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## Folsom Street Barracks Bust

... DRUG RAID

San Francisco. The Narcotics Squad raided the Folsom Street Barracks Bath House on Friday, June 25, at 10:15 p.m.

About 18 police personnel were directly connected with the operation which routed patrons out of their rooms and subjected them to search.

According to police reports provided by Sgt. Charles Hoenisch, the police found seven spindles of "speed"; six bags of a pink powder which they believe to be MDA, a hallucinogenic drug; an assortment of "reds" and "yellows"; LSD tablets and some small amounts of marijuana.

One person had sixty LSD tablets on him, according to Sgt. Hoenisch.

Eighty persons were interrogated under a search warrant obtained prior to the bust, said Hoenisch. Eight people were charged with having hard drugs

and eight were cited with having less than an ounce of marijuana.

Hoenisch was quick to point out that this was not a "vice" raid. The police, he insisted, were not concerned with "consensual sex" and were not out to harass the gay citizens.

The fact that it was "Gay Pride Week" had nothing to do with the raid, he went on.

After interviewing a number of those actually arrested, it became apparent that Hoenisch was correct. To a person, no one complained of the treatment they received at the hands of the police; and each person remarked that he had been well treated and not abused in any way. In fact, several pointed out, those arrested for the minor marijuana offenses were out of custody in less than three hours. Many involved in the raid went back to their rooms at the bath house, which held the rooms for the arrested patrons!

Edward M. Smith, the owner and operator of the bath house, was not cited by the police as he might have been if they considered him responsible for the drug traffic.

In an interview with the owner, he pointed out that he only recently purchased the bath house in December of 1975 and had not actually taken over its operation until April of this year. He said he had been aware of the drug problem in the place and had tried to stop it.

At one point he claimed his life was threatened by pushers because he was attempting to stop the drug operations going on there. He said he regretted the way in which the raid was made, but felt it was inevitable the way things were going on.

"I fired a number of persons who worked here and threatened anyone who was encouraging traffic among employees with the same treatment," he said.

"Some of the dealers got so brazen," he went on, "they wanted me to store their drugs in our safe deposit boxes."

Although only sixteen were charged by the Narcotics Squad, a number of persons were picked up for unpaid traffic warrants. That fact gave the appearance of a much larger "bust" to those who observed the action as passers-by on the street.

B. J. Beckwith, a well-known local attorney, was alerted by someone in the bath house at the time of the raid; and he was on hand to aid those who needed legal assistance. He expressed his opinion that the raid was, in fact, just what it was purported to be, a drug "bust", and not police harassment of gays.

## National Coalition Of Gay Activists

GAY ACTIVISTS ANNOUNCE PLANS FOR LARGE-SCALE DEMONSTRATIONS AGAINST THE DEMOCRATIC NATIONAL CONVENTION; HEAD-QUARTERS OPENED NEAR MADISON SQUARE GARDEN TO COORDINATE PROTESTS.

The National Coalition of Gay Activists, an organization with members throughout the United States, today disclosed its plans for protests against the Democratic National Convention in New York City the week of July 12.

The demonstrations are in response to the Democrats' failure to advance the rights and liberties of tens of millions of Lesbians and Gay Men in this country. Actions will include picketing the hotels of Democratic delegates, a candlelight march, and a Celebration of Gay Love.

The Coalition has opened a store-front headquarters near Madison Square Garden in order to coordinate the Gay protests. It is located at 304 West 39th Street (at 8th Avenue) and will be in operation from June 20 through July 20.

## Ma Bell Tries Again

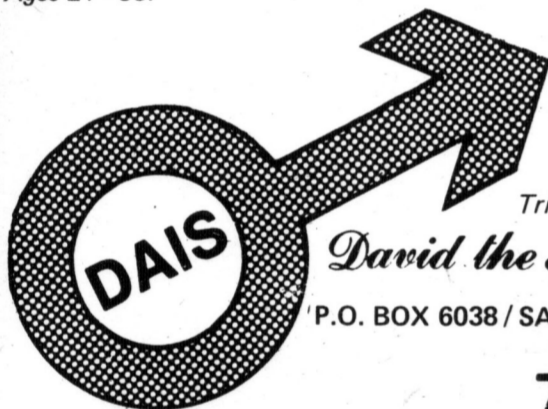
San Francisco. A Show Cause Panel of the San Francisco Human Rights Commission found the Pacific Telephone & Telegraph Company guilty of discrimination against gay persons after its May 20 hearing here.

After hearing arguments in the matter of the Pride Foundation vs. PT&T, the commissioners upheld a determination of HRC Executive Director Grant S. Mickins that the phone company discriminates in its employment policies against gay persons.

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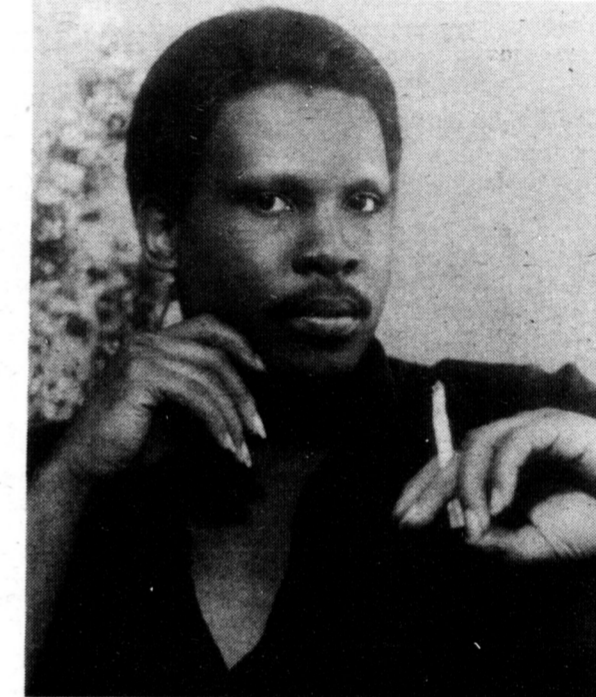
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Smarting under that decision, the phone company has put the HRC on notice that it intends to appeal the ruling.

In accordance with the rules of the HRC, a new hearing will be held before the HRC as a whole. In effect, that would permit the PT&T to "exhaust administrative remedies" thus paving the way to legal action in court.

While the phone company keeps insisting that it does not discriminate, it is interesting to note that they have issued new instructions to supervisory personnel to avoid the problem.

Dropping any reference to "manifest homosexuals" from their employment policy statement, an intra-office memorandum circulated by the company to the heads of departments issued a new policy statement.

Dated April 30 and signed by D. L. Short, the "new" policy still contains the suspect phrase, "We do not give favorable consideration to anyone who, in our judgement, may create conflicts with existing employees or the public we serve."

A question and answer sheet attached to the policy statement "clarifies" the intent of the policy.

For example, in answer to one question the clarification

states that "...we will not reject solely on the basis of homosexuality..."

If a "man" is hired and later admits he is gay, he would be retained "as long as he... does not exhibit behavior disruptive to co-workers or the public we serve..."

Would homosexuals be barred from employment?

"Not if fully qualified... however, if it was apparent that he would be taking advantage of the policy and use employment as a forum for disseminating his views, make overt actions and, therefore, be a disruptive influence, we certainly would have to take that into consideration."

Would the phone company actively seek homosexuals for employment?

"NO!"  
Why did the company change its policy now?

"We are constantly reviewing our employment policies. In this case, we felt this modification was appropriate."

Would the use of the words "may create conflict" in the new policy give the company an "out" from hiring homosexuals?

"... only if it were apparent from the applicant's actions or statements that he would use employment as a forum and be a potentially dis-

ruptive influence on the job."

Who will exercise judgement as to potential "conflicts"?

"Basically the decision will be made in the employment process; first by the interviewer and later by successive levels of management as required."

Fredrick Furth, a prominent local attorney who has the reputation of being one of the best anti-trust lawyers in the country, will continue to represent the Pride Foundation against PT&T.

The City Attorney, Thomas O'Conner, who has never been a champion of gay rights, will also have to participate in the action against the phone company and represent the HRC to defend gay rights.

### Metropolitan Community Church

During the congregational meeting on May 12, 1976, the members of the Metropolitan Community Church of San Francisco elected the Rev. Charles W. Larsen as Pastor. Rev. Larsen's installation will take place on

Sunday, July 18, 1976, at the 1 o'clock service. The Rev. Elder James E. Sandmire, Pastor of M.C.C. Los Angeles, will be officiating at the installation. The Rev. Elder Troy Perry, founder of the Universal Fellowship of Metropolitan Community Church, and the Rev. Elder Freda Smith, Pastor of M.C.C. Sacramento, have been invited to attend. The Board of the Council on Religion and the Homosexual, of which Rev. Larsen is Executive Director, has also been invited.

Rev. Larsen received an Associate of Arts Degree from the University of Minnesota in 1963 and a Bachelor of Science from St. Cloud State College in 1965. He attended the Chandler School of Theology, Emory University, Atlanta, Ga., where he received his Masters of Divinity Degree in 1970. In 1971 Rev. Larsen was ordained and installed as Pastor of the Highlands Presbyterian Church in Atlanta, Ga. In 1972 he transferred his ordination into the Universal Fellowship of Metropolitan Community Church at the Third General Conference held in Los Angeles. He then returned to assume the pastorate of the Tampa M.C.C. from 1972 through 1974. In 1974 he came to California to pursue his education and is cur-

rently working towards his doctorate in theology at the Pacific School of Religion. Rev. Larsen has served as a staff minister of M.C.C. San Francisco since 1974, and as a sponsor of their Exhorter Program. He has also served as Assistant Pastor since March 1, 1976.

All are cordially invited to attend Rev. Larsen's installation, and are more than welcome to join in all worship services. Services are each Sunday at 1 p.m. and 7:30 p.m., and Wednesday at 7:30 p.m. They are held at Mission United Presbyterian Church at 23rd and Capp Streets (between Mission Street and South Van Ness Avenue).

### Gay Man Murdered At Home

San Francisco. Peter M. Molzen described by the coroner as a man in his 50's was found dead in his apartment at 1:09 a.m. at 676 Geary Street, San Francisco, on the 26th of June.

A short man of 5'7" with blue eyes and blond hair, Molzen was identified by his roommate, Dennis Flynn, who notified the police of the death at about 1:00 a.m. However, the police reports indicated that Flynn may have found the

victim dead earlier about 11:45 p.m. and had delayed notifying the police.

Homicide Inspector Michael Mullane stated that both men were known to be homosexual. No motive was determined by the police, but they did arrest Flynn as the suspect.

Although still under suspicion, Flynn has since been released by the court pending further action by the District

Attorney's office.

The officer who arrived at the scene of the crime was J. Cassidy out of Central Station.

When he arrived, the body was found in the closet on its back, face up in a "supine" position.

The body had multiple stab wounds in the chest, and there were indications that the victim had defended himself with his right hand and arm which bore defense wounds.

Blood was dried on the face, arms, thorax, abdomen and thighs. There were also numerous bruises about the eyes, chest, knuckles, arms and wrists.

Officer Cassidy found blood throughout the apartment—on kitchen counters, the refrigerator, walls and floor, in the front room, closets, in the bathroom on the stool, on the shower door, the sink and the

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

### Carter Dumps Gay Plank

San Francisco. There can be no doubt that Jimmy Carter is behind the decision to dump the gay rights plank from the National Democratic Convention's platform. His chief henchman, in the role of a platform "whip," Stewart Eisenstadt, did the hatchet job on the gay rights issue along with any support for the marijuana legalization plank, according to advance reports.

The whole idea of a platform committee is to rally

divergent forces together behind one selected candidate. Petty party differences are intended to be settled while satisfying each pressure group that it will not have to go unheeded.

Carter got so many delegates that his priorities are being used to set the tone. He apparently does not want to have any issue in the platform which might be used to lose his votes. He obviously does not want anything to do with gay rights!

The California Committee for Equal Rights strongly criticized the action taken by the Carter platform "whip" at its business meeting here on June 15.

The CCER called for gay citizens to contact delegates to the Democratic convention and Carter supporters to complain about Carter's show of bad faith.

"Considering the pitch Carter made for gay votes," a

CCER spokesperson noted, "the dumping of the gay plank is an outrage."

Carter supporters in the gay community do not appear to be overly concerned about the latest actions taken by the platform committee. Larry Littlejohn, who ran as a delegate for Carter, played down the meaning of the platform committee's decision.

"Platforms don't mean that much," he insisted. "Carter has not changed his stand on supporting the Abzug bill."

The Abzug bill was introduced by Bella Abzug, congresswoman from New York; it would protect gay rights and other rights at the federal level.

Ms. Ann Daley, who is active in local Democratic party councils and is a potential delegate to the convention, said that she was "livid" over the actions taken by the platform committee.

She, like others connected with the Democratic party locally, is not sure just what Carter's advisors are up to.

"Unless the rules are too tight, there should be a quite a fight over the platform once it is referred to the floor," she suggested.

Jo Daly, who will go to the convention as a Brown delegate, was not too optimistic about the platform.

"We can't do much about it," she shrugged; and that about sums up the opinion of most of those asked to express one.

### Sex Forum COUNSELING CENTER OFFERS ENRICHMENT WORKSHOP

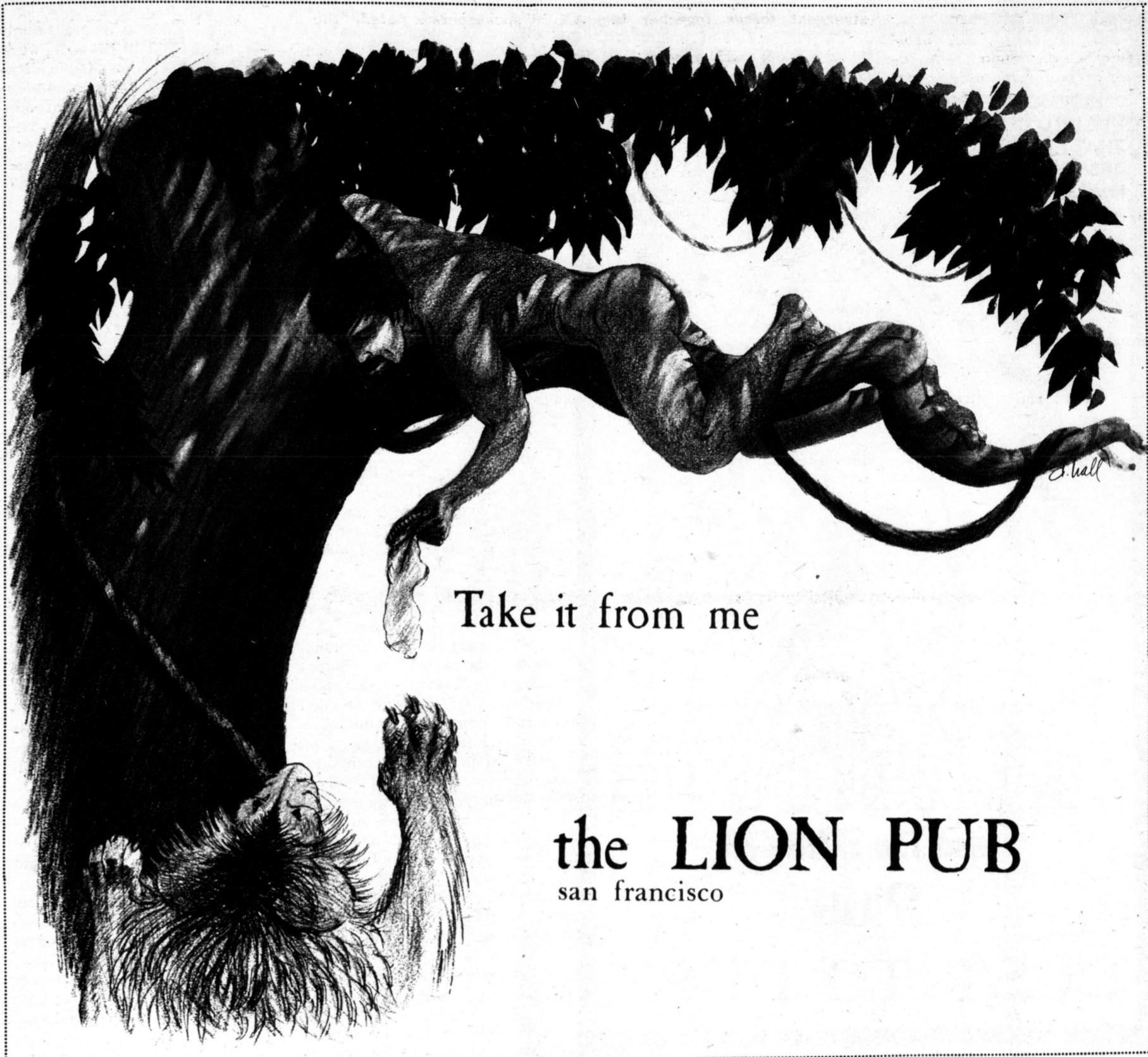

The workshops consist of one private assessment meeting and four 3½-hour evening group sessions.

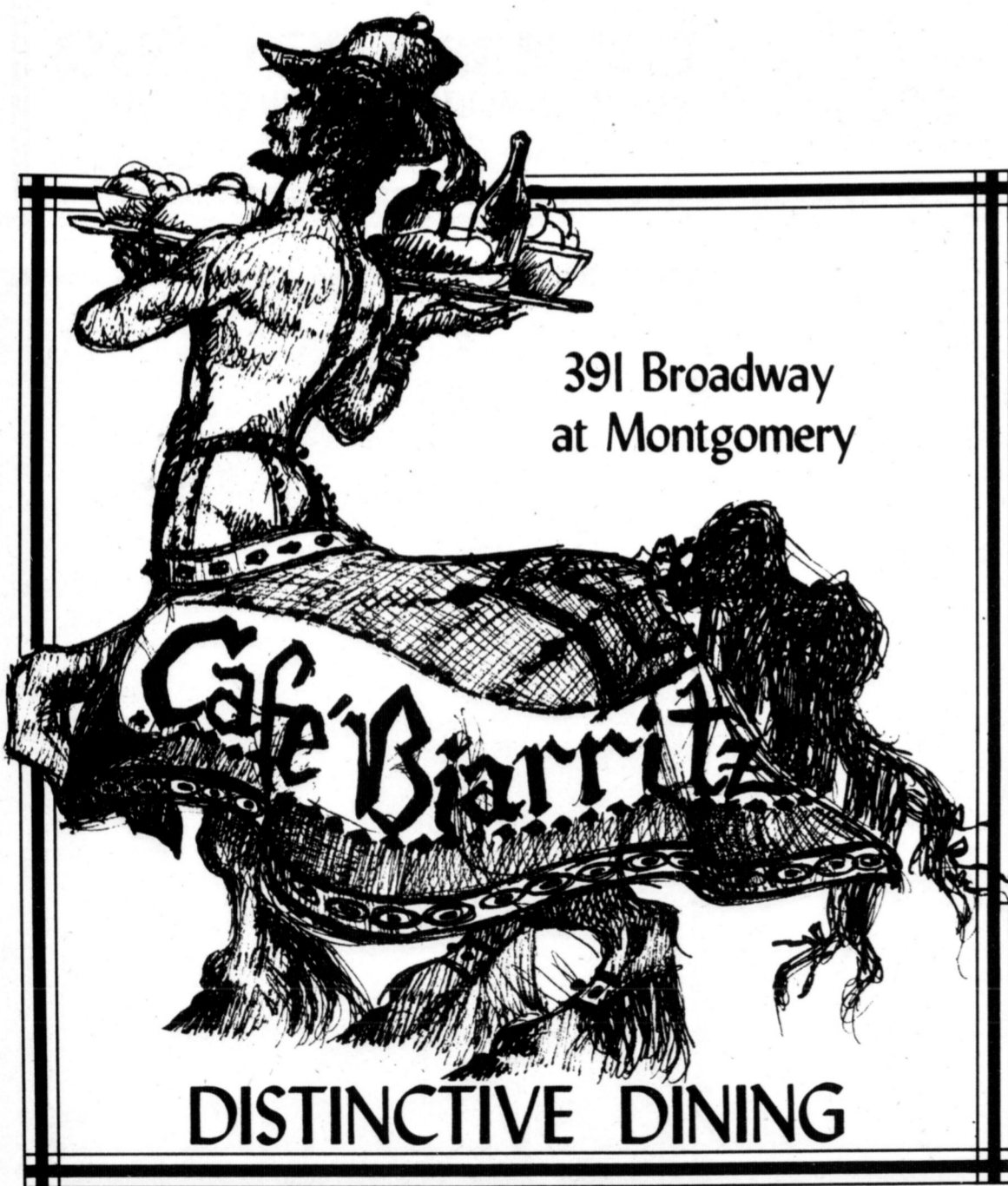
New workshops are offered each month and are open to individuals and couples of all sexual preferences.

AN OPEN LETTER ABOUT A THEFT

To the person or persons who ripped off Cinemattachine on the early morning of Gay Freedom Day 1976 - June 29 - we have this to say:

1. We hope that the \$2500 in equipment you stole is worth it to you.
2. We would wish that you would return the dispatch case of credit cards, other documents and Mattachine Society's

Corporate Seal which have no cash value to anyone—all possibility of that has been stopped as of this date.

3. The equipment you took can become whatever you wish. It can be replaced; and, in fact, already has.

4. You shall not stop Mattachine's faith in people nor its 26-year policy of extending aid whenever it can to those in need.

5. You shall not stop either the operation of its private club for men, the Seven Committee, its operation of Cinemattachine, and the other benefits they accrue to the more than 5600 members who look to us for validation of their lifestyles.

6. Loss of the above has been duly reported to San Francisco's Police Department and other

appropriate authorities—including all of the many offices which extended the credit cards you have. The response of the Police Department was immediate, courteous and thorough. The credit card agencies have all taken action to cancel any use. There is no benefit to gain from the documents you have except to cause the owner of them to take additional steps to have them replaced where possible and to forget it where he cannot.

7. If there is any inclination to return the dispatch case of documents, it can be easy. Simply leave it at any gay bar or facility in San Francisco, and no questions will be asked. The name and address is plainly labelled inside and they will return it to its rightful owner. A reward is offered.


8. You did cause us to revise

our plans for Gay Pride Day. In the midst of resetting ourselves for normal operation, we did manage to film the Gay Freedom Day Parade as we have done for the past five years, and to operate our club on schedule. We did have to forego a presentation we had planned at California Hall after the parade, but we shall show parade films as planned starting July 1; and on July 4 we will photograph the similar Gay Freedom Day Parade in Los Angeles and show those films also on schedule in both cities.

**Sheriff's Deputy Victim of Homophobia**

San Francisco. Sheriff's Deputy Rudolph McWestly Cox, a young black man in his 30's who received some notoriety in the local press as the "first up-front gay" to become a deputy sheriff here, was found free of all charges that he cheated in an examination.

In handing down his ruling, the hearing officer, James Denman, made it clear that Cox was totally without blame and had not cheated as his accusers had stated.

The hearing was held at City Hall in San Francisco as an administrative procedure.

As part of his training, Cox had been sent to Chabot College Alameda Sheriff's Academy. Officials there filed a formal complaint against Cox accusing him of cheating on an examination. The complaint was filed on May 21, 1976; yet the occurrence was supposed to have taken place weeks earlier.

A non-partial investigation was conducted by Lt. Frank Hugo of the S.F. Sheriff's Department. His investigation did not support the charges made, and he directed the hearing officer's attention to many "irregularities" in the evidence against the accused.

For example, he noted, one person had been caught cheating on an examination at

the same time as the accused was charged; but the one who was guilty and pleaded guilty also had a fluorescent substance on his fingers which was intended to trap anyone who attempted to look at test answers left on the instructor's podium. Cox had no tell-tale substance on his fingers.

The legal counsel for the Sheriff's Department, Richard H. Schooler, noted irregularities in the handling of the polygraph (lie detector) testing made on the accused. He agreed with B. J. Beckwith, who was Cox's attorney, that the questions asked were far too general and perhaps "loaded" to be proper questions for conducting a test.

B. J. Beckwith, who is known to friends and clients only as "B.J.," was able to convince the hearing officer that highly questionable methods were used to prove his client guilty.

Having a reputation for skill and showmanship in the imaginative way he sets up a defense for his clients, the hearing was not disappointed. He produced witnesses and experts to change the very curriculum used by Chabot College to show that the school and its instructors were, in fact, blatantly homophobic.

"They obviously hate queers!", he noted.

They know my client is gay, and they were out to get him," he insisted.

Beckwith insisted that the fact that his client is gay was all the incentive the school officials needed to set up what he considered a crude attempt to discredit Cox and get him discharged as a deputy sheriff.

In a brilliant move to convince the hearing officer that the school officials were out to get Cox, he introduced curriculum materials which had been issued to the students of Chabot College.

The subject matter was "Sex Crimes." In the texts a "Sex Degenerate" was simply described as "a person who diverges from natural acts of intercourse."

A "Sex Pervert" was a "person who gets satisfaction from sexual intercourse performed in an unnatural manner, or by unnatural stimulation, usually selecting one type of act to serve his purpose."

They seem to have made up a word, "Effemination," which they use to mean homosexual.

Homosexuals, they pointed out, "hunt sex thrills" and are a "threat to the community and society; history shows a threat to civilization who (sic) are lulled into tolerance."

Because homosexuals suffer from "rejection," the text goes on, they "cause many problems" ranging from disturbing the peace to murder!

The outline used in the text was prepared by Lt. William M. Foster of the Alameda County Sheriff's Department.

Attached to the text is a list of "sexual terms" prepared by the Alameda County Sheriff's Department which, if it were not so serious in its implication, would seem funny to any educated person, according to Beckwith.

The list perpetuates homophobia even in its use of words.

"Homosexual" is given as a word used to describe a person who "has a tendency to find sexual gratification with a person of the same sex. Other names for males are gay person, inverts, faggots, queers, nances, fruits, pansies, swishes" and queens."

For a female the list suggests the words "Sapphists (lady lovers), tribads and buldykes."

In the educational texts the word faggot is spelled "faget" which may be an indication of the degree of understanding of the subject matter as Beckwith suggested to the hearing officer.

The word "gay", the school teaches, is "a slang word pertaining to a homosexual used mostly by the layman."

The words supposedly used by homosexuals to describe police officers are given as "Millie, Tillie, Mae, Fuzz"!!!

"Swish," on the other hand, is the word used to describe a homosexual who "acts like a homosexual."

Sheriff Richard Hongisto

was genuinely surprised and shocked at the apparent content of the instructional material used at Chabot College. His attitude and the promise of the hearing office that Cox would not have to return to the homophobic institution to complete his training may be the start of a whole new attitude toward Chabot as a training facility.



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raising as much money as possible for this worthy cause.

### Punks Invade Polk Street

San Francisco. Six youthful punks viciously attacked John Patrese Quinn, age 37; Ferd Eggan, age 29; Felix Amato, age 32; and Jack Hutchinson, age 37, on Saturday morning, June 26, at about 12:55 a.m. at Polk and Bush Streets.

Quinn had his jaw broken; Eggan needed 16 stitches over his left eye, and Hutchinson suffered damage to a kidney as a result of a kick.

Totally unprovoked, the attackers struck, kicking Quinn in the jaw as he sat at the curb edge talking to his friends. It was a balmy night and a pleasant night to be out; more people seemed to be out on the streets than usual according to the victims.

Quinn described the attackers as "Chicano boys ranging in age from about 13 to 18 years." Using an ice chest as a weapon, one of the punks began to strike out at Quinn and his friends. Another attacker had a baton-like weapon which looked like the handle of a large portable radio.

A melee erupted. At first the punks were attacking Quinn, then Hutchinson and Eggan. Within minutes Amato came to the aid of his friends.

Since Quinn had been sitting on the curb and Hutchinson was squatting down when attacked, the attackers had no idea how tall Quinn and Hutchinson actually were. The attackers were only between 5'7" and 5'9".

Realizing that they attacked more formidable victims than they thought, the punks ran. They ran down the street right into the arms of the police.

Six youths had attacked, but the police released two at the scene without getting any statement from the victims! Four were held in the police car and clearly identified by the victims.

The one minor who had struck Quinn with his foot and broken his jaw was positively

identified by three of the victims. He was booked for "aggravated assault."

Three of those taken into custody were minors; one was 18 and, therefore, classified as an adult. The adult was listed on the arrest sheet as Raymond Vasquez of 2210 23rd Street, San Francisco, born 12-21-57, and a student.

Hall of Justice records show that even before the investigation was actually completed Vasquez was released and the charges dropped by the District Attorney.

The investigation is in the hands of Juvenile Inspector Nelson Thomas, who warned the victims that unless they could positively testify that those punks other than the one who actually kicked Quinn did more than "join in the fighting", they would have to be released.

In interviewing the victims, it was apparent that they thought more about protecting the punks from arrest records and possible jail terms than of vengeance for themselves.

The irony of the situation seemed to annoy the police inspector, Thomas, who tried to get a positive identification from the victims regarding the other youths involved in the fight. All through the interview with the inspector the victims displayed more concern for the effect of jail on the teenagers than for vengeance for themselves.

There was no question that the one who started the trouble and kicked Quinn should be held and punished, but the others the victims thought played lesser roles and ought not to have their lives ruined.

From interviewing the victims it became obvious that they were gentle, thoughtful, empathetic persons not bent on revenge. The punks who attacked them were lucky. Their victims were "beautiful people."

### Maine Lesbian Wins Court Battle For Her Children

"We're thrilled," Carol Whitehead told members of the Maine Gay Task Force when she announced that Maine Superior Court Justice Harry P. Glassman had awarded her unconditional custody of her children. Whitehead's former husband, Danny F. Black, had challenged her custody of their two children because she is a Lesbian.

In a 13-page decision, dated June 14, Justice Glassman wrote that the overriding concern of his decision

was "the best interests and welfare of the children." Noting that homosexuality is not a crime in Maine, Glassman stated "a court charged with the responsibility of acting in the best interests of a minor child must inquire into the psychological, social and moral well-being of that child as well as its physical well-being. To this end the sexual activity of the mother or father becomes a relevant consideration, not for the purpose of censoring or criticizing the manner in which the parent lives, but for the purpose of determining the impact of the parent's life style upon the minor child. Thus the inquiry would be the same whether the parent is living in an adulterous heterosexual relationship or a homosexual relationship: What is the effect on the child exposed to this relationship?"

In his decision Glassman found that the present home life at the North Berwick farm of Carol Whitehead adequately meets the social, psychological, physical and moral needs of the children. His ruling placed heavy emphasis on the testimony of Dr. Adair Heath, director of the Division of Child Psychiatry at the Maine Medical Center. Dr. Heath testified that the "home life appears stable and activities are as in any heterosexual home."

Whitehead said that Glassman's decision "gives you faith in the system, it's a marvelous kind of Bicentennial present." She learned the good news while looking out her window and seeing her lawyer, Kim Matthews, running up the stairs carrying a bottle of champagne. Matthews, a partner in Maine's only all woman law firm in Portland, said that, considering Glassman's reputation for legal scholarship, the decision would probably carry weight with other state judges considering similar cases.

For Carol Whitehead, the decision means an end to thirteen years of fleeing and harassment from her former husband, Danny Black. She moved to Maine a year ago to gain peace and security from Black who on various occasions has attacked Carol, both verbally and physically. Black arrived in Maine on April 28th and attempted to take the children from their school. School officials refused to turn the children over to Black, which resulted in the subsequent court battle.

### Gay Lib Reaches The Campus

Santa Barbara. By a narrow vote, the American Association of University Professors adopted a resolution on June 26 to protect gay rights on campuses throughout the United States.

The AAUP is recognized as the most prestigious organization in the United States which sets standards for professional conduct and for academic policies affecting universities and colleges.

The resolution to protect gay rights was presented at the 62nd annual convention held at

Santa Barbara by the University of Akron Chapter of the AAUP.

One of the most outspoken proponents of the resolution was Professor Dennis Rubini of Temple University. It was he who led a floor fight at the convention to have the issue put before the membership as a whole after the so-called Committee A refused to take testimony on the matter and held closed sessions in secret.

Committee A is a regular standing committee of the AAUP to which matters of this type are submitted for consideration as a regular business matter.

Rubini indicated that he was incensed at the arrogance of Committee A members in the handling of gay rights.

The basic criteria established by the AAUP were adopted during their 1975 annual meeting. At that time they mandated sanctions, censure, and possible legal action against those member schools which practiced discrimination.

To the list of categories

and classes of persons protected against discrimination was added gay persons by prohibiting discrimination on the basis of sexual or affectional preference!

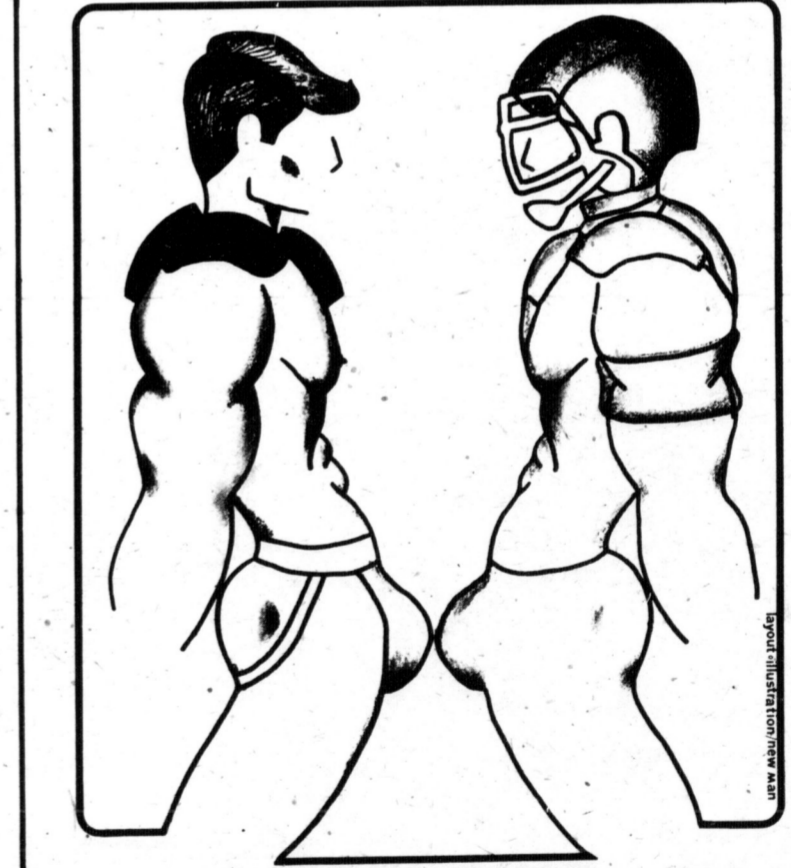
"It was not easy," declared Rubini in an interview, as he went on to tell of the vicious behind-the-scenes attacks mounted by the anti-gay forces.

Voting is possible in two forms under the rules of procedure of the AAUP. Individual members present could vote with one vote each. However, "proportional voting" was also used whereby representatives of institutions cast a block of votes proportional to the size of the institution. Using the latter method, the voting resulted in a pro-gay vote of 10,900 to an anti-gay vote of 10,300.

"One anti-gay member tried to 'particularize' the list of protected persons to such persons as blacks and women," said Rubini.

At that point, someone yelled out "but not gay blacks

or lesbians" according to Rubini. This brought blacks to their feet to support gay rights while the women began to yell "Pigs, Pigs" at the opposition!

To make their case worse, one speaker asked the group if they intended to permit "the crippled to teach dance" according to Rubini.

In response to this a crip-

pled professor struggled to his feet on two crutches and notified the last speaker that he would cast his 600 votes for gay rights.

"This resolution will send shock waves through the Midwest," Rubini promised.

"The impact in the uptight 'Bible Belt' of this country will be tremendous," he went on.

"Gay rights were slow in coming to the campus," Rubini reminded.

He called attention to an article written in the AAUP bulletin in 1972 which raised the issue of requiring information on marital status when seeking admission to institutions of higher learning.

Then he called attention to a statement issued by the National Education Association which advocated prohibiting discrimination on the basis of "sexual orientation" and at the same time suggesting affirmative action for gay persons.

"The Association," referring to the National Education Association in its printed statement, "urges governing boards to employ minority (including those discriminated against because of sexual orientation) persons... in all administrative levels. It may be necessary to give preferences in hiring, retention and promotion... to

overcome past discrimination." At the September meeting of the American Historical Association held in 1974, the membership added protection against discrimination because of "sexual orientation" to their list of criteria. This was done after receiving a report from the "ad hoc" committee on The Rights of Historians.

Dr. Arthur C. Warner of Princeton applauded the actions taken by the AAUP. His approval was expressed in statements addressed to the annual conference of the National Committee for Sexual Civil Liberties held in Los Angeles between the 24th and 27th of June, 1976, at the University Hilton. He has been an active and vocal champion of gay rights on campus and elsewhere. "Departments of History and institutions of higher learning must extend tolerance to persons with varied life styles," Warner insisted. "Modes of dress, appearance and sexual orientation should not affect professional evaluation," he added.

## Small Claims Court Must Protect Gays From Discrimination

San Francisco. After a number of successful complaints being made and settled against discrimination against gay persons, the Small Claims Court decided not to handle any more discrimination cases!

Whether it was because they were gay cases against the Club Baths here or because the court had some other reason, the Pride Foundation took quick action; and the court admitted that it was in error and will hear cases under the Unruh Act and other anti-discrimination laws.

Judge Albert C. Wallenberg, Jr., presiding judge of the Municipal Court, had taken a narrow view of the Small Claims Court jurisdiction to grant additional damages over and above costs.

However, the Pride Foundation was able to show that the matter had been settled by the California Supreme Court; and, in the opinion of Attorney General Evelle J. Younger, Small Claims Courts do have jurisdiction to award damages over and above costs so long as the monetary relief sought did not exceed the \$500 limit placed on the Small Claims Court by statute.

Gay persons then may take their housing and other discrimination cases into Small Claims Courts throughout the state and seek up to \$500 in damages where they are specifically protected by state law.

Judge Wallenberg, however, will not make it too easy; he has also ruled that unless the complainant can "swear under penalty of perjury" that the residence address of the respondent is known and listed,

no suit will be heard in Small Claims Court.

The problem with this ruling should be apparent to anyone. Many businessmen do conduct their activities from an office and live elsewhere or have an unlisted, unknown residence address.

Even though there would be no trouble in serving them with papers, the judge would not permit them to be sued unless they could be served at their residence.

The problem stems from the wording of the law covering Small Claims Courts. The laws allow the person sued to have only five days if they reside in the county but allow 15 days to be served if they live out of the county.

### New Program For City Jail

San Francisco. Les Morgan, speaking for the Sheriff's Department, announced plans for the official take-over of the city jail facilities at the Hall of Justice from the police by the Sheriff.

In assuming responsibility for the jail, Sheriff Richard Hongisto promised gay community leaders that he would halt the abuse inflicted on gay prisoners and do away with the notorious "J" tank.

"J" holding tank was also referred to as the "queen's"

tank. It provided the police with an extremely punitive and oppressive holding facility.

Physical and sexual assault was not only possible, it was probable in the tank. It was a depressing and dehumanizing situation, according to Morgan.

To enable lay persons to understand what the changes would mean to the gay community, Morgan explained the function of the Hall of Justice jail.

An arrestee is held at the Hall of Justice for not more than 48 hours, as a rule. He is there for clearance and holding right after an arrest is made.

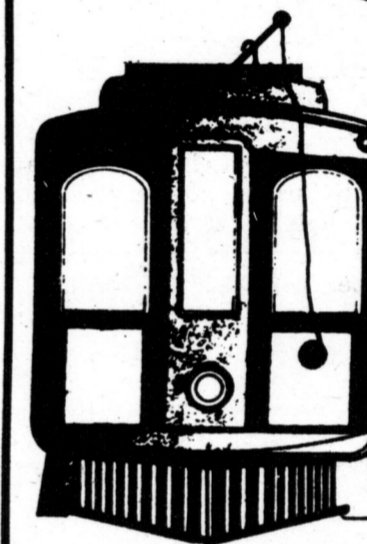
If the person arrested is not released in a short time, the person is moved from the City jail on the sixth floor to the County jail on the seventh floor. Prisoners could then be sent from the seventh floor to the main County Jail located in San Bruno, California.

The changes being intro-

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duced are the result of the San Francisco Board of Supervisors' legislative actions which mandated the reduction of police jail bureaucracy.

Morgan pointed out that 80% of those held in the City jail were released within a few hours. It was a rapid turn-over facility, he said; and it is in just that sort of situation that sexual assaults seem to be most frequent.

"Reducing the probability of 'rape' while in the jail will be an important factor in the organization of the new operation at the jail," Morgan said.

To achieve its purposes, the Sheriff's Department will be working closely with local gay organizations such as the Pride Foundation, the Metropolitan Community Church, Operation Concern, the Society for Individual Rights, and others to obtain support and input.

### Tim Corbett

Charges against Tim Corbett, a militant gay activist who three months ago was arrested on Haight Street for "posting leaflets on utility poles," were recently dismissed. Affidavits written by community people were submitted to the DA's office supporting Corbett's view that he was being harassed because of the gay nature of the leaflet and

the political views it expressed. The posted leaflet was publishing a workshop on "Gays and Classism" sponsored by the Working Class Caucus of BAGL.

The nature of the affidavits ranged from people stopped by police for posting election campaign literature but not cited or arrested to people who, in the view of the police, posted notices looking for apartments or advertising garage sales and were not stopped. Another gay man was recently arrested for posting a leaflet for a benefit for PR workers. Charges against him were dismissed.

Corbett is convinced that the process of gathering affidavits as evidence in his behalf had a very persuasive effect on

the DA's office and had encouraged other activists who have been hassled for the same offense to do the same.

Attempts to subvert free expression of political views the police, the DA's office, and the Board of Supervisors don't like are too linked with repressive legislation like SB-1 to go unchallenged by progressive groups in our society.

It appears the Board of Supervisors had asked the MPD to make arrests for posting leaflets on utility poles and the DA's office to prosecute these cases with reasonable vigor.

### No. California Burn Council

In 1974, there were 32 deaths to San Francisco residents from burns caused by flame. These were classified as deaths due to "conflagration," "ignition of clothing," "ignition of highly inflammable material," and "other flames." Of course, many more burn injuries occurred which, while not fatal, were severe and often resulted in scars and disfigurement. Pre-school children are particularly vulnerable to burn hazards. Three leading types of burns are flame burns from burning fabrics (particularly clothing), natural gas and gasoline flames, flames from playing with matches, etc.; scalds from steam and hot liquids; and electrical burns from extension cords and high-tension wires. Parental responsibility in the prevention of burns includes supervision, the removal of possible burn hazards and the teaching of children about the dangers of burns.

The Northern California Burn Council was formed in May of 1975 with the purpose of informing the public about the burn injury problem. The Burn Council was created as a non-profit organization and, during the past year, has been awarded two grants of money to be used for educational purposes. The purpose of the first grant, from the "Fire Administration" of the U.S. Department of Commerce, is to detail how an organization can develop a burn prevention program in an urban area. The other grant, from the Rosenberg Foundation of San Francisco, is specifically for the purpose of initiating a pilot program in burn prevention in the public and private schools of San Francisco.

The Burn Council has completed an epidemiological study of hospitalized burn injuries in San Francisco and

Santa Clara counties. Carried out by two sociologists at Stanford University, this data has identified the major causes of severe burn injuries as well as other etiological information. It is this base-line information that will serve as the touchstone for prevention efforts in school programs.

Members of the Burn Council have established ongoing working relationships with significant related groups including the major burn centers in Northern California, the State Fire Marshal's Office, the San Francisco Department of Public Health, and the American Trauma Center, as well as other organizations interested in the prevention of burn injuries.

### Sen. Allan Robbins Does A Good Turn

Sacramento. State Senator Allan Robbins (D.-No. Hollywood) took notice of the opposition to expand the duties of the Fair Employment Practices Commission to protect gay citizens because of the presumed costs. He introduced

S.B. 2159 on April 19 to appropriate "an unspecified amount" to the FEPC for the purpose of enabling the commission to increase its staff and materials to pursue complaints of employment discrimination.

NAACP President Joseph Hall and their registered lobbyist, Verna Canson, have openly opposed the inclusion of gay citizens under the protection of the FEP Act on the grounds that it would increase the burden of the commission's work and strain its limited budget.

The California Committee for Equal Rights has been lobbying actively throughout the state to broaden the authority of the FEPC and has tried to introduce legislation which would amend the statute to clearly protect gay persons from employment discrimination and not leave the gay citizens to depend on legislative "intent" for protection.

CCER lobbyist Paul Hardman has been trying to amend AB 3124 to get gay citizens included in the law. AB 3124 would change the name of the FEPC to California Equal Rights Commission and expand its authority to cover government agencies and bureaus. It would also permit local counties to "contract" with the state to hear complaints of discrimina-

tion on a local level.

AB 3124 was introduced by Julian C. Dixon (D-Los Angeles); and, although he has refused to amend his legislation because of NAACP pressure, he has agreed to introduce separate legislation on the subject.

"Those who understand the workings of the legislature do not expect to see any success for a gay bill winning right now; so, while the offer to introduce legislation is appreciated, an amendment now would be more realistic," Hardman noted.

Tom Coleman of the Gay People's Alliance in Los Angeles can be credited for his efforts to get Robbins to act on this matter. Coleman cooperates closely with the CCER in effectively lobbying for gay rights in the state.

Sacramento. John Vasconcellos (D-San Jose), a long-time friend of gay people, has introduced legislation to require physicians and surgeons to know more about human sexuality. It is listed as AB 4179.

Existing law does not require an applicant for a physician's or surgeon's certificate to complete a course in human sexuality as a condition of getting a license.

His bill would require such an applicant to show evidence that he has at least completed a course in human sexuality. Human sexuality is defined in the legislation.

As defined, "human sexuality" means "the study of a human being as a sexual being and how he or she functions with respect thereto."

Washington. Congressman Edwin L. Koch introduced a bill,

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HR 548, which would control the discretion of the military in the granting of discharges.

As it is now, code numbers and classifications can be included in a person's record to tip-off future employers or others who have no right to know whether or not a person is homosexual.

The California Committee for Equal Rights is working at the national level to lobby for protective legislation for gay people.

The need is great, according to the CCER, not only in the area of military personnel, but in the discrimination gay persons suffer at the hands of

the Internal Revenue Service when they wish to organize under a tax exempt status.

The California Committee for Equal Rights is supporting this legislation on behalf of gay citizens in the belief that if the medical profession knows more about sexuality, they might understand homosexuality better.

AB 4179 has just passed the Assembly by a vote of 41 to 25 and has been sent to the Senate for action there.

FINDING THE ANSWERS

Chief Davis Must Be Retired

The city specifications for the position of Police Chief in Los Angeles call for a person who "promotes cooperation and good will" and who "keeps informed of current thinking and activity in the field of law enforcement." Although only that city's Police Commission can remove the Chief, Mayor Tom Bradley and the anti-Davis Los Angeles Times could drop him if they called for his dismissal. Bradley has been mildly critical of Davis while the Chief has trampled on a large Los Angeles minority - homosexuals.

The July 4 parade and carnival, produced by Christopher Street West Committee in Los Angeles, was another example of how Davis' cops react. While the L.A. Police motto is "to protect and serve" it clearly should be "to harass and be a disservice." Officers could have quietly let the small parade down Hollywood Boulevard progress without incident, but they were directed to break up the final unit of the parade, a contingent of people who had joined in from the sidewalks.

The enormously successful San Francisco parade went without incident, although 90,000 were involved, because police relaxed and permitted people to enjoy themselves. Los Angeles police had done this in recent years, when they ignored a city ordinance which prohibits spectators from entering a parade. Regular marching units were forced to keep in the center of the street, allowing for one full, open traffic lane on each side. Police cars, motorcycles, and an overhead helicopter followed the end of the parade where a banner was carried which said "Unaffiliated Gays." The implication was that gay people from the sidewalks could join in at the end - as they had done in past years (by the thousands in the San Francisco parade). A few Los Angeles marchers called out, "Out of the closet; into the streets," and several hundred moved to swell the ranks of the final unit. It was then that the police moved in to move hundreds back onto the sidewalk.


In a mad scramble, marchers and police mixed. In the confusion we watched one young man, who was standing next to us, beaten by four

officers. We had never seen the brutal L.A. officers in action before. The man was merely standing and observing as we were. One officer jumped him - for no apparent reason - and began to wrestle him to the ground. Another officer pulled out his heavy, wooden nightstick and began slamming it against the man's legs repeatedly. The man was not resisting, but a third officer jumped him and folded up his leg - moving his knee forcibly into the man's crotch. A fourth officer jumped in, without rhyme or reason. The four cops threw the victim to the ground and tore his shirt apart in the process. They handcuffed him

and placed him in a patrol car. He was later booked at the station for "resisting an officer," which is the one thing he definitely did NOT do.

The angered crowd who witnessed the above, which had been quiet and respectful of the police authority, was now shouting, "Pigs!" and was openly hostile. This reporter joined them in his anger. . . Later, in front of the Gold Cup

restaurant at Las Palmas and Hollywood, we witnessed an officer point into the small crowd at three young men. They were placed against a police car and searched. When we protested to the local police captain, who was standing nearby, he said that the young men had been "observed throwing firecrackers earlier." Ironically, two of the men were



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jailed on possession of marijuana charges - not charges relating to firecrackers... Later officers arrested three others on various charges. All six arrested were later released on bail with the help of activist

Morris Knight and the gay HELP organization.

Hatred was evident in the crowds that observed the above. A quiet holiday spirit became one of anger and hostility as they rioted. It was a strange

and tragic thing to observe... a situation fully tolerated by Mayor Tom Bradley who had proclaimed the parade a worthy city event. Many believe that Bradley is fearful of Davis' political power.

Chief Davis was indirectly present when the police "did their thing" on Hollywood Boulevard. His long range policy of refusing to cooperate with the gay community is evident. He has said, "Under no conditions am I going to develop a working liaison with a group which promotes violation of the State homosexual laws." When the Brown consensual sex law became law, he continued his harassment and public statements attacking the gay community. He says, "I naturally feel sorry for anyone afflicted with such a faulty development. They are to be pitied, and, where possible, helped... The open, ostentatious merchandising of homosexuality is a clear and present public danger to the youth of our community. It's one thing to be a leper; it's another thing to be spreading the disease..."

Davis has more respect for dogs... Yes, dogs! He has said, "Dogs have stood by man since the dawn of time and were the first of Nature's creations to befriend and serve with that high degree of absolute trust and unflinching loyalty so rarely matched by their human masters." The members of the John Birch Society, of which he is a member, are enthusiastic in their support of this "love the dogs and beat the citizens" approach to law enforcement.

The Chief had admitted that he keeps thousands of files on private citizens; and when civil liberty groups protest, he replies that although he did

have a "Homo-File," that "...you haven't anything to worry about if you haven't done anything wrong." When the Brown consensual sex bill was proposed, Davis asked if "the term 'sexual orientation' applies to sadists or child molesters or transvestites?" and commented that homosexuals should "alter" their "malady" to "conform to existing social and legal practices."

It is not surprising that few people saw or participated in the Los Angeles parade. The fear is still there - and rightfully so. Not the fear of harassment and intimidation from other citizens, but fear of the police! This strange situation resembles Nazi Germany during World War II. It is fascism, and there is no question that it is tolerated.

We believe that it is time that our Los Angeles gay sisters and brothers who are upfront begin to deny Mayor Tom Bradley the popularity he enjoys in the gay community. It is time that Bradley openly attacks Chief Ed Davis for his continued oppression and his training of men to be oppressive. The year is 1976, and we should no longer live in fear of the very people who are there to "protect and serve" us.

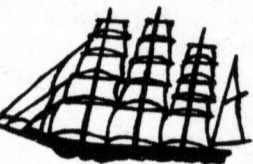

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# Gay Pride Week

## Gay Power Startles San Francisco

San Francisco. Police estimated gay participation in the massive Gay Liberation Parade at over 90,000 marchers, counting not only the 130 costumed units but also the oceans of enthused gay persons who closed ranks behind the formal marching units.

On a rare, hot day--hot enough to fry eggs on the pavement--the non-typical day provided a setting for the most non-typical event ever held in the city. It was credited with being the largest parade ever held in the city. The fact that it was a gay parade made the public at large and local officials take serious notice of gay power.

The number of persons participating tends to confirm the Chief of Police's estimate that there are about 140,000 gay adults living in San Francisco. Chief Charles Gain made his estimate a few months ago when he suggested he would be justified in hiring up to 21% gay policemen in San Francisco to match the percentage of gays in the city.

The crowd was festive and orderly, outrageous in some respects, but all in proud, good fun.

Lesbian women bared their chests and proudly displayed their abundant femininity; gay men adorned their bodies or displayed them as they saw fit.

Hordes of men and women - blacks, whites, and many other races - joined together in a common show of unity as gay brothers and sisters celebrating gay freedom and progress.

Down Polk Street, past City Hall to Market Street and up to Castro Street it swept, in-

The parade commemorates the June 1969 outcry which erupted in New York City when gay citizens there confronted police harassment with open violence and resistance on a massive scale.

From that date on, gays throughout the country have looked to their growing sense of unity and power to fight for gay rights.

Local politicians are responsive to gay voting power, and that awareness must have been enhanced by the show of numerical strength in the parade.

Statistics show that only

about 190,000 persons actually ever vote in San Francisco elections; so, if the estimate is that there are 140,000 gay adults in the city, then the potential voting strength is tremendous.

The gathering of celebrants at Marx Meadows in Golden Gate Park was one of the high points of the day. There were music and speech-making. The Meadow was also the scene of some low points when rowdy "straights" attacked individuals there and attempted to disrupt the fun. They failed.

# Show Biz In Review

## Stage: The Baker's Wife

There were only two things wrong with "The Baker's Wife" now playing at the Curran Theatre -- the curtain went up at 8:40 and didn't come down until 10:50. As I rose from my stupor at 10:51 and headed for fresh air and Geary Street, it seemed incredible that life had continued merrily along outside the Curran for two hours and ten minutes while I had sat numb in a vacuum.

Lest you get the impres-

sion I thought "Baker's Wife" was bad, let me hasten to correct that belief; "The Baker's Wife" isn't interesting enough to be bad, it's just the most interminable bore I have seen in years. Marcel Pagnol's 1938 film "La Femme du Boulanger" was a gem, and Sidney Howard fared pretty well with the same theme in "They Knew What They Wanted," which later became a popular musical entitled "Most Happy Fella," but the simple theme of a good-hearted older man married to a young, restless wife who runs off with the village stud gets short-sheeted in Joseph Stein's latest adaptation. The book is so thin and so predictable that the stereotype characters have an uphill battle ahead of them before the curtain rises.

Stephen Schwartz, composer of "Godspell," has done nothing to help matters along. Schwartz has written a dimly childish score that is at first laughable and later, painful. He also, as a lyricist, is a singer's nightmare, cramming 422 lyrics into 16 bars of music. Patti LuPone deserves an award for valor just for getting through an endless song entitled "Meadowlark" that defies the human tongue. You leave the theatre humming Jo Mielziner's sets. . . which is a wonder. Joseph Hardy has directed with

every stock cliché in the book (including LuPone singing her first number slung against a wall in a 1940 imitation of a French chanteuse) and no imagination; no choreographer is credited in the program, which is wise since there is none to speak of; and the sound came and went with disgusting regularity.

Armed with this fragile little sentimental story and no aid from either director, composer or playwright, the burden upon the cast is overwhelming. Israeli star Topol makes his American debut as the trusting baker. Topol is miscast to begin with, being far too attractive and intelligent to convey a meek, foolish cuckold; but he underplays sturdily and with great conviction to at least bring credibility to the role. He is given two solo bits in the first act as he bakes his bread that are supposed to be comedy highlights and are only cluttered, unfunny schtick. He has nothing to work with, and his low-key solemnity adds little zest to the desperate bid to create a heartwarming comedy. Patti LuPone and Kurt Peterson, as the wife and her lover, sing extremely well and fight to inject some depth where none is allowed. Peterson meets LuPone; she hands him 12 loaves of bread;

and he rushes centerstage and sings, "I'm in love!" Since she has done nothing more than tell him her name, this seems a bit hasty on his part. Not to be outdone, the wife decides to run away with lover simply because he serenades her husband under the balcony with a dreadful song about how wonderful is the bread.

The best performance of the evening is Keene Curtis as the wenching mayor of the French province. Curtis commands the stage and creates the only dimensional and interesting character of the play. The rest of the cast bring excellent voices to stock characterizations and manage to sing several ditties to the wonders of bread without giggling, for which they deserve enormous credit.

Producer David Merrick is presenting "The Baker's Wife" at the Civic Light Opera prior to Broadway. I can only admire his misguided optimism!

## Stage: Same Time Next Year

A.C.T. is now presenting the Morton Gottlieb production of Bernard Slade's two-character comedy, "Same Time Next Year," at the Geary Theatre. Doris and George, both married to others, meet in 1951 and shack up for a night. They enjoy it so much they decide to meet for one weekend a year; and in six scenes, we watch

appealing. So, Doris is the focal point for the audience. We care about Doris; we only occasionally feel a twinge for George.

Act one consists of three scenes that look like rejects from the Carol Burnett show. They are broad comedy sketches with some funny lines, but they show little depth beyond the glib one-liner (usually to do with sexual inadequacies) and become increasingly forced by Scene 3, when Doris shows up for the annual rendezvous seven months pregnant. It's right out of "Love, American Style."

Act Two, Scene 1 provides both the biggest laugh of the play and the most dramatic moment. In this scene, Slade demonstrates the playwrighting ability that elevates "Same Time Next Year" beyond another sex comedy. Doris has gone hippie rebellious, and George is stodgy conservative; and it's a fine playwright that can bring us from uproarious laughter to a strong emotional impact in a matter of minutes. Scenes 2 and 3 show Doris progressing from housefrau to businesswoman, liberated and successful, to a middle-aged woman married 27 years to a good man who is "comfortable." George goes from Goldwater conservative to Gestalt therapy to sudden widower.

Two-character plays are tricky at best. Both Gail Strickland and John Lithgow are adequate actors delivering

them progress through various stages of their lives, together and separately, for 25 years.

It is an interesting concept by Slade and a potential theatrical tour de force for the two actors. Unfortunately, his play is off balance; the husband, George, is a whiny, guilt-ridden superficial weakling; while the wife, Doris, is bright, intelligent, witty, strong-willed and

predictable work; and they lack that charisma that generates any excitement. If ever a play cried for a star vehicle, "Same Time" needs that audience identification. And since we never feel that Doris and George are a good couple together, the play becomes Miss Strickland's (or Ellen Burstyn's, or Loretta Swit's, or whatever lady is doing it at the moment).

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Structurally, George must play the horse to Doris' Godiva; if Slade had written a man who was a match for Doris, the play would be infinitely more balanced and theatrically more valid. As it is, "Same time Next Year" is being given a stock production at the Geary, well directed by James Hammerstein; and if you have the forbearance to wait

through the fast format comedy that tickles matinee ladies fancies, "Same Time Next Year" offers mementos both funny and touching with intelligent insight of modern human foibles.

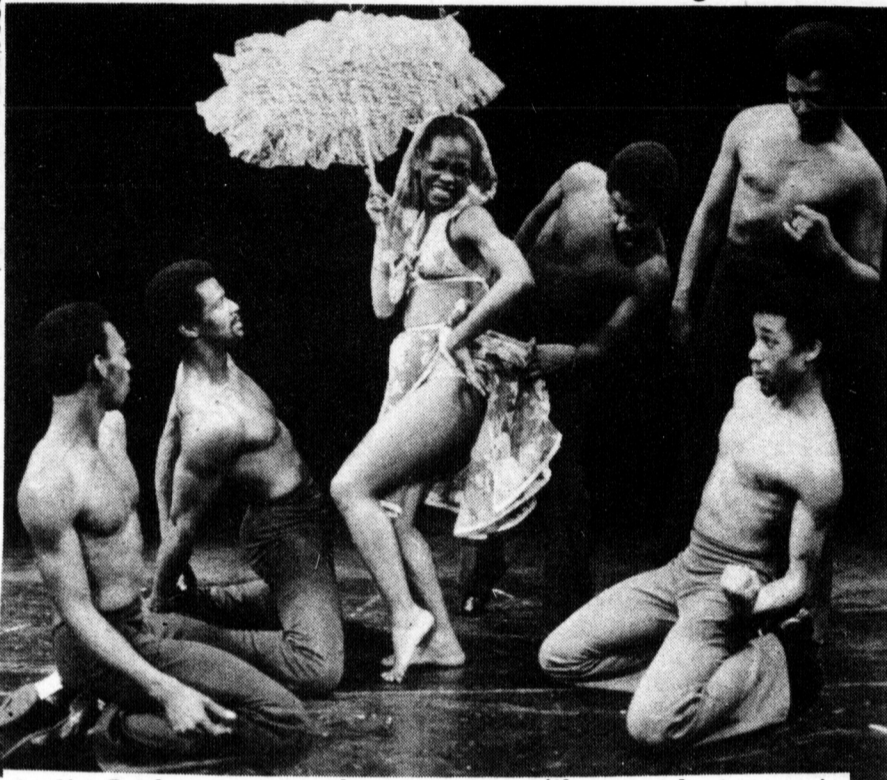
### Stage: Don't Bother Me I Can't Cope

The other A.C.T. offering currently is the return of "Don't

Bother Me, I Can't Cope" at the Marines Memorial Theatre. I must admit that I have never seen this much-acclaimed musical until now; and I regret that fact because I suspect five years ago, when it first opened, it possessed much more power than it does today.

Part of this is simply that there have been several black musicals since 1971 that have dealt successfully with the black lifestyle; so now "Don't Bother Me" is just one more striving to illustrate black dignity. The other reason is that the current cast, gifted performers all, are full of flash and

plastic personality. Nell Carter has a sensational voice, but the acting escapes her. Only Charlotte Woodard conveys both vocally and emotionally the intensity that Micki Grant's lyrics demand. Grant's montage of music touches many styles, both good and bad. Best of the lot is "Time Brings About A Change," which makes a strong statement in an entertaining manner, "Blues for Billie," the lovely "Thank Heaven for You" and "It Takes A Whole Lot of Human Feeling," plus the catchy title song. The score is not really heavily "soul" music; the melodies begin to sound

technique but little conviction. Sheila Ellis has a strong belter voice; she also has a tendency to the "cutesy" and "look-at-me" mannerisms. Nat Morris is handsome and possesses a smooth, powerful tenor but a

repetitious; and numbers like "Good Vibrations" and "Fighting for Pharaoh" seem more appropriate for a black Las Vegas lounge revue.

Since "Don't Bother Me" makes a personal statement for Micki Grant and director Vinette Carroll (two very able and talented women who have mounted a spasmodically joyful evening), let me make one of my own. I bitterly resent any show that forces me as an audience to do the actors' work for them! I resent having to clap along, sing a chorus, join hands with my neighbors (whom I may or may not choose to know) or stand up and become a Holy Roller revival audience against my will. I resent being shamed into not conforming because everyone is looking if I don't. I do not pay good money to enlarge the working chorus, meet a stranger across the aisle or have my right of privacy in a darkened theatre invaded upon. You may let me know it's alright to clap along, and if I so choose, I will. But when you stand next to my seat, tell me to get up and clap and wait until I do, you are leaving yourself open to several rude

remarks and/or my hasty departure up the aisle. In turn, this is not the actor's fault, but the director's. It's all well and good in rehearsals to say, "Now here you all go out in the audience and make them sing along;" but maybe someday, if enough actors protest dirty looks or split lips, directors will learn not everyone enjoys being in the show; some just came to watch it!

"Don't Bother Me" is grievously guilty of this; what it isn't guilty of is heavy-footed militancy. Grant, Carroll and choreographer Edmond Kresley have presented an often entertaining, occasionally obvious message of tolerant understanding. Indeed, about the worst this production could be accused of is a superficial approach to what was probably a very dynamic and original concept at the outset.

### Film: Silent Movie

The best news of the week is Mel Brooks' latest and best film, "Silent Movie," now playing at the Metro. It is literally a silent film, with only one word spoken in 100 minutes.

Writer Ron Clark came up with the idea of depicting a formerly great Hollywood director ruined by drink trying to make a comeback by making a silent movie in 1976, but

getting all the biggest stars to appear in it. It took Mel Brooks' special brand of wackiness to make it work.

Brooks appears as Mel Fun, the director, with Dom DeLuise and Marty Feldman as his loyal sidekicks. DeLuise

eats steadily throughout the picture, while Feldman casts lustful looks at busty blondes (and one hilarious bit with Valerie Curtin, the waitress in "Alice Doesn't Live Here Anymore," as an intensive care nurse who reads trashy love stories while her patients lie gasping their last behind her). The bits are so fast that you barely recover from one before

Brooks hits you with another—a blindman getting the wrong seeing eye dog, Henny Youngman in a variation of "Waiter, there's a fly in my soup," and a dazzling turn by Bernadette Peters as Vilma Kaplan, femme fatale extraordinaire seeking to seduce Brooks away from making his movie for the sake of the arch-villains, Engulf and Devour, a big business complex that wants the studio. And Sid Caesar scores a breezy turn as

the studio chief. But it is the appearance of six famous guest stars that provide some of the greatest moments in the film. The sequence with Anne Bancroft is probably one of the funniest bits ever put on film; and Bancroft proves she is more than a match as a comedienne for her husband, director Brooks. Burt Reynolds and Marcel Marceau also have fine moments, but to tell any more

would spoil the pleasure of discovery. Suffice to say, Brooks' off-the-wall sense of humor gets a full workout in "Silent Movie" and his cast is topnotch, from the smallest sight gags to his luminous guest stars.

Mel Brooks has recaptured the screwball comedy of the early greats—Keaton, Harold Lloyd, Laurel and Hardy—and given filmgoers a visual romp that never lets up. It doesn't always work, but his batting average is amazingly high. "Silent Movie" is the funniest film thus far this year...and possibly of many years.

### Film: Murder By Death

When Neil Simon teams up with Agatha Christie, the results are bound to be worthwhile. "Murder By Death," now playing at Cinema 21, takes the old "10 Little Indians" format of the invited guests who mysteriously die one by one and reverses it; in Simon's version, the top six detectives are invited for a weekend to solve the murder of their host, played by Truman Capote with urbane disregard for anything approaching acting.

The remainder of the cast is first-rate from top to bottom—Maggie Smith and David Niven as Nick and Nora

the tureen. The laughs are fast and furious for the first half of the film, particularly when Brennan reveals that Capote met Falk in a gay bar in San Francisco. Says Falk, "I never did anything to a man I wouldn't do to a woman!" But, as with most of Neil Simon, the gag begins to wear thin and the final denouements are a weak, paltry ending. Most of the humor is of the schoolboy variety (the host's name is Lionel Twain; he lives in an old mansion named Two Two Twain...get it?), but for true mystery fans, the spoof of famous detectives is marvelous.

"Murder by Death" is a lot of fun under Robert Moore's period direction and Simon's contemporary script...one can only wish they could have sustained it until the end.

### Celebrity Flashes

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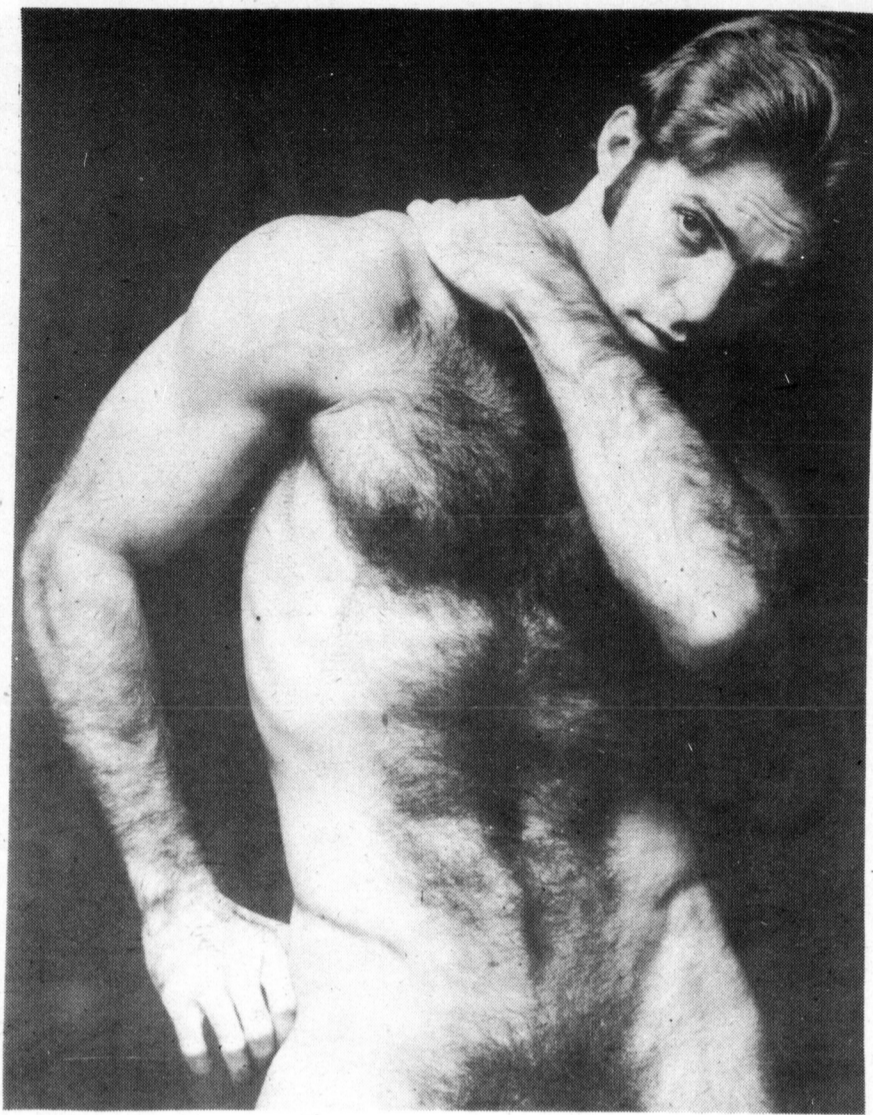

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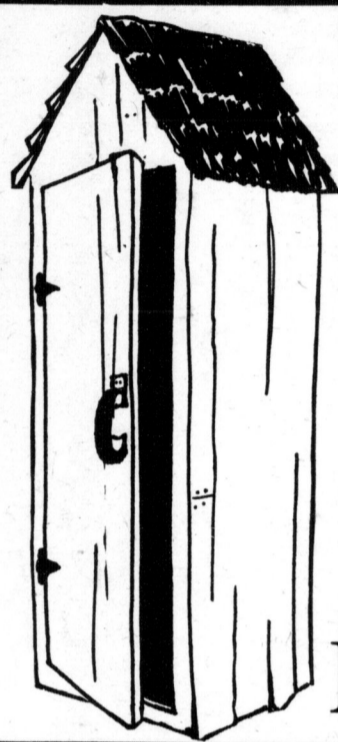
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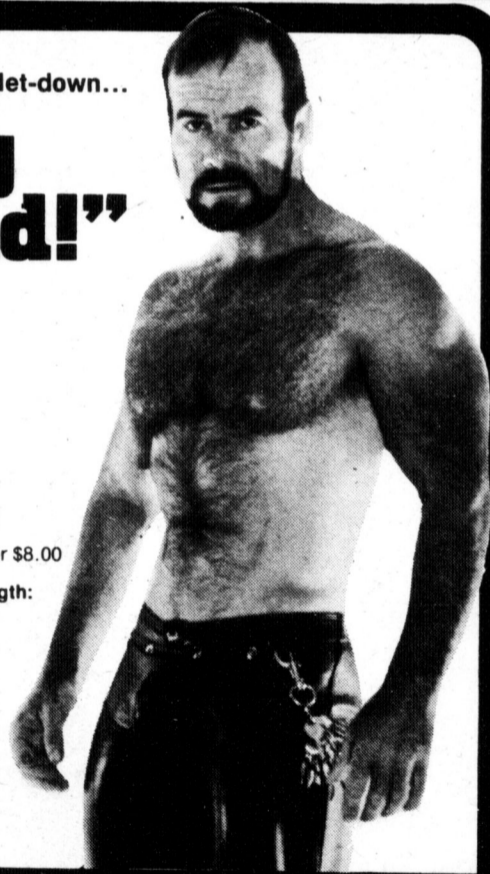
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## The Men In My Life

### One Woman's Over-sized Soul

I bit into Ruth Falk's Women Loving (a book detailing an independent woman's "experience with love") with the best intentions imaginable. Here was an opportunity to assist a first-time-out author. Moreover, the book would launch my long-awaited expedition into the alien world of a young woman's psyche—especially a Gay woman's. To better understand my Gay brothers, I concluded, I had to come to terms with my Gay sisters. What better way than through an intelligent "now" woman's personal story of coming out.

The book ravaged me. Like some timber wolf—injured and abused—I wanted to limp to some safe, rocky ledge and howl my anger and outrage. Instead I sat on my response for over six months—not sure of what to do with what I had to say. Ms. Falk's problem, when I met her, was that no reviewer or publication of stature had assessed her "act of courage by a woman of great integrity" (as claimed in the book's friendly preface). I had volunteered to help.

By this time the book has made its dent on the public, or has fizzled on its own. Anything I had to say, upon finishing the book, couldn't help its promotion so I remained silent. I only hoped I wouldn't bump into Ms. Falk at another cocktail party. I even stayed out of Berkeley.

It later occurred to me that I had often dealt with women with cowardice and compromised integrity—under the guise of gentlemanly deference. No doubt one more facet of male sexism...

Over the months the bitterness did not abate. The mere mention of Women Loving produced the same wounded howl. I suppose it's far fetched to say one can be raped by a book. Perhaps victimized is a

better way of putting it. Pit an enthusiastic innocent against a bulwark of courage and great integrity and who wins? What are a sexist's chances against "a sharing that is a gift of love"? All too often enemy men in my life have labeled me an ingrate. Would I now be adding nice-lady writers to the list?

A woman gave me life and all too likely one will bury my corpse and weep for my memory. Would I never cease to sink my fangs into their damnable "gifts of love"? Or to put it another way: to repeat my gut reaction to their kicking me in my balls.

A half year has passed, yet the experience still nags. Silence has become more galling than golden. And filing my claim was one way to grab a piece of courage and to salvage an ounce of integrity. As one friend chirped, "In love affairs, albeit bookish, one crime (especially the unreported mental variety) deserves another." On that note I dug up my hatchet.

If for nothing else, I had invested over a week threading my way through Women Loving, ending up with nothing to show for my labor but lockjaw and a bad taste in my mouth that refused to go away. Some form of payment was due.

And finally if only to clear the decks of my life, to get on to items of less integrity. To say at last what I've been bursting to say for months. "Ms. Falk, your book stinks."

Saying that, I am once again free and clear, and the account is closed. If I were truly courageous, I'd drop the book in the garbage. That liberated I'm not!

In case some perverse sensibility is still wondering, "How could anything published by so prestigious a firm as Random House be that bad?" I have hidden away ten pages of erratic notes with nary a nice word in the lot. Slim pickings after enduring 550 pages of pure intentions. I will forward them to anyone who figures

It is a symbol of the cyclic movement of the world of phenomena and pertains to the unconscious.

Horse symbolism in the form of pairs of horses represents death and rebirth.

"A . . . ar . . . rooh . . ." There I go howling again . . . trying to wolf it down.

### GAY JOB CORPS

The Job Corps for Disabled Gays, a state funded program for helping disabled members of the gay community overcome their problems and find employment, will be terminated on September 30 of this year unless a new sponsor and source of funds can be found.

The program began on October 1, 1975, at the Society for Individual Rights under a \$24,000 grant obtained by the Whitman Radclyffe Foundation from the State Department of Rehabilitation. SIR provided \$4,000 in matching funds plus administrative services, office space, telephone service and other utilities.

The proposed program for the next fiscal year calls for direct expenditures of \$30,000 with the state providing \$24,000 and the sponsoring organization providing \$6,000 which must be on deposit by September 30, 1976. The sponsor must also provide the administrative services, office space and utilities previously mentioned which the grant does not cover.

Because of a reordering of priorities and limitations on financial resources, neither the Society for Individual Rights nor the Whitman Radclyffe Foundation has elected to continue support of the program beyond September 30. Such decisions by these organizations are understandable and legitimate.

For a while it was hoped that Operation Concern might

be able to "adopt" the program and locate it at Pacific Medical Center. When, however, the proposed Operation Concern budget for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1976, was prepared, it was apparent that increased costs and reduced revenues ruled out such expansion.

A certain amount of controversy has surrounded the Job Corps program due to state directives clarifying and narrowing the definition of "disabled" issued subsequent to the initial grant agreement. At the time the original contract was signed, it was felt that a high percentage of those com-

ing to SIR for job placement assistance fell within the definition of the target clientele covered by the grant. Subsequent narrowing of this definition made it difficult, on the one hand, to limit services to those covered by the grant, and, on the other, to serve the larger group expecting services. The problem was aggravated by a contracting job market and by the necessity for conducting open intake interviewing to reach target clientele.

On balance, however, the program has been a very successful one for the gay community with several hundred persons employed who might

not otherwise have been. Whether it can or should be continued given present resources and priorities is another question.

Those responsible for the administration of the grant must give an indication to the state rather quickly as to whether renewal of the grant for the next fiscal year should be sought. A sponsor and the necessary matching funds are not yet in sight.

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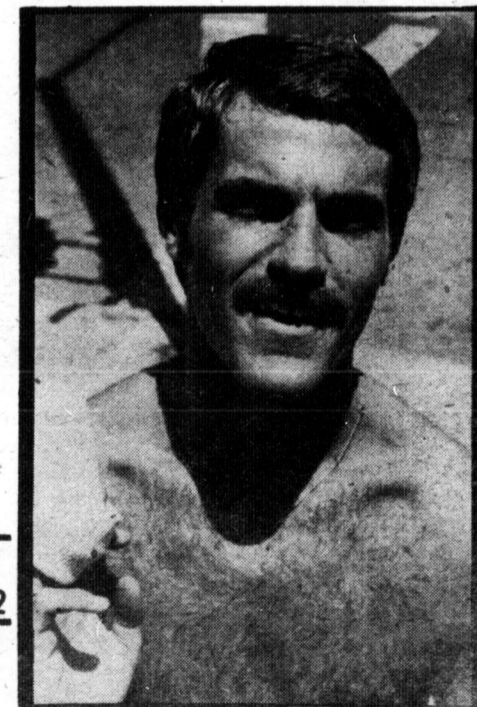

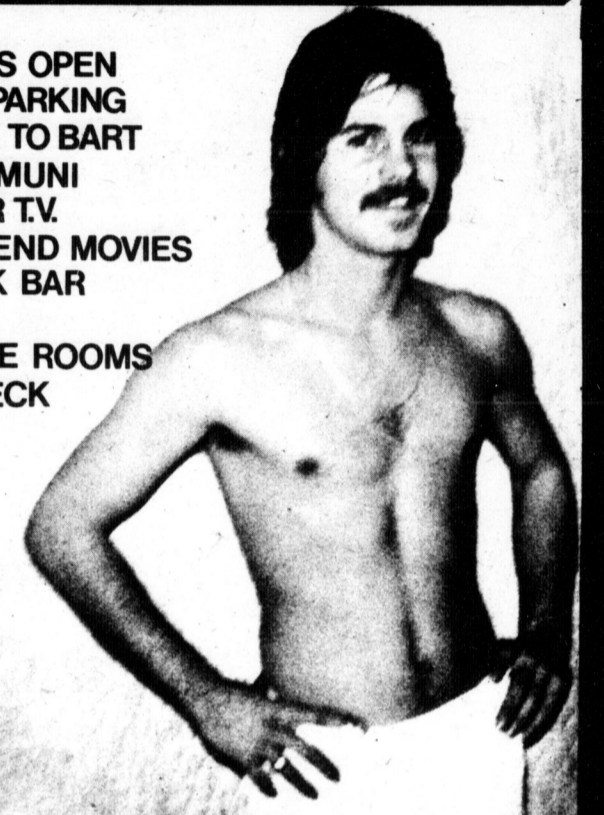

Thank you to my court, sponsors and the many individuals for all their help in making the Empress' float such a great success. I was extremely proud

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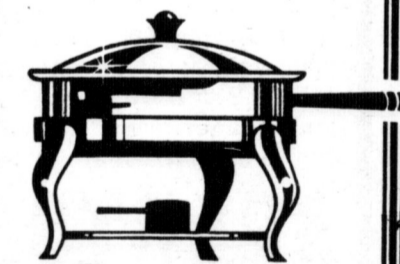
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of the gay community for the warmth they showed me during the parade. This year's parade was a great success—next year's will be even better.

neither use for nor understanding of them, they have seen fit to defend their straight players' attitude with charges against me that border on pure libel.
