### RADICAL WOMEN

SEATTLE, WA - The 1976 Radical Women Conference held Oct. 9 & 10 at the University of Washington in Seattle emphasized coalitions between the feminist, minority, labor, and gay movements. More than 130 women attended, according to conference spokesperson Constance Scott. One presentation, called "Gays and the Class Struggle," given by lesbian activist Laurie Morton, emphasized the class differences between gay organizations.

Morton seconded the draft report of the conference which stated, "Radical Women's unwavering support for the gay issue has demonstrated that socialism and gay liberation, class struggle politics and feminist humanism are not contradictory, but rather they are mutually supportive and interconnected strands of all humanity's struggle for freedom and justice."

### GAY BLASPHEMY

LONDON, ENGLAND - A British anti-pornography campaigner is charging the "Gay News" - the British gay newspaper - under the Blasphemy Act of 1617. The woman, Mary Whitehouse, has persuaded a High Court judge to allow criminal proceedings against the "Gay News" because of a poem that allegedly blasphemes the life of Christ. The poem - a fantasy in which the speaker imagines a series of homosexual acts in which Christ is accused - was written by James Kirkup. Kirkup has been published by "Fag Rag" and "Gay Sunshine" and is presently a poet in residence at Amherst College, Amherst, Massachusetts.

It is the first such case in 54 years in England. The crime carries a possible maximum life sentence.

### NO MONEY, NO MARRIAGE

WASHINGTON, D.C. - A threat of a financial cutoff of funds from the Episcopal Diocese of Washington to a local parish as ended the wedding plans of two gay men here. The planned Nov. 20 nuptials of Wayne Schwant and John Fortunato had been announced as a "holy union" in a parish newsletter but were called off six days before the wedding date.

The bishop co-adjutor of the Episcopal Diocese of Washington, Rt. Rev. John T. Walker, had attempted to persuade the church rector, Rev. William Wendt, to cancel the ceremony by Wendt had refused. The two men quarreled over an interpretation of the Episcopal Church's Sept. 1976 resolution stating that homosexuals are entitled to "the love, acceptance, and pastoral concern and care of the church."

However, when the diocese threatened to cut off \$7,000 in funds, Rector Wendt backed down and cancelled the marriage ceremony.

### CANADA'S GAY BAN

OTTAWA - Canada's long-awaited immigration legislation to replace the present immigration act has been prepared for introduction in Parliament. According to the "Body Politic", the new act - which has the backing of the Trudeau government - contains no reference to homosexuality.

The present immigration act on the books bars entry to Canada to homosexuals, prostitutes, epileptics, and those said to be "living off the avails of homosexuality or prostitution." The act also prohibits entry by those who have committed an illegal act involving "moral turpitude."

Boston gay activist John Kyper has been in the lead of those testing the Canadian Immigration Act. It is not known at this time when the new legislation will be introduced.

### BOYCOTTING RECORDS

HOLLYWOOD - Two women's organizations have threatened a California-wide boycott of seven Warner record labels unless the record companies - Atco, Atlantic, Asylum, Elektra, Nonesuch, Reprise, and Warner Brothers - stop depicting women as victims of sexual and other violence. The California branch of NOW and the Los Angeles based Women Against Violence Against Women have branded the Warner group "one of the prime offenders", according to a report in "Variety".

The two women's groups have presented an ultimatum to the companies demanding an end to "further use of such images," cancellation of offending current advertising and withdrawal from retail sales "of all offending advertising and promotion, including album covers", by Dec. 15.

Julia London of Women Against Violence Against Women told "Variety" that "our emphasis at this point is on the use of abusive sex in sexual relationships as a selling technique. Of course we're not interested in seeing women objectified in (non-violent) sexual ways for purposes of selling anything, but the immediate protest is to get rid of the violence.... The images (on album covers) are part of an environment that trivializes brutality against women", she said.

### BATHS STAFF FINED

OTTAWA, CANADA - The former manager of the Club Baths, Ottawa, has been fined \$50 for keeping a common bawdy house, the Body Politic reports. He pleaded guilty. Three other men pleaded guilty and were fined \$100 each for being "inmates" (workers) in a bawdy house. The arrests in the case were made last May in a series of raids throughout Canada, coinciding with the Olympic clean-up campaign. Two men charged with gross indecency had already pleaded guilty in the case, and because of their pleas, the lawyer for the bath employees found it inadvisable to fight the case. Gay activists had hoped to make a test case of the arrests to draw attention to the bawdy house law.

### DAVIS' VICE \$ DENIED

LOS ANGELES - The Los Angeles city police commissioners voted on Dec. 2 to reject Police Chief Ed Davis' request for increases in vice operations expenditures in the 1977-78 budget. The five-person civilian review board unanimously rejected Davis' request for 17 vice enforcement positions, an administrative vice position, as well as 16 new automobiles requested for undercover work.

Nine days before the report was issued, a large group of gay taxpayers urged a public hearing on the additional vice money to reject Davis' request.

Davis has been under heavy criticism from the Los Angeles gay community both for last spring's "Slave Auction" raid at a gay night-spot and for a recent report on child molestation in Los Angeles. Many gay activists charged that the recent child molestation report was an attempt by Davis to aid him in his requests for more vice enforcement monies.

### ENGLISH PROFS SUPPORT

CHICAGO - The National Council of Teachers of English (NCTE) narrowly passed a resolution on discrimination against lesbians and gay men at the organization's business meeting in Chicago on Nov. 27. The resolution - offered from the floor by Louie Crew, gay activist who teaches at Fort Valley State College in Georgia - passed by a close vote of 172 - 96.

The resolution reads: "Whereas lesbians and gay men are now and have always been present in society and members of our profession, both as students and teachers, we the members of the National Council of Teachers of English urge the immediate end of all discrimination against them wherever it may exist, specifically in the hiring and firing practices of our profession, in the textbooks of our discipline, and in our own classroom practices and exchanges with students. We further urge that NCTE establish an appropriate group charged with both investigating problems faced by lesbian and gay male colleagues and students in the discipline of English and the formulating of recommendations to the Council concerning their welfare in the profession."

### FRENCH COMMUNISTS

PARIS - The Central Committee of the French Communist Party will soon hold an internal workshop on homosexuality. The workshop will be chaired by Central Committee member Pierre Juquin and feature psychoanalyst Dr. B. Mulwurf. Other participants in the workshop will include gay members of the party, but no gay activists outside the CP have been invited to participate. The CP Central Committee has not ruled out their participation, however.

The Association pour la liberte des pederastes et des homosexuels reports that this workshop represents an important change in the CP attitudes towards gays. In the past the French CP has seen gayness as a bourgeois perversion. The party's new evaluation should be made public before the end of the year (1976).

# SHOWTIME

## STEPPING OUT with ken dickmann

### MICHELLE AND HER FRIENDS

Now that the Holiday season is over, there always appears to be a lull in activities and a general "crash" period for all. But if you have that "want to do something" feeling, there are two fun shows to go to, each offering pure entertainment and containing nothing to tax the mind. The first is MICHELLE, MY FRIENDS AND ME, now performing in the back room of SUTTER'S MILL, Bush & Montgomery. MICHELLE, MC extraordinaire, headlines a review of local talent and keeps the musical interludes separated by telling his own Tales of the City. Everyone will enjoy his monologues on when he was the only Gay on Castro Street; what Halloween used to be like; on flying PSA with a wig box; and what Jimmy and Roslyn Carter can do for you.

The local talent coming out of the male chorus line of 8 that back Michelle is adequate enough to entertain you, and fortunately, they don't over extend themselves. Brent Wayne attempts "Mama, a Rainbow" and Manny hums "On the Street Where You Live." George Lowy, Reggie Blain and Brent highlight the show by dancing to an apt tempo "Summertime" well choreographed by Lowy. The number works well and utilizes a mirror prop. The space between Michelle's monologues could use more of this type of filler.

Michelle also sings and provides comic moments with "Gorgeous Like An Orchid" and fares very well with "My Own Best Friend". In between Chuck Zinn has staged the chorus line in "Razle, Dazle," "All I Care About Is Love" and repeats Michelle's theatrical triumph with "Hello Dolly." However, most of Zinn's staging is strictly one, two, three, kick.

Don Morris heads a 4 piece band providing MICHELLE & FRIENDS with solid support, and George Lowy has managed to design some wonderfully, functional and colorful sets in the limited space of the stage. Kudos to Lowy for succeeding where others have failed in that department.

MICHELLE, MY FRIENDS AND ME is a group effort under the title of A New Company, and because of this group effort, Michelle, per usual, shines. He knows what his audience want and never holds back anything to please them, for Michelle is a gifted comedian and knows what the word entertainment means. And that's what you'll find on Saturdays at 7:30 and 10:30 p.m. and Sundays at 7:30 p.m. Tickets: \$5.00.

### REVISITING OUT OF THIS WORLD

The second entertainment of the non-taxing kind is at the Phoenix Theatre on Broadway, and in its third month is playing to full houses. Don McLean's production of Cole Porter's OUT OF THIS WORLD has had three major cast changes and warrants a re-review. What originally was a galaxy of singing stars has now turned into a tighter show and a well-rounded musical comedy. The plus changes are Norman Roberts as Jupiter, Weslia Whitfield as the seduced Helen, and Raymond Wood as gangster in hiding, Niki.

Roberts character of the sex hungry Jupiter is no longer presented as a muscular type as originally done by Jim Mariner, but is now a mischievous dirty old man. Roberts creates comedy where before there was none. Weslia is a younger Helen than Pamela Brooks and her naivety in the royal chase to the boudoir is believable. Raymond Wood as Niki has taken a good part that was originally not defined and makes a good comic character out of it. His comic dialogue that was thrown away is now heard and fully utilized.

After playing for three months, one would think that the pace would have slowed down by now. Not so. OUT OF THIS WORLD moves much faster now, and the performances are as strong as they were on opening night. The re-

views all agreed on how fabulous Carolyn Zarembo is as Juno. She still is, but with the cast changes, her role stands with the entire cast rather than overpowering them. Carolyn still brings down the house with "Nobody's Chasing Me."

So with the Holidays over and lots of spare time, treat yourself to these two events and relax into them. You'll love either one.

SEESAW will run for only 5 days (Thurs. thru Sun.) sometime in March.

No star has been signed yet for the SF Civic Light Opera revival of IRMA LA DOUCE, but don't be surprised if this is cancelled and replaced hopefully by CHICAGO.

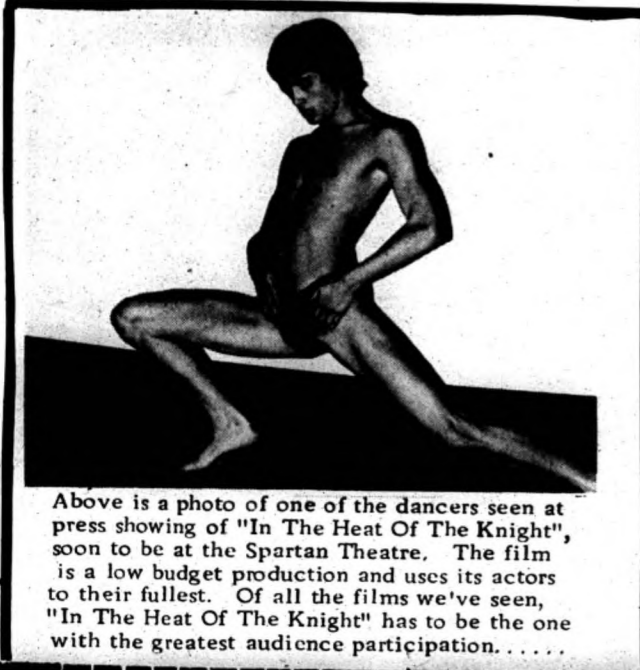

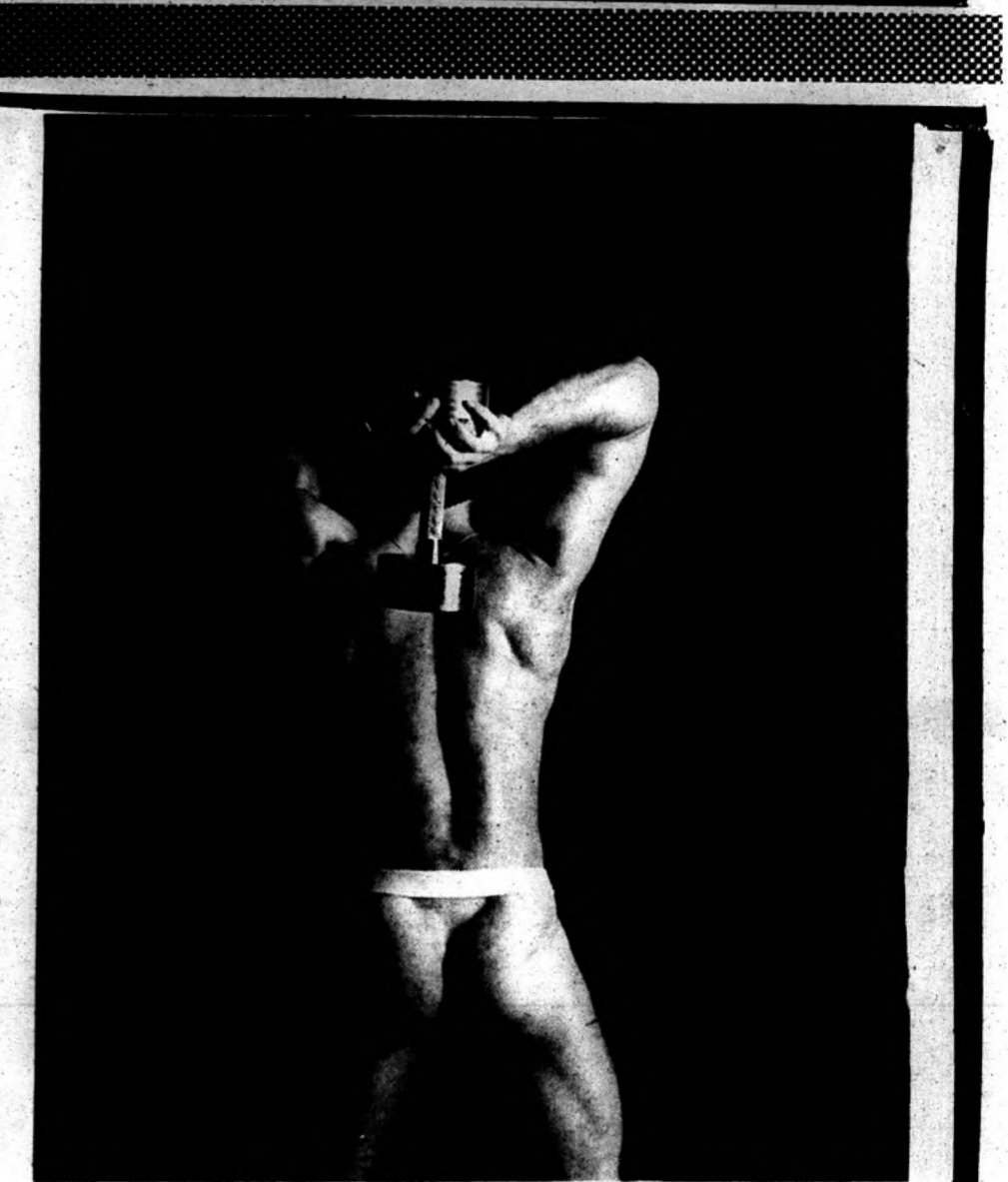

The first episodes of MAGAZINE MOVIE "Cheap Thrills" and "Hanky Panky" are scheduled for release in February at the Roxie Theatre, San Francisco's leading theatre devoted to serious art films.

BIOGRAPHY - JAMES MOSS

James Moss began his career in Hollywood at the age of 4 as "little Jimmy Moss" a child star and Quiz Kid. Over a span of 12 years, Mr. Moss acted in over 37 major films (usually playing the star's offspring) including: "The Damned Don't Cry" with Joan Crawford, "Jim Thorpe All American" with Burt Lancaster, "Mr. Scoutmaster" with Clifton Webb. During this time he was featured in over 25 television dramas and over 100 30-minute episodes of "Children Should Be Heard" the award-winning children's program that was syndicated nationally.

As a young adult, James Moss studied at Columbia University and began his writing and directing career in New York. Mr. Moss has had some 57 short stories and novelets published and over 100 magazine articles in nationally distributed publications. For 2 years he was the ghost writer of Dr. Joyce Brothers, and for over one year was the ghost of Sybil Leek.

Mr. Moss wrote and directed the underground film feature "Dragula" that was distributed nationally by the Walter Reade Organization. He has had a number of photographic exhibitions in the San Francisco Bay Area.

Mr. James Moss is now 36 years old, lives in San Francisco with his parrot Butch and collects teenagers as a hobby.

NGTF WOMEN COOPERATE IN LESBIAN SOURCEBOOK PROJECT!!

Women of the National Gay Task Force are cooperating in the preparation of a Lesbian resource book being edited by NGTF media director Ginny Vida. The book will be published by Prentice Hall in the fall of 1977 or spring of 1978.

The volume will include about 35 articles on a variety of subjects, including coming out, therapy and counseling, monogamy and alternative lifestyles, legal problems and remedies, lesbian mothers, activism, lesbian culture, lesbian feminist theory, race, class and age. Anyone who wishes to submit brief personal testimonies (3-5 typewritten, double-spaced pages) on any of these subjects is encouraged to do so. Also, clear black-and-white photos are being sought of lesbians who are willing to be pictured in the book.

GAY REPRESENTATIVES MEET WITH CBS - TV PRESIDENT!!

At a meeting held in New York last Friday, executives of CBS Television indicated that they will commit on a more regular basis with representatives of the gay community on programs involving lesbian and gay male characters. Network president Robert Wussler, nighttime programs vice-president Alan Wagner, and program practices vice-president Van Sauter also agreed to arrange for sensitivity sessions with program practices staff on both coasts; and to arrange meetings with programming

executives designed to assist them in developing new shows with lesbian and gay themes.

Gay representatives at the meeting included Jean O'Leary and Dr. Bruce Voeller, co-executive directors of the National Gay Task Force; Ginny Vida, NGTF media director; and Dr. Newton Deiter, coordinator of the Gay Media Task Force in Los Angeles.

The gay delegation stressed that, while a breakthrough in visibility for gay men had been achieved in the current TV season, a lesbian image has been almost non-existent. CBS acknowledged the lack of lesbian portrayals and indicated an openness to discuss ways of implementing lesbian characters.

Ms. Vida and Dr. Deiter met with executives from the broadcast standards departments of the ABC and NBC television networks later in the day.

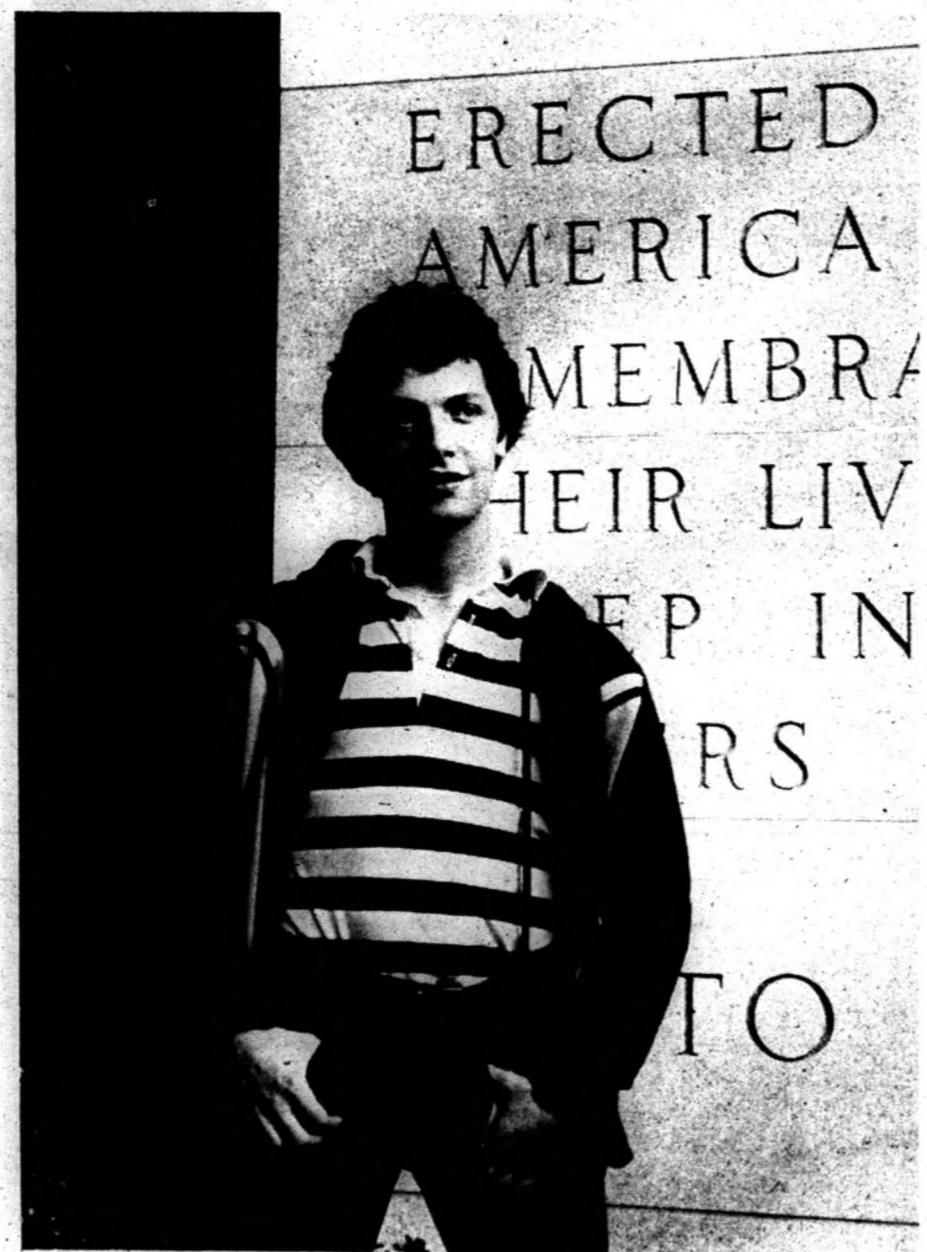

# Doris Fish

My first memory of myself as a performer is my father's office Xmas party. I recited "Nellie Bly." I was 4 years old.

My childhood was quite uneventful but was very pleasant. I have two brothers and two sisters - all delightful, pretty people. They are all in Australia living delightful lives.

I remember my school days as being horrible and I was delighted to leave. I was sixteen when I went into the world of drugs and drags. Being ever mindful of my health I have religiously avoided any harmful drugs including alcohol. But I have not avoided drag.

It was not until I was nineteen that I first appeared in women's clothes. An innovative troupe of actors and actresses had formed "Sylvia and the Synthetics". I was a prominent and popular member for two years. During this time we appeared at various functions and did ourselves organize numerous parties at which we entertained our many friends.

We were described as "sexual politicians" by at least one newspaper. POL, a glossy fashion and scene magazine, used us as fashion models for one glorious issue. We became famous (often for things we didn't do!).

I remember one performance of things we did do. It was a New Year's Eve Show in an old dis-used theatre club. We were already the darlings of the hip and art set and the hall was packed. The show opened with a gorgeous muscle-man centre stage. Onto his broad shoulders descended a young pretty (fake) woman. The rest of us danced on in fish net stockings and tails as the "heroine" sang about her breaking heart. She then took her heart from her breast and at it. The blood dripped onto her powder blue debut gown. At various times during the evening we threw fish, flowers, candy and glitter at the eager audience. We whipped and kicked each other and removed our frocks. The whole hall was soon filled with naked bodies. The police later arrived and arrested some rowdy people who were living in the gutter.

The New Year's Eve Show was described in the press as an avant-garde art show. We were featured in an artists' journal; we did television appearances and we made various underground movies, none of which have ever surfaced.

The initial energy of the group was waning as various members headed for distant lands. I came to San Francisco. The Synthetics last token performance was my farewell party. Another troupe member has now joined me - Jasper Havoc. We two have been friends for over ten years! (Since school.)

Shortly after my arrival, The Tubes Talent Hunt was staged. There were over 50 acts. Pearl Gates and myself, Doris Fish, were among the half-dozen acts chosen as winners.

For three fabulous weeks Pearl and I did two shows a night with the glamorous Tubes at the world famous Bimbo's nite club. I met many famous and talented people including Julie Christie, Holly Woodlawn ("you must be a piranha Ms. Fish cause you sure ate me up!") and Grace Slick! Who is just my favorite lady! And of course lots of other pop stars.

A gentleman who was greatly impressed with my monologue introducing Quay Lewd, was James Moss. He saw my potential and decided I was star material. James photographed me beautifully and told me I was to star in his film, "Magazine Movie". I was absolutely thrilled with his offer!

Very quickly we organized our first filming session at Nelson Studio, doing "Hanky Panky" and "Cheap Thrills" in one weekend. The first in an educational film on the elaborate handkerchief code of sexual preferences. The second is an expose' of Amyl Nitrite, dealing with the manufacture, dealing and effects of Amyl. I play a nurse during a live demonstration of the heart-rate speed up.

Since meeting James, my time has been spent in photo sessions, filming, writing and fan club events and parties. T-shirts have been distributed worldwide. I have been called a cult figure! I have been invited to opulent mansions! Doris Fish the fake woman is becoming a real star!



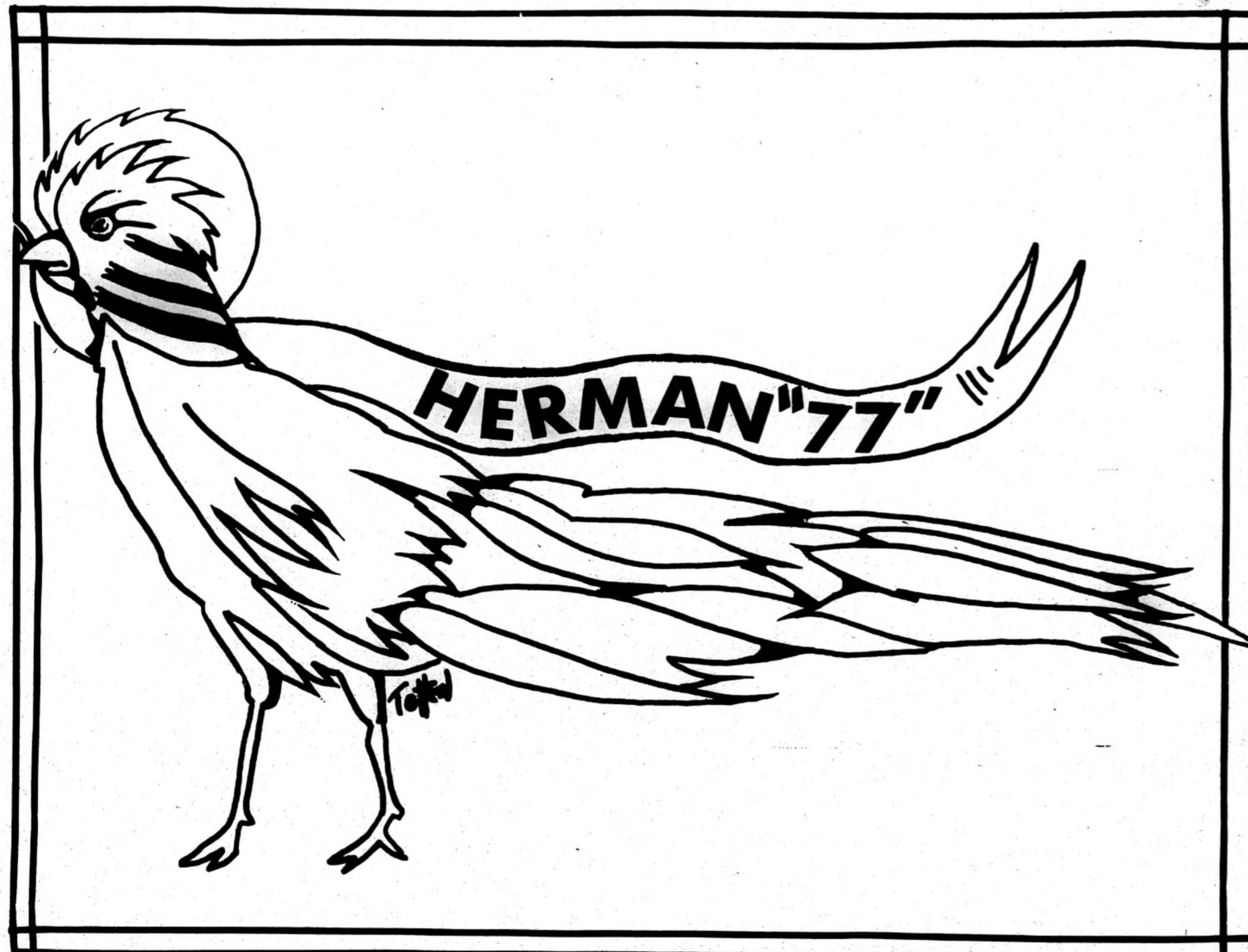
