As a librarian, I've enjoyed reading your books and following your distinguished career, and have especially been looking forward to the new paperback edition of Picture Bride. Because of your intimate connection with books and with the Japanese American experience, I--as Chairperson of the Friends of the Japanese Collection--would like to ask you if you might consider allowing us to use your name as a key sponsor for our next membership drive in February or March, 1989. Presently, the Friends--established $1\frac{1}{2}$ years ago--has a membership of some 65 individuals and 3 businesses/organizations.
