



Silver Opposes Dan White Sentence Reduction Appeal

The appeal of convicted murderer and former Supervisor Dan White for a reduction of his sentence, as reported in the local press, prompted Supervisor Carol Ruth Silver today to urge both the District Attorney's office and the City Attorney to fight to sustain the sentence imposed

Supervisor Silver asked the District Attorney and the City Attorney to file "amicus curiae" briefs (friend of the court), ob-serving that the incumbent District Attorney Freitas had characterized the appeal as "routine."

Supervisor Silver commented: "A ridiculously light penalty for an outrageous double murder should not be further reduced. Our whole court system and the rule of law have already been shaken by the often repeated observation that 'White got away with murder.



GANGS AGAIN ATTACKING GAYS


Reports from several sources confirmed that over the weekend of September 21 an armed gang of young punks were marauding through Dolores Park. The concentrated on the Church Street side of the park between 18th and 20th. This side of the park is overgrown with dense shrubbery and provides a deep gulley for the tracks of the Church Street street

The gang was described as Latinos ranging in age from 9 to 18. They were reported brandishing sticks, pipes, car anten-nas, billy clubs. One youth carried a large brightly decorated In-dian war club. Also as they advanced up the tracks, they would blow a whistle.


Two men who were waiting for a bus at 18th and Church, Saturday, Sept. 22, between 11:30 and 11:45pm, were set upon. With a cry of "Get 'em" the punks charged out of the park. The bus driver, seeing what was about to happen, tried to keep on going but the Gay men ran alongside banging on the door until he opened it. One man was hit with a brick on his shoulder.

The gang proceeded to chase the bus as it sped off down 18th throwing rocks, sticks, and bricks at the vehicle. Further down 18th the driver stopped, the police were called, and a squad car flagged down. The latter gave the victims little or no satisfaction

According to one of the victims, the bus driver was so angered by the lack of police reaction, stopped three blocks later when he spotted a second patrol car. Again the story was repeated, and once again the citizens were met with indifference. Said one of the men to the B.A.R., "The police did nothing

In a historic move, California Superior Court Commissioner Governor Edmund G. Brown for the past several years, Jr. has appointed an openly Gay person to a judgeship. On September 15, Stephen M. A Commissioner is appointed Lachs was appointed to fill a to serve in this judicial capacity vacancy on the Los Angeles Superior Court. This appears the court. This appointment by to be the first time that an openly Gay person has been appointed to a judgeship anywhere in the country. The appointment is in keeping with Brown's strong commitment to equality of opportunity regardless of sexual orientation. Earlier this year Governor Brown issued an executive order prohibiting discrimination on the currently an ex-officio member basis of sexual orientation in

Los Angeles attorney Thomas F. Coleman, co-chair of the National Committee for Sexual Civil Liberties and longtime friend of Stephen Lachs, commented upon the appointment, "If anyone deserved the honor of being the first openly Gay person to become a judge, Steve did. He has been a role model for lawyers and for Gay people for a long time. I congratulate Steve and I thank Governor Brown.

Sheriff candidate Mike Hennessey and his campaign staff have identified three areas crucial to the well-being of Lesbian and Gay staff and prisoners. Hennessey has labeled them "issues of immediate concern."

Lesbians and Gay men who work in the San Francisco jail system have come out strongly in his favor. Says one spokesperson, "For those of us who work in the county jails, the election is far more than a popularity contest; it is critically important to the lives of thousands of people.

Hennessey, who was hired by former Sheriff Hongisto in 1973, is said to have spent his entire career working for a more humane jail system

On Gay-related issues Hennessey pledged himself to im-plement the following policies:

1. CLASSIFICATION: The frequent sexual assaults and harassment of Gay prisoners

Local Episcopalians Respond **To Anti-Gay Vote**

CALIFORNIANS BY AND LARGE DISSENT.

San Francisco Episcopalians — particularly the Gay members — were greatly disappointed with their church's latest stand on practicing homosexuals as priests. However, they do not appear to be defeated. In fact, a few are taking the matter with a grain of sand . . . seeing themselves more ad-vanced (perhaps more Christian) than the majority.

Meeting in Denver, Colo-rado, two weeks ago, the Epis-copalian House of Deputies passed a resolution that no practicing homosexual be ordained by the 3-million member church. The resolution was previously approved in the 239 member House of Bishops; however, 31 bishops — including Bishop C. Kilmer Myers (Bishop of California) signed a statement of conscience in objection. Their statement took exception to the part of the resolution which denied ordination to practicing homosexuals.



Bettinger has been spending considerable time since the disappointing Bishops' resolution rallying his friends and supporters in the California diocese. Britt also asked Mondale for an appointment with either himself or some White House aide during the October 14 March on Washington weekend.

Britt told B.A.R., "I think I got the message across to the Vice President that the Gay community was outraged at this appointment. I find it hard to believe," Britt continued, "that a White House that so espoused human rights can blithely appoint a man who makes such blatantly bigoted statements."

When Mondale told Britt that

of the White House, Britt said, "Well then withdraw the appointment." He received no commitment from the V.P. on such a course of action.

Britt also spoke at length with a White House aide to Hamilton Jordan, Carter's newly-appointed Chief of Staff.

At the same time Britt, along with Gay mayoral candidate David Scott, sent a telegram to President Carter condemning the Askew nomination. Mayor Feinstein also telegraphed her shock to Carter. Quentin Kopp telegramed U.S. Senator Alan Cranston urging him to reject Askew. Said Kopp, "To confirm Mr. Askew's nomination those who believe that Gay

people can be systematically excluded from employment opportunities." He concluded, "Such actions should not be encouraged."

Viewpoint THE MARCH WHISTLE STOMPING **TO WASHINGTON**

On the eve of the Gay community's first nationwide assemblage and protest — a "bon voyage" sentiment or two is in order. First of all it is a major event, a milestone in the march for civil and personal liberties. The decisions to participate or not have by now been long since made. Some are going, some are not; for reasons valid in either Case

We are pleased to see that the major thrust will be from those Gay enclaves not in the national limelight. It's time the smaller cities, the towns, suburban, and rural Gays came forward for their share of the battle and its conse quences.

So too that the Rubin Askew incident happily happened to coincide with the March. The avowed homophobia of Carter's recent appointee has given the March focus and specificity.

We are pleased and thankful that San Francisco will be represented by Supervisor Harry Britt. As one of the few upfront Gay officials in the nation, it is almost taken for granted that Britt would attend. Yet he does so at considerable sacrifice. He must give 5 days to Washington, while on the local scene he fights for his political life where the loss of even an hour of campaigning is hazard. The downtown interests have decided he must go, and even the Mayor has taken to campaigning for his nons. On the home front these things we must remember

We thank all those on the March committee for their vision and their perseverance. Their rewards will derive from the impact and success of the March itself.

To the participants - we staying behind are counting on you to carry the message and the spirit. For us, pack a whistle and when you get to Washington, use it at the rallies and assemblies. Let the lawmakers know the Gay voice can be loud and clear and that it too can be shrill and insistent. Let them know that the Gay voice is both before them, and also doubling for those where it still must remain invisible.

Of all the symbols depicting Gaydom - the whistle is increasingly establishing itself as a Gay trademark. It both serves us well and says so many things.

Let Washington and the White House hear its sound and its message. Blow it in memoriam for Harvey Milk and in outrage for every crime committed against Gay people down through the ages.

Otherwise, have a gay Gay party for which we are equally famous . . . or infamous. Get a little on the side, or a lot — it will make the trip more memorable. P. Lorch

FEMINISM AND/OR GAYS

* Laura Atkinson's sensitive, intelligent and beautiful response (B.A.R., Sept. 13) to Sally Gearhart's letter is the one ray of sunshine in the whole sad business. It can't be forgotten that feminism itself has been shaped by a heterosexual society, and Gearhart's letter and Alexander's article show the alarming ease with which traditional homophobia can be rationalized in Lesbian/Feminist terms.

The position of Gay men in the feminist movement has always been ambiguous: to have Gay rights conditional on passage of the ERA, and an open question afterwards leaves questions as to the status of Gay rights in states that have already ratified the

One of the basic themes of the Bryant-Briggs campaigns has been that Gays aren't really oppressed, but vileges. My own experience with the Lesbian/Gay March on Washington left me feeling that while we were combating stereotypes of Third World people and women, we were still bound by those of Gay men as pastel equivalents of hetero men: as if being oppressed for your sexuality were less real or urgent than other oppressions.

Sixteen hundred years of a homophobic society have given Gays their own issues, and the responsibility to regard their own oppression and that of other Gays with the same respect, attention and urgency that women regard feminist issues.

POLICE "STRIKE" AGAIN

* I'd like to report a very apparent case of police harassment I observed, along with my date and several other "shocked" bystanders, on September 11 on Polk Street.

At 2:10am on September 11, following the closing of the bars, my date and I had just left the N'Touch and were crossing the intersection of California and Polk when we observed a police car parked on the right side of California Street off Polk, and two officers were checking the ID's of two men and one lady. As we stepped up on the curb, we heard one officer

yelling at three apparent Gay men who were following behind us. Apparently, when they were half-way into the middle of the intersection the light turned red. The three men proceeded to cross, and one officer took off after the three on foot, catching one innocent guy and began swinging him all over the sidewalk, shouting obscenities at him and dragging him to the police car. When they reached the car, he threw him over the trunk of the car and proceeded to frisk him like a hardened criminal when in fact all he was guilty of was jaywalking! It was so obvious, verbally and visually, that this was a pure case of Gay harassment! Most onlookers stood there in utter disbelief that this could happen on Polk Street!

I am new to this city and was shocked by this outrage after hearing for so long that it was quite acceptable to be Gay and live here.

Is San Francisco regressing? To be quite frank, I was pissed! BUT, considering it was a "law enforcer doing his duty," all I could do was stand there, watch helplessly, yet knowing this so-called "law enforcer" was DEAD WRONG! What do we do to stop this totally uncalled for and discriminating police harass-

We believe that most of those quoted in the articles do not represent the attitudes of the majority of the gay or third world populations and in fact were probably chosen because of their reactionary beliefs in order to further divide the many at the bottom of the economic ladder. We would no more support the likes of racist Donald Lipper who said, according to one article, "Why the hell should this gem of a city be given over to welfare blacks? Put them in Idaho or at east Oakland", than a homophobic who beat up lesbians in women's bars or screamed "faggort" at two men holding hands.

He is dressed casually: corduroy trousers, loose-fitting terry cloth short-sleeved shirt, slippers without socks. He looks something like a cross be-tween Jack Nicholson and Clark Gable and has personality characteristics reminiscent of the best qualities of Gary Cooper and Spencer Tracy. Some combination! But in direct contrast to such matinee idol allusions, there isn't a hint of phoniness about the man no guarded statements, no "acting," only complete candor. It's all couched in a soft voice, an easy-going manner that also gives rift to the rumor of a fiery Wallace temperament. Though this is our first official introduction, it is not the first time I've observed Wallace. On various forays into District 5, he has inevitably seemed to pop up, handing out campaign literature from a small knapsack without a lot of typiucal political brouhaha, greeting and meeting people in a laid-back easy-going manner.

Reconstructing Howard Wallace's politically active past is like trying to do a Reader's Digest number on "War and Peace." It -all began for him over 25 years ago in Denver where he debated in high school for the abolition of the then-active House Un-American Activities Committee, was active with the ACLU and served the NAACP (remember, this is the early 50's, long before such things were "fashionable"). At age 19 he managed the campaign for a Black woman candidate for the Denver School Board. He became a Teamster about this time and remains affiliated with that union to this day. He organized the Committee Against Police Brutality; he was a founder of Friends of SNCC; he aided in establishing the New Hispano Party; he helped set up groups opposing the Viet Nam war on college campuses across Colorado and Wyoming . . . and it goes on and on, Howard Wallace's socalled "radical" political leanings finding expression in active volunteer work within the community year after year after year.

Howard is convinced that District 5 voters will "look to a more substantial record" when they approach the polls in November. In terms of experience, concern for individual rights, the ability to speak out clearly and candidly on the issues, integrity, Howard Wallace is hard to beat. While he may not have the financial backing of the two current front-runners in District 5, he'd make one hell of a supervisor.


Security Seminar for Gays



HALLINAN FRONTS FOR BROSHEARS

The largest and most popu-lar Gay disco in the Haight has been denied weekend after hours license by the Board of Permits Appeal. The Board, at its Wednesday, Sept. 19, meeting, was approached by Ray Broshears (who makes a habit of opposing Gay business licenses) and the Haight/Ashbury Neighborhood Association.

The I-Beam had been granted an after hours license (a cabaret license) by the San Francisco Police Department. The license was effective only on weekends from 2 to 6AM.

Attorney Terence Hallinan, candidate for Supervisor in District 5 and who is trying to unseat incumbent Harry Britt, arrived with Broshears. According to witnesses they sat together. Hallinan was one of after hours license. He walked to the podium, and in his opening remarks said he represent ed the Rev. Ray Broshears. Those attending said he made a point of saying that this was not a Gay/straight issue. He reportedly was the only speaker who pointed up the sexual differences.

Kay Pachtner, another District 5 hopeful, also spoke against the permit. The main objections were parking, noise, late night street traffic. The Board subsequently reversed the Police Department and denied the permit 4 to 1. The I-Beam needed 2 out of 5 to keep its permit.

Recently I received a call from a CUAV committee co- and learn Self-Defense! Call ordinator about an attack report. A Gay man had called to report that three men had attacked two Gay men on Castro Street near 18th. There seemed to be confusion on just who was injured, and who had been taken into police custody. After a visit to Mission District Police Station, and Mission Emergency, we learned that the fight began with an unhappy drug customer.

A heterosexual drug dealer had displeased a Gay customer and that customer beat him. The dealer found two friends and brought them back to Castro Street to seek revenge on the unhappy customer. When the dealer could not locate the customer, he pointed out a Gay man at random. The three attacked the innocent Gay man and his companion, resulting in injuries needing medical attention.

The attackers were held at Mission Station pending a report on the extent of injuries to the Gay men; all three were charged with assault. They accused the Gay man of assaulting them, and so the legal aspects of the incident were omplicated

After our stop at the police station, I, as CUAV Co-Chair, and a friend from the Public Defender's office went to Mission Emergency. We found that the Gay man accused by the dealer was not seriously injured, and his companion was voked attack, and injuries during the fight, the Gay man year "won" and had the three under Citizen's Arrest when the police

was handled well by both victims and police, fights over street purchases can end in tragedy. The point: be aware of potential for attack, and therefore exercise cautious common sense on the streets.

Senator Seeks Co-Sponsors for **Gay Bill**

Washington, D.C.

Senator Paul Tsongas (D-Mass.) has sent a "Dear Colleague letter to all members of the Senate announcing his intention to introduce legislation to prohibit employment discrimination against Lesbians and Gay men. The purpose of the letter is to seek co-sponsors for the proposed legislation.

Gay Rights National Lobby Executive Director Steve Endean expressed extreme pleasure at the development. He commented, "This marks the first time in history that a Lesbian/Gay civil rights bill will be in the United States Senate. Because of the nature of the Senate, where each member represents an entire state, introduction of a Senate Gay Rights Bill should provide a major assist in making this a truly national issue." The Gay Rights National Lobby (based in the nation's capital) has played a key role in securing this action and will continue to work closely with Senator Tsongas in securing additional sponsors and supporters. 

> **Gay Relationships Featured** in U.C. Training Program

The University of California-San Francisco Medical Center now features a seminar series on Gay relationships in its Family Therapy training program. The program (according to press releases) is the only one of its kind in the country.

The seminars are conducted for a (not necessarily Gay) student group of post graduate psychologists, physicians, psychiatric residents and therapists from throughout the United States. The class hopes to make students more effective professionals by giving them new insights into Gay psychology and sensitizing them to the particular needs of their own Gay clients.

series is a field trip. Students are paired and assigned to spend an evening exploring Gay neighborhoods and bars. Immediately following the field trip, students assemble for a late night seminar which explores their experiences and reactions.

Joseph Brewer, M.A., M.F.C.C., and Gary Walsh. M.S.W., L.C.S.W., both Gay, were selected by Dr. Chris Hatcher, Director of the U.C. Family Therapy Training program, to create, design and conduct these seminars because of their unique work in the Gay community. Brewer and Walsh are currently pioneering their own couples counseling and support program, geared to the special issues of Gay male couples.

"It's our hope," says Brewer, "that the students will gain a greater awareness of problems facing homosexual relationencouraging

Full Moon Over The Opera House

POWER TRIPPING IN THE ARTS By George Heymont

The opening week of any opera season is fraught with tension. This time around a full moon hovered over the San Francisco Opera. It did not take long for madness to run rampant. Last year the frenzy centered around Kurt Herbert Adler's jubilee. This year marked the preparations for the company's first live telecast. Pressures mounted quickly. Tempers flared. Many of the shenanigans which comprise the behind-the-scenes farce were captured by onsite TV camera crews. Some of the backstage insanity may appear next year in a TV documentary about "what goes into the making of grand opera."

BITCH! BITCH! BITCH!

The lead soprano was the first to come unglued. This was to be Renata Scotto's initial attempt at LA GIOCONDA. She was, of course, concerned that things be perfect. She was also activities." Tires were slashed in a royal snit because the the night of the GIOCONDA

tenor, Luciano Pavarotti, seemed to be garnering all of the pre-opening publicity. On opening night Scotto accused Pavarotti of deliberately upstaging her. The diva refused to come out for any curtain calls with him after her solo bow. The soprano's hus-band later apologized to the chorus (through Adler) for the prima donna's rip-snorting backstage temper tantrum. By the Sunday night DON CARLO rehearsal, supers were taking bets that Scotto would skip town after the telecast. Word hit the backstage crew there was a good chance Grace Bumbry might arrive in town as a replacement.

Meanwhile, out front on opening night there was a heavy police presence in the auditorium. Two years prior the Opera House had been bombed as a symbol of "elitist

Opening night performances are often uneven. This year was to be no exception. Scotto did a fine job, but Pavarotti sounded tired and strained. At the concert in Golden Gate Park the following Sunday he clowned his way through a rehearsal run-through while singing at half-voice. He sounded weary. The Polish mezzo who joined him on the program (Madame Scotto did NOT choose to sing) showed even more promise than on opening night. The audience responded warmly. Toczyska was genu-inely touched; thrilled by the reception. She also wiped up the floor with Pavarotti, who seemed to be coasting on his aurels. One felt the uncanny presence of Eve Harrington smiling down from legendary skies.

LET THEM EAT CAKE!

This year the San Francisco Opera has come across some severe stumbling blocks. Neither has the press been easily silenced or brought around to Adler's side. In March Adler fired Bob Bailey as Director of Western Opera Theatre. To Adler's surprise, the W.O.T. Board got severely bent out of shape. Several resigned in dis-gust. Following the brouhaha over the Royal Ballet's inability to get into the Opera House, the company's demands have come under fire from the newly formed Citizen Committee for Reform of the War Memorial. Victor Wong (the entrepreneur who heads Fine Arts Development) stressed that his requests for rental dates have gone strictly according to the book. Too often, the Board of Trustees of the War Memorial has turned a deaf ear to his demands for fair play. Wong underlined the seriousness of a situation where the power to make or break the arts commuhands of so few people who end rehearsal during that

SAVAGE/LOVE - TONGUES EUREKA THEATRE TACKLES THE AVANT GARDE

In SAVAGE/LOVE, Chaikin, dressed as a shoeless Post Office employee, explores, through a series of formidably expressive physical gyrations in and out of rhythm with the music and Shepard's dialogue, a sort of "story" built up out of most secret feelings related to "falling in love." He speaks dis-

BARS & RES phrases; he sings snatches of corny romantic jazz standards; hence moods emerge which synthesize into a realizable emotional "story" that is absorbed rather than strictly intellectually understood - the self-abrasive aspects of living in love even before it's out of the head

TONGUES, more difficult to analyze, has Chaikin seated, motionless, legs covered with a dull red lap rag (homage to Beckett?) spouting a jumble of poetry as a free-verse reflection of the absurdity of the commonplace, a series of short dull-friendly letters and typical closings, song lyrics and lots of other stuff all bearing the common seal of creepingly civilized banality. They touch on hunger, death, love and whatever else with a lightness and agility that says in essence that we're all rather silly imbeciles; and, who knows, Shepard may be right. Then again perhaps the need for Hallmark contours surrounding our lives is there to counteract the actual horrors of reality we're sometimes forced to face.

Which leads up to the point that these are serious works, challenging works, and, in spite of the strangled humor that sometimes crept in, are played by Chaikin in devastating earnest.

Chaikin, founder of New York's Open Theater, is a short, wire-haired man with fantastic eyes which seem to discharge their own intense light. His excellence in every facet of performance technique - from perfectly coordinated stage movement to fully realized exploration of vocal manipulation - is truly enviable and lent even more weight to Shepard's fragments than they otherwise might have on their own. Or without the music! In SAVAGE/LOVE, a combination of percussion (played by Skip LaPlante) and saxophone/flute (by Harry Mann); in TONGUES, percussion only, the music, in itself, was exceptionally impressive, as was the wild conglomeration of paint pans, whiskey bottles, jars and jugs, nails and forks and all sorts of homemade musical chimes and implements created especially for these two works by Shepard and played with effortless skill by LaPlante.

Add to it all the fine lighting by Beverly Emmons for SAVAGE/LOVE and you have what theater should be all about but too often, sadly, isn't: cooperative genius. Yes. I don't use the word lightly






ORCHESTRA REHEARSAL

ORCHESTRA REHEARSAL s a 72-minute Federico Fellini film that comes packaged with the subtitle "The Decline of the West in C # Major." Set in the perfect acoustics of a 13th century oratory (a site, we are told, of the tombs of three Popes and seven Bishops) the orchestra readies for a rehearsal which will be filmed by a TV documentary crew. The exposition of the film is carried out by an unseen interviewer asking questions of various members of the orchestra. (The voice of the interviewer is Fellini himself.) As with any rehearsal the going is slow and tedious, especially when it is merely a vehicle for a heavyhanded parable about society and contemporary Italian society at that! But this is Fellini directing so any apathy one may have is soon erased by the director's masterful theatrics. A brilliant, witty — and, alas, the last — musical score by Nino Rota is alone worth the price of admission. I'm not sure a Fellini

admission. I'm not a Fellini devotee, but at 72 minutes, ORCHESTRA REHEARSAL is, if not completely diverting, an artistic triumph of politicalsocial satire.



Malcolm McDowell plays H. G. Wells, whose time machine takes him from Victorian London to 1979 San Francisco. "This clever film is pure entertainment," B.A.R. critic Michael Lasky.

TIME AFTER TIME

H.G. Wells invites his friends to his London home to announce he has invented a time machine. All scoff him except Dr. Stevenson (David Warner) who it turns out has good reason to hope it works. Wells, played to perfection by Malcolm McDowell, ends up having to chase Stevenson through time - from turn-ofthe-century London to 1979 San Francisco. For Stevenson is actually Jack the Ripper and must be brought to justice. Wells arrives at the Science Museum in Golden Gate Park at an exhibit of H.G. Wells memorabilia. Thoroughly disoriented and confused (the damn machine actually worked!) he wanders through downtown San Francisco in his Victorian tweeds. A friendly bank clerk, Amy (Mary Steenburgen) just about throws herself on him (it's hard work for a woman to get a straight guy in the City) and of course they fall in love. They are, of course, an odd couple, but the two play with such naturalness that they



Take A Bishop Like Me by Paul Moore

Harper & Row - \$8.95

The gulf between Gay people and organized religion has always been deep and depressing. Many homosexuals see no need for involvement in this aspect of the sexual revolution. But they seldom realize that until the man of the cloth is won over, the man or woman in the legislature will be reluctant to smile at us. This anti-Gay political-religious clout has been vividly demonstrated on several occasions in New York when the Catholic Church sent battalions of priests to the city council and state legislature to kill civil rights bills for Gays. In New York City this has now occurred seven times.

Bishop Paul Moore, of the Episcopal diocese in New York City, has long recognized both the positive and negative roles of Christianity in our battle for freedom. In his current book he relates the agony and triumphs of his struggle for these rights in the Episcopal Church. The tale has few dull moments.

As a prologue to these historic confrontations he relates his early years in the priesthood and the tragic case of a clergyman named John who was finally destroyed by his homosexuality.

The storm has raged around Ellen Barrett, a young deaconess who has fought to gain ordination. She instantly embodied the rights of both Gays and women's liberation. Ironically, she committed the unpardonable sin of honesty about her sexual orientation. If others who stood in the pulpit

Moore has worked with still exert a powerful influence.

Moore shares with the reader samples of the vicious hate mail he has received on the ordination issue. He has also been awarded with his share of gratitude from Gays and members of the women's movement.

One irrational letter writer declared, "A Chinese journalist said to one of your journalists when former President Nixon was first in China, 'You are very sexually oriented in the United States. China was sexually oriented during the Ming Dynasty and the Ming Dynasty

But Bishop Moore is a man of vision and stubborn courage. He rarely yields to pressure. He quotes the philosophy of a close friend who said, "When you are faced with a difficult choice, go with the future, not the past."


The battle boiled to a near climax in September, 1977, when the House of Bishops met in Florida. Many factions attempted to defeat Ellen Barrett's newly won position. At this time Moore's raging plea to his fellow Bishops helped to sway the anti-Barrett votes. His voice was filled with anger and

Do you realize that every Gay person in America will be watching what happens this week? Do you realize that if you officially condemn this ordination you will be casting a judgment upon the min-istry of hundreds, perhaps thousands of bishops, priests, and deacons, and lay persons of the church who live with the problem? Do you realize that you will be removing a sign of hope they finally see in a church that has treated them so shabbily over the years?

The crisis will not end soon. September of this year the final (?) showdown will explode when a special commission, appointed to study the Gay issue, will make its final report to the General Convention of the entire church. But the deck has clearly been stacked against any sign of objectivity or charity. Any individual of pro-homophile sentiment has been barred from serving on

the commission. This conservative body is chaired by Ruth Barnhouse, a homophobic psychiatrist and author if the rabidly anti-Gay study, A Symbolic Confusion (now out of print). There can be little doubt as to the recommendations of this board

But we may be sure that Paul Moore will be in the front lines crying out for the cause of social iustice

Films in a theater are one thing, but in the privacy and freedom of your own home are in another sphere altogether. When Target Studios an-nounced the introduction of BullsEye Productions, an explicit line of hardcore movies, interest was immediately aroused. Imagine Bruno, Jeremy Brent, Ed Wiley and lascivious newcomer Rod Mitchell in full action in your own living room (or bedroom). I'm pleased to report that Target's are among the hottest films I've ever seen prepared for home consumption. This is hardcore with a vengeance. The color is brilliant, focus is excellent, and the action will blister your screen.



I would have bet money on Bruno and Rod Mitchell, starring in FULL CIRCLE. Bruno has been number one in my sex pantheon for several years now. Surprisingly, though, this is not his best film outing, due to the film's unusual tranquility. Mitchell is first seen holding Bruno's legs during calisthenics but he immediately climbs on, venerating Bruno's pecs. anointing his stomach, and engulfing Bruno's cock down his seemingly endless throat. Some beautiful cock-sucking ensues, and Bruno explores and exposes Rod's ass, certainly a photogenic subject. The action continues with some extended 69'ing and then Bruno fucks Mitchell, smoothly, slowly, to the point of orgasm. Continuing outdoors with some lengthy jack-off footage, we are treated to another orgasm. Although it's sizeable. it does not have the thrust and force of Bruno in top form; this is Bruno in a dream state. But I've watched this movie as much as any other, if only to see these bodies.
