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Abstract

In this paper the sufficient conditions that each cell in a one-dimensional array of Chua's circuits has identical, synchronized behavior are given.

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1. INTRODUCTION

Recently, a significant increase in the number of publications on synchronization of Chua's circuit and arrays of Chua's circuits have appeared 1-6. Because of its simplicity, robustness and low cost, the Chua's circuit has become a tool for analytical, numerical and experimental study of nonlinear phenomena. In this paper we present a rigorous analysis of synchronization in a one-dimensional array of Chua's circuits.

2. MAIN RESULT

The basic cell of our one-dimensional array is a three-dimensional dynamical system described by the following dimensionless equations:

$$\dot{x} = -f(x) + a_1 y + a_2 z
\dot{y} = b_{11} y + b_{12} z + b_1 x
\dot{z} = b_{21} y + b_{22} z + b_2 x
x, y, z \in \mathbb{R}$$
(1)

where a_1 , a_2 , b_{11} , b_{12} , b_{21} , b_{22} , b_1 and b_2 are parameters, and f(x) is a nonlinear function. The set of equations representing the array are, in its dimensionless form, :

$$\dot{x}_{k} = -f(x_{k}) + a_{1}y_{k} + a_{2}z_{k} + D(x_{k-1} - 2x_{k} + x_{k+1})
\dot{y}_{k} = b_{11}y_{k} + b_{12}z_{k} + b_{1}x_{k}
\dot{z}_{k} = b_{21}y_{k} + b_{22}z_{k} + b_{2}x_{k}
x_{k}, y_{k}, z_{k} \in \mathbb{R} \quad k=1, 2, ..., N,$$
(2)

where D > 0 represents the diffusion coefficient of the variable x. In addition to (2), we impose the following zero-flux boundary conditions:

$$\partial x_1(t)/\partial s = 0$$
, $\partial x_N(t)/\partial s = 0$

where s is the direction of the diffusion. This is equivalent to assuming that:

$$x_0(t) = x_1(t), x_{N+1}(t) = x_N(t), \text{ for all } t \ge 0$$
 (3)

Note that if $\Delta s \to 0$, then a continuous model is obtained, where the "diffusion" term of the first equation in (2) represents the Laplacian of x, $\partial^2 x/\partial s^2$.

Example 1. Eqs.(1) represent Chua's circuit, if:

$$a_1 = \alpha$$
, $a_2 = 0$, $b_{11} = -1$, $b_{12} = 1 = b_1$, $b_{21} = -\beta$, $b_{22} = b_2 = 0$, $f(x) = \alpha h(x)$

where h(x) describes a continuous three-segment piecewise-linear curve of Chua's diode^{8,9}. In this case, Eqs.(2) represent an array of Chua's circuit. Recently, traveling wave fronts are investigated in an array of Chua's circuit^{5,6}. For diffusion coefficient less than some nonzero critical value it has been observed numerically that the traveling front fail to propagate. A continuous model, the so called time-delayed Chua's circuit, is considered in Ref.10. It has been proven rigorously that the time-delayed Chua's circuit exhibits the period-adding phenomenon.

Example 2. Eqs.(2) represent an array of the unfolded canonical Chua's circuit 11-14, if:

$$a_1 = \alpha$$
, $a_2 = 0$, $b_{11} = -1$, $b_{12} = 1 = b_1$, $b_{21} = -\beta$, $b_{22} = -\gamma$, $b_2 = 0$, $f(x) = \alpha h(x)$.

Theorem 1. Assume that the following conditions are satisfied:

(i) There exists a positive definite Lyapunov function

$$V(x, y, z) = \frac{1}{2} x^2 + \frac{1}{2} (A y^2 + 2B yz + C z^2)$$

such that the trajectory derivative of V(x, y, z), $\dot{V}(x, y, z) \stackrel{\Delta}{=} -Q(x, y, z)$, with respect to the linear system:

$$\dot{x} = -ax + a_1 y + a_2 z
\dot{y} = b_{11} y + b_{12} z + b_1 x
\dot{z} = b_{21} y + b_{22} z + b_2 x$$
(4)

is negative definite.

(ii) There exists a real number

$$\nu = \frac{\lambda_0 - a + 2D}{2D},\tag{5}$$

such that $0 < \nu < 1$, where $\lambda_0 = \min_{\xi \in \mathbb{R}} f'(\xi)$.

Then there exists an integer $N_0 = \text{Int } (\pi/\text{arccos } \nu)$, defined to be the integer part of the argument, such that in the phase space of the array, described by Eqs. (2), of N cells, $N \leq N_0$, the manifold:

 $M = \{ (x_1, y_1, z_1, \dots x_N, y_N, z_N): x_k = x_{k+1}, y_k = y_{k+1}, z_k = z_{k+1}, k = 1, \dots, N-1 \}$ is asymptotically stable.

Proof. See Appendix.

Remarks:

1. If the manifold M is asymptotically stable, then all cells in our one-dimensional array are synchronized, i.e. each coupled subsystem has identical behavior, when $t \to \infty$:

$$x_k(t) = x_{k+1}(t), y_k(t) = y_{k+1}(t), z_k(t) = z_{k+1}(t), k = 1, ..., N-1$$

2. The condition ν = 0 determines the critical value of the diffusion coefficient:

$$D^* = \inf_{a} \frac{-\lambda_0 + a}{2}.$$

Because $\nu < 1$, it follows that a $>\lambda_0$, and consequently $D^* \ge 0$. If D is close to D^* ($D > D^*$), then $N_0 = 2$, while when $D \to \infty$, then $N_0 \to \infty$, as well. Let $\nu_1 = \cos \frac{\pi}{i}$, i = 2, 3, ..., then from (5) we get $D_i = \frac{D^*}{(1 - \nu_i)}$. Hence, for fixed a and λ_0 (note that a and λ_0 depend only on the parameters of the system (1)), we have the following interpretation of the theorem 1: if $D_i < D \le D_{i+1}$, i = 2, 3, ..., then the array with "i" cells is synchronized.

3. Suppose a can be chosen such that it is arbitrarily close to λ_0 , i.e. $a=\lambda_0+\epsilon$, where ϵ is a small positive number. Then, $D^*=0$. In a similar way, $D_1=0$ for all i. Hence,

if D > 0, the array with an arbitrary number of cells is synchronized.

- 4. The above theorem gives only sufficient conditions for asymptotic stability of the manifold M. As a consequence, this theorem does not give the minimal value of the critical diffusion coefficient, except in the case which is considered in the Remark 3.
- 5. Let the basic cell of our one-dimensional array be an n-dimensional dynamical system described by the following dimensionless equations:

$$\dot{\mathbf{x}} = -f(\mathbf{x}) + \mathbf{d}^{\mathsf{T}} \mathbf{y}$$

$$\dot{\mathbf{y}} = \mathbf{D} \mathbf{y} + \mathbf{e} \mathbf{x}$$

$$\mathbf{x} \in \mathbb{R}, \mathbf{y} \in \mathbb{R}^{\mathsf{n}-1}$$

where d, e, y are (n-1)-dimensional vectors and D is an (n-1)x(n-1) matrix. An example of such a system is the n-dimensional canonical Chua's circuit¹⁵. The generalization of the given theorem in this case is straightforward.

3. APPLICATION TO CHUA'S CIRCUIT

Chua's circuit

The state equations of Chua's circuit are:

$$\begin{vmatrix}
\dot{x} = \alpha(y - h(x)) \\
\dot{y} = x - y + z \\
\dot{z} = -\beta y
\end{vmatrix}$$

where $h(x) = m_1 x + (m_0 - m_1)[|x+1| - |x-1|]/2$. The system is described by four parameters $\{\alpha, \beta, m_0, m_1\}$, with the double scroll chaotic attractor occurring in a neighborhood of $\{0, 14(2/7), -1/7, 2/7\}$. In what follows we assume that $\alpha > 0$, $\beta > 0$ and we fix the values of m_0 and m_1 to -1/7 and 2/7, respectively. Consider the Lyapunov function defined by:

$$V(x, y, z) = \frac{1}{2} x^2 + \frac{1}{2} (A y^2 + 2B yz + C z^2)$$

where $A = \alpha$, $B = -\frac{\alpha}{\beta} \frac{\epsilon}{\epsilon + 1}$, $C = \frac{A - B}{\beta}$, and $\epsilon > 0$ is a small parameter. It is easy to show that its trajectory derivative with respect to the linear system (4) is negative definite, if

$$a > (\varepsilon + 1) \alpha + \frac{\alpha \varepsilon}{4 \beta (\varepsilon + 1)}$$
 (6)

On the other hand, since $\lambda_0 = m_0$, the inequality $\nu < 1$ is satisfied if

The critical value of the diffusion coefficient is obtained when $\varepsilon \to 0$ in Eq.(6). Hence, it is given by:

$$D^* = \frac{\alpha - m_0}{2} \tag{7}$$

Thus, if $D > D^*$, the array of N Chua's circuit, $N \le N_0$, is synchronized. For the double scroll chaotic attractor, the critical value is:

$$D^* = \frac{9 + 1/7}{2} = 4.5714.$$

The first four values of the diffusion coefficient D_{i} are:

$$D_2 = D^*$$
, $D_3 = 9.1428$, $D_4 = 15.6077$ and $D_5 = 23.9362$.

So, if $D_i < D \le D_{i+1}$, i = 2, 3, ..., then $N_0 = i$, and the array with $N \le N_0$ cells is synchronized. Figure 1 shows the number of cells N in the array of Chua's circuits as a function of the diffusion coefficient D. We stress that the above analysis with the same critical coefficient D^* given by (7) is still valid for all $m_0 < m_1$ and $m_0 < \alpha$.

Since the theorem 1. gives only sufficient conditions for asymptotic stability of the manifold M, the above values of D^* and D_i , $i=2,3,\ldots$, are not the minimal values the diffusion coefficient. Numerically we found that D^* is less than 3.5. Figure 2 shows a double scroll chaotic attractor associated with the first and the last cell in a linear

array of Chua's circuits with five cells and D=20. As shown in Fig.3 the array is synchronized, i.e. each coupled subsystem has identical behavior, when $t \to \infty$. If we add just one more cell to the array while retaining the value of D (D=20), we found that the array is no longer synchronized. In fact, all trajectories become unbounded and no attractor is found numerically. This example demonstrates that our *sufficient* condition for synchronization is quite sharp.

Canonical Chua's circuit

The state equations of the canonical Chua's circuit are:

$$\dot{x} = \alpha (y - h(x))$$

$$\dot{y} = x - y + z$$

$$\dot{z} = -\beta y - \gamma z$$
(8)

where $h(x) = m_1 x + (m_0 - m_1)[|x+1| - |x-1|]/2$. The system (8) is described by five parameters { α , β , γ , m_0 , m_1 }. Let us consider the Lyapunov function:

$$V(x, y, z) = \frac{1}{2} x^2 + \frac{1}{2} (A y^2 + 2B yz + C z^2)$$

where A > 0, $AC - B^2 > 0$. Assume that one can find the constants A, B, and C such that all of the main determinants of the matrix:

$$\begin{bmatrix} 2a & -(\alpha + A) & -B \\ -(\alpha + A) & 2(A + B\beta) & -A + B(\gamma + 1) + C\beta \\ -B & -A + B(\gamma + 1) + C\beta & 2(C\gamma - B) \end{bmatrix}$$

are positive. On the other hand, $\nu < 1$ implies $\lambda_0 < a$, where $\lambda_0 = \min \{ m_0, m_1 \}$. Now, we can apply the above theorem. Of course, for fixed values of the parameters $\{ \alpha, \beta, \gamma, m_0, m_1 \}$,

it is not always easy or possible to find such constants A, B and C. Here, we shall give some examples.

Example 3. If $\alpha > 0$, $\beta > 0$, $\gamma > 0$, then using:

$$A = \alpha$$
, $B = 0$, $C = \alpha/\beta$

we obtain that the corresponding array is synchronized if $a > \max\{\alpha, \lambda_0\}$ and the critical value of the diffusion coefficient is given by:

$$D^* = \frac{\max\{0, \alpha, \min\{m_0, m_1\}\} - \min\{m_0, m_1\}}{2}$$
 (9)

For the case of the double scroll chaotic attractor occurring in a neighborhood of $\alpha=9$, $\beta=14(2/7)$, $m_0=-1/7$, $m_1=2/7$ and small γ ($\gamma>0$), (9) becomes (7).

Example 4. If $\alpha < 0$, $\beta > 0$, $\gamma > 0$, then using:

$$A = -\alpha$$
, $B = 0$, $C = -\alpha/\beta$

the array is synchronized if $a > \max\{0, \lambda_0\}$, and the critical value of the diffusion coefficient is again given by (9). Let us consider in more detail the following case: $0 < m_0 < m_1$. Then, both conditions of the theorem 1, are satisfied if $a > \lambda_0 = m_0$. Thus, a can be chosen arbitrarily close to λ_0 : Eq.(9) gives $D^* = 0$, and for D > 0, the array of canonical Chua's circuits with an arbitrary number of cells is synchronized.

4. CONCLUSIONS

In this paper we have analyzed rigorously the synchronization in a one-dimensional array of Chua's circuits. We have proved that under some conditions given in theorem 1, there exists an integer $N_0 = \text{Int } (\pi/\text{arccos } \nu)$, where ν is given by (5), such that all cells in the one-dimensional array of N cells, $N \leq N_0$, are synchronized, i.e. each coupled subsystem has identical behavior, when $t \to \infty$.

We close this paper with the following questions for further study:

- (i) generalize theorem 1 to two- and three-dimensional arrays of Chua's circuit;
- (ii) find the conditions such that in an array of N-cells, the first " i " cells , i < N, are synchronized, while the remaining (N i) cells are not synchronized.

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APPENDIX. Proof of Theorem 1.

Using the notation:

$$X_{k} = x_{k-1} - x_{k+1}, \quad Y_{k} = y_{k-1} - y_{k+1}, \quad Z_{k} = z_{k-1} - z_{k+1}$$

we obtain:

$$\dot{X}_{k} = -\lambda(x_{k}, x_{k+1})X_{k} + a_{1}Y_{k} + a_{2}Z_{k} + D(X_{k-1} - 2X_{k} + X_{k+1})$$

$$\dot{Y}_{k} = b_{11}Y_{k} + b_{12}Z_{k} + b_{1}X_{k}$$

$$\dot{Z}_{k} = b_{21}Y_{k} + b_{22}Z_{k} + b_{2}X_{k}$$

$$k = 1, 2, ..., N - 1,$$
(A.1)

with boundary conditions

$$X_0 = X_N = 0.$$

where

$$\lambda(x_{k}, x_{k+1}) = \frac{\int f(x_{k+1}) - f(x_{k})}{x_{k+1} - x_{k}}.$$

Applying the Mean-value theorem, we can write $\lambda(x_k, x_{k+1}) = f'(\xi), \xi \in (x_k, x_{k+1})$, and hence

$$\lambda(x_k, x_{k+1}) > \lambda_0$$

Consider the Lyapunov function

$$W = \sum_{k=1}^{N-1} V(X_k, Y_k, Z_k)$$

and its trajectory derivative with respect to (A.1):

$$W = \sum_{k=1}^{N-1} \left\{ -(\lambda + 2D - a)X_k^2 + 2DX_k X_{k+1} + 2DX_k X_{k-1} - Q(X_k, Y_k, Z_k) \right\}$$

 ${\it W}$ is negative definite if the quadratic form:

$$P = \sum_{k=1}^{N-1} \left\{ (\lambda_0 + 2D - a) X_k^2 - 2D X_k X_{k+1} - 2D X_k X_{k-1} \right\}$$

is positive definite. This is true if all main determinants Δ_k , k = 1, ..., N of the matrix:

$$\begin{bmatrix}
 2\nu & -1 & 0 & . & 0 & 0 \\
 -1 & 2\nu & -1 & . & 0 & 0 \\
 0 & -1 & 2\nu & . & 0 & 0 \\
 . & . & . & . & . & . \\
 0 & 0 & 0 & . & 2\nu & -1 \\
 0 & 0 & 0 & . & -1 & 2\nu
 \end{bmatrix}$$

are positive, where ν is given by (5). One can easily verify that the following recurrent equation is valid:

$$\Delta_{k} = 2\nu\Delta_{k-1} - \Delta_{k-2}, \ \Delta_{0} = 1, \ \Delta_{-1} = 0, \ k = 1, \dots, N-1.$$

If ν < 1, then the last equation has a solution:

$$\Delta_{k} = \frac{\sin (k+1)\phi}{\sin \phi}, k = 1, \dots N-1$$

where $\phi = \arccos \nu$. For $\nu > 0$ and $N \le N_0$, $N_0 = \operatorname{Int} \left(\pi / \arccos \nu \right)$, all Δ_k , k = 1, ..., N-1 are positive. Hence, the origin of the system (A.1) is asymptotically stable, and consequently, the manifold M is asymptotically stable as well.

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

 vs. x_5 , (b) y_1 vs. y_5 , and (c) z_1 vs. z_5 .









