November: a month of mixed emotions . . .

Cold and rainy, November is a month of contradictory emotions. The month begins as costumed Hallowe'en party-goers revel into the wee hours of the first, and continues with the passion and frenzy of last-minute politicking prior to the November 6 election.

Then Thanksgiving Day — that uniquely Middle American holiday, capable of detonating feelings of alienation and despair that too frequently visit the holidays.

As the month nears its end, we witness the somber first anniversary of last year's double murder at San Francisco City Hall — the slayings of the late Supervisor Harvey Milk and of Mayor George Moscone.

What do we have to be thankful for, and who are we thanking? The Mother Goddess, God, nature, our fellow human beings, ourselves?

I'd like to imagine how Harvey Milk would view Thanksgiving one year after his tragic death.

I remember Harvey as a warm, personable, very Jewish (in the cultural sense), dynamic, sympathetic, tolerant (I could string adjectives together forever, not all of them flattering) acquaintance. Harvey would have laughed at an image of himself as the Martyr Hero — invincible, faultless and haloed. And I imagine he would also find amusing the scramble among various candidates to succeed him as San Francisco's Supervisor in District Five and as "National Gay Leader."

There are elements of farce in all of San Francisco's electoral races this fall: Mayor, District Attorney, Sheriff, and Supervisors. In one way or another, all would have tickled Harvey's funny-bone — although his own involvement in the outcome of the races would have been earnest.

But there is one event Harvey would not have found amusing. He would have been overjoyed, ecstatic.

This event was the National March on Washington For Lesbian and Gay Rights and the concurrent National Conference of Third World Lesbians and Gays.

Harvey would have celebrated this Thanksgiving not by giving thanks to some abstraction, but by giving thanks to the thousands of people who made the march and conference a success.

The original Thanksgiving was the celebration of a persecuted minority

coming to a new home and cooperating with and being aided by the native population. The cooperation didn't last long and that "persecuted minority" has by now nearly destroyed their Native American benefactors. But the idea of different cultures working cooperatively is the promise of this holiday.

The National March on Washington was planned for all of us. It was broad-based and grass roots. It guaranteed participation by Third World lesbians and gays and not just token participation.

The National March on Washington was not run by established gay organizations that would have us all appear "normal" except in the bedroom in the privacy of our own homes.

The March has established links that promise to bind us together in a truly National Movement.

Harvey fought the Establishment when he had to and worked with it when he could. He was not a revolutionary. He was a progressive politician, a pragmatic one. The leadership of the March worked with the gay establishment when the latter finally embraced the March. No one was left out.

We haven't won the final victory, and our enemies are strong, well-heeled, and unprincipled. But if we build on the unity exhibited in Washington, we will emerge victorious.

Celebrate that hope this Thanksgiving.

Low Voter Turnout Foreseen

San Francisco's Deputy Registrar of Voters, Jay Patterson, predicts a low voter turnout locally for the November 6 election.

Controversial issues such as rent control, high rise limitation, abolishment of the vice squad, binding arbitration for police and firefighters, and a proposed hefty increase in corporate taxes confront the city's voters. In addition, voters will elect or re-elect a mayor, district attorney, sheriff, and six out of eleven supervisors; and with other California voters will determine the fate of four State propositions.

Despite these pending voters, Patterson says "probably sixty percent of registered voters will go to the polls, if it doesn't rain — lower if it does."

Asked why he forecasts such a low

'Take Back The Night' Celebration at Amelia's

A celebration commemorating last year's successful *Take Back The Night* March enlivens San Francisco Sunday, November 18, at Amelia's.

Women can dance upstairs to contemporary disco, or downstairs to Mary Watkins, Linda Tillery and other artists; for those who crave nostalgia, the evening offers "oldies but goodies" from the 50's and 60's.

All this (from 8 pm to 1 am) for a mere \$2.00. Proceeds benefit Women Against Violence in Pornography & Media (WAVPM), which organized the 1978 march of 3,000 on San Francisco's Broadway District, and briefly but effectively paralyzed the city's heterosexual porn center.

Beth Goldberg, spokesperson for WAVPM, explains that although *Take Back the Night* accomplished everything WAVPM had intended, the event took three months to organize and saddled the group with \$7,000 in unpaid bills.

"The money from the celebration will let us pay off the balance of that debt,

and, more importantly, sustain our ongoing projects while providing seed money for new ones."

WAVPM

Women Against Violence in Pornography & Media publishes *NEWSPAGE*, a newsletter for feminists and others interested in the ongoing struggle to end violence against women. They've also produced a slide-show on anti-woman media, available to women's groups on request.

Another WAVPM project provides for tours of the Bay Area's non-gay, x-rated bookstores and movie theatres, so women can see first-hand the material that civil libertarians would protect with First Amendment arguments. This same material, WAVPM holds responsible for terrorizing women's lives.

Goldberg also tells us WAVPM needs to raise money to pay more staff. At present, she is the group's only paid staff person, and she hopes for "the resources to set up a library on the subject of violence in pornography and the media that could be used by interested parties world-wide."

To those gay men who view WAVPM the way hard drinkers view the Women's Christian Temperance Union, Goldberg says, "We affirm sexuality by distinguishing between pornography and erotica."

VOTING INFO

Polls open at 7 a.m. Tuesday morning and close 8 p.m. that night. Because polls tend to be crowded before and after work and during lunch breaks, it's best to plan your day so that

you vote between 9 and 12; or between 1 and 5.

The law requires employers to allow workers time off for voting.

"Something pornographic must portray a man, (WAVPM) concerns itself almost exclusively with heterosexual porn, in which the norm is men dominating and/or abusing women. Ed) woman or child being bound, raped, tortured, degraded, mutilated, or murdered for sexual stimulation."

She continues: "The material shows unequal power relationships, usually between men and women in a sexual context, in such a way that it seems to recommend and applaud inequality."

Educational materials will be available at Amelia's during the November 18 celebration and dance. In addition, photographs of the 1978 march and concert will line the walls of the bar.

Describing last year's march at its peak, one participant later wrote: "For an hour, Broadway belonged not to the barkers, the pimps, the pornographers, or to the theater owners, not to potential rapists, not to whistles, hassles, or cat-calls. It belonged instead to the songs, voices, rage, vision, strength, and presence of three thousand women who took back the night."
