

citizens." Geiger insisted that opening up to families is vital for Gay brothers and sisters in the hinterlands "where Gay demonstrations never reach." He left Charleston, S.C., for San Francisco two years ago. "I represent people who had to travel all across the country to be able to live free, who they are." When Kohl needed a Gay person genuinely coming out publicly for the first time to appear on the Saturday night news of a local TV station, Geiger volunteered. "I tried to rationalize that I didn't need to be one of those who wrote home to my parents, telling them

I wrote. It was hard, but now I feel very good about it." At the Monday meeting forming the Coalition for Human Rights, Geiger set up a table "for people who wanted to come out for the first time" by signing up to work with his SOHR educational committee. "It was phenomenal," said he. "Hun-dreds signed up - Ph.D's, people working in the financial district. They said they could lose their jobs over this, but after Miami and the repression ahead, they had no choice." Although Save Our Human Rights was accurate-ly claiming the most concrete results in the early post-Miami period, older groups - militant and moderate - viewed SOHR with some suspicion. Who were the new leaders? Would their high energy last? They were a collection of professional men, largely legal and media, who had never been Gay activists before. Yet everyone deferred to them in the first seven days. All acknowledged it was a new era, desperate for new ideas and full of new possibilities. SOHR's political committee earmarked voter registration as its first target. It immediately allied with the brainchild of Jim Rivaldo of the San Francisco Gay Democratic Club. Rivaldo wants to register 25,000 Gay voters by July 4 simply to amaze local politicians about the potential power of Gay sentiment to make or break any issue or candidate.

Q. We are talking about a letter which claims

Q. We are talking about a letter which claims that true gayness no longer exists. A. I have said that I think it does. Gay wit and sophistication are just as much in evidence now as they were some 30 to 50 years ago. Gayness as a style is still around, too. I speak of "wit" and "sophistication" and "style" because they are the words used by the letter-writer. Perhaps I should say something about why I feel qualified to speak on this subject. The writer has suggested in his letter that I am too young to know about the people and the times very well. I was there. I was one of those people. Moreover, when I was young I was very close to an older gay man whose memories of gay life stretched back another dozen or so years beyond mine. That is why I know that a large part of what the letter-writer says is true. I disagree with him, however, when he says that that kind of gayness died along with a generation of older men. Q. But you agree with his description of what those gay men were like? A. Yes - with one major exception. There is one part of his description that I would like to question. Let me quote from the letter: "Gay' was a high style and required not only education in many areas but constant awareness of what is going on. In general the truly 'gay' groups were from middle and upper classes." I assume that the letter-writer is talking about American gay men. English gay men might fit this description - at least in the period the writer is talking about. But American gay men? I am not persuaded. Q. Do you think the writer is suggesting a kind of snobbishness? A. That is what it sounds like. And I am having

Perhaps an illustration?

Q. Perhaps an illustration?
A. I am thinking of a certain gay bar that thrived in North Beach before, during, and after World War II, the period the letter-writer speaks of. All kinds of people w it to that bar - except, perhaps, elegant queens. There was nothing about the place that suggested any kind of class structure - upper, middle, or lower. Everyone belonged to only one class - gay. The education standard simply didn't apply: there were college professors and there were first-grade drop-outs. A man with a suit and tie sat next to a man with torn dungarees. But the meaning of "gay" that I have been talking about could have been recognized in that bar every night of the week. The place was famous for its wit and humor. The people there had a kind of sophistication that would be hard to match anywhere else in town. And that indescribable tone of the place must be called style, no matter how you define the word. What I am suggesting here is that our interpretation of what "gay" means cannot be so easily pinned down. It doesn't belong to a single class of people, and it isn't limited to certain kinds of taste.

Q. That bar was considered pretty low-down by some people. A. By the elegant queens, no doubt. There is your snobbishness. But I will tell you this: I think those people who went to that bar came far closer to epitomizing gayness than elegant queens ever did. The place was a true melting pot. Those people who used to talk about the melting pot of democracy should have experienced this bar. There were all kinds of people, and when they were in the bar they were all equal. Everyone had a good time. Every-one there was "gay" in all meanings of the term. Out of that place, too, came the first stirrings of what we now call the gay liberation movement.

CURZON: Many people were quite pleasant to me-token fag that I was. However, I vividly recall one male student who wrote on his final exam that he didn't think he could write the exam for me "because a dick-sucking man is worth, at best, a joke."

B.A.R.: What grade did you give him?

CURZON: A fair one. I'm not vindictive ... not in THAT way at least!

B.A.R.: Any other experiences like that?

CURZON: Well, since I've left Fresno, I've learned that one of the poets on the staff there was bad-mouthing me behind my back. I didn't know the man at all, but I suspect he's one of those types who're polite on the surface but seething with hatred of "fags" underneath. I hope it was nothing I SAID to this poet. (I seem to have a knack for making enemies.)

B.A.R.: What do you do?

CURZON: I talk back. I get angry. THE ADVOCATE still holds a grudge against me, I've discovered recently. You'd think THE ADVOCATE would be BIGGER than that!

B.A.R.: Why did you quarrel with THE ADVOCATE? CURZON: I'd just as soon forgive and forget.

B.A.R.: What did that poet in Fresno say about you behind your back?

CURZON: That my writing was "nasty."

B.A.R.: Nastv?


CURZON: Seems almost quaint, doesn't it? I guess certain people want art to be more perfect than life. But I feel uncomfortable as a teller-of-the-truth if I don't present the harsher side of reality. Maybe I ought to write a wholesome, uplifting book - fuck it, no I shouldn't! I try to tell the truth as I see it.

B.A.R.: What are you writing at the moment?

CURZON: At the moment I'm staging an evening of satirical skits that I wrote. It's called SEX SHOW. We're putting them on the first three weekends in

gether we've come up with a lively and funny show. B.A.R.: What's the satire about?

CURZON: I'm trying to poke fun at our sexual behavior. For example, one skit is about Beaver and his Dad - remember "Leave It to Beaver?" They're talking over Dad's plans for Beaver's initiation into manhood - by being sodomized by the 13 Elders of the town. I got the idea from the Keraki Tribe of New Guinea, which actually does initiate its young men through sodomy. I merely transferred it to Beaver and his Dad to show the arbitrariness of what's considered "manliness" and what's not.

B.A.R.: Would you say your skits are obscene?

CURZON: Don't get the wrong idea. They're FUNNY! The sex is not presented realistically -only in a stylized way. I have no particular fondness for pornography. But I do get a charge out of poking holes in the myths around sex.

B.A.R.: Should I bring my grandmother to these skits?

CURZON: Sure, grannies are welcome! In fact, everybody's welcome - Gays and non-Gays alike! We try to touch on all sorts of sexuality - from transvestism to bestiality - but comically! Please let me insist that we're not appealing to prurient interests!

B.A.R.: You sound as though there's something wrong with appealing to prurient interests.

CURZON: Well, theoretically there may not be, but practically I distinguish between material we jack off to and material we laugh at. Maybe in these skits I'm trying to make up for not having ANY sex in my second novel, TIM McPICK; but I'm not interested in describing sex acts for their own sake. B.A.R.: What are your plans after your skits close in

mid-July?

CURZON: Maybe they'll be a big hit and a producer will take them from the Gay Community Center on Grove to the Big Time - at least to some off-Broadway theater here in San Francisco. B.A.R.: And if that doesn't happen?

CURZON: Who knows. I can join the Peace Corps. And I haven't tried hustling yet. If I hurry, I might be able to get in a little - say, six months' worth. Or perhaps I could give autograph parties and offer a blow-job with each sale!

B.A.R.: Sounds novel.

CURZON: Writing's a rough trade. But to be serious - I don't know what I'll be doing after mid-July. Maybe a teaching job will open up. Skidmore College in New York seems interested in me for a fiction-writing post, but I've been through all this before - many, many times. Most of the time, the job isn't funded or somebody else gets hired.

B.A.R.: Are you discouraged?

CURZON: Not really. We survive, I guess, one way or another. Maybe my agent will call me tomorrow and say he's sold one of my new novels. Maybe

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

It is the only place in the world where you can see the cycle performed one week in German and the next in English. Both cycles are sung in sequence with a unified cast and a conti-nuity of voice and drama that is rare. The entire saga involves 19 hours of muthology music saga involves 19 hours of mythology, music and magic woven into a spell-binding treat. Often the schedules of international casts result in a jumbling of the four operas as if some mad projectionist had mixed up the reels in a mystery film. 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
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

Demo Club Requests Proclamation From Mayor by Art James The Gay community of the South Bay held its first coalition organiza-tional meeting June 13 to discuss the Dade County area. Gay activist Paul Bone area.

Gay activist Paul Bone-berg of the Gay Student Union at San Jose State took the initiative and arranged the open meeting in the De Anza Restaurant in downtown San Jose.

Local Gays responded with a turnout estimated at approximately 300

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at approximately 300 people - filling the restau-rant to capacity. The tone of the meeting was established by the opening statement: "So far Gays have basic rights in this county, but

we should construct a temporary organization to temporary organization to protect our own rights and the rights of any other Gays in the Nation should they be threatened by 'Save Our Children' or the like. This organization should be directed by the leaders of the established groups (M.C.C., Lambda, G.L.T.F., etc.) and manned by volunteers from these groups and the community at large. It should be empowered to speak for the whole com-munity in respect to the munity in respect to the present issues and gather funds and volunteers to construct a standard political organization to coordinate a response." The open agenda al-lowed for many opinions, and one of the more elo-

quent speakers to address the issue was Dorothy Theresa Hauser, a Theresa "straight" "straight" spokesperson who felt the need to at-tend and express her feel-ings of support. Her opening remark, "I think I'm outnumbered be-

cause I'm what is known as a 'straight'," drew a roar of applause. She went on to extoll the many contributions that Gays have made to sociion that we should be proud of our history.

Urging those present to maintain a responsible course of action, she re-minded the gathering that we need the alliance of our straight supporters to succeed.

The world is watching to see how, and what, and who wins out. Not only you as individuals are con-cerned, but generations to come will reap the results of what and how you all do in the now. Get your straight friends, and your straight friends, and your families, to come forth and stand shoulder to shoulder with you. Let's all be united as one.'





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
