



Armistead Sues Jock After House Assault

Two former pro-football players who have become writers nearly clashed last February at the residence of a third writer, Armistead Maupin. A confrontation did not occur because Dave Kopay ("The Dave Kopay Story") was not present, evidently irritating David Meggyesy ("Out of Their

A civil suit filed by Maupin and others alleges that Meggyesy called out, "Where is Kopay? We came to get that fruit Kopay." He was joined by an unnamed woman and a friend, John Clancy. Meggesy now lives in Berkeley, Clancy in San Francisco.

Kopay is a former San Francisco '49er and Meggyesy is a former St. Louis Cardinal. Meggyesy is critical of pro football in his "League" book (pocketbook, \$1.75, Warner Books). Kopay is also critical of the sport, particularly the attitude of some players toward homosexuality, in his book.

The suit was filed by Maupin, two former roommates - Jim Gaguer and Brian Bullard - and Maupin's publicist, Ken Maley. It alleges assault and battery, civil rights conspiracy, injury to animals, civil conspiracy, and violation of the Ralph Civil Rights Act of

Applying the Ralph Act (51.7 of the State Civil Code) is a seldom-used tactic. The act states that "all persons have the right to be free from any violence or intimidation by threat of violence." Although the act does not specify "sexual orientation" in its guidelines, the state court has ruled that such categories are illustrative and not exclusive.


The charge is that the arriving group pushed in the door, knocking down Gaguer. One assailant is alleged to have kicked a small pet dog down the stairs. Maupin states that Clancy also tossed his potted plants around.


Maupin and the three others have filed the suit in Superior Court and are asking \$10,000





State where he served as Student Body President. Later he became active in political circles, joining the Alice B. Toklas Democratic Club and unsuccessfully running for a vice presidency. He surfaced in the Bob Mendelsohn for State Senate campaign as a staff worker and later served briefly with the Stokes for Supervisor campaign. Maley lives in the same building as Armistead Maupin and has been a publicist for Maupin and the ex pro-football player turned Gay lecturer Dave Kopay.

It is Maley, with co-signer Maupin, who filed a police complaint last April alleging that investigator Toschi had written letters to Maupin which praised the writer — signed by several women — and drawing suspicion that Toschi may have written the final Zodiac letter. Toschi admits having written his own fan mail but denies that he wrote the Zodiac letter.



He attended San Francisco in New West and include the now-embarrassing anonymous praise that Toschi had for himself. He referred to himself as "a glamour guy," "very smart and a good officer," "a real detective" and even "curlyhaired and adorable."

> It is in the New West article that Maley is repeatedly mentioned as having instigated the Toschi attack. It is Maley who "persuaded me," Maupin writes, "to dig through a trunk of old fan mail" to find the Toschi letters. Later it is "a personal friend of Ken Maley's" on the police force who was approached with the letters. Again Maupin reveals that it is at Ken's house "that they met a police official, Inspector Jim Tedesco, the direct superior to Toschi at the time.

Toschi, currently on vacation after being transferred from Homicide to the Pawn Shop detail, told the SF Examiner's Kevin Starr, "I never met Maley. He must have a ruthless instinct for PR. however. He has sure gotten Maupin and New West their share of publicity at my expense. As far as I can tell, Maupin is the only guy to gain anything out of all this."

Who is Armistead Maupin? Most San Franciscans know that he is the creator of the SF Chronicle series "Tales of the City" — soon to be a book. He is also the talented writer who wrote the sold-out hit show "Beach Blanket Babylon Goes to the Stars" . . . Maupin enjoys being controversial, having kissed Mayor George Moscone on the lips before 500 people at a Castro Theater event and openly advertised for a women in order to broaden his sexual experience.

Police Chief Charles Gain has announced that his latest investigation reveals that the last "Zodiac" letter was not writ-ten by Zodiac. He states, nowever, that anyone could ave written it. The Zodiac's writing style became known when the SF Chronicle published an earlier letter from the murderer.

Toschi is well-known among Gay journalists who have considered him a friend. He sought attention and received it, but he was also considered competent in his assignment in attempting to crack the many

murders of Gay people from 19751977. He attempted to develop a pattern of crime and widely circulated a sketch of a suspect known as "The doodler." Although he was under attack from some Gays for not "really trying to solve the murders because they are of Gay people," this reporter found this not to be true. Toschi was tenacious in his work and spent many hours in Gay bars attempting to find leads. In answer to a question from this reporter at the time, Toschi admitted that if hard evidence in a murder case is not forthcoming within 48 hours of the crime, there is not much hope of solving it.

Toschi now believes that Maley and Maupin "are out to destroy my professional career and my personal life." He said the complaint against him by the two was done "to call attention to Maupin's article and his book. In any event, they signed a complaint at just the right time to get the maximum amount of publicity. Even when I'm exonerated, as I will be, they'll still have gotten their publicity at my expense."



Milk's Last Three Months

Bruce Pettit Analyzes the Board Votes

Mayoral vetoes which he helps sustain enable Harvey Milk to be - barely - on the prevailing side of most city decisions. Even so, all other ten Supervisors win more often.

Milk, the first elected Gay official in San Francisco, joined successful alliances on major issues before the Board of Supervisors about 55% of the time between January and June. B.A.R. has surveyed 40 key votes because of their importance to Gay people and the city.

Dan White and Ella Hutch, now receiving the most criticism among Gay people, prevailed most often.

Carol Ruth Silver continues to agree with Milk's positions more than other colleagues. The two have disagreed on only two major issues removing police/fire collective bargaining from the June citywide ballot (Silver favored) and Yerba Buena convention center construction (Milk opposed)

Voting statistics, of course, are not the single measure of effectiveness. Milk's greatest victory in his first six months took place behind-the-scenes.

April To June Board Votes

B.A.R. is monitoring the performance of up-front Gay Harvey Milk in relation to his ten colleagues on the San Francisco Board of Supervisors. Forty votes have been selected, based on widespread agreement about their importance to Gay and other vital



Perhaps Milk's greatest setback as a Supervisor was losing an ordinance to curb housing speculation by taxing profits on first-year sales at 80%. By 8-2 the Board thought the ordinance would not produce the desired result, and only Silver supported Milk (Hutch was absent).

SYMBOLISM

Milk has fared well on most symbolic issues (those not having effect as law) that he has Board to oppose this legislation employment discrimination against Gays, and to urge closing a consulate because of South Africa's racial discrimination. The Board refused, however, to oppose a recodification of federal criminal statutes that civil libertarians say is dangerous. On a measure solicited by Moscone, Milk stood alone in opposing a plea to the Pentagon to keep the Presidio open.

Opposition to Briggs is one of seven identifiably Gay issues in the B.A.R. survey. Milk's position prevailed five times. Though there is no Gaycommunity consensus that his losses — a guarantee of 330 Grove's continuance as a community center and new mental health funds - reflect Board anti-Gay sentiment, his positions serve as the best comparative. On the Gay issues, only Silver and John Molinari agreed with Milk all 7 times, with Gordon Lau, Hutch and Lee Dolson agreeing 6 times, Ron Pelosi and Dianne Feinstein 5 each, Quentin Kopp 4, and Lee Dolson and White 3

On all 40 of milk's positions in this survey, Silver agreed with 85%, Lau 78%, Hutch 56%, White 43%, Pelosi 37%, Feinstein 34%, Kopp 26%, and Dolson 21%.

> In fact, on 15 items (in the survey) decided by one vote, White was on the winning side of 13 of them. Hutch prevailed on 12, Pelosi and Feinstein on 10, Lau and Kopp on 9, Dolson 8, Milk 7, and Silver, Molinari and Gonzales 6.

White and Hutch also led each at 83% — in the proportion of times they were on the winning side of all 40 votes. Pelosi and Feinstein prevailed at a 79% rate, Lau 73%, Molinari 68%, Gonzales and Kopp 67%, Dolson 62%, Silver 60%, and Milk 55%.

Hutch has come under increasing criticism from some 'Gay people, not on Gay issues but by frustrating their expectations that she would be more allied with the Board's liberals - Lau, Molinari, Milk, Silver and (usually) Gonzales. Gay activists Jim Rivaldo and Dick Pabich, who prepared Hutch campaign literature as well as Milk's and Silver's last year, are among the discontented. The Alice B. Black Ministers Reject **Gay Rights**

Black Church Untouched by Gay Rights Crusade reads the banner headline in the current issue of JET magazine. The article contends, "Though the push for Gay rights has permeated many avenues of society - employment, education, politics - it has yet to make a formidable challenge to the Black church...

One exception to the rule, JET reports, is Rev. Jonnie Colemon, pastor of Christ Universal Temple in Chicago. She states that "the ministry makes no distinction between Gays and other parishoners. My feeling is I cannot decide or judge who's right and who's wrong or who's anything. My job is to teach people how to live better lives. I don't care who you are, where you come from, or what you do. My job is to help you wherever your hurt might be." Colemon emphasized that if a Gay person came to her she would administer aid in regard to the person's problem - not the person's sexual orientation.


"The church is diametrically opposed to homosexuality. states Bishop William Hilliard of the Third African Methodist Episcopal Zion District. He told JET, "I'm not saying that we don't have some in our denomination, but they have not surfaced to an extent that they create a problem." The official position of his church is that nomosexuality is a sin.

A stronger position against nomosexuals was urged by Bishop Jasper Roby, spiritual head of the Apostolic Overcoming Holy Church of God. He sided with Anita Bryant in calling for Black and white ministers to speak out from the pulpit against the "homosexual ifestyle." He said it "is just like any other disease, and if we don't try very hard to stop it, it will grow to destroy us all.

Rev. Colemon's liberal views were not shared with Rev. George Lawrence, pastor of Antioch Baptist Church, New York City, and an official of that church. He sided with Thomas Kolgore, president of the Progressive National Baptist Convention who has said, "I believe sex belongs in the bedroom of a married man and woman.

Rev. Kolgore, however, takes the position adopted by many Protestant denominations - that homosexuals are people entitled to civil rights. He concludes, "The world of literature, music, art, education and religion would be poorer if: these people had been locked out of society."




A victory was achieved by the National Gay Task Force out of its recent hearing before the Federal Communications Commission: Gays are included as a legitimate minority, worthy of access to the FCC under the federal communications law. The FCC ruled that its "other" minorities category includes Gay people and that local television and radio stations must recognize Gays as having legitimate demands.

Ronald Gold, a NGTF official, told B.A.R. that the NGTF represented 146 Gay groups in its petition. He said the victory was partial because the NGTF had asked for a separate listing
— to add "sexual orientation" to the list of 19 categories now "recognized" by the FCC. Including Gays under "other minorities" will, however, permit local Gay individuals and groups to demand equal treatment by TV and radio out-

The communications law states that the 19 groups "and other significant minorities" must be "ascertained" meaning that their concerns must be sought out by local broadcasters. Gold urged that local Gay groups should now confront TV and radio executives with their concerns and

In the past, Gays could complain but in reality had no official standing with the FCC. The new policy establishes the Gay community as a legitimate minority.

> **High Court Rejects One** Gay Petition. Considers Another

The California Supreme Court has refused to block the anti-Gay Briggs Initiative from appearing on the November ballot, based on a petition filed by several Gay groups and individuals. However, it has vet to rule on a separate petition filed by Metropolitan Com-

The court ruled without comment against the petition, managed that political and privacy rights are denied by the mere presence of the initiative on the ballot. The contention was that the threat of the initiative's adoption is currently preventing freedom of the people to act as Gay persons or in support of Gay

The MCC action calls for removal of the measure, which has been placed on the ballot by the Secretary of State because of its denial of religious freedom. MCC, which has an outreach to the Gay community, contends that Gay school employees in its congregation are fearful that their religious association with the church could later be used against them under the initiative if it is approved by the voters in November. This, MCC contends, has denied some of its congregation the right to religious freedom under the

The petition that was denied was filed by the California Federation of Teachers, Lesbian Schoolworkers, Gay Teachers of homosexuals and other and School Workers Coalition, Gav Teachers of Los Angeles, Gay Academic Union, the Pride Foundation and several individuals.

In the past, the High Court has rejected attempts to remove initiative measures from the ballot, preferring to consider such petitions if the initiative becomes law. Previously, the court had ruled unconstitutional a repeal of the

The Times' Ace Lundon has expanded his duties as Managing Editor to include publishing responsibilities.

B.A.R. has also learned that a local Gay newspaper, GAY-ZETTE, has discontinued publication after producing 13 issues. GAYZETTE had a small press run and was distributed primarily in non-Gay businesses.

Hongisto Heads **New York State Prisons**

ALBANY - Richard Hongisto has again established himself as part of the criminal justice system by accepting an appointment as the head of New York's troubled prison system.

Hongisto had built an impressive list of "former" positions such as San Francisco police community relations officer Sheriff of San Francisco and Police Chief of Cleveland. He had stayed on in Cleveland as an observer in the recall effort to remove Mayor Dennis Kucinich, possibly hopeful of being re-appointed Police Chief of that city. Rumors that he desired to be Cleveland's mayor were denied by Hongisto and his associates. The administrator had recently married SF activist Elizabeth Colton and purchased a home in Cleveland.

In announcing his appointreported that Hongisto was elected Sheriff of San Francisco "on a platform of fair treatment minority groups.'



THOUSANDS MARCH IN NATION'S CAPITAL

by Gina March

On July 9 some 100,000 women and men marched down Constitution Avenue in Washington, D.C., to demand passage of the Equal Rights Amendment. It was the largest women's march in our nation's history and the third largest march ever at the capitol.

"The women's movement is alive and well," declared Eleanor Smeal, national president of the National Organiza-tion for Women (NOW). "We represent millions of Americans. Women's groups, labor, civil rights groups, educators, working people, the handicapped — all people are here

The march was the broadest and most geographically widespread action ever to secure women's rights. People came from all over the country, from hundreds of organizations -Gays and Lesbians carrying banners demanding civil rights for all. The Leadership Conference on Civil Rights and the National Council of Negro Women had large contingents.

Support from labor unions was unprecedented in an action for women's rights with

the largest labor delegation from the United Auto Workers. Steelworkers chanted "U-S-W-A. We're for the E-R-A!"

Marchers included the communications workers, teachers and members of the American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees (ASFSCME), United Mine Workers, hospital workers and Brooklyn Navy Yard workers.

"I've been marching in women's marches and demonstrations for the last eight years, and I have to say that this was the most encouraging march because of its broad base of support," said Sue Englander. a representative from the San Francisco Chapter of NOW.

The march was organized by NOW, the largest women's organization in the U.S. to lobby for more time to pass the Equal Rights Amendment. Two-thirds of the states must ratify this amendment to make it part of the U.S. Constitution. The deadline for ratification is March 1979. If three more states do not ratify the ERA by March, the amendment will die. The thousands of demonstrators at the march were demanding, "Don't let time run out on equal rights. Extend the deadline another 8 years or for as long as it takes to grant women equality under the

The mood at the ERA march was not unlike that of the June 25 Gay Freedom Day Parade in San Francisco. Participants at that rally also heard Eleanor Smeal, NOW's president, express support for Gay men and Lesbians in their struggle for civil rights. Speakers at the ERA rally drew parallels between the struggles of women, Gay men and Lesbians, minority peoples and all working people. Partici-pants felt the strength of their united effort.

"It was truly inspiring," said Mary Spenser, President of the S.F. Chapter of NOW. "We heard from legislators that they were awed by the large support for the ERA. It was almost a spiritual feeling."

Marchers left the rally determined not to give up on the fight for women's equality. "This is just the beginning," Smeal told the thousands gathered at the Capitol.

"We will march; we will demonstrate; we will petition - we will work this summer like never before. We will have bigger and bigger demonstrations," she pledged. The marchers agreed.



Open Notebook

Seven Words

by Jack Warner

Among the Supreme Court decisions that have been handed down recently, there is one that I hope hasn't gone unnoticed by Gay people. I speak of the decision to allow the Federal Communications Commission to ban seven words from radio and television: fuck, shit, piss, motherfucker, cocksucker, cunt, and tit. According to five of the Supreme Court justices, these words are "patently offensive." But there is a curious and rather funny double standard at work here. Apparently what is "patently offensive" on the radio and television isn't "patently offensive" on the radio and television isn't "patently offensive" in public print: every newspaper story I have

seen spells out the words in

The case arose when a New York radio station broadcast a record by George Carlin and a man complained that the seven words were heard by his young son. The radio station took as its defense the unconstitutionality of federal interference in what is broadcast, and so that is the issue that came before the court. There is a large question in my mind, however, about whether that is what decided the case. It seems to me that the real issue involved here was never approached, even though it had an impact on the outcome. The five justices, along with many other people in our society, have made certain assumptions about words and about sex that are simply not valid.

Primitive people believe that words are magic, and appar-

ently the five justices believe so, too. But words aren't magic, except in a metaphoric sense. Words are symbols and tools, and put together in certain ways under certain conditions, they can move the emotions and the intellect. But no word has any power of its own as it stands by itself. Whatever power is involved in an utterance comes from the person who uses the word and the person who hears or reads it. A word is an invention of human beings, and it has no meaning other than what human beings give it. By itself, it is neither good nor bad.

The man who complained about the seven words claimed that his son was injured by hearing them. The question that should have been asked and wasn't - is HOW. Single words can do nothing by themselves, and what shouldn't escape our notice is that what COULD do harm is the father's reaction to them. If the boy responded at all, he responded to the father and not to the words. This would be true even if the boy already knew the words, because the words could take on meaning only in terms of the relationship between the boy and his father. Where is the injury? And who is responsible for it?

Beyond this immediate situation, there is another question that also wasn't asked: What if the boy, instead of hearing the words on the radio, had heard them on the playground when his father wasn't around? don't think that anybody with any common sense would bet that the boy wouldn't sooner or later hear precisely those seven words somewhere besides on the radio. Since the words exist everywhere in society, how can the father possibly prevent the boy from hearing hem? It seems to me that the father deceives himself by thinking that he can control something that is entirely beyond his control.

Maybe that is also what the five justices do. But they speak with authority, of course, because they know that vast numbers of people in this country will support their view. In primitive societies, words that are made taboo reflect what the people in those societies are afraid of. Our taboo words reflect the same thing in us. In twentieth-century America, the words that are pronounced taboo all have to do with the human sex organs and their functions and possible uses. What we are afraid of is

The CHRONICLE headline announcing the decision neatly sums up the matter for us: "Supreme Court Upholds Ban on Seven Dirty Words." We all know what the word "dirty" means in this context: vile, disgusting, corrupt, wicked, sinful. In this period of what is said to be sexual liberation. "dirty" is still a synonym for "sexual." Many people still speak of dirty books, dirty pictures, dirty movies. This is a concept that has grown out of a distinction made between body and mind/soul by the early Christian Church

(although it's much than the Church) and amplified during the Middle Ages. It's a good example of how a belief can persist in spite of evidence to the contrary, in spite of its destructive effects.

What the Supreme Court decision tells us is that there still exists in our country a strong force that clings to medieval values. And that is why the decision is important to Gay people, even though it does't deal directly with a Gay issue. It serves as a weather vane: There's a strong wind blowing that's dry and stifling, and it's blowing from the past.

FPPC Investigates **Briggs**

Senator John Briggs (R -Orange County) spent nearly one million dollars (\$849,487) in successfully qualifying his controversial anti-Gay teachers

The feisty senator is currently under investigation by the state's Fair Political Practices Commission for possible irregular manipulation of funds. Briggs had admitted in his financial statements that he interchanged funds between his Citizens for John Briggs and the Defend Our Children committees. The FPPC states that some of these transactions appear to be illegal.

Included in the \$849,487 figure is an admitted loan from the Citizens for Sen. John Briggs Committee of \$361,631. Briggs also personally loaned the initiative committee \$25,000.

The two committees shared the same office, the same office equipment, and the same staff in a joint effort headquartered in a Newport Beach shopping center

Those organizations campaigning to defeat the initiative petitioning effort were only able to muster \$122,944 and actually spent \$116,415. This campaign was divided between several groups. The major ones were New Alliance for Gay Equality (New Age), the Bay Area Committee Against the Briggs Initiative (BACABI)... the Human Rights Campaign Committee, Concerned Voters to regular Friday night services, of California (CVC), and the Advocate Political Action fund.

- Among the Pro-6 supporters and various social functions. were contributors from many states, as Briggs had used national mailing lists provided by the ultra-Right. A number of large contributions came from Florida, where Briggs has campaigned with Anita Bryant.

The senator's largest campaign expenditure in support of Prop. 6 was the purchase of mailing lists and the actual mailings.



The judge allowed Jillian to live with her mother while the case is on appeal. Defense funds may be sent to Margaret-Jillian Fund, 111 North Main, Ann Arbor, MI 48107.

Victory was ob-tained in Minneapolis where a family court judge said he was "acting in the best interests of the children" in placing the care of three sons with their Lesbian mother. The woman's estranged husband had declared that his wife's lifestyle was "immoral."

The family service agency concluded that it was the mother who was the dominant parent. It recognized that the children knew of the mother's sexual preference, but that they were not disturbed by this and wanted to live with her.

LOS ANGELES - A student-dominated Communications Board at the University of California campus here has approved (7-1) the budget of a proposed Gay campus newspaper. \$6,700 allotment must now be approved by the Registration Fee Committee and the Chan-cellor. UCLA Gay Students Union is optimistic that they will receive final approval and be permitted to publish news of interest to Gay people on

Homophobic **Mayor Rebuffed By Court**

ANCHORAGE. Mayor George Sullivan has been ordered by the Supreme Court of Alaska to include the Alaska Gay Coalition in the city publication BLUE BOOK.
The Gay group was denied a listing in the city's social service reference book in 1976.





Kathryn Boute, who originated the role of Grace Farrell (Warbucks' right hand woman), is gorgeous to look at and a classy talent with a warmth that tingles your toes.

Tom Hatten is more than comically credible as a very far out of it F.D.R.

The chorus ensemble holds it all together and does yeoman plus duty acting, singing, and dancing many roles. Outstanding are Toni Lamond. John J. Fox and a dynamite trouper Frank O'Brien. Keep an eye out for Barbara Brummel. She's an ingenue with that look and maybe the brass to make it big.

Stage: The Lamplighters RUDDYGORE

Without a doubt, RUDDY-GORE is the campiest of all the Gilbert & Sullivan operettas. Not only does it spoof the excesses of Victorian melodrama, it lets loose a few stinging barbs at grand opera, particularly the use of the obligatory mad scene. The Lamplighters produced a stunning Mad Margaret this year in the form of Marcia Hunt. Ms. Hunt, with high cheekbones and red hair, was made up exactly like Joan Sutherland in Lucia drag and proceeded to devour the stage in a tour de force the likes of which are rarely seen. In the second act, when a subdued Margaret was kept in line with threats of the mental hospital at Basingstoke, Ms. Hunt's attempts at self-control were epic, culminating in a flight across the stage on a rope a la

This revival by the Lamplighters is in very good shape. The plot, of course, is pure nonsense, centering around the likes of Rose Maybud, Robin Oakapple, Old Adam Goodheart, and Sir Despard Murgatroyd. RUDDYGORE is often ignored and is not seen as a staple in the repertory, but I think it is one of the best operettas Gilbert & Sullivan produced. It contains some of Sullivan's best music. His parody of the Bel Canto madness (done here with an interpolation from LUCIA DI I AMMERMOOR) is merciless. The rest of the opera is quite "hummable," and a delightful evening of pure camp.



A SPARKLING JEWEL

As I was heading for the lobby during intermission of SIDE BY SIDE BY SONDHEIM last week, I heard a woman behind me say, "Of course the lyrics are brilliant, but you can take just so much brilliance." "Madame," I was tempted to say, "speak for your own uneducated self." Instead I began to realize that Stephen Sondheim's songs are not food for just anybody's appetite. But neither, then, is Dom Perignon, pate de fois gras, and Beluga caviar.

I could not recommend a Sondheim show to anyone who goes to the theater and feels satisfied and entertained when "moon" rhymes with "June." I would send them to see HELLO DOLLY! Sondheim shows are for connoisseurs of musical theater and the English language; the wit and intelligence of any Sondheim score are unsurpassed in contemporary musical theater.

There is abundant evidence of Sondheim's genius in SIDE BY SIDE now playing at the Marine's Memorial Theater as over thirty of his songs are exquisitely performed by a jewel of a cast. There are songs that everyone knows, notably SEND IN THE CLOWNS, but most are not Top 40 hits. The pop media is hardly ready for Sondheim's lyrical insights and observations on marriage, sex, city life, and survival . . . Those lyrics often bite and sting, and the listener finds himself facing the reality of his innermost lies. deceits, foibles and fantasies. Swaddled in an endless, unrepetitive array of original meters and melodies, Sondheim offers us life as it really is: not necessarily the peachy-keen existence some songwriters ask us to believe it to be.

Return of the Miniskirt Diva

This is the final installment in an article about Lilian Sukis, a young singer who left the Metropolitan Opera to build her career on European stages.

* * * * While in New York, she thought that perhaps ballet lessons or jogging would help bring her out of her depression. She ran a quarter mile in Central Park until a very bored 10-year-old looked up from a rock and muttered, "Hey lady, wanna screw?" Jogging was out. Since then, there have been several near brushes with disaster, but she does not feel jinxed. "I took a vacation to the island of Corfu and the next morning there was an earthquake. I arrived in another town and there was a flood. On the way to Seattle I stopped to do a concert in Toronto. I got a standing ovation and rave reviews. The day before the concert I was walking down the street with a friend when a car came careening around the corner and someone 20 feet in front of us was shot get in your car?" she laughed, "it could be your doom!"

How does Sukis handle a situation

when she is stuck with a turkey? When I work myself to death preparing duets and ensembles, I get upset when someone comes in not knowing the work. I have a responsibility for myself, and also to act and react with my colleagues. I don't mean a singer who graciously steps in to cover someone's illness. But I get annoyed when some clown waltzes on going "Tra la la la" when he had the time to prepare and didn't. Sometimes you are in a new production that is bad, and you sit there for six weeks, watching it doomed! If, during rehearsals, a colleague is not prepared, I think you can go up to him and say, 'Well, I hope you will know it in two weeks,' or you can even tell him off. Little Richard: Giving Up Makeup For Christ



The church alleges that this makes such a union a "Christian" event. The certificate has no legal significance.







HOT TRUCKIN', now showing at the Nob Hill Cinema, is one of the few movies of recent years which lives up to its advance publicity. The movie is satisfying without being memorable, features good-looking, horny and aggressive young men, has excellent photography by Robert Shaw, clear and natural color, plus sensible straightforward direction by Lancer Almost everything Brooks. you could ask for in a porno except spontaneity, mood, and true excitement.

Enough of a plot exists to make sex scenes inevitable and believable. Buck and Nick work for an in-city trucking firm and have oh so many loads to deliver. The truckers are always received by semi-clad and semi-erect young men who can't wait to sign for the delivery and sing for their supper. While Buck visits with a carpenter, Nick kills time in a public john with a dark-haired. aggressive fellow who's been featured in recent magazines under the name Derek. The two simultaneous encounters are ingeniously cross-cut as each couple pursues the same sort of sex, and four climaxes are reached at the same time.

Buck and Nick are unable to reach their home office by telephone because their dispatcher - tall and hard - is an obscene caller. This jackoff scene is intercut with Buck's visit to a painter's studio and the willing seduction of another

young man After a busy morning, Buck nd Nick take a lunch break, but find themselves being O cruised by a truly handsome red-headed boy on a bicycle. Moments later, the movie's hottest scene arrives as Nick and Buck fondle themselves and lure the boy into the back of the truck for a hot three-

Gordon Grant stars as Buck. and while he may not be the superstar the ads proclaim, he does have certain undeniable qualifications for the job. He is big; he is handsome, muscular and hung. He is also passionless, uncharismatic, and uncreative and methodical in his sex-play. All of his encounters consist of the same activities, performed in the same order, rather automatically, as if he was reading cue cards. The sheer beauty of his body and musculature make up in part for these faults, as does the strength of his climax. His trucking partner, Nick, certainly shows more interest in nis pursuits and is good-looking and thick to boot. Both men are surprisingly credible actors, showing the natural good humor and camaraderie of being trucker-buddies. "Grease it up and point it north," growls Nick as they climb into their rig and head out for more choice/chance


While this "trucker" movie is certainly not in a league with Joe Gage's famous KANSAS CITY TRUCKING series, it will
