

\$610,000 Pro-Gay Boycott Hits San Jose Convention Business

SAN JOSE

Three major civil rights groups have cancelled state convention plans for this city because of its position against Gay rights.

The latest group to skirt San Jose, cancelling its 1979 conference plans, is the California Association for Human Rights. It will now meet in Burlingame for its 3-day conference in May which will generate \$30,000 in hall rentals and hotel-food accommodations.

San Jose has also been hit by boycotts by the California Democratic Council (CDC) and California National Organization for Women (NOW). Both of these groups are also cancelling their 1979 conventions because of this city's position on Gay rights.

David Stewart, chair of the Santa Clara County Human



includes San Jose, announced his group's cancellation of its 1979 meet. "The state organization," he said, "has realized it would be hypocritical to hold a human rights convention in a city that disregards human rights, namely for Lesbians and Gay men." Stewart explained that the decision had been made by staff members and reaffirmed by a state board.

The San Jose City Council had refused to proclaim Gay Pride Week in 1978. It later res nded its own resolution which had proclaimed a compromised "Gay Human Rights Week." Recognizing 800 Christian fundamentalists at a March meeting, the council acted in fear while a small group of Gay activists protested. Later in the year the council voted against a resolution to take a NO position against the anti-Gay Proposition 6 on the November ballot.

Mayor Janet Gray Hayes stated in March that her office was at a virtual halt because of the continuing protests against her earlier pro-Gay position. Councilman Al Garza had introduced the Gay Pride Week resolution. Both Hayes and Garza recognized the pressure against them and eventu-

The San Jose Mercury had sided with Hayes and Garza in March, urging that Gay rights not be considered because "it is leading to a brawl that is dividing the community."

The San Jose boycotts were initiated by individuals within the CDC, NOW and the Human Rights group. They did not come from a concentrated effort by a Gay rights organiza-

The dynamic effect of the Gay rights boycotts is similar to that being felt in states which have refused to support the Equal Rights Amendment and have lost many conventions. This boycott effort was organized by NOW.



Mormon-TV Refuses Lesbian/Mothers **Donahue Program**

SEATTLE

A recent segment of the nationally syndicated "Phil Donahue" television program was pulled off the air by KIRO-Seattle. It was a discussion with Lesbian mothers Sandy Schuster and Madeleine Isaacson of Edmonds, who had won a court fight to retain custody of their children. The major investor in KIRO is the homophobic Church of the Latter Day Saints (Mormons) headquartered in Salt Lake City, Utah

While local Gay activists and the daily Seattle Sun protested the station's action, its program manager, Nick Freeman, issued a statement. He said "The program only program only represented the women, not the fathers. The matter is in litigation, and the attorney for the fathers didn't want them to

The program was shown on KTVU-2, Oakland, in the Bay Area. The only Donahue program cancelled by the local station was one the day after the murder of Supervisor Harvey Milk. It was an interview with Senator John Briggs. The station decided that to air the Briggs program, with com-ments about Milk, at that time would be in bad taste. The Briggs interview ran as-scheduled on KIRO, Seattle.

Frank Jank, station manager at KVOS in nearby Bellingham, stated that he did not find the Lesbian mothers program unbalanced. His station ran the progrm because "my experience is that Donahue is courteous to everyone, even American Nazi Party members. The show also included a phone interview with the attorney for the fathers, and he made his case very forcefully." (This reporter saw the program with the fathers' attorney charging that the mothers were "immoral." He quoted Bible scripture to support his argument.)

Jank said that his station received only seven telephone calls after airing the controversial program, four protesting. KIRO's Freeman said the Mormon station received hundreds of telephone calls and scores of letters supporting cancellation of the program that its viewers actually were unable to view. (KIRO is considered a conservative TV station. It runs Billy Graham Crusades in prime time.)



FROM NEW YORK

* I write to you as a proudly visible member of the homosexual community and as an executive of the oldest and most respected Gay publication in the Eastern United States. In both these roles I wish to express the deepest sorrow at the assassination of Harvey Milk and Mayor Moscone, a truly grievous national loss not only to the minorities who needed them most but also to every American citizen capable of recognizing the constitutional issues they so uncompromisingly represented and advocated. Their most important legacy was the abiding reminder that f the rights of even a *single citizen was unfairly denied, the rights of every other citizen are also diminished to some predictable degree. It would not be exaggerating to note that it was the same uncompromising issue which cost Ghandi his life. Freedom is not a negotiable commodity, and its attainment and preservation are often costly. No citizen, Gay or otherwise, can afford apathy.

I also wish to heartily commend B.A.R. for the magnificent campaign you waged to defeat Proposition 6, and I am sure that you played a vastly mportant part in defeating this monstrosity. California should be proud to have you as its major Gay publication. My hearty congratulations to you and to Il your state's citizens for their victory.

If New York's Gay community, huge and economically powerful, could somehow be roused from its intellectual/emotional stupor (not to mention its mindless devotion to pleasure vs. cerebration), our City Council would not have dared defeat the local Gay rights bill. Neither the local Gay organizations nor Gay press have succeeded yet, but we shall not stop

I am sorry my old friend Arthur Evans is not here to lend his fiery spirit to the battle; but I started my assault against the misama of fear and ignorance with my articles in GAY way back in 1970 and shall continue to use my voice, position, and money as the cumulative weapons I know them to be. I am fortunate never to have been poor nor to have felt powerless, but I am also bright enough to recognize that the richest homosexual in America remains a second class citizen so long as the rights of any of us continue to be subject to legislative tampering, denial, or condemnation. In this arena, power cannot reside in silence, and my memory is too long and accurate to tolerate such silence. My own comfortable life does not excuse me from caring.

* Wayne Friday was good to share his personal insights in his article "The Harvey Milk I Knew." Like Wayne, I also met Harvey in 1973. Harvey immediately impressed me with his intense insistence that it was the hour to move forward actively on Gay rights. I worked in Harvey's campaigns always, even after District Elections put me in another district Wayne helped me sometimes to put up Milk signs, working out of my old truck. I recall nailing two huge signs on the home of your publisher, Bob Ross. And the "human billboard," the auctions, the precinct work.

Harvey never hesitated to tell me that I was terribly wrong about any number of issues, and there were disagreements. He despised hypocrisy in society and knew I would continue to support him not only out of friendship, but because of the respect he had demanded and received for the Gay minority in America. A public official could hardly have a bigger heart or more concern for everyday people.

Last summer when Harvey faced the personal trauma of the suicide of his lover, I wrote him a short letter in the hope of uplifting his spirits. Sometime later a poem arrived that Harvey had composed. Now, after Harvey's ashes have been cast over the ocean. I would like to share his poem

> One day, shortly after I went down to the ocean. I saw a glorious sunset. It died into the evening, but I knew it would be reborn the next morning with equal splendor and I understood.

New 'Adult' **Businesses** Limited

Permits will not be granted here in the future for any erotic movie theater that is within three city blocks (1,000 feet) of a similar business. The Board of Supervisors has voted are finalized. Funds to initiate unanimous approval of an ordinance originally sponsored by now-mayor Dianne Fein-

The ordinance also does not permit a new erotic book store or "encounter" parlor within the same 3-block area. This effectively eliminates the possibility of new erotic businesses in the Gay sections along Castro. Polk and Folsom Streets as well as in the downtown Tenderloin

Licenses may be issued if the new site is away from existing businesses and meet the requirements of zoning, building, health and police codes. The Police Department is the major licensing agency.

One of Feinstein's first actions as mayor was to order a "clean up" of pornographic businesses by Police Chief Charles Gain. In the past, Feinstein's major objection to such businesses has been the public advertising displays in front of "adult" businesses on the basis that they are offensive to the general public. An earlier Feinstein ordinance (which was not approved) would have closed most such businesses and restricted them to a "porno" district South of Market, along the waterfront.

Police Brutality Increase Charged

WASHINGTON, D.C.

A private investigative and lobbying group, the U.S. Commission on Civil Rights, reports that there is increasing brutality against "Gays, Blacks, Mexican-Americans and others.'

The commission has heard testimony from minority groups throughout the country and its chair, Arthur Fleming, believes "the volume of complaints has increased, indicating a widespread concern that police are depriving individuals of their Constitutional rights."

Jean O'Leary, co-director of the National Gay Task Force, told the rights group that police crimes of "extortion, blackmail, rape and assault" are continuing in many areas of the country against Gay people.



Rideout The Rape Charge

by Priscilla Alexander

On December 27, 1978, a jury in Salem, Oregon, found John Rideout "not guilty" of the charge of raping his wife. John Rideout was the first man to stand trial on such charges in the United States, under a new Oregon statute that makes marital rape a crime. Iowa, Delaware and New Jersey also have marital rape statutes. But California and 45 other states specifically state that rape is a crime only when the victim is not the spouse of the rapist.

Greta Rideout testified that she submitted to having sex with John Rideout only after he beat her. John Rideout, however, claimed that he and his wife had sex after making up from an argument and that she

There is quite a difference between submit and agree.

There was testimony during the trial that the Rideout marriage followed a pattern of "quarrel, make up, have sex; quarrel, make up, have sex. Studies of battered wives indicate that this pattern often occurs, and that it is only recently, with the establishment of shelters for battered women, that many women have felt that they had a choice, that they could end that pattern.

And if, indeed, this pattern existed in the Rideout marriage, then Greta Rideout may,

1979 Jobs Bill Possible

THE BIG PUSH: Sacramento Lobbying Day, January 15

A mammoth statewide lobbying day in the State Capital will be held on Monday, Jan. 15, to draw emphasis to new "Gay job rights" legislation. The Big Push could place California on the map as the first state to successfully pass legislation barring discrimination in employment for Lesbians and Gay men. A lobby workshop is scheduled for Sunday, Jan. 14.

Assemblyman Art Agnos (D-SF) is introducing AB-1 in the Assembly while companion legislation is being introduced in the Senate — SB-3 by Senator David Roberti (D-LA) and SB-18 by Senator Milton Marks (R-SF). Agnos is Democratic Majority Caucus Leader while Roberti is Senate Majority Leader. Marks' bill is the companion to Roberti's, establishing the legislation as a major bill among Republicans.

California Human Rights Advocates (CHRA) is sponsoring the Gay lobbying day in Sacramento. Its two lobbyists. Steve Badeau and Lisa Katz, are urging Lesbians and Gay men from across the state to allow for space in their regular work schedules for the January 15 event

Katz believes that there is a good opportunity to supplement California's consensual sex bill with additional job rights" legislation. She cites four reasons for a possible victory: 1. the overwhelming defeat of Prop. 6 indicates that Gay teachers are not conceived as a serious threat: 2. two of the proposed bills are being introduced by two of the major Democrats in the legislature (Agnos and Roberti) which should mean a significant Democratic YES vote in both houses: 3. the bills are low in number and low-numbered bills normally are passed without much difficulty: 4. the deaths of Mayor George Moscone and Supervisor Harvey Milk have brought special attention to Gay rights.

Women are interested in the proposed legislation because it would also ban sexual harassment on the job. a problem that Katz explains is a common experience among women. Feminists groups are supporting the





Center Proposal Not **Before HUD**

A proposal that federal funds be used to help finance a Gay Community Center has not been filed with the federal Housing and Urban Development agency. As stated in B.A.R. on December 21, the idea proposed by Gay Community Services Center, Inc., is being negotiated before an application is made to HUD.

In a letter evidently written to Mayor Dianne Feinstein, local HUD area manager Steven Sachs has reiterated some of the guidelines and criteria for funding neighborhood centers reported earlier in B.A.R.



Gays Quiet, Michigan **Governor Signs** Rights Bill


LANSING - Possible inaction by Gay groups here has assisted in the passage of a law. signed by Governor William Milliken, that prohibits discrimination in nursing homes based on sexual preference.

The legislature has passed and the governor signed legislation which denies such discrimination in the care of patients. No Gay group spoke out for the measure, thus it was not a public "Gay rights" issue. The new law has gone quietly into effect.

During earlier hearings one resident told a Senate committee that mail addressed to the person had been opened and censored by the home's personnel. The resident said this was because of his homosexuality. No Gay organizations

The new law (SB-659) requires medical record confidentiality, privacy, unopened mail, and the right to associate with persons of one's own choice.

Don Mager, an official of Michigan Organization for Human Rights, told Gay Community News, "We just sat by and quietly let it go through. He added that SB-659 is a beginning toward achieving broader legislation concerning jobs, housing and public accommodations.



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

Despite its faults, SUPER-MAN proves to be what the Hollywood magicians set out to make it: super entertainment. Don't look for too much of a story but rather set pieces: Superman does this feat. Warner Bros. pulls all the stops and provides every known special effect they had in the lot.



Basically, this is one of those impossible mission tales, but author Alistair MacLean adds enough intrigue and surprise twists to rev up the tension and keep us guessing.

The performances, given the medium they are incorporated, are professional and credibly wooden. But as Fox noted, "You can't help but be a stereotyped and wooden character in war type films."

Director Guy Hamilton, veteran of the James Bond flicks, maintains the pace of an otherwise cliche ridden story. Robert Shaw has to kill a German spy who has infiltrated the Balkan pacifists. Edward Fox is assigned to go with him but ends up blowing up a dam which will destroy a bridge



Pre-opening publicity Cabaret: emphasized Edward Gorey's Tony Award-winning sets and costumes. Those expecting spectacular special effects may be disappointed. Rather than opting for opulence. Gorev used the subtlety of basic black and white (and shades thereof) throughout the production. The only color is an occasional touch of red (a single rose, a bleeding finger) which always, rivets attention. His spectral bed canopy in Act II is a masterpiece of the macabre.

The entire cast performed brilliantly under Dennis Rosa's stylish direction. Though the first ten minutes whizzed by too quickly for my comfort, everyone eventually settled into a more comfortable rhythm and worked toward building a solid series of melodramatic climaxes. Though there was room for humor, the "scare factor" of DRACULA was not ignored. Neither was the sexuality of the title character.

Jeremy Brett was a sensual and aristocratic Count. His performance grew in depth and bravado as the evening progressed. Also excellent was John Long's Renfield. a character easy to overact. Long. instead, was wonderfully convincing as well as funny in his role of the spider-eating madman.

If the production has a weakness, it lies in the script. The Dracula story never rises above its melodramatic qualities; it never makes any statement nor supports any philosophy. This reduces the possibility of its offering any lasting qualities beyond what we are given in the theater. I found I took little more away with me than an enjoyable 21/2 hours at the theater; but, for a holiday treat. that wasn't bad at all.

DRACULA will play through February 3. and I think you'll find the fun is worth your money.

Cabaret: **Charles Pierce** AT PLAY

I don't know who's having more fun at The City these nights. Charles Pierce or his audience. I guess it doesn't matter, since a party is for everyone and a party is what Pierce offers twice nightly through January 7. There's howling and bitching and drinking and dishing. comments were often so clever that I began to wonder if they were indeed ad-libs or elaborately planned screw-ups.

If you've never been to one of Charles Pierce's parties at The City, by all means go! If ou have, go again. They're never the same, and they're Ilways hilarious.

Just about everyone who's seen MOVIE MOVIE will tell you again and again how much great fun it is. They're right. We are treated to a double feature, a pair of mini-flicks based on the form and substance of the old 30's Warner Bros. movies. He pops up again in the second part musical as Jinks Murphy, the harried Broadway director and deftly shows the audience the deja vu sameness of the role to the one that just preceded it.


Art Carney does a cameo shot in each part as "Dr. Bowers," the dirty old man who makes women take off





In large part, what saved the show this year was the presence of some old pros who know how to deliver. Rysanek was on hand as the Marschallin. Although she did not give her most scintillating performances in the role at every performance, she did compensate a few rough tones with some brilliant acting. To my mind, she has always been the Angela Lansbury of opera.

While she does not project a star personality, she so thoroughly immerses herself into each role that she often reaches a manic-hypnotic state during the performance. Rysanek can change in one moment in the first act of ROSENKAVALIER from a radiant woman in love to a hausfrau who looks like she just got hit with a sack of

potatoes. Her dramatic timing fans are extremely devoted and and presence are always a joy to watch; both in terms of her musicality and sheer professionalism. She is the kind of standard. The aria, "Mein Lippen, sie kussen so heiss," (the Hot Lips Hoolihan number from Lehar's GIUDITTA) could easily be tossed off as a piece of light schmaltz. Leonie made it clear that the emotions involved were on the grandest of scales. It reminded me of a night when she sang the light and fluffy "Vilja" as if it were Senta's dream.

Matching her step for step was Walter Berry as the grubby social clod, Baron Ochs. Over the years, this incredible man has managed to completely soak in the character of the lovable, but thoroughly lower class operatic baritone. His performances this year as Leporello (in DON GIOVANNI) and Ochs, and in the past as Barak the Dyer in DIE FRAU OHNE SCHATTEN, lent a mark of distinction that is rare to each production. When he sinks his teeth into a character, there is no trace of Walter Berry left visible onstage. He lives and breathes the character thoroughly. He picks his nose onstage, uses his hands to retrieve meatballs out of someone else's plate, and in general, makes it clear that societal him. The man is a gem. His things that night. musical delivery is always superb, but more importantly, he lives and breathes every note written for the character he portrays. If Walter Berry ever retires we will all be in a lot of trouble. The man is one of the few who understands the totality of opera as musical theatre.

The event of the season was not so much the Anniversary Gala as it was Magda Olivero's debut in TOSCA at the ripe age of 70. There was as much a show in the audience that night as there was onstage. Magda's

What we saw was really a phenomenon of showmanship. Olivero does not project the most dulcet tones on the operatic stage today. But when confronted with a choice of TOSCAs this fall, I declined the Caballe-Pavarotti performances. TOSCA, to me, has always been a rough and tumble melodrama. The thought of Caballe standing onstage and turning a trick for the audience by dropping a few pianissimi left me absolutely cold. Of course, we all have our favorite Floria Tosca. Mine is Leonie Rysanek, and few could touch the memory of her performance in the role. But manners have no relevance to Olivero sure did some amazing




heat as though paradise is already lost. The psychedelic style can be unnerving and irritating. The sex scenes are wildly self-indulgent and unrestrained. We wonder, can
