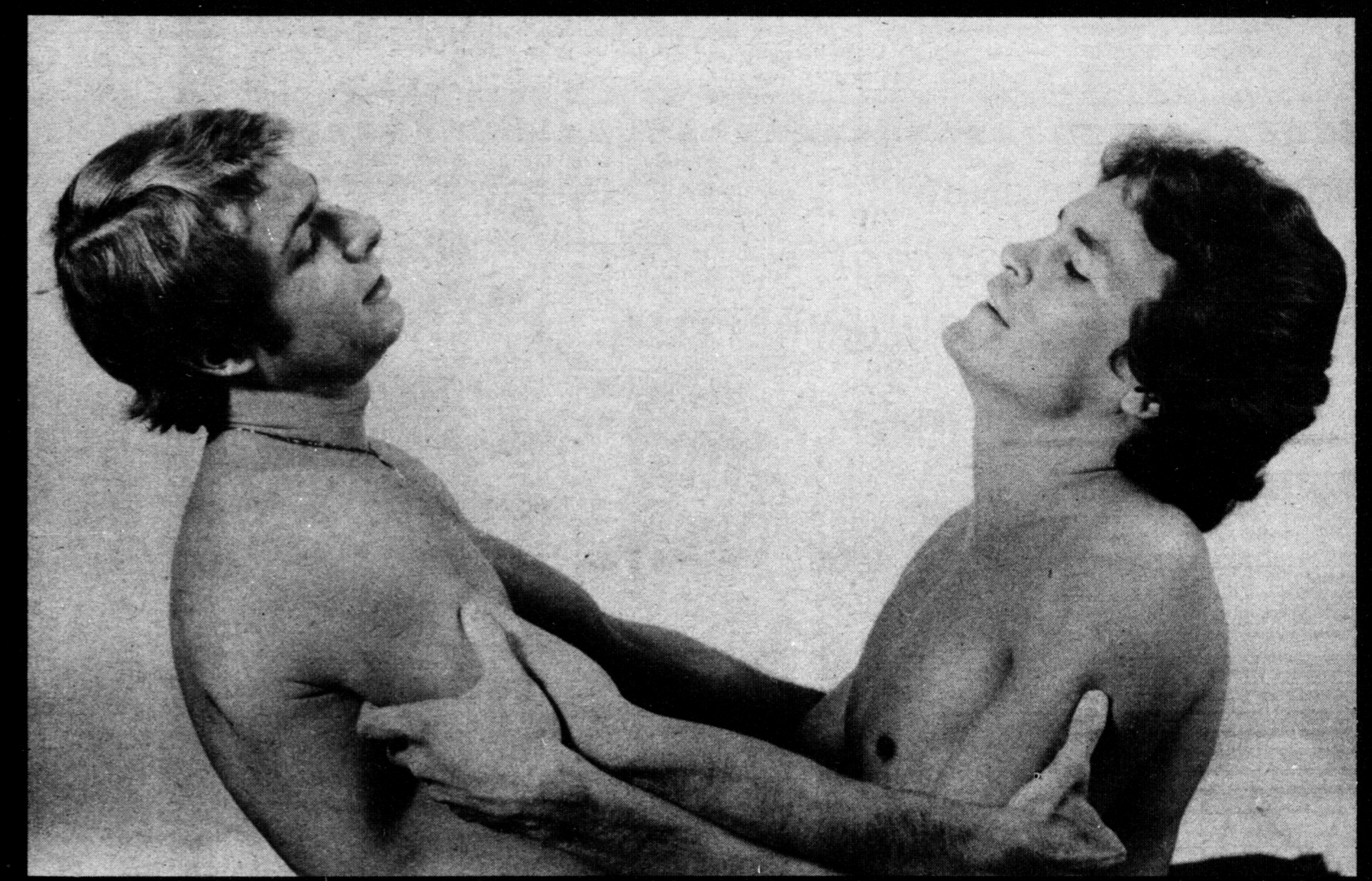

## Goodstein's Machine Unveiled

David B. Goodstein's political machine has been unveiled in a series of exposes in various publications around the nation, as gay leaders are awakening to find their freedom of speech and press in danger and as well, their access to their elected officials is in dire straits.

Goodstein, who called for an exclusive conference in Chicago in March, in which the "gay spoilers" would be dealt with, such as keeping them away from the press, the news media and most of all, away from legislators. To date, over ninety letters have been received at B.A.R. protesting the blatant attempt of David B. Goodstein to take over the gay liberation civil rights movement in America.

Scheduled to keynote the conference was Gary Aldridge of U.S. Senator Alan Cranston's office in Washington. But, Cranston's office told B.A.R. that never had the Senator authorized Aldridge to speak at such a conference, and Aldridge himself told B.A.R. that it had been mentioned to him, but that he had never agreed to speak at the conference.

Goodstein's dream machine exists fairly well in San Francisco in the person of Jim Foster who founded the Alice B. Toklas Democratic Club; the Golden Gate Business Association; the Whitman Radcliffe Foundation, headed by former Roman Catholic priest

Tom Fry, and numerous other individuals, the principle ones aside from Jim Foster are: Ms. Jo Daly, Doug DeYoung and George Raya to name but a few.

When B.A.R. first learned of the Goodstein machine power play, the editor of this paper wrote a guest editorial in Data Boy.

B.A.R. has consistently fought for freedom for all peoples, according to B.A.R. publisher/editor Bob Ross, and he condemned harshly the actions of the David Goodstein machine.

Other local activists expressed outrage at the Goodstein power play, some going so far as to threatening to picket the Whitman-Radcliffe Foundation offices here.

The G.L.A. (Gay Liberation Alliance), headed by Rev. Raymond Broshears, issued numerous letters to elected officials along with the Goodstein letter, and at last count, had sent them out to 110 legislators and news media personalities in the State.

The G.L.A. has planned for actions directly at the Advocate offices in San Mateo, as soon as logistics can be worked out.

In Northern California, gay activist Morris Kight of the Stonewall Club, has let it be known that he is planning to take action in the matter. The California Democratic Council State Convention is in Los Angeles on Feb. 27 thru 29 and there, Broshears told B.A.R., "we expect to clash with Goodstein and his lackeys, head on, letting the chips fall where they may, as they don't have the numbers in the CDC any longer, and

we are prepared to be arrested if necessary in order to show the CDC what a reactionary monster has grown up in their midsts."

## D.A. Cracks Down

San Francisco District Attorney Joseph Freitas Jr. today filed criminal charges against a contractor for failing to make health and welfare payments on behalf of his employees as required by law.

The action is part of an effort by District Attorney Freitas' new white collar crime unit, to protect consumers, wage earners, and taxpayers from unfair business practices, and it is probably the first use, in this city, of the Labor Code provision which permits criminal action by the District Attorney on behalf of wage earners whose employees fail to maintain health and welfare and other fringe benefit payments.

Mr. Ronald C. Reagan, of McChesney-Reagan Construction Co., Inc., is charged with a reported failure to make the required contributions to the Bay Area Painter Trust Funds. Union representatives came to District Attorney Freitas with the complaint, when one of the local union members reported cancellation of medical benefits and all health insurance for his entire family. If found guilty, Mr. Reagan could receive a maximum sentence of five years in the State Prison plus a fine of \$1,000.

Investigation of the matter has been conducted in cooperation with

James Quillin, California Labor Commissioner, of the Department of Industrial Relations, and with the California Contractors State License Board.

The D.A.'s office also announced that it has successfully moved to double the amount owed by the Marina Health Spa to the City and County of San Francisco. The Consumer Protection Unit of the District Attorney's Office moved to order an assessment of \$107,000.00 due immediately.

Upon the motion of the DA's Office, Judge Albert Axelrod ordered the \$107,000.00 due immediately because the Spa failed to pay an installment penalty as previously ordered. The motion by the District Attorney's Office followed a protracted legal battle which had gone on for 1 1/2 years.

Last year, in a month-long trial, the District Attorney's Office successfully prosecuted and proved that the Spa had engaged in false and misleading advertising and illegal collection practices. At the trial it was proved that the Spa advertised facilities which it did not have and that the Spa was intimidating and harassing people to compel them to make payments on unlawful contracts. The Spa conducted its payment collection through a phony billing agent, the American Charge System, which it represented to be a huge collection agency which could seriously damage a person's credit rating.

After Judge Albert Axelrod ordered the Spa to pay the entire

amount owing, Freitas observed, "It is ironic that the Spa, which was so concerned that its customers paid their bills on time, would not pay its own bill owed to the City and County."

## Open Budget Meeting at SF Public Health

A series of five public meetings on the budget of the San Francisco Department of Public Health was announced today by the Director of Public Health, Dr. Francis J. Curry. "This opportunity for the public to participate in the budget process, suggested by Mayor George Moscone, will take place at each of the five District Health Centers of the Department on five different evenings, beginning Feb. 17," Dr. Curry stated. All meetings start at 7:00 PM and residents may want to attend the meeting at the Health Center nearest their home.

Market & Sanchez; Wed., Feb. 25 - Health Ctr. #3, 1525 Silver Ave., nr. San Bruno; Tues., March 2 - Health Ctr. #4, 1490 Mason, at Broadway.

Dr. Curry indicated that he and his administrative staff would be present to explain the budget request for the next fiscal year (1976-77) and to answer questions and receive suggestions from the public. "The Department would like the help of San Franciscans in evaluating health services and determining priorities," Dr. Curry said. "All are welcome."

Written and produced by Dr. Mark Freedman, the film was directed by Edd Dundas at Cinematherapy, Inc., studios in San Francisco.

Dundas, who has made more than 35 films, considers this to be one of his best.

*Nick and Jon*, follows the development of a relationship between two men who meet by chance at a casual dinner party. Their friendship leading to sexual intimacy is beautifully portrayed.

The quality of the color and sound work is exceptional.

Tickets will be available throughout the community and at the door. The \$3 donation will be tax deductible. All the proceeds will be used to fund the many continuous services of The Pride Foundation. These include the National Colation to Defend Gays in the Military and the current suits in State and Federal Courts fighting for gay rights.

The Rising Son is a collective of gay men who plan to open a non-profit community coffeehouse and cultural in the Castro area. At present it is a coffeehouse without a house. The benefits at the Blue Dolphin will help raise funds for the collective's own facility. Doors open at 8 pm and a \$1.00 donation will be asked.

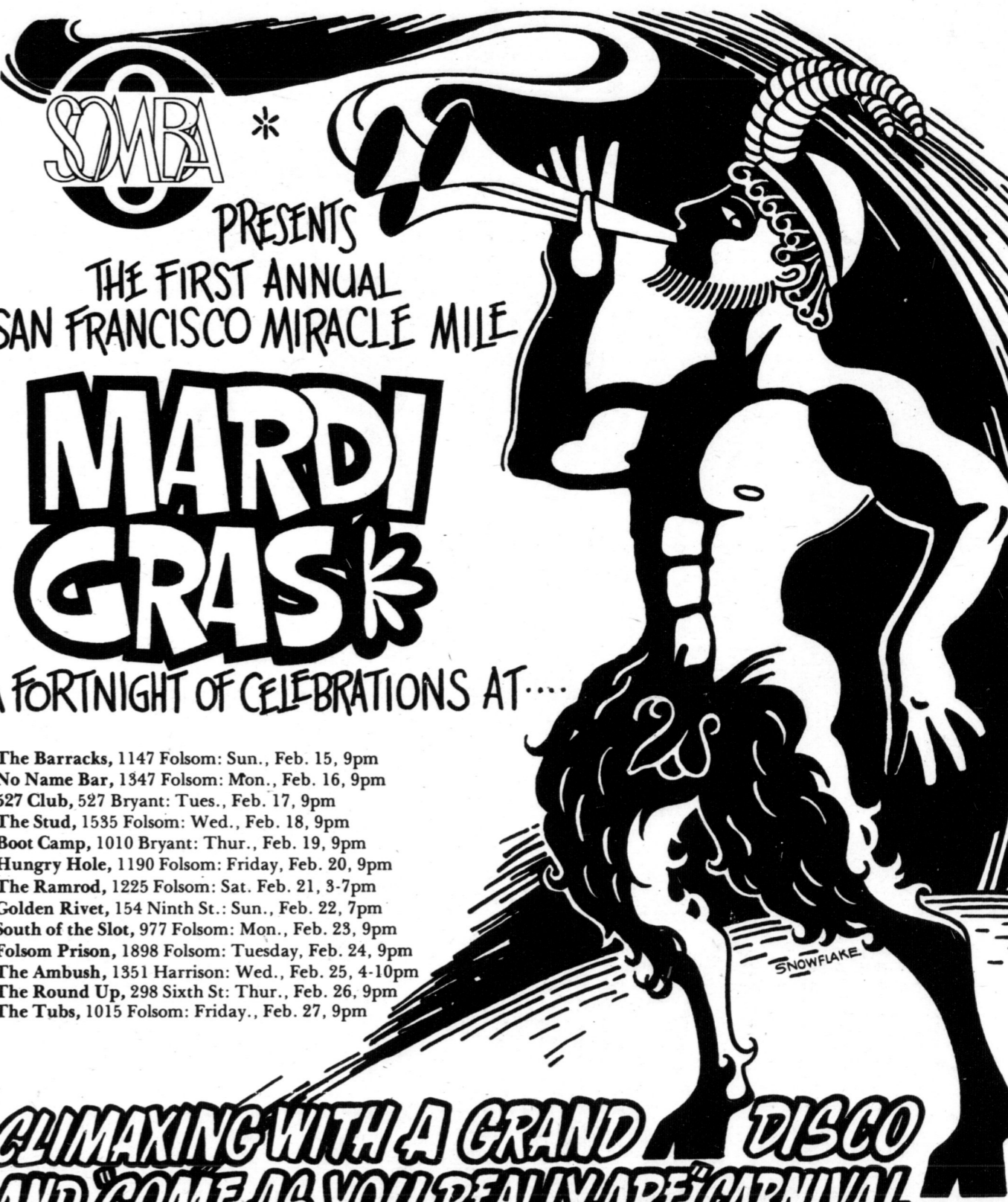

## 444 Productions

Richard Marell and Irwin Goldman, producers of 444 Productions, have just opened the first professional, continuing company in the world which is slanted to gay theatre. An former nightclub, once known as Ann's 440 and more recently as the Club Chi-Chi, offering girlie shows, San Francisco's newest theatre is located at 444 Broadway in what has become the city's leading theatrical block with three legitimate productions running simul-

aneously: *Rusty*, *Bullshot Drummond* and *Evolution of the Blues* (soon to be replaced with *Let My People Come*.)

Ninety of the 136 seats are arranged in sets of two chairs per small table, with drinks being served before and after the shows as well as during the intermissions. Equity rules prohibit the serving of drinks while the performance is on. Prices are surprisingly reasonable for that area with bottle beer at \$1.00 and well drinks \$1.25.

The opening show, *Rusty*, an original erotic romance by Douglas Dean, author of last summer's very successful *Special Friends*, stars Jack Wrangler and Michael Kearns (*The Happy Hustler*), with Dean Goodman directing. Others in the cast are Goodman, Robert Cowell, Kenna Hunt and Mark McIntire (JFK in *Adam King*.)

*Rusty* deals with a college student who has leukemia, his relationship with an older professor and his deep love for a young man his own age. On a deeper level, the play takes up the problems of physical vs. emotional love, as well as the commitments due differing forms of friendship. Nudity is an integral part of the production.

Future plans call for a revival of *Special Friends* and original scripts are being sought for later productions, with the eventuality of having three or four shows playing in repertory.

(In our last issue we printed a story about Barbara Arms who was dismissed from teaching at Heliotrope because she taught at Lavender U and because she was a Lesbian. ## Pellet Gun Attack On Castro 3 Arrested

Floyd Market, 19, and two juveniles, both 17, have been arrested as suspects in a pellet gun and "marble machine" attack on Castro St., near 18th. The 10 pm incident on Friday, Feb. 13, was seen by five witnesses who are cooperating with the police.

Police Inspector Harry Miller told B.A.R. that all the suspects have confessed on tape and one has admitted being part of a similar attack on February 10 at Noe and 14th.

The two victims in the February 13 attacks received medical treatment. One had a pellet removed from his arm and the other had a marble removed from his back.

The attack was from a moving automobile, which continued to cruise the area and was finally halted at 400 Castro. Witnesses had chased the car. Police say that they may be able to link the Feb. 10 and 13th incidents by a lab study of the pellets.

Inspector Miller said that there have been several pellet and marble attacks on businesses in the Castro area, resulting in some broken windows. He is hopeful that these arrests will end the problem.

The Gay Safe Streets Committee is investigating this incident and may encourage the victims to file civil actions against their attackers.

## Cheers Greet Moscone at Gay Religion Banquet

"If all you do is get elected, or get appointed or get a measure of decency down the line, because you find that you have political strength — that ought not to be enough for you," Mayor George Moscone told 200 banquet guests at the annual Council on Religion and the Homosexual banquet on Feb. 16. The cheering crowd heard the mayor call for gay people to go "beyond the simple level of achievement — to open new vistas." He said that he would only be satisfied that if after four "or hopefully eight" years of service as mayor that he could not only change

the face of San Francisco but "change the soul of San Francisco and with its extraordinary international authority — become a catalyst for conversion for the rest of this country, if not the world."

Mayor Moscone apologized for not being able to "break bread with you" as he was watching his sons play basketball in a tournament. He said, "They have waited some time for me" in reference to his hectic schedule. The crowd gave sympathetic applause and was later moved by the mayor's tribute to Gary Hess, a Santa Barbara gay activist who is both a father and member of the local Board of Education. Hess testified at the State Senate hearings on consensual sex legislation and Moscone said he and other gay people were most effective in Sacramento.

Jews, Christians, Buddhists, agnostics, atheists and others sat united as CRH Executive Director, Rev. Chuck Larsen, presided. KPIX-TV cameras and KCBS-radio recorded the Moscone address. The mayor expressed his pride that he had dismissed commissions and boards and appointed people "from all walks of life — particularly those who have been ignored." He said he wanted to make a place in government for many in "our diverse culture, in this — even people in Los Angeles recognize — the greatest of all American cities."

In reference to his liberal attitude toward minorities — including gay people — the mayor said that this attitude can not be mechanical. "It just flows. It flows because it is the right thing to do. What happens, the world rejoices... It is doing the right thing because it is the right thing to do, because it is the only understanding thing to do. There can be nothing mechanical about fair play, about Christianity."

The mayor did not point with pride to his appointment of gay activist Harvey Milk to the Board of Permit Appeals. Milk sat directly in front of Moscone but the mayor, who has expressed his displeasure at Milk's intent to run for the Assembly, did not recognize Milk or even vaguely refer to his Board position.

## Valentine's Day Massacre in S.F.

With nearly 75 persons looking on, the death of the four year old gay social service organization, Helping Hands Community Services & Center, was

announced from the stage of the S.I.R. Center during the Sweetheart Ball, which was to be the "saving" fund raiser for the Helping Hands.

The audience, which was 350 people short of the expected amount, had been dancing and listening to the most enjoyable music and talents of Conan, a group of young bi-sexual musicians from Sacramento that Helping Hands staffers discovered a year ago and have helped promote their career, as Helping Hands has helped tens of thousands of people and helped them to a better life during its four years of existence.

F.E. Mitchell and Bill Caruthers of Survival House, another gay social service agency, which is in dire need, and is on the verge of collapsing, both agreed with Elmer Wilhelm and the director of the now-defunct Helping Hands Center, Rev. Raymond Broshears, that the "blame is on the elite of the so-called gay community," as they seem to prefer to spending tens of thousands of dollars on "title trips", and ignore the real needs of the community, starvation, the needs of those afflicted with emotional disabilities, those who do not meet the criteria to be served by the "gay elitists" Operation Concern, which is for the middle-class. The elitists do not care for the needs of those who do not have proper education, even 6th grade, except to use them as sex objects, but do not care to help *Them Better Themselves* or to learn a skill or trade.

Those afflicted with drug addiction are the most neglected according to the Rev. Broshears, for too many of the "gay elitists" like them that way! For, he claimed, when a person is dependent upon drugs, they will do most anything for money, and there are many, many sickies in the gay community who "use them" to give them money for "services rendered!"

Helping Hands has been the scene of much controversy during its four years, being the founding place of the historical Lavender Panthers, a militant arm of the socially concerned gays. Also, the Stonewall Prison Conference was a highlight of the existence of Helping Hands. The late Popeye Jackson used Helping Hands during the Hears's "People In Need" food program as a downtown distribution spot for the elderly and disabled. And Helping Hands in turn, supplied 31 workers for the PIN program.

Many have said Helping Hands

would have received more support if Rev. Broshears were not running it, but as Bob Ross, publisher of B.A.R., and a Board Member of S.I.R. said, "What most people don't realize that Ray is Helping Hands, and Helping Hands is Ray. He devised the place, he plans all the programs, he runs it virtually 24 hours a day. Without Ray Broshears, there is no Helping Hands, but there will be a Ray Broshears, without Helping hands. So the good done that people like, they like what Ray Broshears is doing, but don't realize it. And that is an honest answer!"

Many gay activists, when they heard the news, were stunned, for the financial straits of Helping Hands was not a widely known fact. Several expressed deepening concern over the survival of the last existing gay social service agency, Golden Gate Gay Liberation House (Survival House) on Haight St. For it too, remained free and clear of political entanglements with the "gay elitists" and serves hundreds daily. F.E. Mitchell and Bill Caruthers both expressed the need for immediate financial assistance. Certain "gay elitists" recently gave untrue testimony to a foundation which was about to give the Survival House a great deal of money. The gays who made the statements against Survival House wanted the funds to go elsewhere.

Now, with Helping Hands closed, Broshears stated that he will go in new directions, spending a good deal more time with church activities, and he would be able to devote more time to the Harry S. Truman Democratic Club, of which he is president. He said that he possibly might try for political office in the near future, and to begin truly "airing some of the gay community's dirty laundry for all the world to see."

Broshears still publishes the local news monthly, the Gay Crusader. A 24-hour Switchboard and Hotline will now be operated by using the same attorney's as before, helping to get people out of jail, etc., with Broshears in charge. The Name, HELPING HANDS HOTLINE will be used!

## VD Gay Project Gives Birth to Gay Health Board

A new Gay Health Board, which will inform the city's Health Department on health needs, will be elected by the

gay community in March. Nominations to the 13-person board may be sent to Steering Committee, 16 Norfolk St., SF, 94103 before March 2. The election will be on March 7, 1-5:30 pm, in the Lurie Room of the Main Library. Nominees will be speaking in the Lurie Room during the election. Any gay person may vote.

An *Ad Hoc* group of 50 met at SIR Center recently to establish a Steering Committee and begin the election process. Mark Freeman, who had been dropped from a recently discontinued Gay Health Project at the city VD clinic, was pleased with the 13-person Board structure. He believes that it will allow "lots of people who have not been heard from before" to speak out. The new Board will have 5 categories: 3 Third World (non-white) males, 3 Third World females, 3 White males, 3 White females and 1 transsexual.

The SIR session was held two days after an invitational gay meeting was held, under the auspices of Health Director Dr. Francis Curry, in the Mission District. Those present did not feel they were representative and decided to take no action after an extensive discussion of some gay health needs — alcoholism, VD, counseling, drug addiction, evening Health hours and a Health Switchboard. Activist Jim Foster chaired the meeting at the request of Dr. Curry.

Freeman is confident that the new Gay Health Board will set up Public Hearings and then evaluate health needs in order to request federal and state funds for implementation. Dr. Curry has promised to give top priority for grant requests, which hopefully will be processed before the start of the new fiscal year in August. It is widely agreed that the plight of recently dismissed VD clinic workers brought considerable attention to the broader health needs of gay people, resulting in the new Board.

## FINDING THE ANSWERS

### Harvey Milk Vs. The Machine

"Harvey Milk and every citizen has a right to present his credentials to the voters. I have an absolute duty to appoint commissioners who would use their time to serve the city...If he runs, he will set the record for the shortest commissioner in history. And I am not talking about his size...A guy can not serve the public and campaign at the same time."

Mayor George Moscone surprised friend and foe with the above statement early this month. Milk is the Castro Street merchant who was recently appointed by the mayor to the city Board of Permit Appeals...the first upfront gay to be appointed by any mayor to a major city commission. In office only 30 days, Milk indicated that he might be running for a vacant seat in the 16th Assembly District. The Moscone response placed Milk in an "underdog fighting the big politicians" role...a role that he obviously enjoys.

The mayor's supporters state that all commissioners agreed to serve four years term. They add that the mayor had told his commissioners that he expected them to serve the city and not to use their positions as stepping stones to higher office. It was felt by many that Milk would serve effectively on the Board for a reasonable period of time and then move on to higher office, probably to the Board of Supervisors. Milk's intent to run for the Assembly was as surprising as Moscone's blunt reaction.

Moscone states that it is Milk's "absolute right" to run, a point emphasized by Quentin Kopp, President of the city's Board of Supervisors. Kopp, who had supported John Barbagelata in the recent mayor's race, seized the opportunity of the Milk-Moscone confrontation to state that an "unholy alliance" exists between Assembly Speaker Leo McCarthy, Congressman Phil Burton and Moscone. This "alliance", he contended, was pushing a "machine-picked" candidate, Art Agnos, and attempting to squeeze Milk out of the race. Although undocumented, it made good Press copy.

Milk was greatly encouraged by the Kopp attack and now talks about the "machine" that dictates who your representatives are." Milk told this reporter, "There is lots of wheeling and dealing and political pay-offs. That is what is wrong with politics. It doesn't have to be like that. There are some politicians that are not like that." He obviously includes himself in the later category and adds, "It is not whether they have been good to the gay community or to people, it is, are they faithful to democracy? Are they better than this system? I don't think anybody — even Harvey Milk — is better than this system. I will fight for freedom of speech and for democracy."

How democracy works was illustrated by a telephone call that ed his intent to run. Milk says that McCarthy is part of the "machine" of Bay Area legislators and he made "courtesy call" to McCarthy, whom he had met once before. He said he had asked for the support of several legislators and Foran in the future (1977) supervisorial race. He said that if he got that kind of support he "wouldn't have to think

about anything else." The implication was clear — that if the "machine" supported him at a later date, he would be able to see his way to not run for the Assembly seat. Milk says he got no assurance from any of them that they would support him in the future.

Milk says he told McCarthy on the telephone that "the road to my being a Supervisor was being blocked and that if there was a crowded field (in the Assembly race) that I would have a better chance of winning there. I him to let him know. It was a courtesy call. Leo and I have gotten along well in the past...Those that I called may have felt that if I got enough support in the supervisorial race that I might not have to run for the Assembly. They can think what they want to think."

Speaker McCarthy told this reporter that Milk had called him with "probing comments" but that "I am not going to draw inference from it. You can draw your own." He said that Milk explained that, "he was taking out papers for the 16th Assembly District — but that his real preference was to be on the Board of Supervisors. He did not specifically ask me to do anything...I did not react because I personally sensed what the conversation was about. I try to be fair as I can with people...he went on and then I told him that I didn't know what to say. I told him, 'You have a right to run for the Assembly if you want to.' Of course, he knew of Art's relationship with me. I told him that I didn't know what I could do as far as the Board of Supervisors was concerned. He did not ask me to support him if he ran for Supervisor nor did he ask me to try to get the mayor to appoint him later to the Board — and I didn't offer anything."

McCarthy added that his aide Agnos, was "unfortunately being put down in all of this cross-fire with Quentin Kopp. Art has an excellent record and I hope people are not being prejudiced by all of this. Kopp supported barbagelata and he saw this opportunity to put Moscone down. Kopp doesn't like me or Burton and he sees this as a prize occasion to make himself a hero through using Harvey Milk...It is ironic that I should be aligned with Phil Burton because we have been mortal enemies on at least a dozen occasions over the years and George and I ran against each other 10 years ago. To describe us as a kind of 'political machine' is humorous."

There is the possibility that the entire Milk vs. Agnos race could have been avoided if the "ins" had consulted with Harvey Milk in advance. Milk says, "You would think that they would have said, 'You know, Harvey represents a certain segment. We ought to talk with him and see where his head is.' Instead, Milk concludes, "they thought that Foster (Jim Foster, gay politico) and Goodstein (David Goodstein,

Advocate publisher) were more important...They didn't inform me what they were doing. That is their problem. I had been asked to be kept informed, to prevent something like this from happening. They never told me...All they had to do was pick up the phone and explain the situation to me. Instead, they did it behind my back."

Milk had written to Moscone, requesting a meeting to discuss the issue. The mayor has recognized that he received the letter but has not responded. Milk says, "I would like to sit down with him and say, 'George, what did you say to the Press?' Maybe he was misquoted. Maybe it was taken out of context. I want to ask him what he meant." Moscone has since repeated that Milk's position on the Board of Permit Appeals is in question but that he will wait to see if Milk files on March 12.

Milk is clearly the most well known candidate in the race for Assembly. His image is also impressive — conservative small businessman, gay activist — with the implied implication that he is for all minority rights, and now an "underdog fighting the big political machine." He has run twice for the Board of Supervisors and made impressive showings with a minimum expense. Milk is aggressive, articulate and highly independent. He is quick to point to the 16th Assembly District chart in his business and explain at length how well he did there in the last election. Money could be raised for a campaign, he believes, and he is already accepting checks for that purpose. He believes that he can "do it" on \$15,000 but is aware that Agnos, with broad political support, could raise considerable more.

The 16th Assembly District is possibly the most interesting area in the state. It is an unusual combination of Blacks, Gays, Latinos, Italians, Chinese — you name it — plus a conservative element. The area includes South of Market, Hunters Point-Bayview, North Beach, Tenderloin, Castro, Noe Valley, Potrero Hill, Twin Peaks, and the Mission. In each of these areas there has been a continuing conflict between conservative and liberal factions.

Who is Art Agnos? He is virtually an unknown person to the general public — few know his face or his name. What he will have going for him is considerable support from neighborhood activists and leaders — including some gay community leadership...In his seven years in Sacramento as an aide to Leo McCarthy he has been "the man" to contact for legislative changes and financial grants to community projects. He knows all Assembly members on a first-name basis and is an expert on state and federal funding. Many people are indebted to Agnos, who has helped the poor and the disenfranchised for several years.

Milk is aware of the Agnos strength

and responds that, "They buy the minority communities to get their support. That is what politics has been and it is the tragedy of politics." Milk may be right but many gay activists who have walked the halls in Sacramento know how Agnos has helped with legislation. Others point to Agnos' assistance on getting gay employment counseling and gay alcoholic aid through the Whitman-Radcliffe Foundation.

Agnos is confident. He says that Milk is a novice who gets excited because his name is now in the newspapers. He says, "Quentin Kopp has seduced him for his own political needs. Kopp is using Milk in a patronizing way — as a political link to the gay community." He says that there is no "machine" but, "I know these people. Isn't it great that I will be able to walk into the mayor's office or our Congressman's office or the Assembly Speaker's office and get things done for you, like I have for the past 7 years? Or do you want someone who doesn't know these people, is feuding with these people, who can't work with them?"

"This whole thing," Agnos claims, "has been blown up because Harvey has been blown up. He is a nice guy but he is now coming on like a conniving politician. He should have to put in some time as a public servant on the Board of Permit Appeals. Instead, he announced that he is seeking higher office. He appears now to be a political opportunist." Agnos' anger and concern is justified because it will take more effort and money to defeat Harvey Milk than it will the third announced candidate, former football star Bob St. Clair.

Within the gay community, Milk is hopeful that there will be a spirit of "electing one of our own" — no matter what the "leadership" wants. There is some feeling that Milk can "do it" because he is an amazing 18-hour-a-day campaigner, 7 days a week. Whether he is or is not favored by Bay Area legislators, some gay people would like to see an elected gay person in Sacramento. How strong this feeling is can not be determined. Milk's earlier campaigns did not rally hundreds of workers from the gay community behind him.

Has Milk enjoyed politics and has it helped him financially or otherwise? In an interview in his Castro shop, he said, "No. But it is needed. It does not have to be Harvey Milk. I kind-of fill a vacuum. I saw the need and heard a good reaction. I keep battling...Do I enjoy it? No. It has destroyed my personal life — from sex to entertainment. It has been a tremendous financial handicap to my business. (he took \$2,500 from his business to help finance his last campaign)...I am the kind of guy who likes to go to movies, theatres, dinners — all of that. If I go out to relax in a bar, people stop me to talk about thus-or-that...I do not enjoy it all, but it is desperately needed. It has to be done — so I will do it, with every ounce of energy that I have. There are some politicians who enjoy it...I wish others would pick up the ball but they are not."

"My business suffers because I should be spending time promoting it and working for it more. I take money from the store to help with my campaigns and that hurts the business...I only get \$15 a week for being on the Board of Permit Appeals, which amounts to about \$3 an hour. I do not ask for Expenses because I want to be clean — Super Clean. It would disturb

me to learn that the first upfront Gay, like let's say a judge or something, was on the take. We have to be like Jackie Robinson when he was the first Black in baseball. I wouldn't even take the offer of a free massage although I recently spoke up for the rights of a massage parlor owner."

When he was asked, "Well, hasn't the so-called 'political machine' worked well lately for gay people?" Milk said that it was the "machine" politicians who "set up Agnos to run. They preamed him, picked him for it. They locked it all up ahead for him. That is what they are trying to do...No, the machine hasn't worked well for us. The Willie Brown bill was not sufficient; it was a step. Foran's bill on employment rights could have passed. Do you mean to tell me that the Speaker of the Assembly and the Chairman of the Ways and Means Committee can not get anything they want passed through the Assembly? They can — but they have to pay the price for it. They do not want to pay that price for gay rights — to end discrimination of gay persons. They are not willing to pull all of the strings. They aren't willing to go all the way."

Several well known gay activists have privately said that they will be supporting Art Agnos, because of his efforts in Sacramento. How does Milk react to this?... "Gay people have gotten favors from the machine because they have gotten pay-offs, in one form or another — aid, funds, whatever. While I certainly appreciate whatever help the gay community gets, I think that loyalty has to be based on democracy and not political pay-offs. If they want to go with the man who can buy them — then fine. Prostitution exists and will continue to exist...Maybe they are buying off leaders in all the communities so that when the time comes to announce, there will be all those debts. Everyone is then supporting him, not knowing that he was bought with public money...Do we have to kiss their hem? They are just getting a tiny bit of what they owe us."

You don't dictate to us by going to four or five so-called 'gay leaders' and making a deal. These 'leaders' can't deliver. They are not going to deliver the votes of the people in the streets. The people have minds of their own...They want to use the names of these 'gay leaders' in their literature. You would think that if they were going to do that, they would have come and talked with me — a long time ago."

## FINDING THE ANSWERS

District Attorney Joe Freitas has agreed not to dismiss charges in assault cases without first contacting the victim. He has further agreed that if the victim opposes such action that he will be instructed that he may contact the Castro area Safe Streets Committee or a similar source for assistance. He also has agreed to furnish, on the request of the victim, to furnish him with the names, dates of birth, and addresses of the attackers so that he may file a civil action against them... We can credit the Safe Streets Committee.

Freitas and his assistant, John Dwyer, met with representatives of the Safe Streets Committee — Attorney Dick Gayer, Chris Perry and Hank Wilson in the D.A.'s office. This reporter went along to observe. Freitas and Dwyer showed a willingness to cooperate with the gay citizens which is helping victims of street attacks in the Castro area... Earlier, Gayer and others had met with Police Chief Charles Gain and the Mission District police captain — successfully, obtaining cooperation in obtaining information about victims and assailants in the Castro area. Mission station is cooperating in this effort, on orders from the Chief.

Freitas has not been able to comply with other requests from the Streets group. They had asked that probation for assailants include "restitution" money for the victim... The D.A. said this would require a change in state law. It was also requested that the victim be kept informed at all times as to what is going on, even if his presence in court is not required... Freitas said this would be impossible because he has only 12 attorneys handling thousands of cases. The committee asked that the D.A. prosecute cases, even if the police recommended against it, when the victim and witness urged prosecution. Freitas replied that police recommendation was not the only determining factor in dismissals.

In the open discussion, a particular case was discussed in which the Streets Committee felt that the available witnesses had not been contacted before a hearing. Freitas agreed to look into the matter... There was also a discussion of whether the D.A. could prosecute an assault case where there were witnesses but a victim who was mentally ill. Freitas said that the reason that a victim was not available would be a consideration. The D.A. added that he would respect the right of a gay

victim not to testify or cooperate if he (the victim) was convinced that his homosexuality being exposed would damage his career. He specifically mentioned teachers, who are confronted with this problem.

Freitas told the committee that he was very concerned about the way street crimes were being prosecuted and that a special felony detail checked on all such prosecutions. He thanked the Streets Committee for its concern and for pointing out possible mistakes in his department's procedures. Freitas said that he wished that he had the personnel to "treat every assault case like a homicide" but that he was greatly understaffed. He was interested in whether the gay community would support him in his budget requests next July.

Dwyer eagerly participated in the discussion and told the committee that he would urge assistance at the beginning of a specific assault case, rather than criticism later. He asked that Gayer and friends contact him directly with information. One of the problems, Freitas emphasized, is incomplete police reports.

Hank Wilson called the attention to a specific case where he knew of police brutality. He said that victims of such attacks do not have trust in the Internal Affairs division of the police department, that the police-investigating-the-police was considered by many to be a waste of time. Freitas announced that his department is now, in cooperation with Chief Gain, independently investigating such charges.

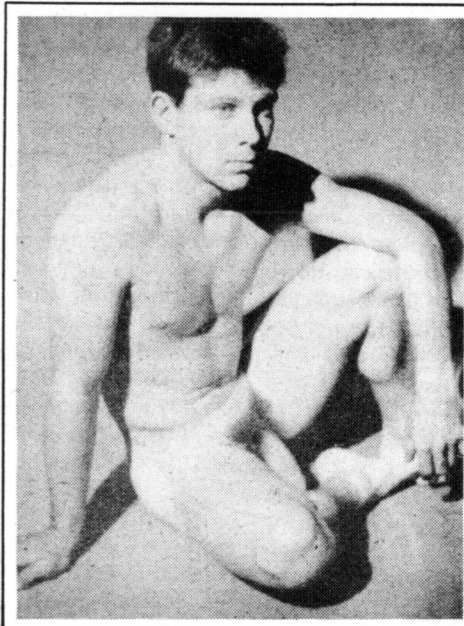
Freitas evidently means business with the independent investigating of alleged police misconduct. He has filed felony forced-sex charges against two officers who are alleged to have participated in an act on a 23-year old woman. The woman was involved in a drive-in restaurant argument. When police arrived, they told the woman to leave the scene. Her car got stuck in the mud and one officer "assisted her" by it-is-alleged forcing her into an act of oral copulation, with full knowledge of the second officer. The officers deny the findings in the D.A. investigation.

We watched Chief Gain on a KTVU-TV call-in program. As we reported in the last B.A.R., Gain said he would repeat publicly what he said at a private gay cocktail party about hiring gay cops — if and when he was asked. Well, someone asked and he said it again... "As far as hiring Gays in the

police department goes, of course, we will hire Gays. I have stated this elsewhere — as I will here, emphatically — that the police department should be reflective of the community. So when it comes to Blacks, Latinos, Gays, Women and White persons — we should be reflective. The easiest thing to do is to set per-centage goals, to hire that per-cent of minority group-persons into the police department that we find in the general population. Certainly, we will hire gay persons."

Freitas commented, in answer to a question, that he saw nothing wrong with gay people showing affection for one another in public, but that this did not include public sex acts, prohibited by law... We were pleased to hear Gain say that he was cracking down on drunk officers on duty. We know of one South of Market bar where the drinking officers used to out-number the other patrons. Respect is earned and this move by Gain is a good step in that direction.

## From The Office Of John Foran

Assembly Constitutional Amendment 2, by Assemblyman John F. Foran (D - S.F.) passed the Assembly and is on its way to the Senate.

ACA2 re-writes Article 26 of the California Constitution. Foran's Constitutional Amendment broadens the application of user tax revenue (gas tax) to include: 1 - the control of environmental pollution caused by motor vehicles; 2 - public transit systems, excluding operating cost; 3 - the payment of principal and interest on revenue bonds issued for these or for highway purposes.

The State now collects close to \$1.2 billion annually in highway user taxes.

If approved by the Senate, Foran's amendment will be placed on the November 1976 ballot for voter approval.

### Citizen Goodstein

It's been a while since NewsWest paid attention to the Advocate or its publisher, David Goodstein. For one thing, we've got troubles of our own. For another, we didn't think the running controversy over Goodstein's ideology was of much interest to our readers.

We didn't even get excited when a group of the Advocate's best correspondents practically forced Goodstein to print their angry answer to his New Year's editorial attacking gay movement "militants." It was an old, old song for Goodstein. In fact, he's been singing it for so long, he hasn't even noticed that some of those "militants" are working in The System—or trying to, at least.

Now, however, the autocratic San Mateo millionaire has gone too far. He has cooked up a dangerously vicious plan, which, if successful, would silence any gay person whose ideas differ from his own. Goodstein has proposed a "1976 Advocate Invitational Conference" to launch a federal gay rights lobbying campaign. An office would be set up in Washington, funds would be raised and so forth. As the saying goes, "That's cool."

However, readers of our story on the proposed conference elsewhere in this issue must have been stunned by the palpable maliciousness of Goodstein's intent. Under his agenda topic, "Dealing With Gay Spoilers," Goodstein asks the carefully chosen delegates to agree on methods of "keeping them off broadcast media and out of print media" and "keeping them away from legislators or at least neutralizing them."

It's bad enough that Goodstein's festering resentment against such movement activists as Morris Kight has driven him to the point at which he would try to manipulate the media against them, and get other gays to join him in the effort.

But we are appalled that such a scheme was hatched by the publisher of a news journal. Surely, the man knows what would happen to Freedom of the Press if a proportionately evil effort against inquiry were waged by the Establishment—to say nothing of what could be done to crush the gay liberation movement and its leaders, including David Goodstein. What gives him the notion that he alone would be spared from the beast which he proposes to unleash?

We think it's time that something be done to stop him. He has abandoned rational persuasion as a means of gaining influence in the movement. He's not interested in discussion. He fancies himself a capitalist—yet he wants to create a deadly exception in the market of ideas. Goodstein has the answers. Why should he compete? Needless to say, NewsWest didn't get invited to the conference. Even if we had, it wouldn't have flattered us into mental Silly Putty. We asked a few of the "chosen" what they thought of Goodstein's plan. Believe it or not, a few of them saw no danger in it! Indeed, several even seemed to like the idea of "keeping them away from legislators."

What should be done about it? We won't suggest a retaliatory boycott of the Advocate, even if it could check Goodstein's spreading menace, which we doubt.

We do urge our readers to howl like fury against any plan permitting Goodstein and his sycophants to decide who would reach the media or talk to legislators. Telephone the Advocate with your objections. Write a letter to the editor.

At the very least, gays should refuse to support any organization which sends a representative to Goodstein's conference. Californians should let Sen. Alan Cranston know what they think of the fact that his legislative assistant, Gary Aldridge, has agreed to be the keynote speaker.

As originally conceived, NewsWest was going to be a forum for all kinds of gay political activism, whether it be in Goodstein's style or of the so-called "militant" or "radical" variety. There have been times when we saw much merit in Goodstein's actions and opinions. In any case, we said there was room in the movement for his voice, even when it carps and snarls like that of a dyspeptic Nero.

But we can't say he has the right to sit upon the movement like a sultan. If NewsWest let him get away with that, we'd be guilty of a great betrayal.

From now on, we're going to keep a closer watch on the activities of David Goodstein. We're going to follow him into whatever labyrinths his cunning and ambition take him. We can't save Goodstein from himself; we wouldn't even try. We can help to save the movement from him—and we must.

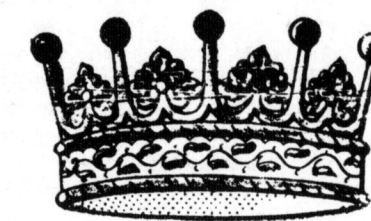


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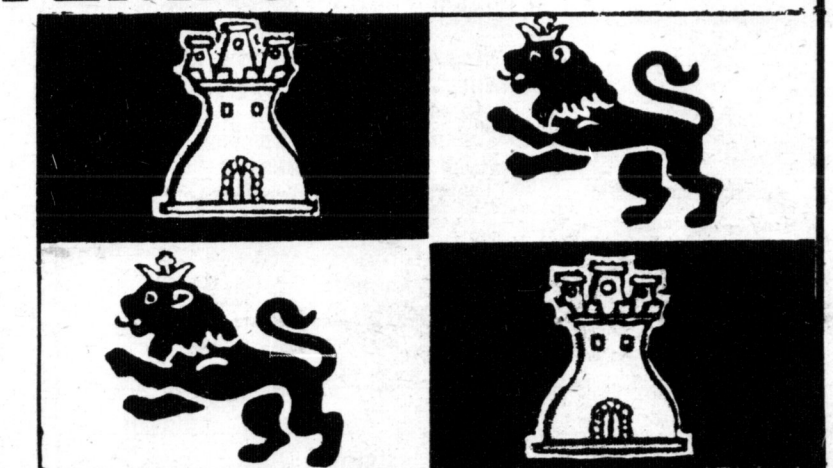

### Opinions Expressed Herein God-Stein's Showdown

"*Ground Rules:* All invitations to the conference will be made by the *Advocate* . . . Access to the meeting will be by name-tag only. No one else will be permitted in the meeting room . . . Any messages for attendees will be kept by one of my staff people . . . There will be no binding votes on matters not on the agenda."

"*Agenda:* (Skipping such items as the Keynote address by Gary Aldridge, Legislative Assistant to Senator Alan Cranston and other items, among them such admirable endeavors as a Gay civil rights lobbying office in Washington, D.C., let us focus on one short item, one which holds the most meaning: in short, the cause for the uproar in the Gay liberation movement.)

"IV. Dealing with Gay Spoilers. A) Keeping them off broadcast media and out of print media — organizing local media committees to educate media about whom to contact. B) Keeping them away from legislators or at least neutralizing them."

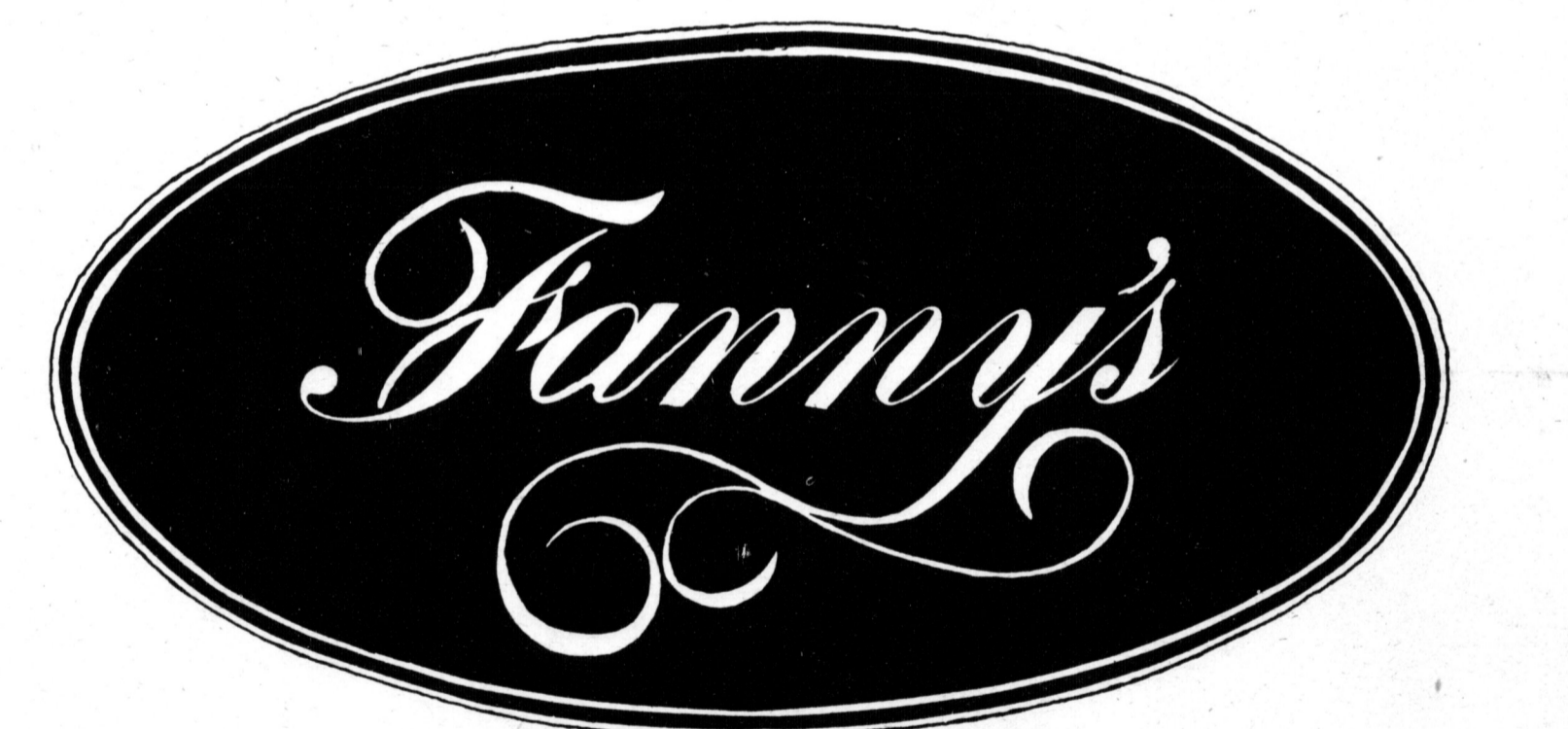

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# Show Biz In Review

## Club: Gotham

After a year's absence, Gotham returned to The City with their excellent vocal harmonies, snappy patter and overall gay zaniness. Gary and Mike have taken over the comedy chores, with scathing audience asides and rapidfire timing. New this trip around is David, handsome, personable and vocally first-rate, but who still seems uncomfortable within the framework of the act. Much of the material was familiar from their last visit — Boswell Sisters, Andrew Sisters takeoff, Patti Page's *Old Cape Cod*, *Holiday for Strings* encore — but their rendition of *Backfield in Motion* was a showstopper, and their inclusion of new material by Melissa Manchester and Louis St. Louis showed off their vocal versatility admirably.

An entire show unto himself is the trio's musical conductor, Ron Abel, whose piano backup is solidly supportive from start to finish. Gotham remains one of the strongest acts working the club circuit today, with a 'gay camp' appeal that entertains without alienating the hip straight following they've acquired as well. It's slick, smooth and professional, only needing now better integration of their newest member into their format (which will undoubtedly come with time).

## Ballet: Romeo and Juliet

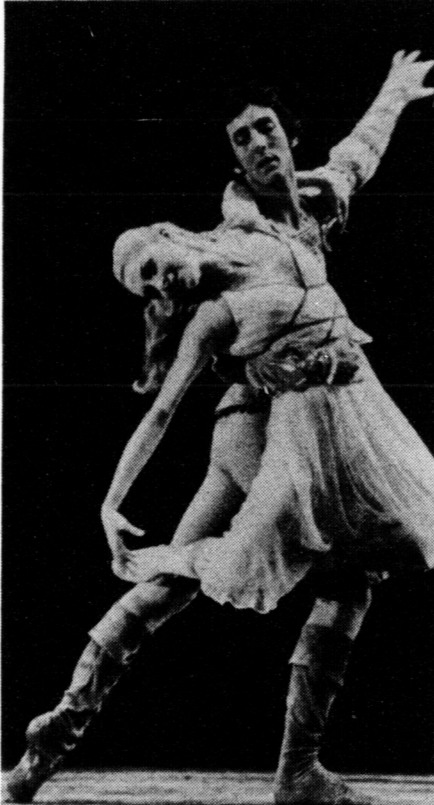
A year ago, we were buying "Save Our Ballet" buttons to keep the San Francisco Ballet from financial ruin. To show their appreciation, director/choreographer Michael Smuin mounted the first three-act ballet for this company, Prokofiev's *Romeo and Juliet*, even minus the full sets desired; the company couldn't have found a nicer way to say thank-you.

Smuin has taken the best of all the other versions thus far choreographed,

eliminated all that didn't work or was stuffy and added several daring and innovative concepts that are distinctly his alone to create the most intelligent and emotionally satisfying production of this classic yet conceived.

Smuin believes that the Montagues were little more than a saucy gang of street toughs, while the Capulets were the more priggish, aristocratic snobs. And when they fought, everybody fought; the women fence just as well as the men and wage battle at the drop of a hemline. No longer are the ladies reduced to decorative milksops. In Smuin's version, Lady Capulet is young, beautiful and lusty, having an

incestuous affair with Tybalt (and when discovered, quickly throws her earring on the floor to conceal their rendezvous, a rich comedic touch). Thus, when Tybalt is killed by Romeo avenging the slaying of Mercurio, it is the dramatic arrival of Lady Capulet that closes the second act; she tears off her regal cap, grinds her body on top of her dead lover and finally writhes in a sexual frenzy upon his funeral bier, hurling curses at Romeo as they are

carried off together. The Opera House audience sat in shock, then came to, in an avalanche of applause at the final revelation of a relationship that makes sense and justifies what has always been an awkward scene.

Lord Capulet also has a flirtation going on with the fair Rosaline, Paris is no longer the insufferable fop but a young suitor that would cause any Juliet to cast a second look at Romeo, Friar Lawrence is mercifully brief (gone that intolerable 15 minute pantomime scene) and there is a stunning effect with Juliet dancing with her own reflection in the mirror. The Smuin touches are evident throughout: if Franco Zeffirelli could choreograph, this production would have been his. And shock of shocks, when Romeo dies, it is not in the artfully draped position next to Juliet's bier; he's halfway across the stage, and Juliet drags him by one arm in her dying moments to the funeral bier with her as a last gesture. It's a modern, exciting concept that pumps new life into an old story.

At the performance I attended, it was sadly pitiful that all this lavish attention was dissipated by the fact that Lynda Meyer and Vane Vest are the dullest dancers to ever bouree across a stage. Miss Meyer is a technically proficient insipid Juliet, but she is a fount of excitement next to Mr. Vest. If he could dance as well as he takes curtain calls, he might have something. Mr. Vest has obviously never heard the words "sharp," "clean" or "precise." His style is muddy, his partnering shaky and his personality nil.

Fortunately, they are surrounded by a rich assortment of talent — Attile Ficzer as Mercutio, Gary Wahl as Tybalt, John McFall in a bravura turn as Benvolio, Betsy Erickson as Rosaline and the undisputed hit of the evening, Anita Paciotti as the lusty Lady Capulet.

Costumes and set pieces by William Pitkin are sensational, but the real star of this production is Michael Smuin. *Romeo and Juliet* should remain in the repertoire for a long time to come, and should definitely be seen by anyone who desires to bask in local pride. The San Francisco Ballet is back . . . and better than ever before!

(One word of warning — Beware the \$2.50 souvenir program on sale in the lobby; it contains the worst ballet photos I have ever tried to squint at.)

## Stage: Equus

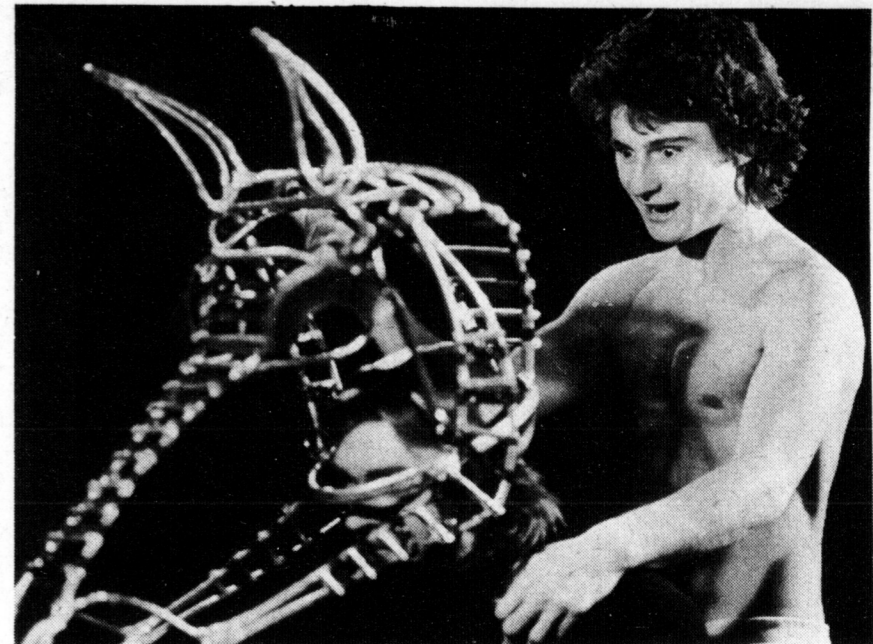
It is high time to shed a little pity upon the poor San Francisco critic. Due to the nature of the theatrical beast in our city, where the mediocre is often applauded and the poor damned with faint praise, we find ourselves waxing rhapsodic over good revivals of second-rate shows, lauding ambitious new efforts that may or may not succeed and searching for new adjectives for competent performances. There is nothing terribly wrong in this, except when once every four or five years something really exceptional comes along, the adjectives have all been used, the praises been sung before for less noble achievements and the fear of redundancy sets in . . . with a vengeance.

Such is the case with *Equus*, now in repertory at the Geary Theatre. *Equus* is a rare, rare experience, a topnotch theatrical evening that should not be missed by any true theatregoer who has smiled bravely through *Camelot* and thrilled to *The Matchmaker* in the hope that maybe someday

somewhere San Francisco theatre will rise above the merely satisfying.

It is not the A.C.T. production that sets this play apart — not the simple set, the basic costumes, the inventive direction or the performances of varying dimension. Peter Shaffer's play can stand on its own as a powerful and gripping piece of theatre, the first play in ages that demands a literate audience willing to work just as hard as the actors, director and author. How much you will enjoy *Equus* depends entirely upon how much you bring into the theatre with you.

Simply, it is the story of a 17 year old boy who blinds savagely fives horses that he loves . . . nay, worships. Why? In a psychiatric hospital, a doctor probes the answer as he questions the boy's middle-class parents and ultimately discovers the truth from the boy himself. There are no easy answers in this multi-layered allegory; what is sanity, must we condemn the worshipper of gods in a society where no gods are left and

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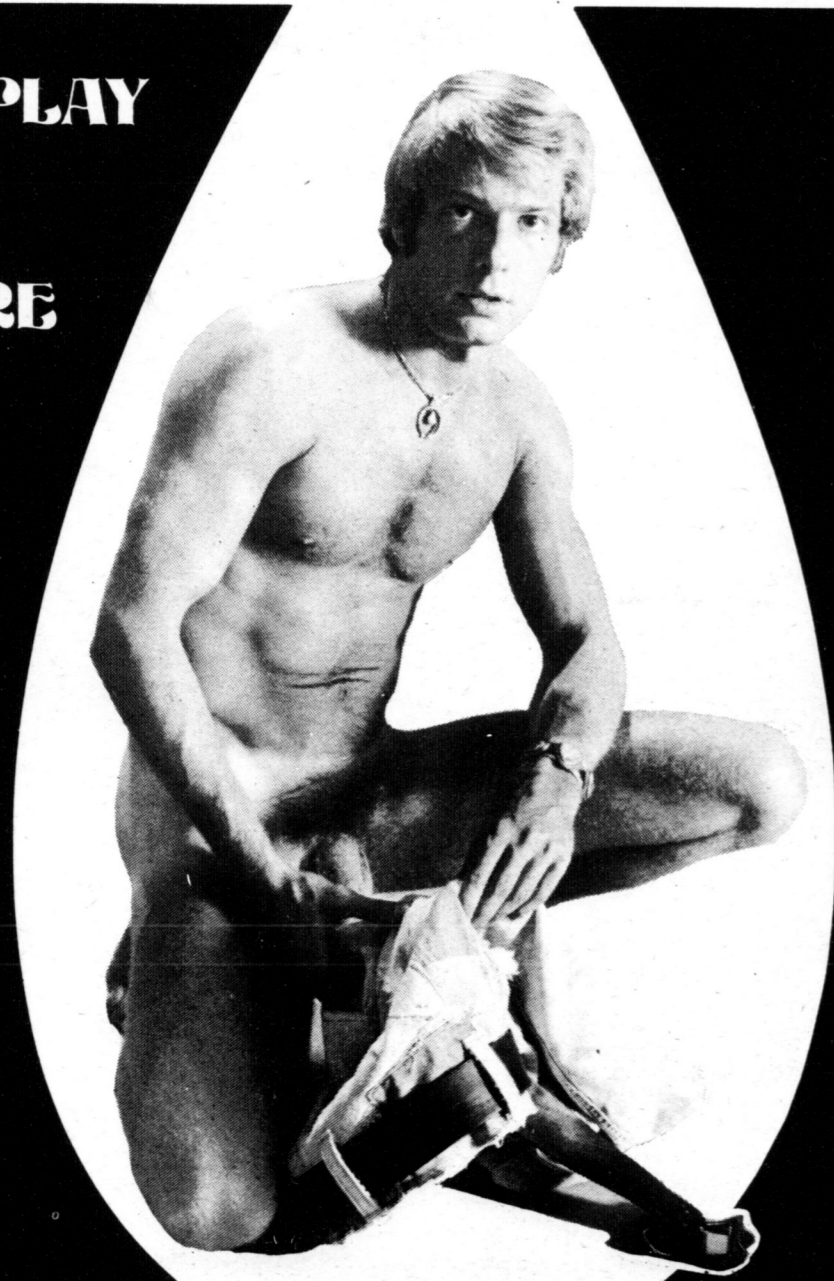
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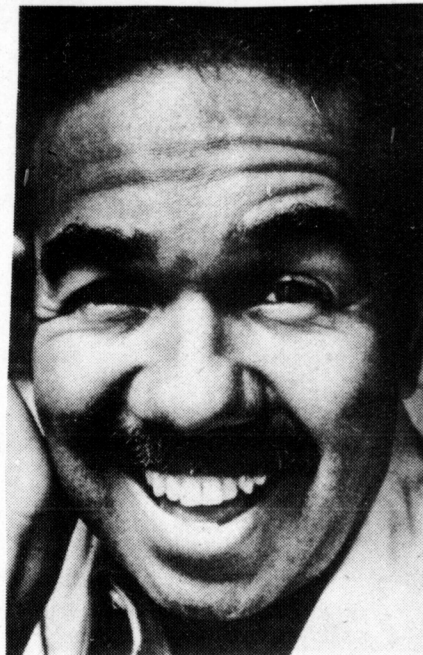

reduce him to "normal," must the individualist be smothered to conformity of the grey mass, is there one ultimate answer good for everybody? A boy who grows up devoid of friends, television and the modern middleclass mentality finds a religious/sexual worship for the nobly independent spirit of horses an exhilarating satisfaction, until he feels rejected by his horses when he forsakes his sexual spiritualism.

Nor does Shaffer cop-out the old plea. A beautiful moment occurs when the quietly religious mother says, "He was loved, he grew up in an atmosphere of love, it is not our fault, he made his own pain!" We are not our parents victims.

Peter Donat returns to A.C.T. to bring a compelling portrayal of the troubled psychiatrist, a man who doubts his own accomplishments and lives within his own anguish. It is one of Donat's most overdrawn performances, devoid of subtlety.

Daniel Zippi plays the boy with

believable fervor, is a slightly shrill edge, and Michael-Keys Hall lends credible dignity and sensuality as the principal horse, Nugget. Megan Cole and Charles Hallahan underplay with quiet conviction the parents, and Fredi Olster acts in a void as the local magistrate. There is a nice turn by Janice Garcia as the young girl who ultimately leads the boy to his destruction unknowingly.

It is William Ball's incisive and restrained direction that brings Shaffer's play into sharp focus. There is a total nude scene between the girl and boy that is both touching and tasteful, but I found it unnecessary to resort to the obvious in a highly stylized play where everything is suggested prior to this one moment. It is a distraction of focus that will doubtless please many playgoers (nor it is Ball's invention; it has always been in the play).

*Equus* is the most exciting theatrical event to hit San Francisco in several seasons. And for a change, I'm understating the case!

## Concert: Bobby Short

The debonaire Bobby Short returned to the Geary Theatre on Sunday afternoon, Feb. 8th. In fine voice, the first half of his show was marred by bad sound, fading spotlight and a lackluster assortment of selections. He pulled it together, however, in the second half of his program, contributing the finest rendition of Sondheim's *Losing My Mind* I have heard, plus a moving *What I Did for Love*, a rousing *Sand in My Shoes* and several Short-identified goodies — *The Tale of the Oyster*, *Her Mother Came Too*, *Just One of Those Things*, *Bojangles of Harlem*. It was not Bobby Short in peak form, but it was solid Short all the way, with the more-than-able assistance of Beverly Peer on bass and Gene Gammage on drums.

## Stage: Us... The Rest of Us

This show currently playing at the Japan Center Theatre (formerly Kabuki) almost defies description. It can best be summed up as a series of sexual vignettes, some in music, some in sketch form. The basic premise of *Us... The Rest of us* is quite simple and quite positive — anybody has the right to feel whatever ass they want!

*Us* is a very positive approach to personal relationships — between gay men, lesbians or heterosexual couples. They all have many problems in common, the immediate attraction to outward beauty (be warned, you shallow superficial beauties, the day of the plain people is coming!), sexual confusion of "love" for "want" and the search for personal security via a partner's insecurity. We are auditioning for the right role in our life; some find it, some never do. And some can never accept their rightful role. The day of the stereotypes is gone, and now each person must make what is right for him/her work for him/her, whatever sexual persuasion.

*Us* offers several strong insights into sexual lifestyles, from the leather boys seeking tenderness through pain, the lesbian who is "not a beer drinking truckdriver" but who finds an alternative lifestyle after being used badly by an immature boyfriend, the old auntie and the young rough trade who demand a losing situation to compensate for guilt, gay love that only succeeds in a transient sexual ambiance when both partners succeed in getting into each other's head and mutually respecting the other's individual needs, and those glittering macho gods that slouch in doorways or illuminate a rock stage, demanding worship of many rather than love of one. Actually, in *Us*, it is the heterosexual lifestyle that is ignored

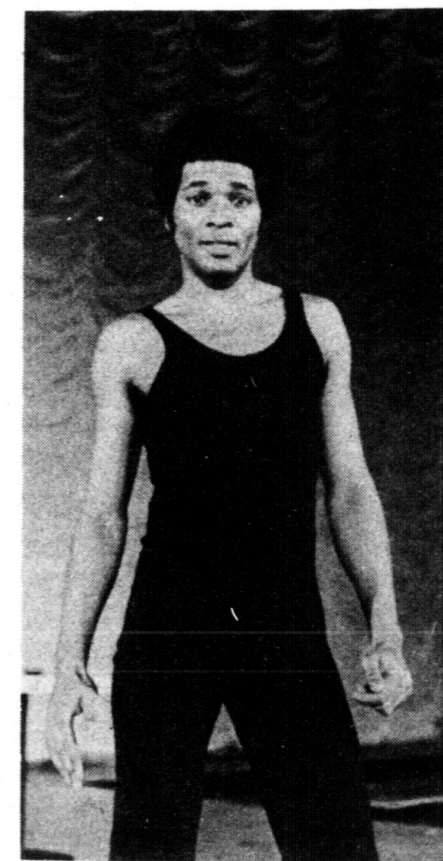

the most and given the shoddiest treatment.

While none of this may come as a great revelation to some, there will doubtless be many who may find a verbalization of something they've only sensed thus far, and certainly anyone gay will see something of himself onstage. It's unfortunate that they can't see it more entertainingly presented.

For all its sharp insight and good intentions, *Us... The Rest of Us* moves at the pace of a dripping faucet, its sketches belabor a point long after the effect is created, the music begins to sound like one continual melody with different lyrics (not especially clever ones at that) and its humor is lowkey, telling and all too infrequent. The show lacks crispness, excitement, pacing and theatricality, settling for a gentle, intelligent reverie that almost becomes somnambulant by its finale.

The talent onstage is excellent, almost without exception. Anna Mathias, direct from *Widow Begbick*, scores the one showstopping moment with her bombastic rendition of *I've Been Living Too Long*. Chris Tanner gives an exceptional portrayal of Gilda Delight (nee Ernie), a Southern-drawling drag queen from Ohio who has created a glamorous synthetic life from a mundane middle class background and refuses surgery to save his life rather than scar his precious gilded body. Douh Shook is impressive as the unbothered gay who finds love tied up in the back of a van, and Barbara Morgan brings a lovely haunting voice to *Dreams of Yesterday*, one of the best numbers of the score. Edward Blair is flashy as the macho male symbol, but vocally unimpressive. The remainder of the cast (if you can figure out who is who from the confusing program) all score solid moments along the way. The direction by Robert L. Wodzinski is pedestrian, the score contains a few choice morsels, the 1st Act being quite good musically, the 2nd Act quite bad, the aforementioned two numbers by Dennis Zackerman (*Living*) and Edward W. Williams III (*Dreams*), plus a fine title song by Williams and Charlie Hufford, notable.

However, there is hope for *Us* — it should be moved to a small theatre such as the Montgomery with an intimate atmosphere, cut drastically to a past-paced 90 minutes with most of the 2nd Act eliminated, the sketches should be curtailed after the point is quickly made and the humor more sharply etched. The three numbers mentioned plus *Drowning Men* should be kept, the rest discarded and a new score supplemented. Then, *Us... The Rest of Us* might become the thoughtful, intelligent revue it now bodes vague promise of.

Due to unforeseen circumstances, show has closed at the Japan Center Theatre (formerly the Kabuki); it will re-open soon (to be announced) elsewhere.

## Law In Action

### MOTHERHOOD AND FAIR EMPLOYMENT

Only women can get pregnant — right there, that is discrimination. But that is the law of the Creator.

For a period of time the woman is disabled, and many companies and government employers have rules requiring the woman to stop working anywhere from two to nine months. These rules are being challenged now by women.

First challenges were made to discrimination which would terminate a woman's employment, upon marriage. An airline stewardess could not be fired because she might become pregnant. Second, mandatory pregnancy leave policies were challenged.

The leave time ranged from after four months to seven months. In a recent case a rule prohibiting women from working during the last two months was upheld.

Other regulations are being challenged. Some employers require that a woman not return to work for a specified time after having a baby. There are other employer policies taht

cause the worker to lose seniority rights when the mother returns to work.

Many argue that this is a form of sex discrimination. Certainly women are entitled to equal protection of the laws. Classifications based on sex are "suspect" and there must be compelling state or policy reasons to allow for a different classification. The discharge of a pregnant women from the U.S. Army is valid policy. But a mandatory pregnancy leave policy for teachers has no compelling state interest.

The discrimination works both ways. For example, in another case, the Florida law allowed widows but not widowers a \$500 property tax exemption. The U.S. Supreme Court upheld the difference. There was a fair and substantial reason for the difference. This was Florida's way to reduce the economic disparity between the earning potentials of men and women. It cushioned the financial impact of spousal loss when the loss may be unusually heavy.

The law is yet unsettled. There will no doubt be many new cases in the near future.

Recently, the Supreme Court ruled that social security benefits to widows but not widowers with children was discriminatory. Both are entitled.

### FRIENDLY AGREEMENT

"Never give a good friend away," says the Old Philosopher. In law, you have a special duty to act fairly when dealing with close friends or relatives. If you should take advantage of them, the court will set the transaction aside. The court may find you used "undue influence" to gain a profit.

There are different grades of friendly relationships. When you deal with your "friendly merchant" you do so at arms length, even where you have confidence in each other. The law says that in this situation it's not illegal for one to gain advantage over the other, so long as there's nothing more than hard bargaining.

In a recent case, Mary and Sue were lifetime friends. When Sue became a widow, their closeness intensified. She relied on Mary even more. Then widow Sue's health failed.

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both mentally and physically. The widow's main wealth was a family home. Mary got her to transfer to her in joint tenancy as a gift deed. Fortunately, Widow Sue's health improved. She then moved to set aside the deal as a product of undue influence. She got her home back, and damages besides.

Some cases grow out of contested

wills. Because the maker of the will is dead, some of the evidence is circumstantial. For example, Uncle Joe and nephew Bill have been very close, but when Uncle Joe dies, he leaves all his money to the practical nurse who tended him during his last illness. That's unnatural. The will doesn't fit with what Uncle Joe told friends and others. The practical nurse here had great oppor-

tunity to use influence and "help" him write a new will. Uncle Joe's mental and physical condition was such, probably, as to allow domination of his free will. All such factors are circumstantial evidence of undue influence.

#### LOOK BUT DON'T TOUCH

In a recent case the district attorney dismissed a case because the court would not permit the removal of a bullet lodged in the victim's spine. The danger's to the victim as well as the right of a person to refuse such a search of his body deprived the DA of the needed evidence.

The same rule applies to everyone, including the defendant. The constitution protects a person's body from search. Yet the cavities of one's body cannot be used as a hiding place for stolen or illegal objects.

To getting a driver's license, the state may demand that upon a drunk driving arrest, the motorist submit to a blood, breath, or urine test. On boarding an airplane, the airline personnel may require a reasonable search of the passenger's body.

But how far can the state go? Certainly the right of privacy of the person's body is one of the most cherished in our culture. A person does not have to suffer indignities or brutality to his person, says the Constitution.

In one case, police broke into the defendant's home, saw him put pills into his mouth. The police suspected drugs. They choked him, and tried to force the pills from his mouth. Finally they took him to a hospital and pumped his stomach, using considerable force, against the man's will. The police found the drugs and charged him with a crime. The court dismissed the case. Such conduct violated due process and the rights of freedom from search. (Rochin v. Calif. 342 U.S. 165)

Other cases have allowed probes by doctors in a medically approved procedure. Another case allowed the

police to require the defendant to take a solution to force the suspect to cough up the stolen goods. In each case there was no evidence of brutality, and the police used reasonable and medically approved methods. (Blackford v. U.S., 247 F. 2d 745)

In another case, the police pumped a person's stomach because there was evidence of a possible lethal dosage of drugs that could have been fatal. (Peo. v. Jone, 20 CA 3d 201) Was the use of force reasonable under the circumstances? If the force was excessive beyond reasonable needs, then the evidence seized must be suppressed.

Society has an interest in protecting itself from criminal activity. Forceful extractions can lead to unreasonable police tactics. There must be a balance of respective rights.

word "hamburger" would lower the tone of the street.

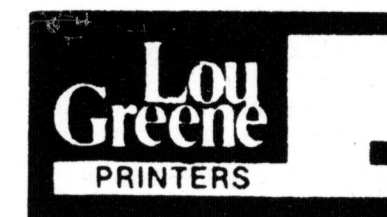

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## Doonesbury Gay Character Stirs Storm

### 5 Newspapers Cancel

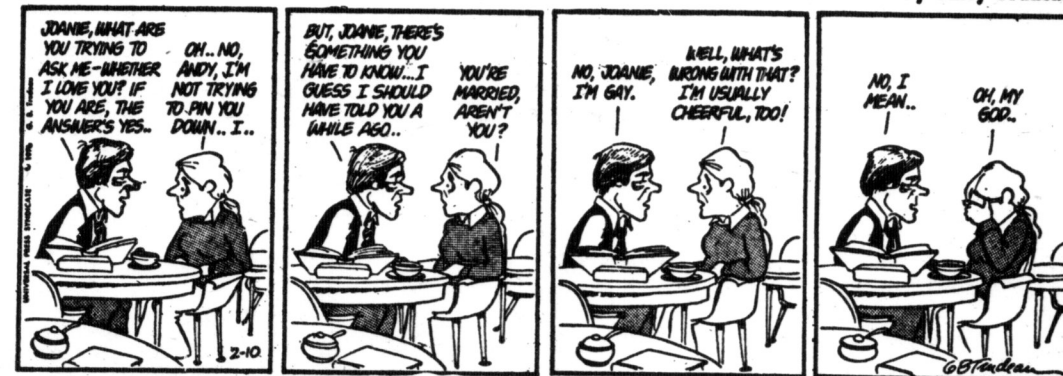
KANSAS CITY, Kans. — The popular comic strip "Doonesbury," carried by more than 400 newspapers across the United States, is under fire today for its latest character — Andy, a gay male. Andy came out on Tuesday of last week by telling his girlfriend, Joanie, "I'm Gay." The two other sequences of the comic strip, which appeared before GCN went to press, deal with Joanie's attempts to deal with Andy's gayness as well as a witty comparison between gay and black struggles.

Reaction throughout the nation to an open gay character in a comic strip has been less than enthusiastic. "There's been an incredible response," Lee Salem, managing editor of the Universal Press Syndicate which distributes the series, told GCN. According to Salem, five newspapers have already dropped the series which is scheduled to run for five days. The newspapers include the Los Angeles Times, the Houston Post, the Miami Herald, the Cleveland Press, and a newspaper in Columbus, Ohio.

Salem indicated that more newspapers may have dropped the series for the remainder of the week than he is presently aware. "Editors can do this at their discretion," Salem said. "I just don't know at

this point how many newspapers have dropped Andy." He also noted that readers of the Cleveland Press, while unable to read "Doonesbury" in its usual place in the paper, may write or call the newspaper and would be sent their missing Doonesburys in the mail.

Managing Editor Salem strongly defended the comic strip, which is written by Gary Trudeau. "He [Trudeau] is handling a real life situation with taste, candor, and a bit of humor," Salem told GCN. "Comic strips are becoming more elastic and Doonesbury reflects this. I believe that that will be the trend of the future," Salem predicted.

Salem conceded that most of the response to the series had been negative but noted that people who liked the comic strip would not be so likely to call or write. In Boston, an employee at the Boston Globe said that there had been a "violent response" to the Andy character but said that the newspaper planned to continue to run it.

This is not the first time that Doonesbury has been the center of controversy. The comic strip gained a wide readership in recent years for the trenchant wit with which it has dealt with a variety of subjects including Watergate and the Vietnam War.
