Hollywood stars came out in force on Friday, Oct. 20, as Concerned Voters of California presented a spectacular banquet featuring motion picture and television stars. The \$100a-plate event, at the Hilton Hotel in Beverly Hills, was a sell-out at 1,350 (with some tickets being scalped in the lobby for more than \$100). It raised \$100,000 to purchase additional TV and radio time for CVC spots promoting NO

#### **Bishop Myers to** Denounce 6 in **Civic Center**

BACABI has appealed to Bay Area Lesbians and Gay men to bring their straight riends to the group's Rally for Human Justice on Saturday, Nov. 4, at the San Francisco Civic Center. Three days later - Nov. 7 - California will vote on the anti-Gay Briggs Initiative, Proposition 6.

California Episcopal Bishop C. Kilmer Myers - who has told the churches that Prop. 6 would unleash a witchhunt "and we ignore it at our peril" - will address a crowd expected to top 10,000. Other non-Gay headliners will include California Assembly Speaker Leo McCarthy and Libertarian gubernatorial candidate Ed Clark. A variety of entertainers is also being lined

BACABI states in its announcement of the 12:30 to 3:30 rally: "It is absolutely imperative that beside every Gay man and Lesbian there are two straight friends standing in proud defiance of Briggs and his politics of hatred." # POLICE HAVE BETTER THINGS

If Proposition 5 becomes law, police would be diverted from serious crime and public protection to answer complaints and enforce a nuisance law. Peace officers would be spending their time being (1) music critics, (2) building inspectors, (3) judges of amateur standing—the list goes on.

#### We're serious.

- (1) Prop. 5 makes smoking illegal at indoor jazz concerts, but legal in the same place during a rock concert. (Police must decide if the band is playing rock, jazz, popular music — or what.) [Sec. 25933(r)]
- (2) Prop. 5 makes smoking unlawful in most places of business, except in one-person private offices or a lounge with smoke-proof walls. (Who will decide if partitions are smoke-proof, how many persons occupy a private office and such?) [Sec. 25933(g,i,j)]
- (3) Prop. 5 prohibits smoking at all indoor amateur events and all professional performances except boxing, wrestling and roller derbies. (A cop would have to verify the amateur or professional status of the performers.) [Sec. 25993(r)]

Proposition 5 has other time-consuming jobs to occupy police officers' time. They would be called on to arrest shopowners who smoke in their own stores—reporters who smoke while they type—bowlers who smoke while they bowl. The list is endless!

Our police have plenty of necessary work to do. They don't need another foolish law to enforce!

They're at it again! What will they regulate next? VOTE NO on Prop. 5.

#### Play Safe or Build Alliances?

## Guaranteed: A Pro-Gay Public Defender

Most Gay activists agree that alliance with other minorities is Brown, his former law partner. an increasing political urgency. Nevertheless, they divide almost equally on whether to seal such a particular alliance in the Nov. 7 election of a San Francisco public defender.

Gay people have an unprecedented luxury in this twocandidate contest: never before in voting for an office that so acutely affects them have they enjoyed absolute certainty that whoever wins will be pro-

Both candidates pledge to appoint several up-front Gay deputy defenders.

Jeff Brown is the seven-year insider endorsed by retiring public defender Robert Nicco. Brown is a Richmond-district family man who has been deeply affected in his legal thinking about Gay people by department colleague Gordon Armstrong - a supervising attorney who is an up-front

Hiram Smith is director of Francisco Neighborhood Legal Assistance Foundation (SFNLAF) which provides free legal services to low-income persons. He is the first Black to run for public defender. His supporters

include Assemblyman Willie

Another Smith supporter is Black Gay activist Claude Wynne, who praises Smith's defense of Gay people through SFNLAF. Crediting Smith with securing the SFNLAF endorsement against Prop. 6, Wynne adds, "Hiram would be another bridge between the Black and the Gay communities."

The public defender fulfills the constitutional guarantee of court counsel for anyone who cannot afford a private attorney. The local office defends 20,000 cases a year with a staff of 65 attorneys. Gay defendants - as Gays - are typically hustlers, transvestites,

public-sex enthusiasts . . . or 'obvious" Gays whom police charge with "standing in a

Since both Brown and Smith come from a civil-rights and anti-war background, there is little ideological difference between them. Thus the election may turn on the question posed by Smith's campaign co-

ordinator, Dorothy Langston: "Can a system in which nearly all jailed defendants are poor and from some racial minority be best represented by someone from a white, middle-class background? Hiram has the expertise and understanding necessary. He is a tremendous lawyer, a sensitive man with a sense of practicality - he knows he can't rid the world of iails tomorrow.

With everything else equal, Gays might predictably have unified in the Smith candidacy. But Armstrong is the overriding reason that that was no automatic alliance

Brown cannot legally promise to retain Armstrong, but Armstrong is confident. "For Gay people, the bottom line of Jeff's election," he believes, "is my continued presence in this office." Smith had "no comment" when questioned about Armstrong's abilities.





#### CAMPBELL QUIETLY SENTENCED -6 Months Suspended, 2 Years Probation

Jack Campbell, one of the giants in the Gay rights movement and a director of the Club Baths chain, was quietly sentenced on September 18 in the Municipal Court of Judge Ollie Marie-Victoire. He received 6 months suspended sentence, 2 years probation, credit for time served after pleading Guilty to "keeping or living in a house of prostitution," section 315 of the State Penal Code.

The activist, former Treasurer of the coalition that fought Anita Bryant in Miami in 1977, was originally charged with a felony charge of "pandering" - soliciting a client for prostitution. Section 315 is a misdemeanor

Campbell was arrested on July 13 at his Lyon Street home. A plainclothesman, answering an advertisement in Bay Area Reporter (B.A.R.), was admitted into the Campbell residence and it is alleged that the officer was solicited to become a male prostitute.

Police stated that they became aware of the alleged prostitution business from a complaint filed by a Rev. Ray Broshears, controversial Tenderloin personality.

Campbell is one of the most dedicated and respected Gay activists in the country. He has given considerable time and

generously of his own money to support the Gay rights ovement from its beginnings.

The active businessman was establishing residency in San Francisco when the July 13 incident occurred. He had ridden atop an open convertible in the San Francisco Gay Freedom Day parade in June. B.A.R. was unable to determine Campbell's current residency, although he owns a

#### **Arson Task Force Expands** After Bath. Freedom House **Fires**

A local Gay half-way house for former convicts, Freedom House, has been destroyed by arson. This incident and several other arson-related fires, including the burning of the Ellis Street "San Francisco Baths," has resulted in an acceleration of the Arson Task Force under Fire Chief Andy

Casper, whose Gay Advisory Board on fire prevention is attempting to bring Gay businesses up to fire code, reports that the force is now attempting to identify trends in arson cases. This includes an investigation of increased arson attempts in the Noe Valley

Freedom House was established by Rev. Bob Humphries. It accepted former Gay convicts as they were released from prison for counseling and job placement. The belongings of occupants were destroyed in the blaze, one of many that had been set at the House in the past. The homeless residents have been placed temporarily in crash-pad arrangements. Ron Rose was the Freedom House director who is currently without telephone due to the fire and could not be reached

#### **HETERO FEARS**

There is still a degree of fear that Gay people recruit and molest children. Changing that attitude is an educational process that has o take place all the time — it should not start around an issue like Proposition 6. Gay people could appear on public talk shows, at church groups and civic groups, to explain that something like the Texas homosexual murder ring is as abhorrent to a Gay person as it is to anyone. Some mind out there is sick — I mean sick. I doesn't have to be a homosexual mind vs. a heterosexual mind. guess what I'm saying here is that Gay people have to pay an extra price. So in making the suggestion I apologize for it at the

I resent the need for Gay people to have to speak out on some atrocity connected to homosexuality when we don't require heterosexuals to speak out on heterosexual crimes. You don't read in any newspaper, "Today heterosexual Joe Smith committed a crime;" but you do read, "Today homosexual Joe Smith committed a crime." I resent that. .

#### **EFFECTS OF 6 VOTE**

The attitude of people toward Gay rights probably won't be affected at all, unfortunately, whether Prop. 6 wins or loses. What it will have is a direct effect on them themselves. People who are not Gay have to understand that if Prop. 6 passes it is the beginning of a long list of challenges that will be made to the human rights of all people in this country — with absolutely no distinction made on whether you're Gay or straight. If Prop. 6 does not pass, it will mean that you in California have successfully protected not only the rights of Gay teachers. You have also protected the rights of all the people in this nation who are Black, Hispanic, Catholic

#### **APATHY vs. POWER**

It is typical that there is apathy within the campaigns, such as NO ON 6, but it is not acceptable. There is a certain level of investment you've got to make for your own well-being. As long as you act like an oppressed group, you're going to be treated like an oppressed group. You asked me what would help the non-Gay community change their attitudes about Gay people? Power. Kick up your heels once in a while and use that vehicle of power that you've got. It's called the vote.

When you become powerful enough to make the difference on whether or not a politician gets elected, oh how the attitudes change and the sensitivity seems somehow to seep out from the cracks where it was never visible before.

I believe Proposition 6 can be defeated. But it mustn't be in spite of Gay effort. It's got to be because of it.



Schropp said that the SOME people eem to change frequently and they are even turning down most speaking engage-ments and refusing to debate

The two major events to climax the Seattle "NO" effort will be on Sunday, Nov. 5, when the Council of Churches is having a mammoth Prayer-In and Rally in a downtown park. Thousands are expected to attend . . . On election night the campaign will have a rally at a large downtown arena, Eagles Auditorium.

#### **State Court** Rules for Lesbian Child Custody

**SEATTLE** — "We won it all," called out Rossell Pekelis after the Washington Supreme Court ruled favorably in a child custody suit involving two Lesbians, Sandra Schuster and Madeleine Isaacson. The excited Pekelis, the attorney for the two women, reported, "They're very happy to have gotten a decision. They've waited a long time."

Six children, ages 8 to 5 were involved in the high court ruling. The Lesbian couple had raised their children as a single family after divorcing their husbands in 1972. The fathers, who remarried, sought to regain custody of the children in 1972, and the matter has been in the courts since then.

Six of nine justices upheld

CTA leaders said that Younger gave them the impression in private conversations that he opposed Prop. 6 and viewed it as unconstitu-

Younger officially states that he is "neutral" on Prop. 6. He views it as constitutional but "unnecessary" because it repeats existing law.

The teachers groups also endorsed Lt. Gov. Mervyn Dymally and Congresswoman Yvonne Burke for Attorney General. It also urged confirmation of all four state Supreme Court justices on the ballot.



# Bitter Thoughts Following Yet Another "Function"

For well over a year now, fighting the Briggs Initiative has been a top priority for some of us. We have attended endless meetings and workshops and conferences. We have survived (and sometimes participated in) the bitching, bad-mouthing, and backbiting that stems from the diversity and occasional competitiveness of the Gay "community." Through a morass of shifting alliances, power struggles, and organizational disintegrations, we have continued to work whenever we could for Gay visibility, human rights, and an end to institutionalized bigotry.

But looking over this past year without the innocence of belief — belief that each and every one of us wants to be free, belief that each and every one of us will fight for our rights — we're angry. We're angry that there are only a few — and we mean FEW — who are willing to lay it on the line day after day for the rights of each and every one in this "community." We are angry that each and every day, these FEW work until they are sick, then beg and borrow so that the battle can go on.

Meanwhile, major events continue to be held in this "community" to raise funds for charitable organizations such as Guide Dogs for the Blind, Muscular Dystrophy, Cystic Fibrosis, ad nauseum. Do we really think we are going to be able to buy respectability through charity? When are we truly going to start taking care of our own people and their problems?

A few days ago, we attended one of the major "functions" and overheard someone ask facetiously, "Why don't they have a fundraiser for the VD clinic?" Indeed, why don't they? The reason is obvious: VD clinics don't buy respectability.

We and the rest of the FEW can't quit. Even though we know that you who won't give a dime/work an hour at a shopping center/make telephone calls/demonstrate/stuff envelopes/or just show up for body count are going to benefit from our work and you don't deserve it — we won't/can't quit. For us and those who work with us and for others all across the state, freedom is our only goal. We eat, sleep, and breathe the dream of freedom — and you can't buy it from charitable organizations.

If we fail, our final word to you is this: Hiding behind your non-profit status, being militantly non-political, will not exempt you from the forthcoming political actions!!!
