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San Jose Gays Mobilize, Win Case

The San Jose Vice Squad's campaign of intimidation/harassment directed at the Gay community has resulted in an unprecedented unity among peninsula Gay groups and a common determination to end this reckless assault on civil liberties.

At a recent general meeting of San Jose's Lambda Ass'n, with representatives of several other organizations in attendance, it was unanimously agreed to form a coalition to deal with this issue on a basis of total Gay community involvement.

A Legal Defense Committee was established. A Community Defense Fund was set up to be financed by private contributions and the participating Gay organizations.

Several prominent attorneys currently handling entrapment cases have offered to form a legal

panel to represent the Gay community of San Jose in filing a class action suit against the city, charging harassment of the Gay minority, with specific violations of civil and human rights.

Strategy meetings are now underway between the Board of Directors of Lambda Ass'n and legal counsel to develop strategy that will include civil suits, public exposure of police entrapment/harassment tactics, and political redress within the straight community to DEMAND an investigation.

In addition, court records are being researched by Lambda volunteers; Vice Squad arrest statistics are being monitored, and the details of recent 647(a) arrest tactics are being documented, with the help of the arrestees and their attorneys.

Another development of the police harassment was evidenced by the "difficulties" Lambda Ass'n is encountering with its per-

mit application for the scheduled June 25 "Gay Freedom Day Rally and Parade" to be held in downtown San Jose. Preparations have been made for the possibility of legal action in this matter should it become necessary.

San Jose Gays have learned from a reliable inside source that plans are afoot between the Vice Unit and the D.A.'s office to expand harassment to other areas of the Gay community.

VICE CHIEF DENIES ENTRAPMENT

Meanwhile, Sgt. Louis Hernandez of the Vice Unit has denied that entrapment techniques are used in making solicitation arrests. "We do not use entrapment tactics..." the sergeant told KPFA reporter Bill Hartman in a recent interview.

San Jose Vice Squad Tactics - Who Cares?

The SAN FRANCISCO CHRONICLE wondered aloud in an editorial last week wherefore and how come the SFPD had a special detention room in the basement of the Hilton Hotel. The editorial followed a story of a woman being beaten trying to get out of a car (a police car it turned out). A man who came to her aid (thinking she was being mugged) ending in his own arrest and a broken jaw.

We wonder if the establishment press in San Jose would be similarly disturbed to learn that the Vice Squad, coming under increased fire for its entrapment techniques, keeps a motel room in South San Jose where it has taken its victims in vice arrests. Where some sort of pre-interrogation, pre-booking "procedures" take place. The Travelodge Motel on South 2nd Street.

We also wonder if the San Jose media would be as concerned that those arrested by undercover vice cops are first photographed with a polaroid camera (usually four photos) before or while being booked. The usual mug shots are taken later at the police station. We wonder if the Vice Squad has been directed to keep separate files on their victims.

It seems to us that one of the media's responsibilities (particularly the press) is to play watchdog on abridgments of citizens' civil rights. We commend the SF CHRONICLE in its vigilance over highly unusual procedures. Isn't it about time the SAN JOSE MERCURY began to look into its own Police Department. And we're also talking about doctored tapes, "most peculiar" alterations in arrest records.

For no lesser offenses a President of the United States was driven from office. Are obstruction of justice and questionable police tactics any less serious at the local level than at the national level? We ask you, SAN JOSE MERCURY, where is your Woodward & Bernstein?

Or is there kind of a San Jose executive privilege and a "local" security that overrides our constitutional rights? We also doubt the answers will come from the San Jose Police officials.

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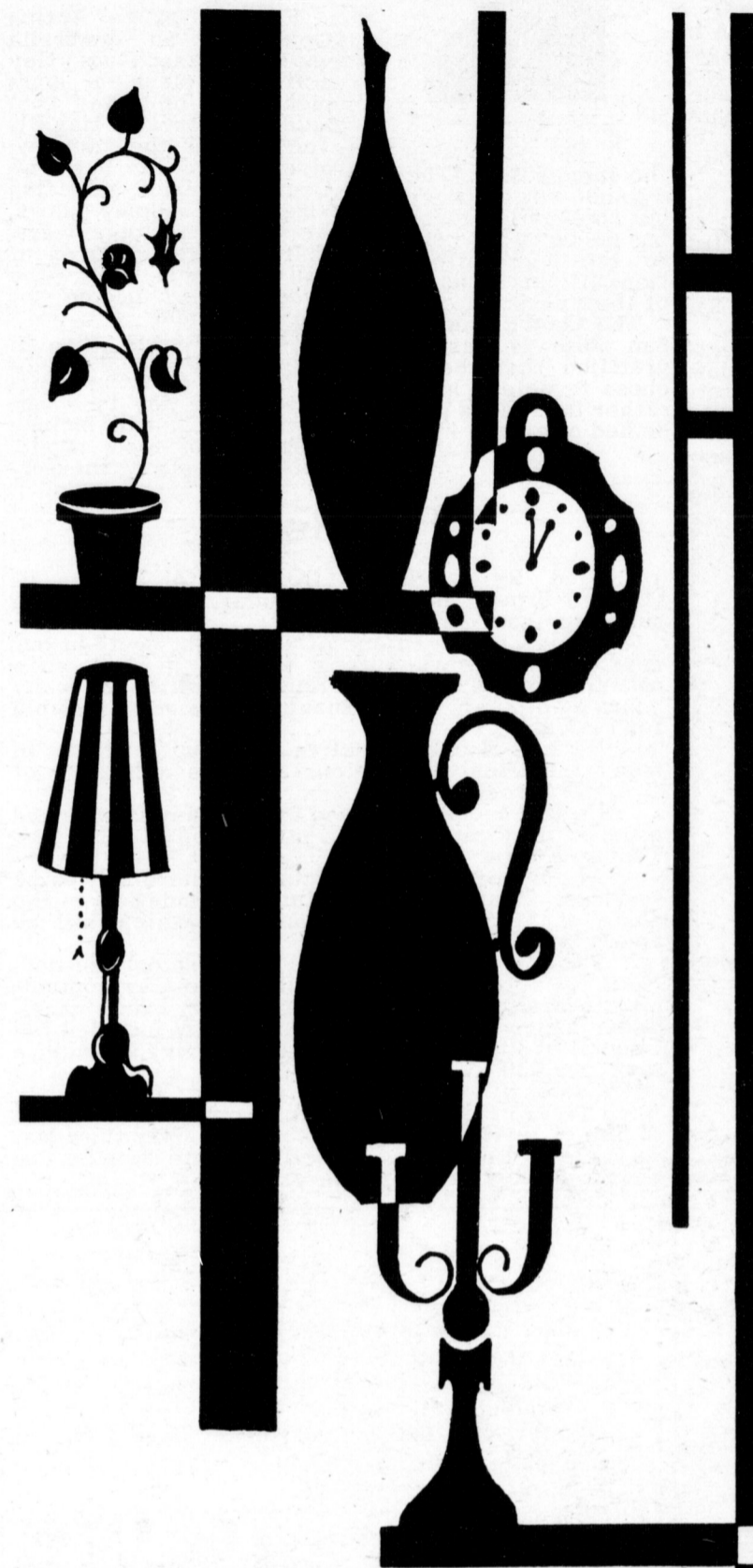
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Entrapment Victim Found Innocent In S.J. Court

On the morning of April 7, one of the hundred-plus 647(a) victims in the current rampage of entrapment/harassment going on in this city, went to trial.

In what may become a landmark decision, the Hon. Robert Beresford of the San Jose Municipal Court found the defendant innocent of the charges filed by the "undercover" arresting officer - a ruling which displeased the

homophobes responsible for the on-going Vice Squad harassment of the Gay community.

According to the defendant, the outcome of the case was decided on two major details. Through cross examination of the arresting officer, it was determined that the officer had lingered in the vicinity of the defendant's parked auto, approached the car without invitation, initiated the conversation, then voluntarily entered the defendant's vehicle. A series of events which the court viewed as "solicitation" by the officer - NOT the defendant.

More importantly, the court held that when the zealous officer got into the victim's car under the above circumstances, he

did so as a "consenting adult" in a PRIVATE place. This interpretation of the automobile as a "private place" is critical in relation to the wording of the 647(a) penal code which states that, "... one who solicits anyone to engage in or who engages in lewd or dissolute conduct in any public place, or a place open to public view ..." is guilty of disorderly conduct, a misdemeanor.

This pattern, where the arresting officer singles out his intended victim then makes the approach in an alluring manner, is TYPICAL of the many San Jose entrapment cases.

The verdict in this case is encouraging, but it does not assure that future cases brought before a different judge will have

Supreme Court To Be Picketed

The Gay Action Coalition, an umbrella group for East Coast Gay activists, plans a mass picketing of the U.S. Supreme Court on May 21. The date is the first anniversary of the Supreme Court's decision upholding Virginia's sodomy laws. According to organizers, that federal precedent will adversely affect the lives of Gay people for years to come.

The picketing will be followed by "celebrations of Lesbian and Gay male love." The day in Washington, D.C., will include a sharing of food, music, crafts, and street theater.

The same result. The case did not set a precedent, but those with trials pending under 647(a) can refer to the legal interpretations of this case as part of their defense.

The Gay community of San Jose is particularly gratified that the victim chose to defend his rights rather than plead guilty as he had originally intended.

There will be a special open bar on Tuesday, April 19, from 5 to 8 PM at the Kokpit. This will be in lieu of services, and all who wish to pay their last respects to the deceased are invited to drop by and have a drink in Fred's memory.

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No, No, Anita!

Not long ago we expressed pleasure that Miami singer Anita Bryant retained her TV job despite an anti-Anita campaign brought on by her opposition to a Dade County ordinance that prohibits discrimination against homosexuals. Now, due largely to Miss Bryant's efforts, the county has scheduled a special June election to reconsider the measure, and we hope the voters will uphold it. Some correspondents interpreted our support for Miss Bryant's right to speak as support for what she has been saying. Far from it. Miss Bryant's arguments - such as her charge that homosexuals are out to recruit converts among children - are absurd as well as benighted, and county officials are to be commended for extending the area of civil rights to an often abused group. It is good that Miss Bryant is keeping her job; it would be better if she lost her campaign.

Increased picketing and soliciting of funds have occurred in San Francisco to protest Anita Bryant's "Save Our Children, Inc." anti-homosexuality crusade. Last weekend the GLA picketed the Northpoint Co-op Food Store to protest sales of Florida citrus products. Another picket line will be thrown up at the Safeway Store at Church & Market on April 15 at 7 pm.

Another group of activists have set up tables in the Castro and Polk areas on weekends to raise funds to aid the Dade County Coalition. Non-Florida oranges are sold for \$1, and donations are accepted.

S.I.R., at its last meeting, voted to support the boycott. As well, the Board of Directors of the Berkeley Co-op will take up the boycott issue at its next meeting.

Letters lending moral support to the Dade County Commission which originally passed the civil rights ordinance have been sent by Mayor George Moscone and, reportedly, Supervisors Quentin Kopp and Dianne Feinstein.

Letters of support are still urged for the Dade County Commission - also letters of protest to the Florida Citrus Commission and funds to Dade County Coalition for the Humanistic Rights of Gays, P.O. Box 414, Miami, FLA 33133, c/o Bob Stickney. The Miami Gays seek to raise \$400,000.

Prominent Cleric Replies To Anita

The Rev. G. William Sheek, director of the National Council's family ministries and human sexuality, has notified the Dade County Commission that he was deeply disturbed "about certain myths and stereotypes that are being perpetuated in the dialogues over the ordinance concerning civil rights for homosexuals."

Sheek, a top official of the prestigious National Council of Churches, said that Anita Bryant misrepresents certain Christian positions and stereotypes

homosexuals. Homophobe Bryant has been quoted as saying, "God puts homosexuals in the same category as murderers." And that the Miami civil rights battle is one of "the agnostics, the atheists, and the ungodly on one side and God's people on the other."

The eminent churchman pointed out that Bryant and her followers were wrong. That the Bible has no single nor clear position on homosexuality. Or that the official Biblical position is that homosexuality is a "sin against nature" not to be tolerated in society.

One local churchman recently commented that if Ms. Bryant misrepresented Florida oranges as woefully as she misrepresents the Bible, most of America would be sucking lemons.

BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board of Elders of the Universal Fellowship of Metropolitan Community Churches condemns Ms. Bryant's activities and the activities of those supporting her in her homophobic campaign;

That members offer spiritual, moral and financial support to those organizations working to uphold the Dade County, Florida, ordinance prohibiting discrimination against Gay people;

That all citizens, Gay and non-Gay, who support civil rights join in the effort to defeat Ms. Bryant's efforts in Dade County, and the Elders warn that these efforts, in successful, will be the first step in a national campaign against the civil rights of Gay people.

To support the efforts of many groups in boycotting the products of the Florida Citrus Board until either:

Where Does The Political Left Stand On Anita Bryant?

The inconvenience of not drinking frozen or canned orange juice is minor compared to the inconvenience that too many Gay people are already feeling.

ONE HUNDRED MILLION CANS

We may make jokes about her, toss her off as a crazy; but that is just what many Germans did about Hitler. Then it was too late. Bryant won't be any Hitler, but while those amongst us are apologizing for her or still drinking OJ from Florida, there will be more Ovidio Ramoses.

Some say that ONE can of OJ won't make any difference. Before Bryant becomes more powerful, remember that your ONE can adds up to millions of ONE cans throughout the nation. The only way to stop this bigot is to have a fully effective economic boycott.

ACID TEST

And this issue is an acid test for the political left.

The left has always been at the forefront of every civil rights movement. They have never walked away from any group or individual when rights were at stake. From the Blacks to the farm workers; from the Rosenbergs to Ellsberg. Yet the silence from the left is all we hear. The political left must be questioned, and they must answer. In the meantime, every Gay person has to do their part by dumping all Florida orange juice. By squeezing fresh California or Texas oranges, one puts the squeeze on Anita Bryant. The day after she and her ilk win is too late to stop her. Today is the test for all of us.

SF Telephone-Recording Poll

OVERWHELMINGLY SUPPORTS GAYS

Responding to a classified advertisement urging readers to "Talk to Bionic Voice," an estimated 900 persons were interviewed by a sophisticated telephone-recording system. The automated interviews lasted one short week. Killed by adverse publicity.

The recording greeted the callers and then asked questions ranging from city government to drug addiction. Two questions related to Gay people: "Did you know that more than 25% of the white, single male population of San Francisco is homosexual?" and "How do you feel about homosexual teachers in the high schools?"

Said Jeremy Ets-Hokin, the man behind the venture, "All I wanted to know was the feeling toward homosexuals in the city. My own feeling is that they are human beings and entitled to do whatever they want. There's no reason they shouldn't teach in the schools."

He said callers to the Bionic Voice agreed, as 91% said they have no objection to Gay teachers at any level.

Transsexual Bill Update

SACRAMENTO - The State Assembly voted 41 to 30 to allow transsexuals to be issued new birth certificates reflecting their gender change.

The bill, sponsored by San Franciscan Willie Brown and supported by both Assemblyman Art Agnos (D., S.F.) and the Brown administration, now faces stiffer opposi-

tion in the State Senate (traditionally more reticent in liberalizing sex laws).

According to observers, the debate was low key in contrast to the heated passions spurred by sex laws in previous sessions. The bill would allow a transsexual, for a \$5 fee and a letter from a doctor attesting to a sex change, to be issued a new birth certificate indistinguishable from the original. A name change could also be secured on the new document if the court approved.

Said Agnos, "This is nothing new and mysterious. It just allows people the dignity that other government agencies already give them." - i.e. military discharges, driver's licenses.

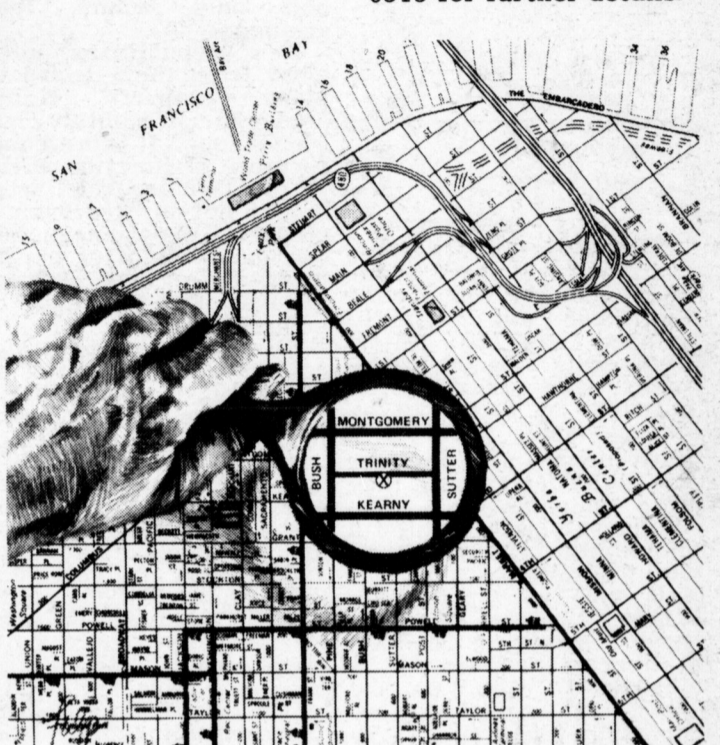

Gay Politic Politics Within CDC

"I keep saying that I am a Democrat, but I ain't. I just pretend to be 'cause Democrats are funny and I'm supposed to be."

- Will Rogers

The truth is that Democrats are still sort of, funny people. I am one of them and I am constantly amazed how my fellow Democrats ignore the reality that Americans do not vote by party but by issues and candidates. Most people still register as Democrats but they vote Independent. The Democrats who elected a movie star who wanted to build a mansion for himself and was politically Right (Ronald Reagan) turned about and elected a liberal seminarian who desired to sleep on the floor and signed a Gay rights bill into law (Jerry Brown). Democrats ARE

not only funny, but strange.

Few Republicans move away from their desire to place property rights above human rights. Thus I have found it more comfortable to function within the Democratic Party. It has not always been a pleasant experience, but the socialists offer me an alternative that I have always found too vague to comprehend.

This brings us to a discussion of Gay politics in California, particularly the way we function within the California Democratic Council (CDC). The CDC began in 1953 as a coalition of Democratic clubs under Alan Cranston and grew in stature until 1963 when it had 650 clubs and 75,000 members. Today, CDC has dropped to 175 clubs and a membership of 45,000. In 1963 the powerful CDC, which was able to produce thousands of door-to-door workers on election day,

came under attack by Assembly Speaker Jesse Unruh, who was then building his own private power base. At about the same time, many who had received CDC help in elections began to form their own power structure - outside of the Democratic Party and outside of the CDC. The weakened CDC has been trying to hold itself together ever since.

How influential is the CDC today? Few legislators pay any close attention to the scores of resolutions passed at the annual CDC conventions. (Save the Whales, Save the Nudists, etc.) In fact, a number of those attending the conventions (1,500 at the recent San Jose affair) moved about in hotel "hospitality" suites and in corridors during floor debates. Some claim that legislators appreciate the information sent to them from the CDC, and others believe that the delegates to the national conventions use CDC resolutions as guidelines in their deliberations. Special interest groups, such as the Gay Caucus, use the CDC for their own purposes in organizing around issues that interest them.

A few years ago the most important Gay politico in California, Jim

Foster, used his considerable expertise and contacts to introduce Gay politics to the Democratic Party and the CDC. (Foster is still considered "Mr. Gay Politics" by many elected Democratic legislators.) From this foothold grew a Gay Caucus within the CDC which has now become one of the most active and influential groups within that organization. Today the Caucus has 12 clubs with over 600 members across the state. (Locally, "Alice B. Toklas" is the largest Gay club: Box 11316, SF 94101). Gay people now hold several offices within the CDC itself.

The expansion of the Gay CDC clubs and the Caucus has been phenomenal - all in all, today a potential tool for further Gay rights legislation. While the CDC itself may be questionable as a power, it functions well as an "umbrella" organization - allowing for our own development.

Rev. Jim Sandmire (MCC) now heads the statewide Gay Caucus. His warmth as a person, administrative ability and intense concern have been a shot-in-the-arm to California's Gay politics.

He joins with such people as Frank Fitch (Toklas), Morris Knight (Stonewall, L.A.), Chris Perry (Gay Democrats, S.F.) and Atty. Robert Lynn (San Diego Democrats) in moving the Gay Caucus forward. Sandmire is traveling about the state organizing more clubs and acting as a political liaison. Most important, he has convinced the Gay Caucus that it must raise funds to support a California political war chest so that we can be effective.

Whatever the future of the CDC holds, with Sandmire's leading the Gay Caucus enthusiasm is developing within the Gay community for furthering our legislative program. Jim Foster has encouraged Sandmire and commended his stimulation of a new Gay consciousness in California. This columnist concurs.

AB607 Would "Straighten" Out Marriage Code

Present law states that any unmarried person may obtain a marriage certificate. Bruce Nestande was asked to amend this law so that only a male and female could get a mar-

riage certificate. This bill was introduced on behalf of the county clerk of Orange County and the County Clerks Ass'n who feared that two people of the same sex would attempt to apply. There is no known record of any California case where a non-heterosexual couple has sought a license under this law.

Nevertheless, couples who have a state sanctioned marriage receive benefits that other couples do not have such as inheritance rights, tax breaks, certain types of unemployment benefits, a psychological recognition for the individuals as well as a recognition for special benefits in the private sector.

This bill was heard in the Assembly Judiciary Committee on April 14. Gays are urged to write members of that committee as well as one's own legislators opposing AB 607.

The address is: State Capitol, Sacramento, CA 95814. This bill can be defeated in committee if our friends in the legislature know of our opposition.

Andromeda Hosts Benefit FOR ST. ANTHONY'S

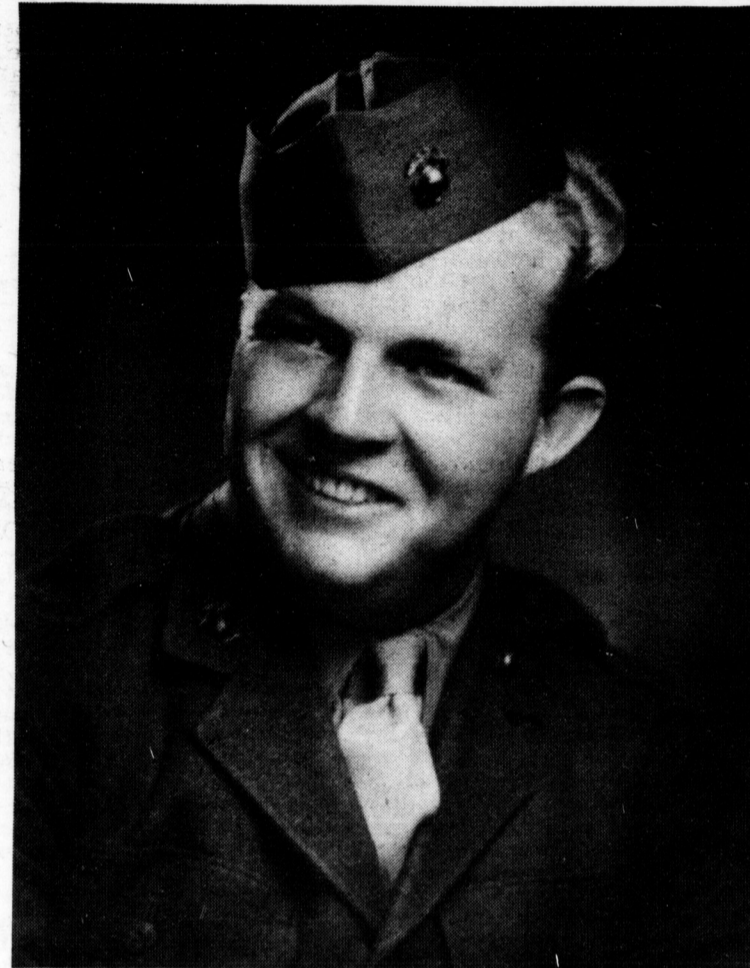
Some of the prizes donated included: Season Tickets to the Spring Opera, Dinner for Two at L'Orangerie, and a Fishing Trip for Two.

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The Gay Parsons

LONDON - Some men embraced and kissed one another in greeting at the first annual general meeting of the Gay Christian Movement in London yesterday. The movement, founded last year for homosexual men and women to achieve full recognition as normal church members, has a high Anglican preponderance, but it is at pains to stress its inter-denominational character. Members of the Anglican, Roman Catholic and free church clergy were among the 200 present yesterday. The major decision taken at the meeting was to try to raise funds to employ a full-time organizer (writes Colin Cross).

There are now 32 local groups dotted around the country, and the membership of 1,000 falls into three categories: Those who are 'straight' in their sexual tastes but sympathetic with 'Gay liberation'; those who are homosexuals but for job or family reasons conceal their orientation.

600 At Arizona State Capitol

PHOENIX - Six hundred them Gay, flocked to the state capitol on March 23 to protest a revised criminal code which would make possible jail sentencing and fines for the state's 229,500 Gays. It was one of the largest and most peaceable protests in Arizona history. Gays publicly came out, a sight not often seen in Arizona, for a special hearing with the Senate Judiciary Committee on Senate Bill 1020 of the revised criminal code. Nearly 300 persons jammed the hearing room while they and the committee heard testimony from 22 persons for more than an hour. More than 300 rallied outside in the presence of unneeded state riot police.

The speakers, Gay and straight, unanimously protested the homosexual conduct code, claiming the bill to be discriminatory, an invasion of privacy and a waste of money. "Making love should not be a crime," insisted B.J. Budd, co-chair of the Arizona Gay Community Council.

Section 13-1403 would make "homosexual conduct" a Class 1 misdemeanor with a prison term of one year and a \$10,000 fine. The proposal legalizes all sex acts between consenting adults of the opposite sex, but makes all homosexual acts illegal.

The purpose of the special hearing was only to take public testimony. No final action was taken by the committee in the hearings. Community leaders hope the committee will delete the anti-homosexual section entirely, or postpone it until next year's session.

Almost half of the 39 persons who asked to speak relinquished their time so as not to be repetitive, as asked by the committee chairman, Senator Osborn.

"The people who will be affected by these laws constitute a sizable portion of the general community," Richard Rubadue, Executive Director of Citizens for Constitutional Rights (CCR), told the committee. "It is our conviction that no legislature would knowingly criminalize such a large portion of its constituents. . . Affectional relationships we conduct with other consenting adults in the privacy of our homes are not, and should never be, the concern of the state." - Arizona Gay News

"Gay" - Our Word, Their Word?

Why Call Them Gay?

TIME magazine (Sept. 8, 1975, p. 32) has claimed that the word "Gay" didn't come into common use among homosexuals until the 1950's. I can report from my own experience, however, that Gay people in all parts of the United States were using the term to mean precisely homosexual at least a decade earlier.

But there is, of course, solid evidence that is far more reliable than my own memory. One good example, can be found in the Cole Porter show "Let's Face It," which opened in New York in the fall of 1941. In a song from that show called "Farming," this lyric appears:

Don't inquire of Georgie Raft
Why his cow has never calfed,
Georgie's bull is beautiful, but he's gay!

(From COLE, edited by Robert Kimball (Holt, Rinehart, and Winston, 1971); "Farming" copyright 1941, Chappel and Company, Inc.)

It is possible, too, that Gay people were using the term specifically to mean homosexual for some time before it became known to even the most sophisticated theatergoers.

We must notice, though, that there is one way in which the word "gay" is currently used that appears to be fairly new. In all of the examples presented so far in this article, "Gay" is used as an adjective that describes a person or a kind of activity. During the last half-dozen years or so, "Gay" has come to be used as a noun, as well: a homosexual person is said to be "a Gay." Newspaper headlines, for instance, will announce that A GAY CHALLENGES THE AIR FORCE or GAYS WIN RULING ON EMPLOYMENT. It looks, in fact, as if it may well be the newspapers - again representative of the straight society - that have inaugurated this usage. Gay people themselves usually continue to use the word mainly as an adjective, adding a noun to indicate a person. We speak of "a Gay man" or "a Gay woman" or "Gay people." But the newspapers will surely win. "Gay" as a noun is already in the language, just as "homosexual" is a noun is.

Strictly speaking, there isn't really any such thing as "a Gay" or "a homosexual" because there is nothing about a homosexual person that distinguishes him or her from anybody else - except participation in homosexual activities. It is the activities, not the people, that are homosexual. Besides, some people who are called homosexual also participate in other kinds of sexual activities. A homosexual may also be a heterosexual in different circumstances. We use the words "homosexual" and "Gay" as nouns - and sometimes as adjectives - purely as a matter of convenience in speaking and writing. They reflect our need to put labels on people.

But when we are not careful, labels can lead to misunderstanding. All too often, a label is mistaken for a preconceived notion that bears little resemblance to actual people. Let us recall the two statements which were presented at the beginning of this article. A well-known San Francisco columnist has asked on several occasions, "Why do they call them Gay when so many of them aren't?" And a commentator on National Public Radio has complained about what he thinks is a perversion of the meaning of "gay": "No self-respecting person feels safe using the word any longer." Perplexity over the use of the word "gay" is really a disguise for something else in these statements, isn't it?

What the columnist is really saying is that he believes that Gay people are unhappy people - a belief for which there is no evidence in fact. What is happiness? How do you measure it? Moreover, it is possible that Gay people may sometimes be unhappy simply because too many straight people insist upon making disparaging remarks about them.

What the radio commentator is really saying is that he is afraid that somebody might pin a Gay label on him. It is not the use of the word that bothers him - it is what the word represents. Apparently this commentator has also forgotten (or has never known) that Gay people are people, too, and that they have - and are entitled to - as much self-respect as anyone else.

Whether we like it or not, the word "Gay" now means homosexual in our language. The next time you hear it or see it in print, try to remember that it is not a "nice" word usurped and turned inside out by Gay people. It is a perfectly good and useful term bestowed upon all of us by our English-speaking - and presumably straight - ancestors.

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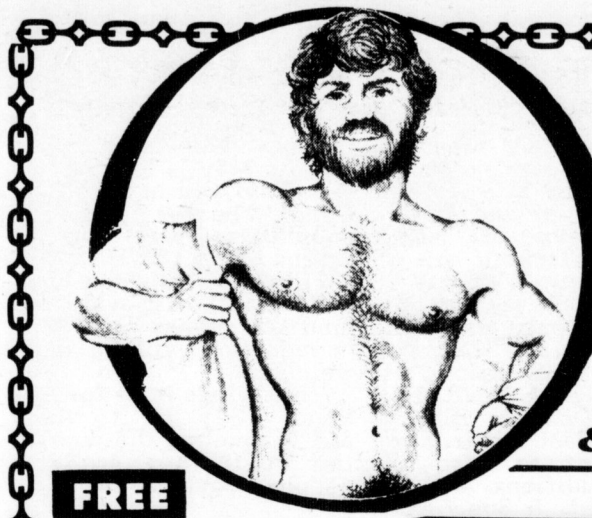

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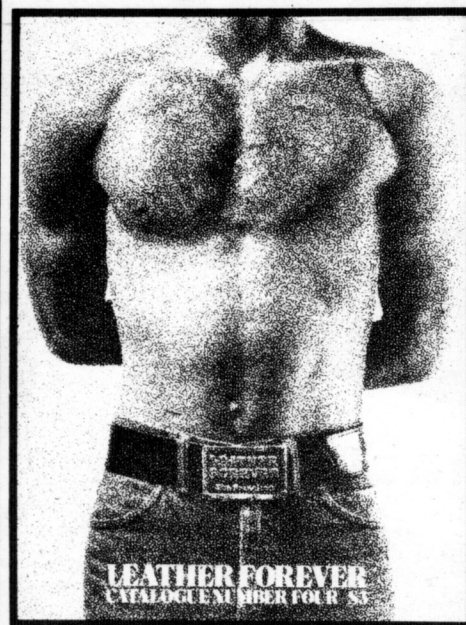

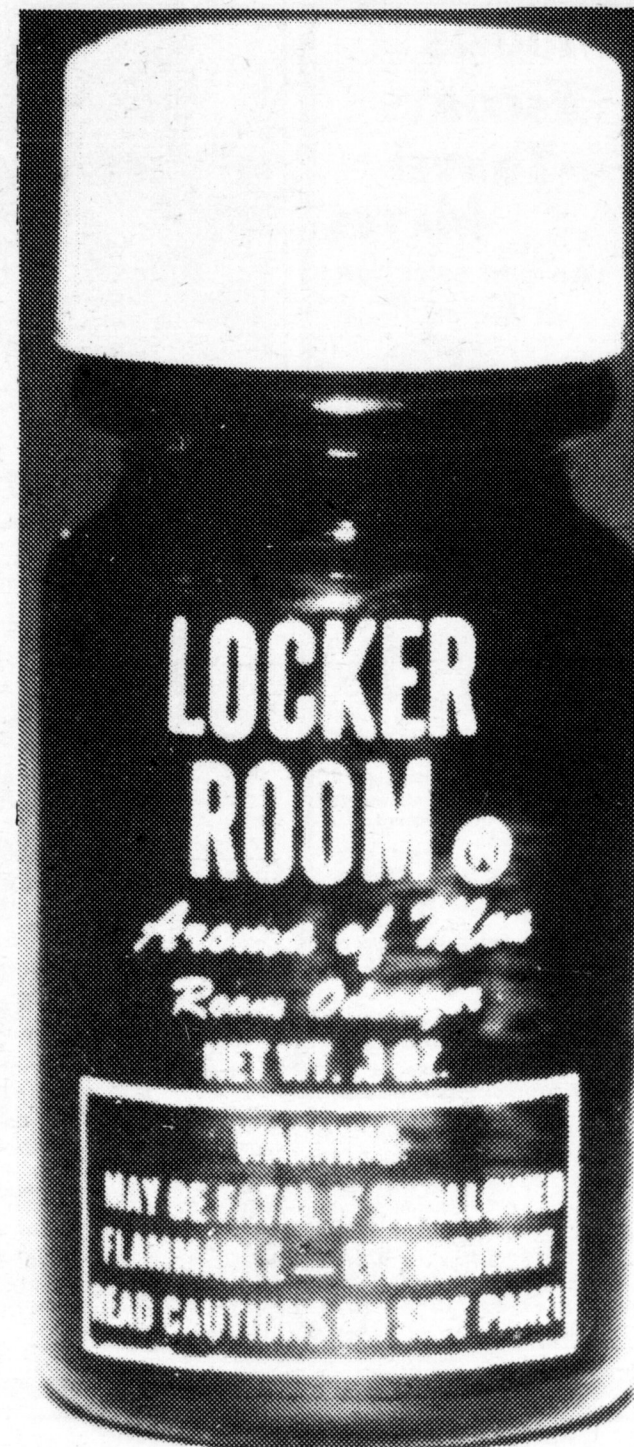

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pard's "Travesties." Stoppard's verbose word-play has moments of electrifying theatricality and a tour de force turn by Raye Birk that alone makes the evening worthwhile. Fortunately, the A.C.T. ensemble offers some of their best work in "Travesties." Barbara Dirickson and Deborah May as Oscar Wilde's Cecily and Gwendolyn are exquisite, especially in a dazzling spoof of the tea scene from "The Importance of Being Earnest" done to the tune of "Galagher and Shean." Sydney Walker as James

Joyce is masterly. Earl Boen as Lenin offers excellent support in a role that could easily be dispensed with, and James R. Winkler is affectedly hysterical as the father of Dadaism.

But top honors go to Raye Birk as a minor government official who recalls Stoppard's imaginary meeting in Zurich, 1917, of Joyce, Lenin and Tristan Tzara, founder of Dadaism, when Joyce asked him to act in a production of "Earnest." Puffed with his own elegant importance, Henry Carr (Birk) takes centerstage with his fuzzy recollections, debating art and political revolution with his contemporaries.

Unfortunately, Stoppard falls in love with his own voice and witticisms, beating us endlessly to death with clever bon mot upon clever bon mot. Suddenly a diamond springs from the rhinestones and we laugh heartily, but he makes a tremendous demand upon his audience to listen attentively for a 90 minute first act and glean the gems from the mundane. He is a self-indulgent playwright, and "Travesties" is little more than a

verbal exercise to display his mastery of word games. No questions are raised nor resolved; Stoppard just tells us his views of art, revolution, garbled history and modern man in his dotage. Fortunately, he tells it entertainingly when he finally relinquishes his favorite dramatic form, the soliloquy, and allows the actors to illustrate rather than dictate.

"Travesties" should be seen not so much for what is said, but the way he says it. The counterpoint with Wilde's "Earnest" is highly amusing, the acting company at their uniform best and the direction by Nagle Jackson is exceptional.

I find Stoppard a superficial playwright who deals with weighty subjects in superficial ways, but his "Travesties" at A.C.T. gets a royal treatment of a common debate told in noble prose.

Club: Charles Pierce

Ol' Blue Eyes is back (no, not at the Circle Star, fools) at The City for another 10 days. Charles Pierce, now officially described as Le Grande Imposter, is back in San Francisco with The Living Dolls (now performing to "A Chorus Line"), Bette and Tallulah, a movie parody of Pierce in the pool with "Jaws" and his imitable mouth. Union Square's own Robert Shields and his personable wife Lorene Yarnell returned in triumph atop Nob Hill instead of the bottom, playing for two weeks in the Venetian Room. If they had looked for years, they couldn't have found a room more unsuited to their brand of dance and pantomime. The stage was low, so that all footwork went unseen beyond the third row, and a good deal of the effect was lost. Also, though both performers are unquestionably talented, their act is structured in a con-

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cert format that has no continuity and a good deal of their material is thrown away and unworthy of them. Best of the evening was Shield's incomparable "The Biker," two mannequins having a messy breakfast, and a film of them in Union Square in the old days. The film was the highpoint of the hour, showing them at their best playing off the vagaries of passers-by (also, it could be seen clearly from start to finish, more than can be said for their act).

It was an unfortunate booking on both sides. I love Shields & Yarnell... but not in the Venetian Room and not with such a disjointed act.

The Demon Seed

As usually is the way, the book "Demon Seed" by Dean R. Koontz is far superior to the film. This is not to say you will not enjoy watching Julie Christie being terrorized by Proteus IV, a computerized brain that decides to create its own child via Christie's body and holds her prisoner while impregnating her with a metal dildo; but "Demon Seed" is not a horror film in the conventional sense, nor a particularly stirring comment upon our mechanized society. The ending is the ultimate copout a la "Rosemary's Baby." Although there are some splendid special effects, I found "Demon Seed" a disappointment that satisfies on no level, despite excellent performances by Miss Christie and Fritz Weaver. Read the book if you want an engrossing, frightening experience; the film is cold and uninviting.

Her voice and style conjure imagery of a sleek chanteuse of the 30's leaning decadently against a battered piano in a smoke-filled saloon at 1 AM weaving her disillusioned songs of lost loves and dreams with a valiant attempt to rise above her sordid surroundings while shedding a tear for what might have been. Her name is Lee Horwin; she is a torch stylist of power and commitment. Not all of her material, an eclectic selection of songs of regret, works for her. Her opening number, "Sweet Misery," should be discarded or moved further down in the show, her closing "Forever Young" leaves the audience on a heavy down note, and there is a self-indulgent song entitled "Brandy" that is lyrically inane and only more of what has already gone before. Her act could withstand more variety, but along the way, she does create a mood and sustain it, no small achievement. With a powerful belter alto she utilizes fully, she excels in creating little one-act vignettes of emotional deprivation, acting as well as singing, and she

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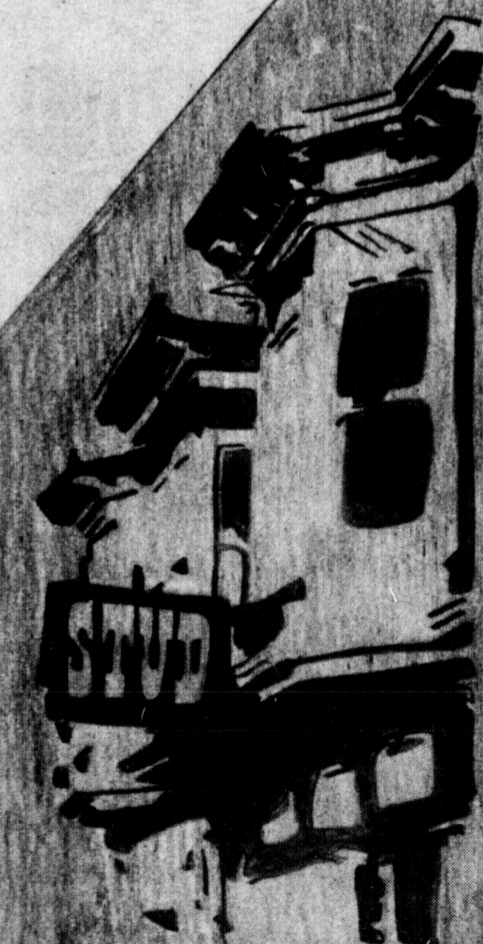
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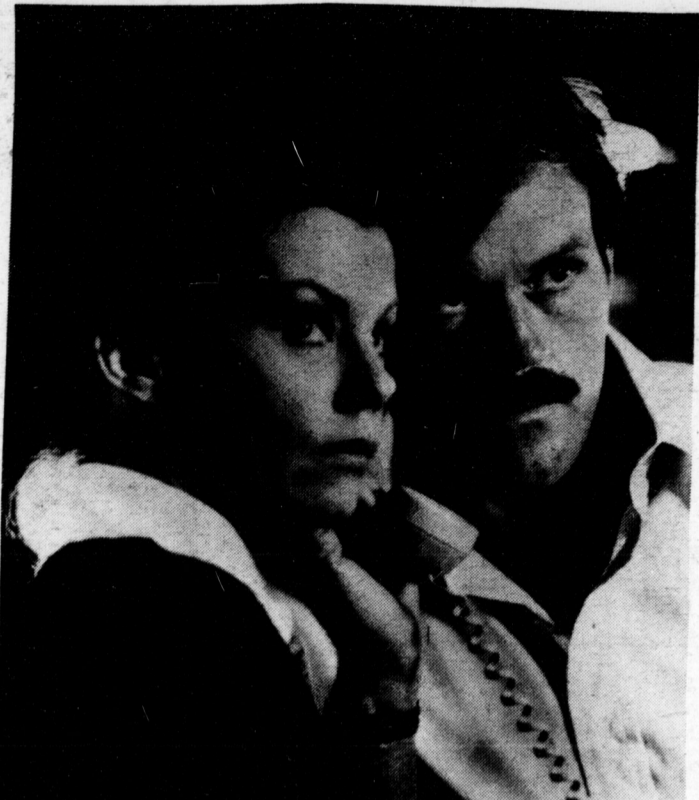

Film: Black Sunday "Crimes Against Nature"

A film that will keep you in constant suspense is "Black Sunday" at the Cinema 21. Marthe Keller, Bruce Dern and Bekim Fehmu portray Arab terrorists, members of the Black September group, who plot to kill 80,000 spectators at the Superbowl game in Miami. The conspiracy involved the use of the Goodyear blimp to spray bullets from overhead, and far-fetched as it sounds, it makes for a thrilling and engrossing film under John Frankenheimer's astute and breathtaking direction. Never does he allow the mounting suspense to subside, aided greatly by John Williams' ominous score.

Robert Shaw, Fritz Weaver and Steven Keats are the commandos trying to thwart the terrorists; and the cast is excellent from start to finish. If we want to quibble, we can maintain Shaw and Keller's accents seem strangely out of place for their supposed nationalities; we might even say we've seen Dern play his beady-eyed psycho many times before; but it works

and that's the important thing. If you're looking for a good, suspenseful and gripping film that never lets up, then "Black Sunday" is a perfect gem.

Iowa City Gay Rights

Some months ago the Human Relations Commission of Iowa City began revisions of that city's human rights laws. The seven member commission has held several meetings with the city council to work out a proposed amendment that would change the law to cover Gay civil rights for the first time.

On March 21 the commission met with the council members in a public meeting and after being urged by several city council members, the commission voted 5 to 2 to delete certain sections

forbidding discrimination because of "affectional preference" in private housing. However, the sections of the proposed amendment forbidding discrimination in employment and public accommodations because of "affectional preference" remain. Thus, the first public "reading" of the amendment has now been accomplished.

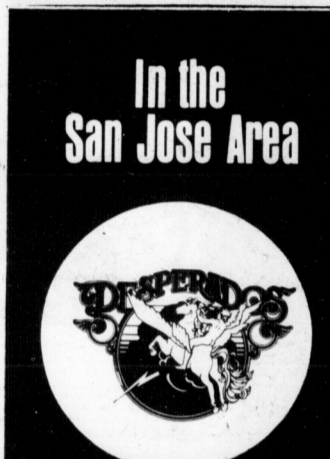
Three more public "readings" at weekly intervals are required before the city council votes.

In an interview, the director of the Catholic Student Center of the University of Iowa stated that although at least one councilperson is unhappy about the deletion of rights in the private housing sector, the proposal will likely pass. Passage would make Iowa City the first city in Iowa to pass civil rights laws to protect the rights of Gay people.

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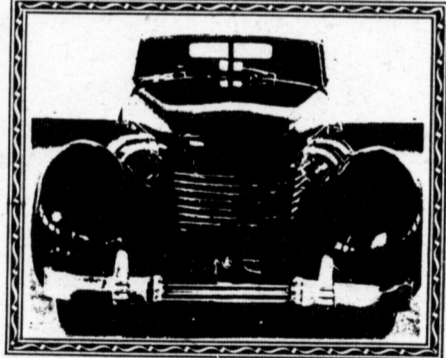

Loose Woman Bites The Dust In Southern California

BEVERLY SILLS as Violetta may look pretty happy but within three hours, Paris' famous courtesan will croak from too much booze and carrying on. Sometimes decadence takes a pretty heavy toll, but at least here it is done with Verdi's beautiful music.

For Palm Sunday, I flew through the evening, to San Diego with soprano what cross-coun-try is to a runner. It tests was pre-flight seat selec-tion so we didn't have to go through the usual scene of Stephen tossing some little old lady into the aisle so he could get a good window seat.

The occasion was the closing performance of the San Diego Opera season, Verdi's LA TRAVIATA starring Beverly Sills. In all fairness, if you want three and a half hours of teary-eyed audi-ences being treated to beautiful music, there is no better way than to watch "Bubbles" die of consumption at a matinee.

This production of TRAVIATA is the same one that was seen on PBS television last fall after being videotaped at Wolf Trap. Physically it is a sumptuous production, which, coupled with the sensitive direction by Tito Capobianco and Ms. Sills' persuasive acting, set a tone to the performance that is rarely achieved. TRAVIATA is, of course, the story of Camille, the famous courtesan, who coughs her way to death during the course of true love and an evening's opera. Too often we see sopranos who are either far too healthy to be be-lievable, or who are, for technical reasons, concen-trating on the athletic demands of making it

me!!" And by avoiding many of the climactic operatic gestures general-ly employed, Sills man-ages to achieve a continu-ity of character through-out the evening. Thus she brings out the far more sensitive and introspec-tive nature of Violetta.

Vocally the perform-ance was beautiful, most touching in the final death scene, where Violetta is again alone in a cavernous bedroom, and everyone else seems to have gotten wise far too late. A pleasant surprise was the compassionate singing of Ryan Edwards in the role of Giorgio Germont, Alfredo's father, who de-mands that Violetta sacri-fice her happiness with Alfredo to save his fam-ily's reputation.

As Alfredo, William McDonald sang very well, but was too detached for a young man having a hot love affair. He tended to play to the audience and appeared uncomfortable interacting with the rest of the cast. Whatever warmth he may have lacked was easily made up for by the passion which flowed from Miss Sills and Ryan Edwards.

An interesting side note: this is one of the few times I have seen Sills perform with two men who are both taller than she, and it made her Violetta more fragile. I once saw a performance of PURITANI where the tenor had been costumed in a huge feathered hat and Joan Crawford pumps but could barely manage an embrace higher than her shoulders. Good tenors are rare enough; tall ones are almost a miracle these days.

We spoke with Beverly backstage after the per-formance where she con-fessed that her afternoon concert in Golden Gate Park last fall was one of the most beautiful singing experiences in her career. In addition to performing in San Francisco this fall in PURITANI, she will be reviving MANON at the New York City Opera and will also sing two per-formances with them as Adele in FLEDERMAUS. For those who have not seen her as Manon, it should not be missed; this is one of the definitive performances in the Sills career. There is a good chance that NYC Opera will make this production available to California audiences on their Fall visit to Los Angeles. Any of you planning a trip to Hollywood around Thanksgiving ought to keep that in mind.

Miss Sills also revealed that she had dropped plans of singing Lady Macbeth in San Diego in '78 but is very excited about the world premiere of an opera she will do there based on a play by Jean Cocteau. She promised it will be "absolutely hair-raising."

For those of you week-ending in San Diego, the Little America Westgate Hotel at 1055 2nd St. serves a fabulous Sunday brunch (right across the street from the Opera House). The lighting above the buffet tables sometimes plays strange tricks, though. I once saw a little lady fiendishly at-tacking a bathtub full of what looked like chopped liver which turned out to be chocolate mousse. Just remember, if you "pig out" on the brunch, you can always walk it off later at the San Diego Zoo.

Recently, San Diego re-leased the lineup for their 1977-78 opera season with six weeks of performances in the Fall and six weeks in the Spring. Opening night will be October 2, with Sills starring as THE MERRY WIDOW. Also in October will be Mozart's DON GIOVANNI, and Bizet's CARMEN. Those of you who took to Josella Ligi in San Francisco's ANDREA CHENIER two years ago will want to know that she is singing Micaela in CARMEN this year.

The Spring season will feature Verdi's FAL-STAFF, Puccini's MA-DAMA BUTTERFLY, and Prokofiev's THE LOVE FOR THREE ORANGES, a rarely performed but beautiful opera.
